A call for help

New 988 hotline has expanded mental health services

A depressed client who had intentionally cut herself made a call to the nationwide 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. So did a man struggling with addiction.

When each person dialed 988, a lifeline operator named Vanessa, sitting in a call center run by Memorial Behavioral Health in Springfield, answered the phone. The comfort and empathy she tried to convey may have averted suicide in both situations, she said.

“It made me feel relieved and grateful,” Vanessa, who requested that only her first name be published, told an *Illinois Times* reporter. “I let them vent and get everything off their chest. ... I try to keep them as calm as possible.”

The female caller agreed to have an ambulance come to her home and bring her to a hospital. The man initially told Vanessa she would be the last person he would ever talk to. But after two hours on the phone, his mood lifted.

Nonprofit MBH, which has answered calls funneled through the national suicide prevention hotline for years, expanded its resources to do so in summer 2022 with federal funding connected to the July 16 launch of the three-digit crisis-care number. Callers previously had to dial a longer toll-free number – 800-273-8255 – which continues to operate.

Calls from phone numbers originating in Sangamon, Christian, Logan, Menard, Morgan, Scott and Mason counties are answered by the four-person MBH call center from 7 a.m. Monday through 7 a.m. Saturday. Overflow calls, as well as calls during the hours the MBH center isn't open, are answered by the statewide call center in Bloomington or by another authorized 988 call center in the United States.

MBH has received an annual federal grant of \$417,365, which flows through the state, to operate the 988 call center. Springfield

Memorial Hospital's foundation paid for cubicles, telephone equipment and related technology for the center.

MBH officials said they hope funding expands so the Springfield call center can be open seven days a week.

MBH President Diana Knaebe said the MBH center received 366 calls from central Illinois residents – including at least 184 from people in Sangamon County – in the first six months since 988 began. The number is expected to grow as more people learn about the number and its convenience. Calls to the number are free and confidential.

“The goal of 988 is to make it easier for people across the country to access mental health resources in times of crisis,” Knaebe said. “You don't have to be suicidal to call 988. In fact, you could be someone who's concerned about someone else.”

Officials at Springfield-based Memorial Health, the parent organization of MBH, said the 988 crisis line complements the agency's other crisis-response programs. They include services at the Memorial Behavioral Health Clinic in Springfield and MBH's Mobile Crisis Response teams.

The agency continues to operate its free “emotional support hotline” at 217-588-5509. That hotline began earlier in the COVID-19 pandemic and is for anyone experiencing anxiety or stress but not in the middle of a crisis, Knaebe said. The hotline is open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday.

When in doubt, people going through a mental-health crisis, or their loved ones, should call 988, Knaebe said.

“Talking with somebody about it may help you, and maybe, if nothing else, give you some resources you can check out on your own that may be beneficial,” she said.

Demand for mental health services through

MBH has swelled during the COVID-19 pandemic, initially causing four- to six-month waits for counseling appointments, Knaebe said. After adding additional workers, the agency was able to reduce most waits to between four and six weeks, though demand is still up compared to pre-pandemic levels, she said.

However, pandemic-related stresses, such as job loss and illnesses, rarely come up as contributing factors in why clients call the crisis line, according to call center supervisor Amanda Riva. “I think it's a sub-factor,” she said.

Call center operators “do our best to resolve the situation on the line,” Riva said. “Someone's always going to answer that phone, and it's always confidential.”

Callers don't have to provide their names but are offered follow-up calls and referrals to other services, she said.

Over the past six months, MBH's staff provided 89% of callers all the help they needed over the phone, including follow-up calls, if desired.

Some were informed about The Living Room, a free MBH service that operates from 10:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Living Room offers a calm, safe space at 710 N. Eighth St., inside Memorial Behavioral Health Center, and provides immediate mental health support from peer recovery specialists. No appointment is necessary for The Living Room, which can be reached at 217-588-5272.

A small percentage of callers required more intensive services.

Two percent of callers were sent to hospital emergency departments, 3% of calls were handed over to 911 operators and 6% of callers were referred to MBH's Mobile Crisis Response teams, which respond to mental health crises.

Vanessa, the call center operator, had some advice for people considering dialing 988: “Call with an open mind.”

She believes many people who could benefit don't call because of the stigma that can be associated with mental health.

“We're here to help,” she said. “We're human. We're not going to sit there and be judgmental.” □

Taking time off

General Assembly passes bill requiring employers to offer paid leave

Sherry Morris says a bill that will soon head to the governor's desk for his signature would boost her quality of life "tremendously" as she works in low-income clients' homes to help them maintain independence.

"It's mind-blowing," Morris, 66, of Riverton said in response to the General Assembly's recent passage of a bill that would, for the first time, require all Illinois employers to offer up to five days of paid leave for any reason each year.

Morris, a part-time employee of Help at Home, a Chicago-based company that operates nationwide, is one of an estimated 20,000 home-care workers represented by SEIU Healthcare Illinois who would be affected by Senate Bill 208.

Advocates say Morris and an estimated more than 1 million workers across the state — both union and nonunion, full and part-time — would gain paid time off beginning in January 2024. The biggest group of workers to benefit would be in the service industry.

"This is amazing," said Morris, who is single and also looks after her 30-year-old son, Kyle Patterson, who has mental disabilities and lives with her.

Morris said she earns \$15.85 per hour and works an average of 23 hours per week. She rarely can afford to take unpaid time off, and she has to take her one week of paid vacation all at one time, not sporadically during the year. She said she would welcome paid time off and a little less stress in her life because of the legislation, which is known as the Paid Leave for All Workers Act.

"If I'm not working, I don't get paid," Morris said. "We basically live to work. ... Now I can schedule things and not have to make up hours."

The United States is "an outlier on the world stage" when it comes to paid time off, according to the Illinois Economic Policy Institute. "Fully 179 countries, or 94%, guarantee paid sick leave for workers, but the United States does not," the institute said in a 2020 report.

The institute estimates that 1.5 million workers in the state — almost one in every four — don't have any paid sick time available to them. Illinois would become one of 16 states, along with Washington, D.C., with either mandatory sick time or mandatory paid-time-off laws.

A few Republicans voted for the bill in the Democratic-controlled General Assembly. The Illinois House approved SB 208 on a 78-30

vote Jan. 10, with seven Republicans voting for it. The Senate approved the bill on a 38-16 vote, with no Republicans supporting it.

The Illinois legislation would require paid leave to be accrued at a rate of one hour for every 40 hours worked, up to a minimum total of 40 hours. Employees could start using their paid leave on their 90th day of employment, or earlier if an employer agreed, but employers could require their employees to provide notice for using PTO, if the need for it is foreseeable.

Time-off benefits offering only sick time would have to expand to time off for any reason. The legislation wouldn't prevent unionized employees from negotiating paid leave exceeding the 40 hours, and nonunion employers would have the option of offering more than 40 hours, too. The bill's paid leave requirements could be waived for unionized employees only if they agreed to it in a labor contract.

Unused paid leave would carry over annually, up to 40 hours, and employers that violate the act could be required to pay fines to the state and compensatory damages to affected employees.

Private employers, the state and local units of government would be covered by the bill, but school districts and park districts would be exempt. The bill also wouldn't preempt local laws passed by municipalities such as Chicago,

which already requires paid sick leave.

"Whether it's dealing with a sudden family illness or an emergency auto repair, sometimes life gets in the way of work," SB 208's sponsors, Senate Majority Leader Kimberly Lightford, D-Maywood, and Rep. Jehan Gordon-Booth, D-Peoria, another of the bill's sponsors, said in a joint statement.

"Paid leave will have a significant, positive impact on the lives of residents across our state and underscores our commitment to uplifting working families," Lightford and Gordon-Booth said.

But outgoing Sen. Jason Barickman, R-Bloomington, said the bill's mandates would create burdens for "mom-and-pop shops that are the lifeblood" of the Illinois business community.

Most business groups eventually took a "neutral" stance on the bill because of provisions that included a one-year preparation period before requirements would kick in. But Illinois Chamber President Todd Maisch said, "We didn't think it was great. This got it at least into the barely acceptable range."

The National Federation of Independent Business remained opposed to the bill. Illinois State Director Chris Davis said the cost burden will be "very difficult" for some small businesses to implement and could put some out of business.

Wendy Pollack, director of the Women's Law & Policy Initiative at the Chicago-based Shriver Center on Policy Law, which backs the legislation, said there are "plenty of studies that show that offering these benefits actually makes a workforce more productive."

The Economic Policy Institute says paid sick leave leads to less risk of spreading infections at workplaces and boosts the economy through increases in consumer spending.

Maisch said employers want happy and healthy employees, too. They just shouldn't be required to offer mandatory paid leave, he said.

Sarah Labadie, associate director of policy at Chicago-based Women Employed, said the criticisms that Chicago's 2017 mandatory sick leave ordinance would be a job killer never came to pass, and the same would be true for the rest of the state under SB 208.

Many workers needing to take time off face "an impossible situation," Labadie said. "Often, one unpaid day off is the difference between paying a bill or not." □

Shouting your message

Springfield native and professional artist to paint mural on east side

Painting a mural is like shouting your message, contends Barbara Mason, a Springfield native and professional artist commissioned to paint a scene on the city's east side.

"From an artist's perspective, mural art is not very much different than if you were just painting on a canvas that would go on your wall at home," she told *Illinois Times*. "It gets your point across, but it's just on a larger scale. So, one would be like saying something in conversation and the other like shouting it out loud."

U.S. Rep. Nikki Budzinski, D-Springfield, announced this month that the Springfield Art Association will receive a \$15,000 federal grant from the National Endowment for the Arts for the creation of a mural.

"The NEA is providing \$15,000 that will need to be matched for the total cost of the project of \$30,000," said Betsy Dollar, executive director of the art association.

Dollar said the location and theme for the mural have not been decided. That determination will be made after seeking public input during neighborhood meetings.

One higher-profile site the SAA is considering is near 11th Street and South Grand Avenue in the Southtown neighborhood, she said. A possible mural idea is to highlight the manufacturing heritage of the area.

"There once was a lot more manufacturing going on in Springfield and there were just flat-out a lot more jobs," Dollar said. "The east side was quite stable, middle class and chugging right along."

Getting Mason, a nationally recognized artist, to agree to create the project was quite a

coup, Dollar added.

"She was born and raised on Springfield's east side and now lives in Texas," she said. "She is nationally known for her pastel artwork."

The mural will be created under the direction of Mason with the help of area high school students.

"My guess is that she will draw the whole thing out and get their help in doing flat areas — like filling in a coloring book. And then she will go in and nuance it with shading," Dollar said.

Mason, a 1981 graduate of Southeast High School, worked for many years as an ultrasound technician at Springfield Memorial Hospital.

"I ran the ultrasound department there for years and I was looking for a hobby, something to do to balance my work and life," said Mason. "And that's when I discovered watercolors and I became a member of the Sangamon Watercolor Society. ... I thought, 'This is working out pretty well. I enjoyed it. So, I applied for my first art show, and that was the National Black Arts Festival in Atlanta. It was a 10-day art show that changed my career. I got a greeting card contract during that show, and I met the top artists in the nation. I started traveling nationally and exhibiting and I just never looked back.'"

Although she now owns her own ultrasound business, she considers herself a full-time artist.

"People see my artwork on cards with words that inspire or comfort someone. It's amazing. And I get calls from all over the world. They say, 'I looked on the back of my greeting card and I saw your name, and I love your artwork.'" □

New names for Sports Hall of Fame

Seven area athletes, five friends of sport to be inducted Feb. 20

Seven athletes will be inducted into the Springfield Sports Hall of Fame next month as part of a 31-year capital city tradition.

"To be considered, you have to have been retired from the sport for at least 10 years and played for one of Springfield's high schools," said Chris Leming, president of the hall of fame.

The athletes will be inducted in a ceremony at the Bank of Springfield Center on Feb. 20 at 7 p.m. This year's inductees:

Nathaniel Browning is a 2004 Lutheran High School graduate who won back-to-back Class A state track 400-meter championships in 2003 and 2004 and scored more than 1,000 points in basketball. He earned a track scholarship to the University of Kentucky in the Southeastern Conference, and while there he was a two-time All-American in the 4x400 relay.

Dominique "Major" Clay is a 2007 Lanphier High School graduate who excelled in track and field as well as basketball. He was a two-time state champion in the high jump and set the Illinois high school indoor high jump record at 7-0 ¼. He earned a track scholarship to Indiana State University where he cleared 7-0 in 35 of the 38 indoor meets. Clay ranked in the top 20 in the world when he was at his highest level and competed at the 2012 U.S. Olympic trials.

Doug Collins is a 1987 Lanphier graduate who played two varsity seasons for the Lions and scored 986 points. He played at John A. Logan College in 1987-88 and 1988-89 and was freshman of the year in the Great River Athletic Conference. He transferred to Iowa State in the Big Eight Conference where he played for Johnny Orr and scored 224 points as a junior in 1989-90 and 442 points as a senior in 1990-91. He has spent the past 22 seasons as the girls' basketball coach at Lanphier.

Phil Eck is a 1980 Springfield High School graduate who earned All-City honors in soccer as a junior and senior and then attended Quincy College, where he played on NAIA national championship teams in 1980, 1981 and 1982. As a senior he served as the assistant soccer coach at Quincy Notre Dame High School, which finished second in the Illinois High School Association state tournament. He was hired as a teacher and head boys' soccer coach at

Springfield High School in 1985, and in 22 seasons his teams compiled a record of 352-131-43, including the 1997 Class A state title.

Jim Files is a 1980 Lanphier graduate who became the first and only boys' runner in Springfield history to win the state championship in cross country, covering the 3-mile course at Peoria's Detweiller Park in 14 minutes 18.3 seconds in 1979. He is still the lone large-school individual boys' champion from Sangamon County since the state meet began in 1946. He served four years in the Army upon graduation from high school.

John Fox is a 1976 Lanphier graduate who earned nine varsity letters – four in basketball, four in baseball and one in golf. During his basketball career he scored more than 1,400 points and was a two-time All-City selection. In baseball he was a pitcher and a catcher and earned a pair of All-City selections. He received a baseball scholarship to Eastern Illinois University and played there for two seasons before transferring to Quincy College, where a knee injury ended his collegiate career.

Tracy Tate Wilson, a Springfield High graduate, is the only high school player in city history to capture two state championships in golf, winning by three strokes in 1980 and defending her crown by one shot in '81. She earned a scholarship to Oklahoma State University and was a member of the Cowgirls in 1985 before transferring to the University of South Florida. She was a PGA teaching professional and director of golf operations at Walt Disney World in Orlando, Florida.

Also being inducted into the Hall of Fame are five "Friends of Sport."

Mike Chamness was the *State Journal-Register* sports editor from 1986 to 1991 and created The State Journal-Register Baseball Classic in 1990. He was part of the group that established the Springfield Sports Hall of Fame in 1990. After spending more than 20 years in the newspaper business, he entered state government in 1991, working in the secretary of state and governor's offices. He was chair of the Illinois Terrorism Task Force from 1999 to 2020.

Larry Chaney served as a coach, teacher and administrator in District 186 for 33

years, including 16 seasons as head baseball coach at Southeast High School and eight years as athletic director at Southeast.

During that time, he played a major role in the formation of the Central State Eight Conference. He was inducted into the Illinois Athletic Directors Association Hall of Fame in 2006, and in 2001 he was named a Class AA Outstanding Athletic Director.

Cress Maddox and **John Reynolds** were both instrumental in bringing girls' soccer to Springfield School District 186 in the late 1980s. They made presentations within the school district numerous times to ask that the sport be offered. Not only did they bring girls soccer to 186, they worked to get Lee Field secured so all of the school district's soccer teams could use it as their home field, raising all of the money for the lights and the construction of the field. Lee Field is used by four of the city's high schools and was used this past season by University of Illinois Springfield men's and women's soccer teams.

Paul Pachlhofer is a 1974 Griffin High School graduate. He began his baseball umpiring career in 1976 and continues to work games today, including numerous regionals, sectionals and supersectionals as well as the state finals in 2021 and 2022. He has been an Illinois High School Association clinician since 2016. He officiated high school basketball from 2008 to 2015 and high school football from 2009 to 2015. He also served as the public address announcer for football games at Memorial Stadium from 1981 to 2005 and as the PA announcer for the City Basketball Tournament from 1984 to 2022. He did sports reporting at WTAX from 1991 to 1996 and at Neuhoff Media-Springfield from 1996 to the present.

Jim Ruppert was a *State Journal-Register* sports writer from 1976 to 1991 and *SJ-R* sports editor from 1991 to 2016. He was part of the group that established the Springfield Sports Hall of Fame. He joined the Neuhoff Media broadcast team in 1991 and continues in that role. He has served as master of ceremonies for the Springfield Sports Hall of Fame since 1999. □

Demand exceeds supply for Illinois EVs

State and federal rebates are snapped up quickly

The state of Illinois has set a goal of one million electric vehicle (EV) registrations by the year 2030. With fewer than 60,000 registrations currently, the state has a long way to go.

Megha Lakhchaura was appointed by Gov. JB Pritzker to coordinate the state's push to electrify the stock of automobiles registered in Illinois. According to Lakhchaura, there are three areas that must be addressed in getting more electric cars on the road in Illinois: supply, demand and infrastructure.

On the supply side, EV manufacturers are having trouble keeping up with consumer demand for many vehicles. For instance, demand was so high for the Ford F-150 Lightning that in April the company announced it had quit taking orders for the 2022 model year. That initial order of 200,000 vehicles will take nearly three years to fill, even with projected increases in production capacity. Customers who ordered the 2022 model will pay a base price of \$40,000 (up to \$90,000 for the Platinum trim), while the starting price for the 2023 model year is \$55,000.

Mike Quimby, general manager of Green Hyundai in Springfield, said that he can hardly keep electric vehicles on the lot. "Most of the EVs that arrive are presold. Demand is off the charts." This in spite of the fact that Hyundais are not eligible for the federal tax credit for domestically manufactured EVs. MSRP for the base 2023 Hyundai Kona is \$33,550. Quimby sees very few EVs traded in, and they are quickly snapped up.

Electric truck manufacturer Rivian, which

has its only manufacturing plant in Normal, fell short of its goal of 25,000 vehicles by about 700 units in 2022. The company cited supply chain issues as the cause, but the *Wall Street Journal* pointed out Jan. 10 that Rivian also lost four high-level executives this past year, including Patrick Hunt, its Head of Strategy.

On the demand side, both the state and federal governments offer incentives for EV purchases. The state of Illinois offers a rebate of \$4,000, but on Jan. 11 the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency announced that the number of applications has exceeded the amount of available funding. Another cycle for rebate applications will open when additional funding becomes available, according to IEPA.

The federal incentive is in the form of a tax credit of up to \$7,500. Most consumers will receive less than that because of rules regarding income and vehicle price. For example, federal tax credits are only available for passenger cars with a sticker price less than \$55,000 and trucks with a sticker price less than \$80,000.

On Jan. 13, Tesla announced that it had cut prices by up to 20%, making more of its vehicles, including its most popular seller, eligible for the federal tax credit. In fact, with the tax credit, the Tesla model Y long-range costs about \$3,500 less than the average price of \$49,507 for a new vehicle in the United States, according to *Kelly Blue Book*.

Quimby said he sees two issues of concern for his customers who are on the fence about buying an EV: reliable access to charging stations, and the cost of batteries. He noted that the infrastructure isn't in place to accommodate EV drivers going on long trips, a matter of particular concern in an area like central Illinois. "Not only are there too few charging stations, but in cold weather the range of the vehicle diminishes."

The battery is the most expensive component of an EV. Quimby said that

when the car is involved in an accident, if the battery is damaged it increases the likelihood that the insurance company will declare the vehicle a total loss. A gasoline-powered vehicle suffering a similar amount of damage could be repaired. When the battery reaches the end of its service life it may be prohibitively expensive to replace, even if the rest of the vehicle is in good condition.

Under federal law, batteries in all EVs sold in the United States must be warranted for a minimum of eight years or 100,000 miles, so *Consumer Reports* estimates replacement costs of batteries only up to the 2014 model year. For 2023, those costs range from \$4,489 for a Prius to \$17,657 for a Nissan Leaf.

Lakhchaura says the state is working aggressively to provide a charging infrastructure in Illinois that will keep up with anticipated demand. The state plans to install 1,300 fast-charging stations in the next two years, some of the cost paid with \$146 million in federal money. One estimate places the cost of a "level two" charging station at \$6,000, not counting infrastructure which can add \$15,000 or more to the cost.

"We've seen a steady acceleration in EV registrations," Lakhchaura said, "over 19,000 during the past year, despite the severe supply chain interruptions experienced by the industry during that time. Rapid improvement of infrastructure has to be a priority." □

From a young age, Bennie Strumpher had a passion for coins.

Black Lives Matter-Springfield is heartbroken to learn about the senseless killing of Earl Moore, a 35-year-old resident of Springfield.

We were contacted by the Sangamon County State's Attorney's Office and Springfield Police Department and learned that Earl Moore was killed at the hands of two Springfield emergency medical technicians. Three of our board members reviewed footage of the incident and were deeply troubled by what we viewed.

While we know that our justice system is broken and this will not bring true justice to Earl Moore and his family, we support the legal actions currently being taken to hold Peter Cadigan and Peggy Finley accountable for Earl Moore's death. The Black community faces constant bias and racism in a variety of contexts, including while seeking medical treatment. This is exacerbated for those with co-occurring mental and substance use disorders. Unfortunately, this incident shines a light on how dangerous it can be for the Black community to seek treatment and receive medical care.

We recognize it should not be the responsibility of the local police to provide medical guidance once EMTs have arrived. Still, we are questioning the protocols and approach currently in place that influences police officers to stand by while a member of the Springfield community is treated with such careless and aggressive actions.

Springfield Police Department and law enforcement agencies must use this as an

opportunity to critically examine what happened and to implement policies and procedures that enable life-saving actions and behaviors. It is incumbent upon all of us to take action when we can, but those entrusted with community safety have a pivotal role to play in intervening to stop violence. How we treat someone when they are at their most vulnerable says so much about the health of our community. So many things could have been done which could have led to a different outcome.

Highlights from the lame duck session

In addition to several high-profile bills, other significant legislation was passed

When the Democrats get their act together during a legislative lame duck session, they can really pass a lot of stuff in short order.

We've seen it before. Two years ago, the Democrats passed a huge amount of important legislation, including the SAFE-T Act, in just a few days.

Except maybe for the assault weapons ban, which is proving unpopular with county sheriffs who believe they have the right to personally interpret the Constitution, nothing quite that intensely controversial passed during this year's lame duck session.

Both chambers also passed a bill to protect out-of-state abortion providers who travel to Illinois, which has since been signed into law. The bill also protects non-Illinois physicians and parents of children who travel here for gender-affirming care.

And both chambers gave the governor a big win with the passage of his \$500 million Large Business Attraction Fund. There are hopes that the governor can use at least some of that money to persuade Stellantis to transform its about-to-be-closed Belvidere plant to one that makes electric vehicles.

The coverage of those three bills will likely overshadow some other bills of note:

- SB208: I think this bill could have more impact on the day-to-day lives of struggling working people than maybe anything else I've ever seen passed in Illinois. All workers at private companies will now qualify for five paid leave days per year, no questions asked.

Just try missing a couple of days' pay on a budget with absolutely no wiggle room. It can be a disaster. And now, some, or even much of that pain will be avoided.

The state's top business groups, led by the Illinois Retail Merchants Association, have been negotiating this bill for years, mainly in an attempt to preempt Chicago from passing a more generous plan. But the final bill allows the city and other home rule units to pass more expansive benefit laws and the groups were neutral.

All props to sponsors Rep. Jehan Gordon-Booth and Sen. Kimberly Lightford for getting this thing across the finish line with the help of the two Democratic legislative leaders and the governor and organized labor. Some Republicans even voted for it in the House. I really can't believe this all came together.

- HB1563: The legislature approved a bill a few years ago which required all state jobs with no specific location requirements to be relocated to Sangamon County. Newly created jobs had to be located in the state capital's county as well. But both lame duck chambers significantly loosened

those requirements.

- HB969: The Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability revised this fiscal year's revenue outlook upward by a whopping \$4.9 billion last November. The belief is that this money is one-time only, so the governor and the Democratic legislative leaders have proposed using most of that cash to pay down bills, build up the Rainy Day Fund, create a business attraction fund, etc.

But legislators are spending creatures and they all have priorities, so the pressure to add bigtime dollars into the state's base spending is undoubtedly intense, which could cause a fiscal disaster if/and/or when revenues fall.


One solution is to divert some of that extra cash into one-time spending for members, including capital projects. The idea would be to placate legislators without putting future pressure on the state budget.

So, the new supplemental appropriations bill has a ton of one-time local and Democratic priority spending, like \$5 million to the Hate Crimes and Bias Incident and Response Fund, \$162 million for "costs associated with care and

services provided to asylum seekers" that the city has sought, \$1 million to the Chicago Recovering Communities Coalition for the South Side Heroin/Opioid Task Force, \$10 million to the Office of the State Appellate Defender for "all costs associated with pretrial release," \$500K to the Peoria Civic Center for "audience building seed," \$75 million for housing programs, \$4 million for East St. Louis home renovation grants, \$11 million for construction of an East St. Louis trauma recovery center, \$9 million to community colleges and universities to administer the Mental Health Early Action on Campus Act, etc., etc., etc. Several churches will receive state funds as well.

Not everyone was happy. Just \$12.5 million was appropriated to community-based services for persons with developmental disabilities, when advocates wanted at least \$30 million.

And there's a danger that a few of these one-time grants could create future spending pressure. Casa Central, a Latino social service agency, is getting \$500K for ongoing operating expenses as is the Peoria Riverfront Museum and others. But it's not really a huge amount. □



Choosing which laws to enforce

“We don’t make the laws; we just enforce them.”

Such statements have become nearly a cliché in police departments across the nation. But the statement is not always true. Some laws are enforced more readily than others.

And over the years, more than a few sheriffs have issued press releases saying they won’t enforce one particular law or another.

For example, Bexar County, Texas, Sheriff Javier Salazar announced June 25, after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned the *Roe v. Wade* decision that he would not enforce a Texas law restricting abortion.

“Shame on the Supreme Court and the bureaucrats in Washington, D.C., and Austin who are attempting to impose their own supposed morals on others,” Salazar wrote in the post. “They will not use my badge or the color of my office to do so.”

Not surprisingly, his statement was criticized by Texas conservatives and praised by progressives. Should a cop ignore a law because he just doesn’t like it?

That question is being asked in Sangamon County where Sheriff Jack Campbell has announced he will not enforce an assault weapon ban recently passed by the Illinois General Assembly and signed by Gov. JB Pritzker.

Campbell, who said he believes the bill violates the Second Amendment, joined the vast majority of Illinois county sheriffs who have said they will not comply with the act.

“I believe this is not just my moral duty, but my constitutional duty to defend the citizens’ right to keep and bear arms,” he told *Illinois Times*.

The Protect Illinois Communities Act, signed into law by Pritzker on Jan 10, immediately bans the sale and purchase of a list of semiautomatic firearms and gives owners of those weapons until Jan. 1, 2024, to report their serial numbers with the Illinois State Police.

“At this point, I don’t see any part of it that I am comfortable with, because all it does is begin to encroach on our Second Amendment rights,” he said. “If we don’t say, ‘no’ now, we might find ourselves living in a country we really don’t want to live in.”

It should surprise no one that it is sheriffs that are making public pronouncements about not enforcing controversial laws. After all, they are politicians wearing uniforms.

But is it appropriate for law enforcement agencies to refuse to enforce laws they don’t like?

Well, to a certain extent, they have always done that. When I was a newspaper reporter in Las Vegas, Nevada was the only state where

possession of any amount of marijuana was a felony.

At the time, I asked two cop friends how they went about enforcing the state’s Draconian pot law. One, a University of Nevada Las Vegas police officer, said when she smelled marijuana while patrolling the dorms, she simply ignored it. Another, a constable in Clark County, Nevada, said when he found marijuana while serving eviction orders, he’d simply flush it down the toilet but not make any arrests.

Neither believed pursuing felony charges against the scofflaws was a good use of law enforcement resources. Then again, the Nevada Legislature – duly elected by the people – said this was criminal behavior. Should these cops have turned a blind eye on felonious behavior?

Is it their place to pick and choose what laws to enforce? Most civics books would say “no.”

When sheriffs announce they won’t enforce a particular law they are committing an ethical transgression, said Robert Wadman, a former police chief of Aurora, Illinois, and Omaha, Nebraska, and a professor emeritus at Weber State University.

Here is the rub, the Bexar County sheriff said he wouldn’t enforce abortion restrictions *after* the U.S. Supreme Court ruled such laws were constitutional. The Nevada cops I knew cast a blind eye toward marijuana laws that, while lousy public policy, did pass constitutional muster.

Campbell and more than 70 other Illinois sheriffs have said they won’t enforce the law *before* its constitutionality has been considered by a single judge. Could the new law be ruled unconstitutional? Yes. But its far from a certainty, says Eric Ruben, a law professor at Southern Methodist University, who specializes in the Second Amendment.

“It sends a message to citizens that they don’t have to follow the law. And it sets sheriffs up as the people who decide whether a law is constitutional – and that’s not their role. In a way, it would have been more honest to say they weren’t going to enforce the law because they didn’t agree with it. But they are weighing in on its constitutionality, and that’s not their job.”

The right to bear arms, like any right, isn’t an absolute. Ultimately, whether the law is constitutional will be decided by the courts.

With the current makeup of the U.S. Supreme Court, it is unclear whether the assault weapon ban will pass constitutional muster, he said.

In the meantime, it would be best if sheriffs just enforced the law rather than opined on its constitutionality.

Earl Moore Jr.

The tragic death of Earl Moore Jr., and the erosion of trust

On Jan. 10, the Sangamon County state's attorney announced that charges of first-degree murder were filed against two emergency medical technicians in the death of Earl Moore Jr., age 35. According to the Sangamon County Coroner's Office, Moore, an African American man, died from "compressional and positional asphyxia due to prone face-down restraint on a paramedic transportation cot/stretcher by tightened straps across the back."

The people of SIU Medicine join the family of Earl Moore Jr. in their sorrow, and we extend our deepest condolences. We all are devastated by the collective loss that our community is experiencing, and we recognize that there is no way to repair the harm that was inflicted on Mr. Moore and on a community still wrestling at the intersection of race, trauma and medical mistrust.

We have worked hard to strengthen trust in our community because we know that health inequity is inextricably related to a deep-seated mistrust of the health care system – a mistrust that has arisen through a variety of social issues, the most prominent of which is systemic racism. As we have worked to repair this divide with communities of color, health outcomes have improved.

One example is the three-year Enos Park Access to Care Collaborative, a program which has impacted 2,500 people through the collaborative effort of local health care organizations and groups that address the social determinants of health. Through this work, we learned together that the engagement of community leaders, the work of local residents as community health workers, and *listening* to those in need are key to the development of trust. This increase in trust had a greater impact than we anticipated, with many significant improvements in both medical and social outcomes.

The success of this project and others like it reinforce the importance of fostering relationships with those who have been historically marginalized, displaced and oppressed by health systems and health care organizations. The death of Earl Moore Jr. from asphyxiation while in custody of the health community will harm this critical work, and the trauma experienced by people in our community as they hear of this tragedy and watch the bodycam footage will erode trust and likely challenge the progress that has been made.

Harm can be both active and passive. Passive harm occurs when we witness violence

and say nothing. Statements of condemnation are a first step in interrupting further harm. This is a way that we collectively name the injury and call out the behavior that led to it. Statements like this and others that will be made in the days and weeks ahead are only the first step. They must be followed by meaningful and sustained actions to build greater equity and to strengthen trust in the health care system in our community.

Our organizations will continue to care for our community and develop trust through community outreach and forums on health inequities. We will continue to build on our

internal antiracism and anti-oppression work through our educational programs, trauma-responsive leadership development and culture change in response to the needs of our community, our patients and ourselves. And we stand ready to support health care workers across the community who seek resources and training to address historic and present harms within our community.

Let us all join the family of Earl Moore Jr. in mourning his death and recommit ourselves to develop the community we all long to live in – one that values the inherent dignity and worth of each person.

Statement on the murder of Earl Lynne Moore Jr.

The Springfield Coalition on Dismantling Racism (SCoDR) envisions an antiracist society and works diligently to dismantle institutional and systemic racism in Springfield and its surrounding communities. SCoDR is intently focused on training, networking, caucusing, consulting and developing affinity groups to build antiracist and multicultural diversity within organizations. We are deeply pained and horrified to witness the murder of Earl Lynne Moore Jr., 35-year-old Springfield resident and beloved son, brother and community member.

The callous disregard and blatant disrespect for Earl Moore's dignity, life and humanity was on full display by Peggy Finley and Peter Cadigan, emergency medical service workers, employed by

LifeStar, whose mission statement is "to promote, restore, and maintain the health of the people by appropriately providing a superior level of care during critical care transport."

Finley and Cadigan failed the mission in every way imaginable. Both debased, fractured and destroyed Earl Moore when they disregarded their training and showed contempt for his life. Like the murder of George Floyd, Moore died of suffocation. Instead of a knee, EMS workers' weapons of choice was the prone position on an ambulance stretcher and excessive force with straps that were pulled tightly to the point of asphyxiation.

Within seconds of their arrival at Moore's residence, they grossly and relentlessly mistreated him. Police bodycam footage

shows Finley repeatedly telling Moore to "get up and I don't have time for this s__ _." Cadigan resorts to physical abuse and body-slams Moore onto the stretcher. The inequities aimed at him is more evidence of the hatred and discrimination minoritized populations endure in the health care industry and society at large. We observe too many incidents in racialized ethnic communities when cries for help quickly become crime scenes when racist people are put in positions of power and service.

We affirm and support the swift and just response of the Sangamon County State's Attorney Office to charge Finley and Cadigan with first-degree murder. The emergency service workers who deliberately violated their duty to restore health are added to a list of violent aggressors who span

more than 400 years of brutality directed at marginalized people across America.

We are resolved to support the family members of Earl Moore during this unbearable season of grief and loss. We ask health care workers and law enforcement agencies to join forces to fulfill the oaths of protection, care and service they made before their governing boards and the communities they serve. We implore policymakers to not view this situation as "a few bad apples," but to examine the apple barrel that permits demeaning and inequitable treatment to persist in vulnerable communities. As an antiracist organization, we are committed to collaborating to educate, train and strategize with community partners to decrease harm and decimate racism and oppression.

War doesn't work well. Here's a strategy for peace.

In the Ukraine city of Bakhmut, fighting between Russian and Ukrainian troops has been going on for six months now. The city had 100,000 residents before the war; now only 7,000 remain. Many neighborhoods have been reduced to rubble by Russian artillery. The city has little strategic value, but it carries symbolic value for both sides, according to the *New York Times*. Both sides have sustained heavy losses but the killing continues. "This is what madness looks like," said Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky about nearby Soledar, similarly devastated and covered with corpses.

The war is escalating, as Ukrainian soldiers head for Oklahoma to be trained on how to operate Poseidon missiles the U.S. has agreed to supply, and Germany is preparing to contribute modern tanks. Russia has plans for conscripting thousands of new troops for a spring offensive. At first the U.S. was cautious about what weapons it would contribute, and Zelensky was cautious to preserve his scarce troops. Now caution is becoming a casualty of Russian aggression.

Is there a logical connection between killing and freedom? Does Russia see a connection between destroying power plants and its goal of annexing Ukraine? War doesn't work very well. It just makes both sides angry, drained of resources and filled with sorrow. There are better ways to resolve disputes.

"The utility of war has become extremely low for producing desirable political outcomes," writes Notre Dame political science professor emeritus Robert C. Johansen, at the beginning of his 2021 scholarly volume on peacemaking: *Where the Evidence Leads – A Realistic Strategy for Peace and Human Security* (353 pages, Oxford University Press, \$34.95). Especially these days, military war doesn't work against non-state actors like Al-Qaeda and Boko Haram, or non-military threats like climate change and cyber attacks.

And war can lead to nuclear devastation. The world no longer seems to worry about nuclear war, like it did in 1961, when President Kennedy warned at the United Nations, "Every man, woman and child lives under a nuclear sword of Damocles, hanging by the slenderest of threads, capable of being cut at any moment by accident or miscalculation or by madness." President Vladimir Putin and former President Donald Trump both have publicly toyed with the idea of using nuclear weapons in the Ukraine war.

Is war a choice? Isn't war the last resort, when

all else has failed? There is often a choice, and there would be a more viable choice if the world would spend even a fraction of its resources on building the architecture of peacemaking as it spends on weapons for destruction.

Johansen outlines a new way of thinking in his suggestions for exchanging the terms *national security* for *global security* and *foreign affairs* for *world affairs*. Thinking beyond borders, and beyond narrow national interests, could slow the wasteful arms race, for which the U.S. plans to spend \$1.2 trillion on nuclear weapons over the next 30 years. Nonviolent campaigns oust dictators around the world more often than military campaigns, and result in democracy more often. Instead of being the world's leading arms merchant, might the U.S. become the leading exporter of nonviolent resistance training? The rule of law, were it to be established worldwide, could allow individuals to challenge their own government's actions in court. Dictators and bad actors could be arrested and put on trial before the International Criminal Court.

This seems unrealistic until the difference between political realism and empirical realism is explained. Political realists think the current nation-states and their ideologies are here to stay, while empirical realists think the status quo was created by people and can be changed by people. Political realists think "great powers are like billiard balls that vary only in size," while empirical realists look within states to explore for opportunities for change – as with recent protests in Russia, China and Iran. Political

realists expect the stronger military to win a war, while empirical realists pay attention to the power of ideas to overcome military weakness, as the U.S. learned in Vietnam.

There are reasons for hope. There are steps being taken now – like rejoining the Paris climate accord and revisiting the Iran nuclear deal – that enhance human security. Promoting global citizenship through education can revive interest in neglected or impoverished regions of the world. Concerned citizens standing up for human dignity can "connect people everywhere with others struggling anywhere to live their fear-ridden lives in ways not determined by fear alone."

This *Strategy for Peace* is current in its details and strategy, but in broad outline not so different from the vision of Adlai Stevenson, the former Illinois governor who was U.S. ambassador to the United Nations in the Kennedy administration. On Nov. 15, 1961, Stevenson addressed a U.N. committee on "Working Toward a World Without War."

"We must abolish war to save our collective skins," he said. He acknowledged that it takes "a strenuous intellectual effort to imagine a world free from war." But he proceeded to envision "adequate machinery for keeping the peace," which included disarmament and a stronger United Nations. A world without war would not be a utopia, Stevenson said, but it would be "a world both safer and more exhilarating for us all to live in." □

Maintain a healthy lifestyle all winter

Don't throw yourself into an all-or-nothing New Year's resolution mindset, only to give up by mid-February, but don't give into the temptation to relax your healthy habits over the winter with the justification that you'll get back on track when spring comes. There's no one-size-fits-all solution for a safe and healthy winter season, says Dr. Joseph Townsend, an internal medicine specialist with HSHS Medical Group who practices at Priority Care on MacArthur Boulevard. Your best bet is reasonable and consistent choices that you can keep up for the long haul.

The benefits of steady maintenance

Opt for moderation and general lifestyle upkeep over extremes of indulgence and restriction – because gaining and losing that same 5 to 10 pounds might catch up with you over time, says Townsend. In his practice as a primary care physician, he sees many cases of metabolic syndrome, a group of risk factors including high blood pressure, high blood sugar, excess body fat around the waist and abnormal cholesterol or triglyceride levels. He says the condition is related to weight gain and inactivity, and he frequently sees a pattern of people gaining a few pounds during the cold weather months, expecting to lose it later, but then not being able to drop the weight as easily as they might have when they were younger. Over the years, as the cycle continues, some patients find themselves increasingly further from their healthy weight.

“What we're trying to do is maintain a healthy lifestyle,” says Townsend. “We want people to do this, and we want them to do it in

a safe way.” The best path for one person may not be the same for the next, so different fitness levels and abilities need different game plans.

If you're already an exerciser

For people who already have a year-round exercise routine, winter fitness might mean continuing what you're already doing but making a few adjustments before taking your workout into the elements. Townsend recommends precautions like wearing warm gloves and socks to protect your fingers and toes, ensuring adequate hydration even when you don't feel as thirsty as you usually would during the warm weather months and doing some extra stretching before you head out to guard against cold-weather-induced sprains and strains. Townsend suggests a temperature of 40 degrees as a safe cutoff point for prolonged outdoor exercise. If it's above 40, go ahead and run, bike, walk or do whatever you usually do.

“It's tough to get motivated, and it's even tougher to get motivated to get out in the cold,” says Townsend. However, for those who do brave the cooler temps, Townsend notes there are many benefits. Thanks to your body having to work harder to maintain its temperature, cold-weather exercisers enjoy boosted calorie-burning power. Also, Townsend says, “Seasonal affective disorder is very real,” and getting outside for sunshine and vitamin D is a huge perk of enjoying an outdoor fitness routine when possible.

If you're just getting started

For those who are less active to begin with or who have some physical limitations or medical

conditions, Townsend recommends meeting with a physician to assess your underlying health and work on a plan tailored to address your specific situation.

Townsend says that for any level of fitness, there are many modifications that can be made to keep you active, and for many people, even light-to-moderate activity, such as daily housework, is a win. If the weather is bad and it wouldn't be safe to go outside, just getting up and walking around the house, putting through indoor hobbies and chores, can greatly protect your health.

Older patients or those with cardiovascular conditions should not exercise in cold environments, Townsend says, because blood pressure goes up, and the heart is pumping harder, leading to increased risks. However, existing cardiology patients have the advantage of a safe, indoor, structured rehab program that can safely keep their bodies active year-round, and they should keep attending their workouts all winter long.


Townsend says to envision the body's cardiovascular system as a house's plumbing, and when cold temps cause the body's extremities to clamp down, it makes it harder for blood to flow through the pipes. He specifically cautions against pushing your limits to shovel snow. “Take frequent breaks, even if you're healthy,” says Townsend.

Keep moving and keep focusing on day-to-day healthy choices. Spring will arrive again, and we'll be there to greet it!



Journaling for mental health

Find what supports or diminishes you

Many of us grew up keeping diaries where we wrote of our teen dramas, current crush du jour and our most intimate secrets, though this practice was often dropped with the transition into adulthood. If you are looking to improve your mental health, you may want to get back into this habit with its shiny new adult name: journaling.



Journaling for mental health has become more popular in our culture as habits that support and encourage good mental health practices have become more mainstream.

It takes no special equipment, just setting aside a few minutes every day to enable this practice to become a habit. Some folks journal throughout the day, others set a reminder alarm at a particular time, and some people find it easier to establish new habits by attaching them to a habit they already maintain, such as journaling after brushing one's teeth.

The easiest way to journal is to mind dump, and that is exactly what it sounds like: writing down all your thoughts and feelings about what happened during the day. This can often bring a sense of clarity, help process emotions and enable us to identify patterns of thought, whether helpful or destructive. Some people draw in addition to writing – however it works for you.

Another way to journal is to ask yourself a set of specific questions each day. What excited you? What drained you? What supported you? What did you learn? What are three things you are grateful for? These questions can help identify the things that support or diminish you in your daily life.

Campbell Walker, a YouTube content creator known as Struthless and author of *Your Head is a Houseboat: A Chaotic Guide to Mental Clarity*, said asking himself these questions for a month helped him identify alcohol and social media as consistent triggers that increased his depression and anxiety and made it harder for him to function. He could no longer shrug away his mental health issues and dysfunctional state while knowing exactly what caused it. After limiting his consumption of both, he was able to turn his life around and finally begin to achieve his personal goals.

For some of us, it is the people in our lives that may support or diminish us. If your friends, partner or family are consistently on your support or drain list, it can provide some helpful clarity about the state of your personal relationships and how they affect your mental health.

We can also use the clarity journaling

provides to make decisions. Sometimes it is a matter of writing objectively about the problem and the options. We can even go beyond practical options to brainstorm our wildest dreams. In my own personal life, I felt stuck in a cycle of low-wage jobs. In brainstorming my wildest dreams, the idea of self-employment came up. My practical self immediately dismissed the idea, but the more I thought about it, and journaled about it, the more I realized it was possible. In 2014 I decided to give myself three months to make it or give up. I'm now nine years into marketing my skills and taking contract jobs on my terms, and I love it. That journaling brainstorm changed my life.

Journaling can also provide an outlook for the future. Sometimes we can feel mired in a routine that no longer provides joy or satisfaction. Without a direction to move into, these feelings can contribute to depression, worsening mental health or even addiction. We can look at ourselves five years into the future and ask what our future selves may desire.

Sometimes having a dream and formulating the practical steps needed to reach it can provide the impetus we need to yank ourselves out of a rut and into better routines and outlooks. Walker says that one question that helped him move into his current successful life was, "If I knew I couldn't fail, what would I do?" Reflections on this question can open up opportunities we never imagined.

Journaling can take time to develop as a habit, but the rewards become apparent rather quickly as we move from a state of constant reactionary emotions to thoughtful contemplation that can drastically reduce stress and anxiety, give clarity and hope and support a life worth the effort of living. □

you have had anal or vaginal sex in the past 6 months, and you:

Use your pantry for winter skin care

Nearly everything about winter weather is tough on skin. Brutal, cold wind outside and dry heat indoors can result in itchy, chapped and even cracked skin. While the beauty industry has created countless products to help address these issues, some of the best skin care products might already be hiding in your kitchen. Sookyung Suh, owner and creator of SAVi skin care (available at Wild Rose Boutique in downtown Springfield), uses only natural, food-grade ingredients when creating her line of scrubs, salves and creams.

Suh, who holds a doctorate in instructional systems, works as an organizational change management and human performance expert and researcher with SIU School of Medicine by day. A busy mother of two, she began experimenting with homemade skin care nearly 10 years ago when her eldest daughter, then a toddler, was diagnosed with eczema.

"I'd always been interested in skin care, but never really thought that I could make my own until my kids started having issues. The more I looked into it, the more I learned how helpful oatmeal baths and certain calming creams can be," she said.

Suh, a trained researcher, put her skills to good use looking into the science of natural skin care. "I continued to play around with different formulas and found that these homemade products really worked for my girls," Suh said. "I grew up in South Korea where the holistic way of living, attention to what you eat and what you put on your skin, is much more emphasized than it is here in the U.S. When I was little, if I ever got burnt, my mom would make up a paste of different things and put it on the burn to pull the heat out. So, it wasn't foreign for me to play with food and put it on my face. When you go to Korean saunas, they have milk baths and yogurt facials... there are lots of food-type ingredients that are also great for your skin."

Combatting the effects of winter weather on your skin requires a multifaceted approach, advises Suh. "A mistake that a lot of people make is not moisturizing in layers. Think about your skin like a plant – if the plant is really dry when you water it, the water initially just runs off the surface. You have to let a little water seep in first before more can soak in. So, if you slather a thick layer on top of dry skin, it's just going to sit on top and not penetrate. Instead, start with something thinner, such as a water-based-type serum, followed by a light lotion and then a richer cream at the end," Suh explains.

Be sure to also hydrate from the inside out by drinking lots of water and using a humidifier. Suh shared her top pantry staples for glowing skin:

Honey and unrefined sugar are rich in vitamins, antioxidants and antimicrobial compounds, honey has been used for skin and wound care for centuries. A natural humectant and emollient, honey also has anti-wrinkle effects. Raw sugar is a gentle exfoliant and natural source of alpha hydroxy acid, which encourages skin turnover, resulting in a youthful glow.

Infused oils made from cold-soaking healing botanicals such as lavender, calendula, arnica and rose petals in safflower or sunflower oil for several weeks, or even months, for maximum potency.

Oats moisturize and calm your skin. Oats work great just mixed with water or yogurt and used as a cleanser every other day.

Yogurt and dry milk powder contain lactic acid, which gently exfoliates and moisturizes skin.

Brown Sugar Coconut Scrub

The basic formula is two parts sugar to one part oil, with the oil being half coconut and half lighter oil, such as safflower. From there, you can experiment with different essential oils and herbs.

1 cup granulated cane sugar (preferably unrefined)

1 cup dark brown sugar

1/3 cup coconut oil

1/4 cup sunflower or almond oil

20-40 drops (depending on potency) essential oils of your choice

Other optional add-ins from your kitchen include lemon or lime zest, ground cinnamon, allspice, ginger, nutmeg or vanilla extract.

Combine the sugars and oils in a mixing bowl and mix well with a fork to combine. Add more sugar or sunflower oil as needed to achieve your desired consistency. Add essential oils, extract or spices as desired. Package in glass jars and store in a cool dark place.

Cleansing Oatmeal Scrub

2 tablespoons dried chamomile flowers (or use the contents of two chamomile tea bags)

2 tablespoons dry milk powder

1/2 cup oatmeal

Combine the chamomile, dry milk and oatmeal in a blender or food processor and pulse until the mixture resembles a coarse powder. Store in an airtight container in a cool dry place. To use, combine a tablespoon of the oatmeal scrub with an equal amount of water in the palm of your hand. Use a circular motion to gently scrub your face or anywhere that needs extra care, then rinse with tepid water. Follow with a light moisturizer.

Live your resolutions

Celebrate the little victories along the way

It's just a smidge past mid-January, how are you doing on your New Year's resolutions? Are you on the cabbage diet, intermittent fasting, riding miles up hilly terrain on your new Peloton, quitting smoking, participating in dry January, taking college classes or vowing to be debt-free this year? Are you on track to reach your goal by the established deadline? Have you already abandoned your goal? Or perhaps you didn't even make a resolution, and your dry January is a bit soggy. No need to feel like a failure, there's a different approach to resolutions and it doesn't have to involve shame, pressure or failure. In fact, it involves a lot of celebrating.

Statista, one of the world's leading data platforms, found that approximately 39% of people surveyed in the U.S. set New Year's resolutions. The top three resolutions are as follows: 52% desire to exercise more, 50% want to eat healthier and 40% want to lose weight. These goals are no great surprise, but you might be surprised that according to insideoutmastery.com, 43% of all people who set resolutions expect to fail before February, and almost one out of four quit within the first week of setting their New Year's resolution. This is a dismal report.

Nearly half of all people who set New Year's resolutions fail because their goal isn't connected to their why – that which is important to them. If your resolution is to exercise more, there is likely an underlying reason that is motivating you to exercise. Maybe you need to lower your blood pressure, reduce stress or lose weight, for example. That is the reason why you are running five miles a day, or taking a walk over your lunch break or hitting the bike trail and enjoying an evening ride. When you focus on what is important to you, then you know why your resolution is worth accomplishing. Your likelihood of success is much higher than that of the 43% who fail.

One more sure-fire way to make sure you follow through is to celebrate the little

victories along the way. Don't wait for the big win to celebrate, like the person on the billboard who has lost over 100 pounds. That's a major goal, and it took many daily workouts to get to the big win. You have to celebrate those little victories – those days when you don't feel like working out but you do. My resolutions used to revolve around the number on the scale, the number of calories burned and exercising to the law of no pain, no gain. And, there was no celebration unless I executed the plan perfectly. Eventually, this approach became so restrictive that my days revolved around my workout schedule, and I wasn't enjoying the ride.



Beginning a yoga practice

At the start of each new year, we are often inundated with messaging about diet and exercise. Several times, I have fallen into the trap of thinking that I have to completely revamp my lifestyle in order to fit it within a tight definition of “healthy.” In years past, this may have meant cutting certain things out of my diet completely, or running or cycling a set number of miles or minutes each week. Sometimes, these all-or-nothing spurts can feel tiresome instead of energizing. So, what to do if you want to improve your health and wellness, but are not sure if you have the mental or physical time and energy to pound the pavement? Perhaps it’s time to consider yoga.

Yoga is an ancient practice of exercise and meditation that has become more and more appealing to busy people, as it provides a strengthening and calm space away from the stress of everyday life. According to a *Harvard Health* publication, yoga delivers several benefits including better body image, more self-awareness, increased mindfulness, a boost to weight loss and maintenance, enhanced fitness and positive cardiovascular effects.

I spoke with two local yogis and studio owners about what personal benefits they have noticed from regular yoga, the types of yoga available and what advice they have for anyone considering beginning a yoga practice.

Beverly Hopkins of Flow Midwest Yoga

and Meditation, 1921 W. Iles Ave., cites help with back pain as one of the benefits that she has gained from yoga, and says that her clients have also had an array of benefits from practicing yoga. For some, it is about gaining flexibility, while others who have arthritis might use the practice to keep themselves moving.

Betsy Link of Aah Yoga, 2201 W. White Oaks Dr., agrees that the benefits are innumerable and often unique to the individual. As a runner, Link credits yoga with preventing injuries and increasing overall strength.

Both Hopkins and Link agree that yoga has the power to lower blood pressure, manage stress and mood and reduce anxiety, and that it can be an important coping tool to use while living in an uncertain world.

Since there are several types of yoga, a beginner might feel unsure as to where to start – but not to worry, as there is truly something for everyone within the yoga practice. Classes such as yin yoga, gentle yoga and chair yoga may benefit someone hoping to increase strength and flexibility while reducing tension and stress.

Ashtanga and Vinyasa yoga classes are sequence-style yoga classes that allow a practitioner to connect breath to movement while gaining flexibility and balance. These classes may feel a bit quicker than

yin or gentle classes, and focus is put on strengthening and challenging the mind and body to the extent that the yogi is comfortable.

Hot Yoga, or Bikram Yoga, is held in a heated room, sometimes up to 100 degrees. The heat in a Bikram class is said to have a detoxifying or purifying effect.

Yoga sculpt is also a popular yoga offering that combines yoga flow with weight training, either with light weights or by utilizing body weight strength moves.

Link’s advice to a yoga newcomer is to “always remember that it is yoga – there is no test at the end of class, you won’t be kicked out or judged if you forget the name of the posture or can’t do a specific pose. It may be challenging at times, but it shouldn’t be painful or stressful. So, let go of your ego and have fun!”

Hopkins adds that the first step in becoming a yoga practitioner is finding a practice that works for you in an environment that provides a welcoming and safe space. She encourages those curious about yoga to go ahead and “allow yourself the experience.” □

When the clock strikes four, everything stops for tea

This past summer, after my job as a cook at a summer camp in upstate Washington had ended, we decided to travel north and take a car ferry to Vancouver Island to visit Victoria, the capital of British Columbia. Named after Queen Victoria, it's one of the oldest cities in the Pacific Northwest and is known for its heritage architecture and time-honored traditions, such as afternoon tea.

My wife is a serious anglophile with ancestral roots in England, and traditional afternoon tea was something she very much wanted to experience. I was unable to obtain a last-minute reservation for afternoon tea at the famous Empress Hotel and instead booked afternoon tea at the Pendray Inn and Tea House, a Victorian mansion with stunning views of Victoria's Inner Harbor.

Whereas the Empress is considered stately, Pendray Inn would be considered quaint.

In a cheerful, sunlit room with stained glass windows and antique furniture, we enjoyed a delightful afternoon sipping tea out of china teacups and nibbling on savory and sweet treats served on a three-tiered tea stand. We made a commitment to incorporate this tradition into our own daily rituals and acquired a formal English tea set this Christmas.

Afternoon tea is an English tradition dating back to the early 1840s. Back in those days, the practice was to eat only two meals a day: a late breakfast and dinner between 8 and 9 p.m. The story goes that Anna, the Seventh Duchess of Bedford, complained of "having that sinking feeling" during the late afternoon. To ward off her hunger, she would have tea and a light snack served in her room. She started inviting friends to join her at her home for a leisurely afternoon of gossip over a selection of little treats and a pot of tea. These get-togethers evolved into the ritual of afternoon tea.

In the late 1800s, tearooms started opening in railway stations. Tearooms were predominantly all-female establishments and became meeting places for members of the suffragette movement. Tearooms were places where women could meet, away from men, to strategize their "Votes for Women" campaigns. Afternoon tea was also a time when women could be liberated from their corsets and wear loose-fitting tea gowns of silk or chiffon, modeled after Japanese kimonos.

Afternoon tea is usually laid out on fine china, with a large pot of tea and a three-tiered tea stand bedecked with a tier of sandwiches, a tier of scones and a tier of little

cakes. It is typically served between 3 and 5 in the afternoon. It's a delightful time to sit back and relax and enjoy good company.

Cucumber and Butter Finger Sandwiches

Serves 4

Make these with good quality sandwich bread, such as Pepperidge Farm Very Thin.

Ingredients:

8 slices white bread
1 English cucumber
Kosher salt
4 tablespoons unsalted butter
Freshly ground white or black pepper

Preparation:

Peel the cucumber and slice it as thinly as possible with a sharp knife or mandoline slicer. Place the slices in a colander, sprinkle lightly with salt and let stand for 20 minutes. Rinse under cold water and arrange slices between two paper towels and pat dry.

Generously spread butter onto one side of each of the bread slices.

Shingle the cucumbers on four of the bread slices, and sprinkle with pepper. Top each with a remaining bread slice to make four sandwiches.

Remove the crusts with a serrated knife and divide them into three equal rectangles.

Egg and Watercress Finger Sandwiches

Ingredients:

8 slices white bread
2 hard-boiled eggs, peeled
4 tablespoons cup finely chopped watercress
3 tablespoons mayonnaise
2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
½ teaspoon finely chopped fresh dill
Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Preparation:

Chop eggs into small pieces. Stir in the watercress, mayonnaise, mustard, dill, salt and pepper.

Spread a thick layer of egg mixture onto four bread slices. Top each with a remaining bread slice to make four sandwiches.

Remove the crusts with a serrated knife and divide into three equal rectangles.

Smoked Salmon and Dill Finger Sandwiches

Ingredients:

8 slices whole wheat sandwich bread
8 ounces cream cheese
2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh dill
4 tablespoons minced red onion
1/2 lemon
Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
8 ounces smoked salmon, thinly sliced

Preparation:

Mix together the cream cheese, dill and red onion. Season to taste with lemon juice, salt and pepper.

Spread the cream cheese mixture onto one side of each of the bread slices.

Arrange the salmon evenly over four of the bread slices. Top each with a remaining bread slice to make four sandwiches.

Remove the crusts with a serrated knife and divide into three equal rectangles.

English Cream Scones

The key to making scones is to work the dough as little as possible to keep the glutens in the flour from overdeveloping, which will make your scones too hard. It is also essential to check the date on your baking powder. Baking powder loses its potency quickly, and your scones won't rise properly if your baking powder is more than six months old.

Ingredients:

250 grams (about 2 cups) AP flour, plus more for dusting the work surface
1 tablespoon baking powder
2 teaspoons granulated sugar, plus more for sprinkling
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
1/2 cup dried currants
3/4 cup heavy cream, plus more as needed
1 egg white, lightly beaten with a little water

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 425° F.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Stir in the currants and cream until just combined.

Turn the dough out onto a floured board and press it together into a rough ball. If it doesn't hold together, add more cream, a little at a time, until it does. Be careful not to overwork the dough.

Roll the dough out to a thickness of 3/4 inch. Cut into rounds with a 3-inch round biscuit cutter. □

This time of year sometimes gets described as a blue time, where the post-holiday season blahs began to remind us it's not all fun and games out there. But wary as one may be for this possible downturn, it sure doesn't feel a bit like that this January as our music scene continues to pop, fizz, shake and shimmy like nobody's business. Also in the something different category, we are presenting our *Sangamon Songs: A Musical Play* in St. Louis at the Gaslight Theater on Saturday night and Sunday afternoon with all pertinent info on the theater's website, plus all weekend long the Hoogland gives us *Follies in Concert* with a full onstage orchestra at the LRS theater.

That's all folks, except for all that's left in the listings, which, per usual, is plenty. □




