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Mayoral endorsements cross political lines

Labor unions endorse Buscher, former mayor Houston endorses previous rival Langfelder

When it comes to campaign fundraising, Springfield mayoral candidate Misty Buscher's support from labor unions so far has been a factor in her lead over incumbent Mayor Jim Langfelder.

With about \$204,500 available at the close of 2022's fourth quarter, Buscher, the current city treasurer, held an \$86,334 edge in funds available compared with Langfelder, who had \$118,202 available, according to reports filed with the Illinois State Board of Elections.

Democrats in the General Assembly and those seeking statewide office traditionally enjoy more support from organized labor than Republicans in Illinois. But that's not the case in this year's race for the officially nonpartisan full-time job of mayor in Springfield.

Langfelder, who considers himself a moderate Democrat – he calls himself a "Kennedy Democrat" – is seeking his third four-year term against Buscher, who calls herself a moderate Republican, heading into the April 4 municipal election.

Buscher was endorsed over Langfelder by the Central Illinois Building and Construction Trades Council. And Buscher on Feb. 13 received the endorsement of the unions representing city police officers and firefighters.

Campaign contributions that Buscher received in the fourth quarter included \$5,500 from the Central Illinois Building and Construction Trades Council, \$3,000 from Laborer's Local 477, \$21,000 from the Plumbers & Steamfitters union, \$7,000 from Sheet Metal Workers Local 218, and \$7,500 from the Mid-America Carpenters Regional Council.

Langfelder did receive the endorsement of

the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, the union representing many city employees.

And Langfelder received the endorsement of the Sangamon County Democratic Party after rank-and-file members turned down a recommendation from the party's executive committee not to make an endorsement in the mayoral race.

Former Mayor J. Michael Houston also endorsed Langfelder. Houston is a Republican who served from 1979 to 1987 and then from

2011 to 2015, when he lost his reelection bid.

When asked about his sometimes chilly relationships with unions, Langfelder said many rank-and-file union members support him, though union leaders may not. He attributed much of the tension to the record that mayors establish when they play high-profile roles in the city.

It's a situation that challengers can exploit, Langfelder said. "Without a doubt, the challengers, they have that luxury," he said.

"You always do what's in the best interests of the city," he added.

Buscher said her support from unions have to do with union rules, the city's enforcement of prevailing wage on city-involved projects and "project labor agreements," or PLAs.

PLAs, according to the AFL-CIO, are collective bargaining agreements between building trade unions and contractors that govern terms and conditions of employment for all craft workers, regardless of whether they are represented by unions, on a construction project.

The AFL-CIO says PLAs protect taxpayers by eliminating costly delays related to labor conflicts or shortages of skilled workers.

Aaron Gurnsey, president of the Central Illinois Building and Construction Trades

Council, faulted Langfelder's administration for reportedly failing to enforce prevailing wage in City Water, Light and Power's 2018 demolition of the former Days Inn on Stevenson Drive.

Trade unions also want the city to agree to more PLAs — which are voluntary — for more city projects. Buscher said she would push for more PLAs as mayor, though the City Council — where the mayor can cast a tie-breaking vote — has final say on that issue.

"I do think that the unions want to see that the city supports them as they support the entire community," she said. "We need to believe in our working men and women."

Gurnsey said trade unions are supporting Buscher because she "talks about labor unions out loud."

Langfelder said he's open to more discussions about how PLAs should be used, but the trade unions decided not to interview him before making an endorsement.

Langfelder said he would like to see trade unions reflect the diversity of the community, and he has been frustrated by the City Council's lack of support for a pre-apprenticeship program that would be operated by Springfield resident Calvin Pitts, a union electrician and the owner of B.O.N.E. LLC, a construction and investment company.

Langfelder said it's no surprise that the police and fire unions endorsed Buscher because he hasn't received their endorsement in the past.

He said he suspects some of the opposition from the police union is designed to gain an advantage during ongoing contract negotiations.

Tami Russell, president of the Police Benevolent and Protective Association Unit 5, said Langfelder hasn't done enough to advocate for higher pay for police officers to improve recruitment and retention efforts.

"We are not being competitive" with comparably sized cities such as Bloomington, she said.

The police union wants a mayor "to have a fresh look at this and actually let the police department tell them what is needed," Russell said.

Langfelder said he and Police Chief Ken Scarlette have made major headway in replacing police officers who retired and weren't replaced because the training of police recruits was delayed earlier in the COVID-19 pandemic. □

Downtown demolitions

Horace Mann seeks TIF money to tear down two buildings adjacent to recent renovation

Springfield City Council members gave preliminary approval Feb. 14 to \$600,000 in tax-increment financing revenues to pay for almost one-third of a \$1.9 million project in which Horace Mann Educators Corp. would tear down two dilapidated buildings near its main campus.

The council voted unanimously at its committee-of-the-whole meeting to put the Horace Mann project on its consent agenda for the Feb. 21 meeting. Items on that agenda are not debated individually and routinely are approved as a group.

The targeted buildings at 622 and 618 E. Washington St. would be demolished after the removal of asbestos to make way for green space and more than 20 parking spaces, according to Don Carley, who is head of facilities for Horace Mann as well as executive vice president and general counsel.

Horace Mann doesn't view the proposal as a "parking project," he said. "It's a beautification project." The two buildings – each three to four stories tall – have been vacant for more than 10 years, Carley told council members.

The buildings are immediately west of the historic three-story Witmer-Schuck building, which dates to the 1860s. Horace Mann acquired the Witmer-Schuck building more than a year ago and has spent more than \$1 million to renovate the site, Carley said.

The first floor is for Hageman Family

Insurance, a Horace Mann-affiliated agency that is operated by Katie Hageman.

The upper two floors have been developed into four furnished apartments as temporary housing for visiting corporate executives and for newly hired Horace Mann employees, Carley said.

Each floor covers between 2,500 and 3,000 square feet, he said.

Carley noted that Horace Mann, a publicly traded national company, purchased companies in New Jersey, Texas and Wisconsin in the past four years.

The \$1.9 million remediation and demolition project at 622 and 618 E. Washington St. would include the purchase of 622 E. Washington St. and wouldn't move forward without the proposed TIF funds, Carley and Mayor Jim Langfelder said. Horace Mann already paid \$80,000 to acquire 618 E. Washington St., but TIF can still be used for remediation and demolition of that property.

The buildings are "not in a condition where they can be revitalized," Carley said.

The \$600,000 in TIF funds would be reimbursed to Horace Mann over a six-year period, with \$100,000 flowing to the company each year, according to the company's proposal.

TIF funds for capital improvements in the downtown area are generated by incremental increases in property taxes in the Central Area TIF district.

The parking spaces to be created would be used by residents of the Witmer-Schuck building, and some would be leased to other downtown businesses, Carley said. Spaces also would be available for free parking at nights and weekends, though those details still are being worked out, he said.

Carley said the project would add to the downtown's amenities.

"Horace Mann is very committed to downtown Springfield," he said. "We've been here for almost 80 years. The company and our employees take enormous pride ... in the campus."

Carley said all of Horace Mann's spending at 628 E. Washington, at the southwest corner of Washington and Seventh streets, has been paid for without city assistance. The same is true for the more than \$5 million in improvements that Horace Mann has made at its downtown campus in recent years.

Those improvements include the campus' pond, where work should be completed by early May, Carley said.

Horace Mann's properties in Springfield have contributed more than \$5 million to the city's TIF program since 1997, he said. □

The art of a medical doctor

Folse exhibition at Strawn Art Gallery

Dr. Roland Folse chaired the SIU School of Medicine Department of Surgery for nearly 30 years, retiring in 2000 after a distinguished medical career. For more than a half-century, he has also used his hands to create art in many forms. A retrospective of his paintings and 3-D work is on exhibit at the Jacksonville Art Association's David Strawn Art Gallery, 331 W. College Ave., through Feb. 26.

Folse has painted for most of his life, beginning with oils and later pastels. He's a renowned bonsai artist, and some of his creations are now in the collections of the Pacific Bonsai Museum in Federal Way, Washington. In the late 1980s, he began making ceramic pots for his bonsai. This evolved into creating art pottery, using shino and crystalline glazes. He has an art studio and ceramics studio at home and expanded into woodworking. He built a woodwork shop where he creates furniture in unique designs using native woods. When his children were young, Folse worked seven-day weeks. Consequently, he pursued hobbies where he could be at home. Instead of playing golf, he pruned bonsai trees, painted and created ceramics.

Folse is a world traveler, often taking painting classes in other countries. The places he visits are reflected in his paintings. Folse believes art is an integral part of life, and it is a driving force in his daily activities. To witness his creativity, visit the Strawn Art Gallery in Jacksonville, Tuesday-Saturday 4-6 p.m. and Sunday 1-3 p.m. □

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Dramatic changes at Sangamon County Animal Shelter

"Things are going quite well now"

Last year, animal welfare activists were picketing the Sangamon County Animal Shelter and now they are working with it.

"Things are going quite well now," said Jill Egizii, president of the nonprofit WILD Canine Rescue. "WILD had a very adversarial relationship with the former administrator and it was just an awful, awful environment for the staff. It was just oppressive when you walked into the building."

Last month, Jeanne Keenan was appointed to head the shelter, where she had been working in an interim capacity since May. The shelter is a division of the Sangamon County Health Department. Keenan previously was in charge of the department's restaurant inspections.

She replaces longtime shelter director Greg Largent, who was fired, said Andy Van Meter, chair of the Sangamon County Board.

"Within the first six months, she has made a dramatic difference in the lives of the dogs and the lives of the people who are served by Sangamon County," Egizii said.

Van Meter agreed that the change at the facility has been dramatic.

"Greg was someone who always looked good on paper. The inspection reports when he was director were quite good. But he was not the right person to manage volunteers and a unionized workforce," said Van Meter.

During Largent's tenure, the shelter shut down its volunteer program and struggled to remain fully staffed. Today, the volunteer program is active and staff morale has improved, Egizii said.

Adoptions are up and the number of animals euthanized is down since Keenan took

over. But the number of animals the shelter is caring for has risen.

During the final quarter of 2022, about 87% of all animals were adopted. During the same period in 2021 that number was 77 %.

"I credit that to local rescue organizations helping us out," Keenan said.

But demands placed on the facility have also gone up.

"There were 300 more dogs and cats that came in this (past) year than the previous year," Keenan said. In 2022, the shelter admitted 3,043 pets.

"It's because of the economy," she said.
"People don't have enough money to feed their pets, so they are choosing to relinquish them."

To help pet owners avoid giving up their pets, Keenan started a food pantry at the

shelter. She said pet food for it is donated by local retailers.

Like almost all shelters, diseases have periodically swept through the facility. Shelters are particularly vulnerable to outbreaks of disease because the animals live in close proximity and there is a constant influx of strays that may be infected with various diseases.

But Van Meter noted that new steps have been taken to minimize the spread of disease.

"The same firm that cleans the neonatal units at the local hospitals is cleaning the dog kennels," he said.

Keenan added an isolation room has been created for potentially infectious cats, and pet bowls are being sterilized in a new dishwasher. More importantly, the shelter is back to full staffing.

"We now have six kennel attendants plus our animal care manager," she said. "So, we have seven people working in the kennels. Before we had two or three."

"Our staff is growing in confidence and we're hoping that in the near future we may be able to transfer some responsibilities to our kennel attendants," Van Meter said. "We look for them to take on some cleaning responsibilities."

The shortage of veterinarians serving Sangamon County has made it more challenging to care for sick animals at the shelter, Gail O'Neill, Sangamon County Public Health director, said. Two area vets visit the shelter for two to four hours each week. □

The tool slid across the glass with the steady hand of an artist teaching her craft.

Former state Rep. Sara Wojcicki Jimenez has been paired with Springfield-area artist Morgan Behnke to create a stained-glass window as part of a Springfield Art Association project pairing 16 local artists with well-known people in the

The couples are creating art using mediums ranging from canvas painting to stained glass. The pieces will be auctioned off at an event April 1.

"It kind of becomes a friendly competition," Jimenez said. "Each person wants their piece to go for the most amount of money. And then there are other opportunities such as sponsorships of the artist."

She added the artist and community member pairings are a true partnership.

Behnke said she is careful to seek Jimenez' input on such things as the color and the overall design. Jimenez told her she likes pink and wanted to create something with a floral theme.

Based on that input, Behnke created a plan for the window.

"I love art," Jimenez said. "I think that the Art Association is one of our crown jewels in Springfield in terms of art classes and just the outreach and the murals and everything that they do in the community."

Charlotte Kane, director of advancement and operations at SAA, said this fundraiser replaces the Dancing with the Stars event the SAA has previously hosted.

"Dancing With the Stars was a gala-style fundraiser held at the Wyndham where local celebrities, stars, personalities and community leaders were paired with a professional ballroom dancer to perform a little dance routine that evening so people could vote for them," she said. "But a lot of our dance instructors here in Springfield, especially in the ballroom community, are aging and moving to Florida.

"Last year, I was really struggling to find people who were willing to dance. So, we decided

to pivot and have local personalities paint a painting and have it auctioned off here. They were left to their own devices on that event. ... (This year) we felt that giving them a little more direct attention would produce something of a little better quality. So, we decided to create this event, pairing the participant directly with a professional artist to collaborate on the piece and allow them to explore other media besides

Silent auction and Art Synergy pieces will be open for viewing and bidding on March 27.

Live auction of Art Synergy pieces will occur at the event on April 1, held 6:30-9 p.m. at the SAA, 700 N. Fourth St.

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
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
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












Grant expands Cielo's outreach to Springfield's Hispanic community

Springfield nonprofit Cielo (Spanish for "sky" or "heaven") has just been awarded a \$230,000 grant by the Illinois Public Health Association. The organization, headed by Julio Barrenzuela, helps the Spanish-speaking community to stay healthy and emotionally and financially stable. The grant will allow Cielo to expand its reach by paying for staff and improvements to its offices, gathering spaces and meeting rooms, according to Barrenzuela.

Barrenzuela, 42, who was born in Peru, grew up in Springfield before joining the navy, then receiving degrees from Southern Illinois University, Carbondale and Woodbury University Burbank, California, where he received his master's degree in Media for Social Justice. "Even though I spent a number of years away from Springfield, I always knew I would return and use my talents to help the less fortunate."

Cielo was founded 27 years ago as a Springfield social organization by Barrenzuela's uncle and a group of his friends. The group organized salsa dances and other activities, mostly in Mexican restaurants. The parties became fundraisers to award scholarships, usually a few hundred dollars at a time, to deserving Latino kids. The amounts were not large, but enough to put gas in the car or make the rent, enough so that a promising student wouldn't have to drop out. Matters of organization were kept informal, but it was a small community.

When Barrenzuela came back from California with his degree in 2019, he took over Cielo and received training from SIU School of Medicine to become a community health worker. He was tasked with improving

outreach to central Illinois' Spanish-speaking community, which the school considered to be underserved. Later, he performed the same role at the Illinois Public Health Association. When COVID-19 arrived, Barrenzuela spent most of his time making sure that information about the pandemic was available in Spanish and Chuj (a Mayan language spoken in Guatemala).

Barrenzuela bought a mobile home in a park occupied almost exclusively by Spanish speakers to serve as a headquarters for Cielo and community center for the neighborhood. Volunteers cleared a lot so kids could play soccer. Two storage sheds were refurbished and converted into playhouses. The organization began to offer English classes, after-school homework assistance, and a safe space for teens to congregate. Eventually the work at Cielo became his full-time job, but the relationships

he formed while at SIU exposed him to others in the community who were in a position to help Cielo help more people.

Two other members of the Cielo staff have received community health worker training. Following Illinois Community Health Worker Advisory Board guidelines, Cielo takes a holistic approach to promoting health for the people it serves, by offering activities for children after school and on the weekends such as field trips and homework assistance, driver education, budgeting and finance classes and other programs.

On Feb. 4, Barrenzuela and two staff members accompanied nearly a dozen children and adolescents to see *High School Musical* at the Hoogland Center, performed by local kids in middle school and high school and sponsored in part by HSHS St. John's Children's Hospital.

Most had never been to a live stage performance in their lives.

"Many children aren't fortunate enough to enjoy access to an event like this. My hope is that seeing this performance will spark an interest and help a child. Seeing children their age on stage made it real to them that they could do that too." Barrenzuela said. One of the girls, perhaps 8 years old, said after the show that she wanted to be in a play herself.

Cielo is currently fitting out an examination room in the community center so that partners from SIU School of Medicine can come for regular visits with patients who find travel to a doctor to be a challenge. Cielo's location in a neighborhood where many of its clients live will mean an increase in preventative care, which will improve health and save money.

Stable housing is another issue that Barrenzuela cares about deeply, and he believes Cielo has great potential to be a catalyst for improving the quality of housing for clients. "A lot of people are paying more for rent than they would be for a mortgage, or are living in substandard housing," he said. Barrenzuela points out that Cielo has the financial resources to help clients transition from renters to homeowners, and trained personnel to help clients understand the financial implications of owning a home.

"Owning a home is the American dream. People who immigrate to America do so because they have a dream." \square

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KEEP SHAWNEE AS IT IS


This letter is in opposition of a proposal to eliminate our Shawnee National Forest so to replace it with a National Park and climate preserve (no such thing).

Starting when they first arrived in southernmost Illinois in the late 1600s, settlers cut and cleared trees for use and to sell. Over time, the area was left denuded and the soil was eroded. Our Shawnee National Forest was designated in August 1933 to repair this damage and rebuild the area. The Civilian Conservation Corps, the Works Progress Administration and other Depression-era work programs worked to reforest southernmost Illinois. Assisted and managed by the U.S. Forest Service employees, nearly 60,000 acres of land has been reforested.

Since 1933, our beloved Shawnee National Forest has grown to 289,000 acres and is visited by up to 1 million forest lovers annually. Had it not been for its designation as a National Forest, our Shawnee wouldn't exist. The Shawnee National Forest is a monument to what we can do when we try, when we care and when we actually work hands-on. Like a monument it was built, and like a monument, it needs continued attention, maintenance and management.

If you are concerned about reports of logging in the Shawnee, those areas are being misrepresented. Visit Google maps to see sites where trees are being selectively removed so sunlight can get through the canopy to saplings on the forest floor. Be sure to zoom out to see how small those areas are.

Efforts are underway to designate Cahokia Mounds a unit of the National Park System. In 2016, Cahokia Mounds met all criteria. Southern Illinois might soon have that National Park. Rhonda Rothrock Pomona (adjoining neighbor to the Shawnee National Forest Fairview Trail)

Thanks for featuring the Shawnee National Park in a recent issue ("Shawnee National Park?" Feb. 2). A few important facts were missing, however, regarding the opposition's expressed rationale for objecting to the proposal.

First of all, the USDA Forest Service had provided only a few hundred acres of logging per year in the recent past, but the agency representative quoted in the article failed to mention that those figures are about to change, drastically. While in different stages of implementation, current FS projects already underway involve industrial logging on more than 12,000 acres of the Shawnee. Plus, the chief of the Forest Service declared that more than 100,000 acres of

the forest are now classified to be categorically excluded from environmental reviews so that the FS can more efficiently log the areas under the guise of "forest health."

Claiming that the National Park Service takes a "handsoff" approach to protecting or managing ecosystems and controlling invasives is not just absurd on its face, it is reckless and disingenuous. The NPS not only details its commitment to "maintain, restore, and protect the inherent integrity of the natural resources, processes, systems, and values," in its management policies, it has a Heartland Invasive Plant Management Plan that includes tackling the problem in the neighboring states of Missouri, Kentucky and Indiana.

Our state is excluded from

the NPS Plan because Illinois currently has no National Park. Our nation longs to establish its first climate preserve and Illinois deserves to have a national park. The Shawnee, with its carbon-capturing mature forests, unmatched biodiversity, impressive scenery and unique history, is the perfect candidate. John B. WYNDHAM DEBT

I am taking this opportunity to clarify a letter to the editor in last week's issue titled, "Not Discussed" (Feb. 2). The letter was from Ald. Ralph Hanauer pertaining to the Wyndham City Centre's outstanding utility bill.

The issue was discussed with the City Council during an executive session on Nov. 2, 2021. On Feb. 21, the City Council will vote on ordinance #2023-050, which will authorize the release of the audio from the executive session. I hope the City Council will approve this ordinance so the public can hear the discussion.

To also clarify, the Wyndham paid 100% of the outstanding electric and water usage portion of the bill.

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

Groups push for share of revenue increase

The legislature's Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability released its latest monthly fiscal report last week. The report claimed the state is still on track to match the commission's revised November estimate of a \$4.1 billion revenue increase for the current fiscal year.

Revenue had originally been projected to fall from the previous fiscal year. And much of the recently projected increase is believed to be a one-time event and has so far been treated as such.

But revenue projections have become so unreliably squirrelly that groups which rely on state funding are starting to push to get their fair share of what they see as a fast-growing pie.

Take a look at Medicaid, an always complicated and expensive topic that will become much more so in the coming months.

More than 300,000 Illinoisans risk losing Medicaid coverage at the end of March. There are those who believe that many of those folks are already back on employer health care coverage (or should be). States haven't been required to conduct redeterminations on Medicaid recipients during the pandemic, and that process will restart soon.

While the state could save money with fewer Medicaid recipients, states are also losing part of their federal Medicaid matching dollars that had been increased during the pandemic. The federal government has increased matching rates during past economic downturns, but it's never easy to adjust to a decrease, particularly when states have received so much extra for so long.

Hospitals were hit hard by the pandemic. They lost the ability to offer revenue-producing services during the closures, and the deadly viral waves that followed decimated their workforce, with illness, deaths and burnout.

When that federal Medicaid match falls, hospitals will undoubtedly feel an even greater pinch. Hospital closures are already a national problem, and it could get even worse as the financial pressure increases.

In the past, hospitals were pushed to increase their self-assessments, which injected more money into the Medicaid system and produced more matching federal funds. But hospitals say the state is cash-flush enough to provide more money on its own. And, like I noted above, there's very little trust in budget projections. If the projection is flat or less, it'll be met with widespread skepticism. And many are now eyeing the state's new \$1 billion rainy day fund.

But the problems don't end there. The state

has allowed out of state and retired nurses to practice here during the pandemic, and those emergency rules will disappear in May, when the governor's pandemic executive orders expire.

The Illinois Hospital Association estimates 15,000 of those nurses are working here right now, many of whom are well-paid traveling nurses. While the travel nurses are straining hospital budgets, the workforce situation is such that the sudden loss of that many nurses could shock the entire system and create huge additional costs. The hospitals have been trying for years to enroll the state in an interstate nursing compact to allow non-Illinois nurses to practice here, but that has always been thwarted by unions.

The governor has already said he wants to greatly expand preschool and childcare programs and make college tuition "free for every working-class family." All of that will cost money, and hospitals are just one group which will be pounding at the door.

Hospitals are the largest employers in most downstate and even some suburban legislative districts. And even if they aren't the largest employers, their boards are usually populated with the most influential business leaders in the region. It's very hard to ignore them.

Meanwhile, after forcefully opposing a graduated income tax in 2020, the Civic Committee of the Commercial Club of Chicago is now proposing a 10-year, personal and corporate state income tax "surcharge" of 0.5 percent and 0.7 percent, respectively, regardless of income.

None of the \$2.9 billion raised by the tax hike could be spent on social services or other budget priorities. Instead, all the money would be sent to the pension funds and the rainy day fund.

The group also says the state should implement mostly unspecified "cost disciplines" to help pay for the plan. It suggests an example of slicing agency spending by 2-3 percent as a start. It also suggests eliminating the estate tax on assets above \$4 million, the current state trigger. They should've left that one out because it's a bad look, to say the least.

Widening the revenue base while narrowing the spending base makes fiscal sense on paper. But the report ignores the decades of all too real state underfunding of services for people with dire needs. □

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Battling the Green Nuclear Deal

In their determination to save the world from greenhouse gases, some environmental organizations have gone over to the other side, while the Sierra Club nationally has maintained its longstanding opposition to commercial nuclear power. Some local Sierra groups seem not so sure. "Is Nuclear Power a Great Way or a Terrible Way to Cut CO2 Emissions?" was the title of the program of the Sierra Club's Northwest Cook County group, which I attended by Zoom Feb. 9.

A great way, argued Madison Hilly of the Campaign for a Green Nuclear Deal. It's not true that nuclear power plants take too long to get built to make a difference in the race to combat climate change. "It's the fastest way to prove up carbon-free energy," she claimed. And to the argument that nuclear is too expensive, she acknowledged that it requires more money up front. But it's worth it because the energy is "dispatchable," meaning available anytime, whether or not the sun is shining or the wind is blowing. She listed the major nuclear-power accidents – Three Mile Island, Chernobyl, Fukushima – explaining how each wasn't as bad as people think.


Neither is nuclear material as bad as people think. She showed herself in a photo beside a reactor fuel control rod, and she's still alive to tell about it. (It's the used, or "spent" fuel that is highly radioactive.) And she said all the nuclear power waste in the world could be stored on one football field in a stack 50 feet high. ("Yes," replied an audience member, perhaps thinking ahead to Super Bowl, "but you didn't mention that all the fans in the stands would be dead.")

One of the problems of nuclear power, Hilly said, is that "some people are afraid of it." I was thinking maybe I was the problem. Then David Kraft of the Nuclear Energy Information Service, based in Chicago, took over for the second part of the program. His position: It's a terrible way to cut CO2 emissions. NEIS is an anti-nuclear organization that has been fighting this battle for 42 years.

A lot of the problem with nuclear power lies in the details, Kraft said, starting with, "Nuclear waste is not as benign as was portrayed." But that's not the issue at hand. We're here to discuss: What is nuclear's role in a climate-disrupted world?" There is no way to scale up nuclear power units fast enough to make a significant carbon difference by 2030 or even 2050, Kraft said, citing several authoritatives studies. There are 411 operating nuclear power reactors in the world, and 130 of those are scheduled to close. There are only 53 reactors under construction worldwide. Half of those under construction are behind schedule, including one in France that is eight years behind. Two units at the Vogtle power plant in Georgia have been under construction since 1989. The cost was originally estimated at \$14 billion; by now the cost is estimated at \$34 billion.

"We can't nuke climate change," Kraft said. "We don't have time." Solar, wind and conservation technologies are available now, at lower cost

The Clinton Nuclear Power Station, 50 miles northwest of Springfield, is a key player in the nation's debate over power. Placed into service in 1987, the owner 30 years later, Exelon, said they would retire the plant in 2017 because it was no longer economical to operate. This prompted a bailout by the Illinois General Assembly and Gov. Bruce Rauner in 2016, under legislation called the

Future Energy Jobs Act. Under FEJA, the state agreed to pay Exelon \$235 million a year to keep its Quad Cities nuclear station and the Clinton plant open for at least 10 more years. The Clinton plant is currently licensed to operate until 2026. Constellation Energy, the plant's current operator, has said it will apply during the first quarter of 2024 to extend the operating license beyond 2026.

It would be better to set aside money now

to transition communities like Clinton away from their financial dependence on a large power plant, than to continue to keep old nuclear plants working beyond their scheduled lives, Kraft said. On Jan. 31 this year, the Clinton reactor experienced an unplanned incident called a "turbine trip," which resulted in an automatic reactor "scram," or shutdown, to avoid a major accident. The safety systems worked this time. But as power plants age, the risk of accidents becomes greater. Meanwhile, highly radioactive spent nuclear fuel continues to accumulate, with no federal long-term waste-storage plan in sight.

Another form of nuclear waste is often overlooked. The combination of state political power, organized labor and private corporations that converge around commercial nuclear power invites political corruption. The pending charges against former House Speaker Michael Madigan, alleging he accepted jobs and favors amounting to bribes from Commonwealth Edison, Chicago's electric utility, is a case in point, Kraft said. Similar scandals have occurred in South Carolina and Ohio, demonstrating that nuclear energy is not clean energy.

In an interview, Kraft acknowledged that it's hard to convince progressives bent on stopping the fossil fuel industry that nuclear energy poses problems just as bad. "It's an arcane subject," says the veteran of the battle against nuclear greenwashing. "But we keep speaking and Zooming. We show up." He said he's sad that the anti-nuclear movement hasn't progressed further, but he's pleased that more young people are getting involved. He knows this fight of his life just may save the planet. □

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Pre-trial help is better than bail

To break the arrest-jail cycle, we ask people what they need

While the future of cash bail is pending before the Illinois Supreme Court, we're running a community-based program to help people break the cycle of arrest and jail. And we're exploring ways to expand our work across the state.

We believe in community support so much that we invested \$2.9 million last year to connect people to services that build productive lives. Our program focuses on helping people during the pretrial phase of their case – meaning they are legally presumed innocent and have not yet been convicted of a crime.

How do we know what they need? We walk into Chicago's Cook County Jail every weekday and listen.

Then we create a support plan based on their needs.

From April through November last year, 1,292 people chose to work with us. They identified an average of five needs for the following social supports: employment, education, affordable housing, health insurance, state identification, physical health care, mental health care and addiction treatment.

This means a typical client may be unemployed in an unstable home environment while they're also struggling with mental trauma and physical ailments. Picture that reality the next time you wonder what can cause crime. Ask yourself what life would look like if your mind and body experienced pain

every day when you don't have a job, a stable home, health insurance or a driver's license. Add an addiction to alcohol or drugs, and it's a predictable path to harm.

This doesn't mean everybody is guilty of the charges they face. For 440 of our clients whose cases have already concluded, charges were dropped in 367 cases. That means eight out of 10 of these clients had cases that lacked evidence to prosecute, or they are innocent and should have never been arrested and jailed.

And almost all of the 1,292 people did exactly what they're supposed to do as they awaited trial in the community: They attended 96% of their court dates. That tells us that we don't need cash bail to ensure that people will show up to court. We also provide court-date notifications and free courthouse transportation to those who need it.

This program – Community Release with Support – was designed and tested by The Bail Project in more than 25 jurisdictions. It works because the simple act of providing freedom and choice helps people gain control over a mindset that struggles to see a positive future. From there, they commit to self-improvement that generates positive feedback that leads to positive actions.

And our clients develop a better understanding of the harm they've experienced and might have caused. They're accountable, to themselves and others, because they're doing the hard work to change their lives.

This work is violence prevention. The

structure we create in an individual's life can lead to safety for everybody. It's a path forward, instead of an arrest-jail cycle to nowhere.

We support the end of cash bail because it makes Illinois a leader in pretrial fairness in the United States. The right to be presumed innocent until proven otherwise should never be a question of money. This doesn't mean detention before trial is never warranted. It means nobody should be locked up for simply being poor.

We're focusing this year on finding partners throughout Illinois who want to work with us. The discussions we've had so far have been encouraging, as more people are starting to see holistic social support as a key component of public safety in our state.

For anybody who wants our help, we're here to listen. \Box

Kids and weddings

Deciding whether or not to invite children to a wedding can be a big question mark for many couples. Some guests may consider children to be a nuisance, while others may think that *not* inviting children is rude. A couple planning a wedding will be hard-pressed to make every guest happy, and so ultimately, the decision should come down to the couple. Read on for tips and advice if you are considering putting kids on your guest list.

During the planning phase

Either way, consider following up with a phone call to any family or friends who are parents. Simply check in over the phone to see if they have any questions about the guest list, and if you are including children, be prepared to explain what accommodations for kids you might be planning.

Kids and ceremonies

Lots of couples opt to include children as a special part of their ceremonies, and there are plenty of ways to do so. Whether you are including a child as a flower girl, ring bearer or a junior bridesmaid, be sure to give children involved in the ceremony ample time to practice during your wedding rehearsal. Consider that younger children, particularly those under three years of age, may have a hard time making it down the aisle alone and designate a grown-up to help.

Outside of the traditional child roles mentioned above, think about other ways to involve kids in your big day. Older children may be able to do a reading during the ceremony. Responsible kids can also serve as ushers, pass out programs or distribute materials for your "wedding exit" – things like bubbles, sparklers, streamers or confetti.

About the reception

If you have included children in your

ceremony, it is considered polite to also invite them along to your reception. That said, you'll want to have some accommodations in place.

During the dining portion of the reception, babies and toddlers will need to eat near their parents and will require booster seats or high chairs. This saves parents from having to balance youngsters on their laps while everyone is in their fine dress. Slightly older kids might be ready for a kid's table. No matter if you are seating children with their parents or at their own table, include table-top activities such as coloring sheets, crafts, small games or puzzles, and definitely consider kid-friendly food options.

Lastly, if your budget and venue allow, think about finding some exciting and reliable child care or entertainment for the kiddos. A magician, face-painter or a balloon artist are super-fun additions that kids of all ages enjoy. If you are going this route, set a firm end-time on child care, so that parents know they'll need to make their own arrangements for the bedtime routine if they want to stay at your reception.

When it comes to kids and weddings, there are no wrong opinions. You and your partner should feel comfortable inviting whoever you feel is best. Happy planning! □

Couples are mixing it up this year when it comes to wedding cakes. Some want cakes with new designs or elements, like cupcakes, while others are going back to classic styles. There are many options to suit a variety of preferences.

Julie Shuler, owner of The Cake Shoppe in Springfield, has received multiple requests for a one-tier cake surrounded by gourmet cupcakes. The wedding couple cuts the cake and guests help themselves to the cupcakes.

"The cake is presented with the cupcakes, which are arranged on decorative cake stands," she says. Couples report that "guests are very pleased with the arrangement and variety of options."

Dessert tables are becoming more popular, too, according to brides.com. This is the stuff of dreams for sweet lovers and can include a cake as well as cupcakes, specialty cookies, mini-cheesecakes, brownies, pies, candy bars or doughnuts. The key is to keep the desserts easy to carry and eat. Couples may want to choose the desserts around a theme, such as the state fair, and serve mini-doughnuts and funnel cakes, or they can simply pick their favorite sweet treats.

Endsley says people want maximalism — on a budget —so they're asking, "How can we use our resources differently?"

Having fun with the food

As many a wedding guest knows, often the most memorable piece of the event is what you were given to eat, and the brides and grooms of 2023 bring the same creative energy to the meal as they do to the rest of the

celebration. Gone are the days of the standard white-clothed buffet table featuring a protein, two sides, a salad and rolls.

Today, food is another opportunity to express a couple's unique story, perhaps through a treasured family dish or a meal themed to pay homage to an emotionally significant geographical location. Lavish tablescapes, lights and even performative cooking can add theatrics and drama to the event.

Brian Reilly of Cured Catering suggests engaging guests with a variety of action stations rather than a sit-down meal. "The bride and groom want mingling," Reilly says, "and action stations give the ability to mix up the focus and add another layer of interest and uniqueness."


An example might be four stations in the four corners of the room – one of roasted veggies and charcuterie, one of pastas, one of seafood and one of typical barbecue fare. Foods can be prepared on-site, giving partygoers a peek behind the curtain and opening up dining options, such as shrimp, that often don't cater well.

"It's fun," Reilly says. "You're dressed up for a reason. People want weddings to be special. It's about creating an experience and expressing themselves through the food as much as any other part of the wedding."

Waste not, want not

Stop calling things garbage. Start calling them trim.

FOOD | Peter Glatz

The Japanese have a concept known as *Mottainai*, which expresses a sense of regret over waste. *Mottai* comes from a Buddhist word that refers to the interconnectedness of all things, living and non-living, and *-nai* means negation. Therefore, Mottainai is an expression of sadness over the wasted opportunity of things that have yet to reach their full potential. It's equivalent to our expression "What a waste!" Japanese environmentalists have used the term to encourage people to "reduce, reuse and recycle."

This concept is one of the core values of the R&D and Fermentation Lab of Audrey, the restaurant I work in. We strive towards being a "zero-waste" restaurant, and I am continually surprised by the amazing things we can make from the trimmings that usually go into the trash or compost. For example, we ferment all the tomato or apple trimmings and reduce the juices into a delicious syrup, and then dehydrate the pulp into flavorful seasoning powders. Numerous other trimmings end up as pickles or turned into miso pastes, vinegars or any number of dehydrated, fermented or preserved ingredients.

It's well known that food waste is a major issue. With the currently inflated cost of food, if you practice fermentation and food preservation, it's more work up front, but as soon as you start creating your own ingredients, you're not buying as much. If you stop calling things garbage and start calling them trim, you get more value for your money.

Our restaurant's menu is based on the seasonality of ingredients, and now we are in the citrus season. Our production kitchen is full of blood oranges, bitter oranges, clementines, yuzu, mandarins, satsumas, kumquats, grapefruits and Meyer lemons. Our walk-in cooler has containers of fragrant citrus blossoms and leaves. All this produce makes its way in some form into the dishes that are coming out of the kitchen and into the drinks coming out of the bar.

Throughout the day, the prep cooks bring containers of citrus peels to the lab for us to create something with. I must confess that I had no idea of the potential uses of citrus peels. The intensely perfumed outermost colored layer of citrus peel (not including the white pith, which is bitter) is known as the *zest*. Zest captures the flavor of the fruit it came from in a highly concentrated form. It is so aromatic

and flavorful because the fruit's volatile oils reside in its rind. I've used lemon, lime and orange zest in my cooking and strips of orange peel in my Old Fashioned cocktails, but these applications are just the tip of the iceberg, and I'm currently involved in a deep dive down the citrus zest rabbit hole.

Before zesting, it's important to remove all the wax coating or anything else that might be on the surface. If you are planning to juice the fruit, zesting should be done first. After you've squeezed out the juice, the rind will be floppy and hard to hold and you might zest your knuckles instead. If you're not in a rush, go ahead and zest some of your citruses as soon as you get home from the store to capture the aromatic essence at its peak. After the peel is removed, the fruit will dry out faster, so try to not let it hang out too long before using the juice.

The easiest way to remove the zest is with a grater or zester. To create a delicate, fine zest, I like the Microplane Grater that I bought at my local Ace Hardware for about \$20. To achieve thin strips, I use an OXO Good Grips Citrus

Zester which I bought for about \$12. If you don't have a grater or zester, you can also use a potato peeler and then cut the zest to the desired size. In a pinch, I've even used a BIC disposable razor. Just be careful to leave behind the bitter, white pith.

It's important to do your zesting over a non-absorbent surface. The volatile oils you're going after will be absorbed by your wooden cutting board. I like to zest over parchment or wax paper. The paper can be folded for easy transfer of the zest. Tightly covered in an airtight container, zest will keep in the refrigerator for up to two weeks, and longer in the freezer.

Citrus Kosho (Japanese Citrus Chili Paste)

This recipe is based on the Japanese condiment Yuzu kosho, a fermented citrus chili paste. Yuzu is a small bright yellow Japanese citrus with an intensely aromatic and flavorful peel. Because yuzu can be hard to find in the U.S., this recipe substitutes easily available citrus. Citrus kosho is a good condiment for grilled meats and poultry.

Try a dab in miso soup. Combine with a little soy sauce, mirin and rice vinegar to make a dipping sauce.

Ingredients

- 1 Meyer lemon (or substitute a regular lemon)
- 1 lime
- 1 small grapefruit
- 1 orange
- 2 serrano chilis, stems and seeds removed
- 1 tablespoon fine sea salt

Preparation:

Zest the lemons, limes, grapefruit and orange into a bowl. Finely slice the chili, and add to the bowl.

Transfer the ingredients to a small food processor and pulse until a smooth paste forms.

Add the juice of half a lemon and half a lime to the paste and stir. Transfer to a glass jar, cover, and allow ferment for two days at room temperature, stirring daily.

Transfer to the refrigerator to ferment for an additional two weeks.

Lemon "Mosto" Olive Oil

Lemon Mosto Olive Oil is traditionally made by cold-pressing together olives and fresh lemons. This recipe is a good approximation. Use this infused oil to dip crusty bread, or in a vinaigrette for salads, or drizzle over grilled fish, meats, and vegetables. It's especially good over grilled asparagus.

Ingredients:

- 1 large lemon
- 1 cup olive oil

Preparation:

Scrub the lemon thoroughly with soap and water and then rinse and dry well.

With a vegetable peeler, remove the zest from the lemon in long strips, being careful not to include the bitter white pith.

In a small saucepan, gently warm the lemon zest and the olive oil. Keep below a simmer for about 10 minutes.

Turn off the heat and allow the zest to steep until the oil cools to room temperature. Remove the zest; it will not add any more flavor once the oil cools.

Transfer the lemon-infused oil into a sealable container.

Store the oil in the refrigerator. It will keep for several weeks. \Box

HISTORY | A stop on the Underground Railroad

For Black History Month, take a tour of one of the Jacksonville area's historical sites linked to the Underground Railroad.
