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Springfield doctors join push for statewide insurance reform

Gov. JB Pritzker wants to address "predatory health insurance practices"

Two Springfield doctors are part of Gov. JB Pritzker's push to reform what he called "predatory health insurance practices."

The Democratic governor's proposed Healthcare Protection Act would ban "step therapy," which can delay patients' access to more-expensive medicines until cheaper medicines are tried first.

House Bill 5395 also would ban requiring prior authorization for inpatient admissions involving crisis mental health care, and it would impose more rules and harsher penalties for insurance companies to prevent the promotion of "ghost networks" of medical providers.

The bill also would make Illinois the first state in the nation to have the right to turn down premium increases proposed by insurers for the "large-group" market, which covers places of employment with 51 or more workers.

The bill "puts power back in the hands of patients and their doctors, where it belongs," Pritzker said at a news conference March 13 after a hearing on the bill in front of an Illinois House committee.

But Laura Minzer, president of the Springfield-based Illinois Life and Health Insurance Council – a group advocating on behalf of the health insurance industry – said the 45-page bill could lead to "significant cost increases" for patients and employers without necessarily improving care.

She said the ban on some prior authorizations "threaten unintended consequences for the patient if the insurer, upon retrospective review of the services and treatments rendered, determines that some of those services are not covered by their policy, leaving the patient on the hook for hundreds if not thousands of dollars in medical expenses at a time they least need that added stress."

Minzer testified that the insurance industry seeks "solutions, not quarrels. We seek progress, not regression." Minzer told *Illinois Times* on

March 19, "There's a potential to get a good compromise, but it's a lot of details."

She noted that the bill wouldn't affect the 60% or more of patients in Illinois' private insurance market because those patients are covered through large employers with self-funded plans. Such plans are regulated by the federal government and exempt from state insurance regulations. The bill's provisions dealing with step therapy and ghost networks wouldn't affect the Medicaid program and its patients.

Dr. Leslie Dignan-Moore, an obstetrician/ gynecologist at Springfield Clinic, testified in committee about the provider directories made available to patients insured by Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois after Blue Cross removed the clinic as an in-network provider in 2021.

The directories purported to list alternate providers ready to serve patients, she said. But she said the list "can only be described as a ghost network"

The directories were a "robust-looking list of providers that ultimately provided dead end after dead end for our patients," she said.

Dr. Mary Dobbins, a pediatrician and child psychiatrist at Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, also testified and said at the news conference that the bill "literally addresses lifeand-death issues."

She said the ongoing shortage of mentalhealth professionals is "artificially magnified" by insurance requirements and restrictions. "Care is commonly delayed, inaccessible, inadequate or even completely denied," she said.

The chief sponsors of the bill, which hasn't yet been voted on by the House or Senate, are state Rep. Anna Moeller, D-Elgin, and state Sen. Robert Peters, D-Chicago. Supporters of the bill said they hope it receives backing from Republicans, as well, and Pritzker said protecting patients shouldn't be a partisan issue.

The "utilization management" practices targeted by the legislation are designed by insurers to "boost profits" and have "never been about supporting patients," Pritzker said. "The sole purpose is the corporate bottom line."

Illinois joined the majority of states a year ago in giving Illinois officials the right to turn down proposed premium increases in the small-employer and individual market. That provision takes effect in 2026.

State oversight of premiums "prevents insurance companies from unfairly jacking up

rates on consumers," Pritzker said.

"Illinoisans who are suffering should not have to jump through hurdle after hurdle after hurdle to get the care that they need to survive," he said. "I know the insurance companies will fight us on this, but I'm not willing to play political games with the health of Illinoisans."

Chicago-based Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois, which restored Springfield Clinic to in-network status in January for many but not all people covered by Blue Cross plans, declined to comment on the bill.

Dignan-Moore didn't refer to Blue Cross by name in her comments but said most of the listed 99 providers for obstetrical and gynecological care outside of Springfield Clinic didn't deliver babies, were farther away from patients than what state rules allowed, weren't accepting new patients or were otherwise unavailable.

"Of the 99 listed, only four were accepting patients within the time and distance requirements," she said. "The helplessness that swept over our patients as they realized the lack of alternative options was overwhelming."

The result was that many patients delayed pregnancies, mammograms and gynecological exams, Dignan-Moore said.

There also were "major issues" with the number of alternative providers to patients outside Springfield Clinic in rheumatology, radiation oncology, ophthalmology, allergy, nephrology, gastroenterology and dermatology, Dignan-Moore said.

Dobbins, who spoke on behalf of the Illinois chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, recounted the case of a 12-year-old patient in need of mental-health hospitalization who had to remain in an emergency room for four days while doctors sought prior authorization for admission.

Dobbins said a 14-year-old patient was denied a hospital admission during a mental-health emergency because the suicide note she wrote that her father brought in had been written three days earlier.

A teen with an eating disorder who was deteriorating physically couldn't be hospitalized because an insurance company wouldn't pay for it "until she was medically compromised and in danger," Dobbins said.

Building "an ecosystem of solutions" on the east side

New city, state funding for CAP 1908 will allow for acquisition of two adjacent buildings

A year from now, Dominic Watson expects to open a shared kitchen and culinary incubator for dozens of emerging minority-owned businesses in a 30,000-square-foot building at 11th Street and South Grand Avenue East.

A year or two after that, his plans call for the former South Town Theater building – on the same block on Springfield's east side – to become a performing arts center and offer early childhood and afterschool programs rooted in the arts.

"One of our larger missions for this location has been to build an ecosystem of solutions to address a lot of the socioeconomic challenges that exist, not just in Springfield as a whole, but nationally, for underserved populations," Watson told *Illinois Times*.

The goals Watson outlined as president of The Springfield Project got a big boost when the Springfield City Council on March 5 approved a \$500,000 allocation to the nonprofit from the Far East Tax Increment Financing District.

Most of the money will be used by The Springfield Project to buy the former Madison Furniture building at 1104 South Grand Avenue E., as well as the adjacent former theater, now used as a stained-glass studio and sales location, at 1110 South Grand Ave.

Some of the funds, generated from property tax revenue from the TIF district, will be used for consulting work to plan for future phases of what is known as CAP 1908, which stands for Springfield Project's Community Access Project.

Watson said the building purchases are key for the future second and third phases of CAP 1908. The title harkens back to the year of the Springfield Race Riot and is signified by a mural on the western exterior wall of 1100 South Grand that depicts an Sankofa bird – an African symbol – rising and overcoming adversity.

CAP 1908, according to Watson, is a "comprehensive redevelopment plan" with three major areas of focus.

The first, a social innovation center and coworking area for minority entrepreneurs and business-related programming for young people, opened in 2023 at 1100 South Grand Ave.

That building was purchased with a \$179,000 federal block grant allocated by the City Council in 2022 and furnished largely with donated materials, along with a \$40,000 donation from Molina Healthcare of Illinois.

The center already has begun offering free financial literacy classes and rented office space on the 10,000 square foot first floor. The development

of more rental office space is planned this spring, Watson said.

A smaller area on the second floor soon will provide office space for one of the Springfield Police Department's neighborhood police officers and Lynard Joiner's nonprofit, Shifting Into New Gear, to help formerly incarcerated people successfully transition after release from prison.

"We're all about capacity-building for other organizations and also providing programming for underserved populations, as well," said Watson, who also serves as president of the Springfield Black Chamber of Commerce.

The second phase, the culinary incubator and space for entrepreneurs to use for podcasting and other tech-based services, will be on the first floor of the 30,000-square-foot former furniture store at 1104 South Grand.

The second floor of that building will house office space and areas for tele-health services offered by health care organizations.

Watson said the building will be renovated with a \$1.6 million federal grant secured by U.S. Rep. Nikki Budzinski, D-Springfield. The grant was part of \$136 million in funding for the 13th Congressional District that was included in a bipartisan government funding bill recently signed into law by President Joe Biden.

The culinary incubator will help many struggling entrepreneurs scale up their businesses, Watson said.

"We know of 50 cottage kitchen entrepreneurs who are minorities," he said.

CAP 1908, in the long term, will spur economic activity and increased property values on the east

side and increased property tax revenues for the city, he said. The Springfield Project will not seek property tax exemptions for the Grand Avenue East buildings, he said.

The third phase of CAP 1908, the performing arts center and space for a Head Start-like early childhood education program and afterschool activities, would require about \$2 million in renovations to the two-story, 10,000-square-foot former theater building, Watson said.

A source of funding for the third phase hasn't been identified, but he said some money could come from the \$3 million being made available through future grants from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for the recent state-designated Southtown Cultural District.

The state unveiled 10 cultural districts in Chicago, Champaign and Springfield in February. The Springfield Project is the host entity for the Southtown Cultural District. The Springfield Urban League is the host entity for Springfield's Central East Cultural District.

"Bringing state-designated cultural districts to Springfield is a monumental step in the right direction for the community and the state," state Sen. Doris Turner, D-Springfield, said in a news release. "These official designations are essential to preserving the history of our state, highlighting the legacy and significant contributions of Black Illinoisans from the Great Migration and onward."

The Springfield Project has four full-time and three part-time employees and will need more as CAP 1908 is built out, Watson said.

The 39-year-old married father of six isn't

paid as president of The Springfield Project or the Springfield Black Chamber of Commerce and works another full-time job.

Springfield Project's current employees are paid through a three-year grant from state adult-use cannabis tax revenue that ends in June 2025.

"Our model has been slow and steady wins the race," Watson said, "and so we are very much focused on not growing too big too fast. I would say that we've been extremely successful, given the initial investment we were given by the city."

The City Council's 10-0 vote to grant the \$500,000 in TIF funding came after some heated debate. The council decided to provide most of the TIF money up front rather than its previous practice of requiring an organization to finance purchases and improvements and then requesting reimbursement from the city.

Watson asked for the money ahead of time to avoid financing charges, but during debate on the request, that option was opposed by alderpersons Chuck Redpath of Ward 1, Erin Conley of Ward 8 and Ralph Hanauer of Ward 10.

Conley said CAP 1908 is "an admirable project," but she wanted city staff to check how other communities safeguard TIF dollars from abuse before the city "makes this type of exception."

However, all opposition evaporated when Mayor Misty Buscher – whose candidacy was supported in the April 2023 election by the three alderpersons – suggested the council deviate from its usual past practice in this instance.

Conley told Buscher, "It's your administration," as she withdrew her opposition.

Ward 3 Ald. Roy Williams Jr., a supporter of the project and an occasional critic of Buscher, said later that the mayor "raised the magic wand" to ensure a successful vote from alderpersons.

"It's amazing," he said. "Our council – that's how they operate. They don't have true convictions. ... In my opinion, that's strictly political."

Ward 2 Ald. Shawn Gregory, in whose ward CAP 1908 sits, said he was relieved after the vote that CAP 1908 wouldn't have to endure funding delays and additional costs.

"It shows our community that there are people in government who are thinking about our community," he said. "This is the poorest area of our entire city. ... We are going to see some fantastic things." \square

ISP concludes investigation into shooting at juvenile detention center

Still not clear how teen obtained the gun he fired before being shot and killed by police

An Illinois State Police investigation failed to determine how a 17-year-old obtained the handgun he fired inside the Sangamon County Juvenile Detention Center and carried as he tried to escape the facility with a hostage Sept. 30 before being shot by police.

Camren Marcelis Darden, 17, was hit by several rounds fired from a semi-automatic rifle by veteran Springfield police officer Brian Riebeling a few minutes before 8 p.m. Sept. 30. Darden was transported to HSHS St. John's Hospital, where he was pronounced dead about two hours later.

"The investigation did not conclusively determine how the gun got into the detention center and into the hands of the juvenile," Sangamon County State's Attorney John Milhiser said in a statement to *Illinois Times*.

"There is no evidence in the investigation to support a finding that the juvenile had an accomplice or was otherwise assisted in obtaining the gun," he said. "My review of the investigation did determine that there is no evidence to support criminal charges against anyone relating to this incident."

Milhiser's statement to *Illinois Times* came after ISP officials confirmed to the newspaper that they had completed their probe and turned the results over to Milhiser.

It's possible that authorities may never learn how Darden obtained the gun, Circuit Judge Ryan Cadagin said.

"This was a tragedy that everyone is working hard to prevent from ever happening again," he said.

The weapon – a Turkish-made Girsan 9 mm pistol 6 to 7 inches long and weighing 1.5 to two pounds – can be seen on the ground at the entrance to the detention center along South Dirksen Parkway in narrated video footage released by Springfield police on Dec. 6.

Darden, a Springfield resident, died from wounds caused by "fewer than a half-dozen rounds," according to Sangamon County Coroner Jim Allmon.

The ISP's written findings, numbering several hundred pages, weren't immediately available to *Illinois Times*, but the newspaper has filed a Freedom of Information request with the agency to obtain a report.

When asked whether Darden might have had the handgun with him when Springfield

police brought him to the county-operated center for pretrial detention, Milhiser wouldn't comment on that possibility or other potential scenarios that would have overcome the center's security measures.

Springfield Police Chief Kenneth Scarlette said Darden was "patted down" to check for weapons when he was arrested, put in a squad car and brought to the police station for questioning before he was brought to the detention center on Sept. 11.

Darden was detained for several hours and under video surveillance while at the station, but police who reviewed the footage found nothing amiss, Scarlette said.

The chief wouldn't rule out the possibility of Darden smuggling a gun into the center when he was admitted there. Scarlette said the incident has underscored the importance of thorough body checks.

The chief said body-cavity searches of people who are arrested are uncommon without a court warrant.

Scarlette said the detention center would benefit from a "more robust way of screening."

He said he wasn't surprised that state police were unable to determine how Darden got ahold of the gun.

"You're essentially looking at a needle in a haystack," Scarlette said. He added, "There are any number of ways it could have gotten into the facility." He declined to speculate on those ways.

Cadagin, the 7th Judicial Circuit's presiding judge for Sangamon County, said it's his goal to reopen the detention center "as soon as it's safe to open." He wouldn't estimate a timeline for reopening.

Circuit Judge Christopher Reif, the Jacksonville-based chief judge for the six-county 7th Circuit, said, "Our No. 1 priority is the safety of the juveniles and the staff."

The detention center is owned and operated by Sangamon County government and supervised by the 7th Circuit judges. It has been closed since the incident to allow for the ISP investigation.

Before the center opens, however, Kent Holsopple, director of Sangamon County court services, told *Illinois Times* on March 18 that "several facility policies and operational changes will be put in place to address all possible safety concerns."

"Additional security measures will be put

into place in the facility, including the use of a body scanner to better detect any potential contraband when youth are brought into the facility and new/upgraded cameras in and around the facility," Holsopple said in a statement.

The center currently uses metal detectors of various types. It appears the body scanner would go beyond what is currently available and would be similar to the scanner inmates go through when they are booked into the Sangamon County Jail.

The projected cost for Sangamon County government to upgrade security at the center was unavailable.

Holsopple said "sufficient staffing for the facility also remains a top priority in reopening planning."

The facility has 22 staff positions that are part of its \$2.7 million annual budget, but the center has been less than 50% staffed while admissions have been suspended, he said.

The Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts, through the Illinois Supreme Court's budget, reimburses counties for the salaries of approved detention center staff members.

Milhiser said the ISP investigation included interviews with more than 50 people and a review of more than 2,000 hours of video from the detention center and footage from police body cameras.

The probe focused at first on the use of force by Springfield police. Milhiser said he agreed with his predecessor, now Associate Circuit Judge Dan Wright, that Reibeling "was justified in the use of deadly force."

Wright decided that criminal charges weren't warranted against Reibeling. Milhiser has said Riebeling won't face any criminal charges in the case, and neither will Chance Taylor, who was an officer-in-training at the time and accompanied Riebeling when they responded to the detention center's 911 call. Scarlette said neither man will face internal disciplinary action, either.

Police said Darden fired shots from the handgun at other detainees and staff members inside the facility before trying to leave with a 16-year-old female as a hostage before being shot by Riebeling. The female was a detainee, as well, Scarlette said.

No one was hit by the bullets fired by Darden. Springfield resident Camille Darden,

34, Camren Darden's mother, said police

overreacted in their handling of the incident. She said Riebeling should be disciplined or criminally charged.

"They didn't have to shoot him and kill him," she said.

Darden, a server at a restaurant and a single mother with three surviving children, all younger than Camren, said law enforcement personnel should have made sure her son didn't have access to firearms inside the detention center.

She said she hadn't voiced her dissatisfaction to police or the state's attorney because she was too upset.

Camille Darden said her son was being held at the center after being charged in juvenile court with possession of stolen property.

Camren previously was incarcerated for six months at an Illinois youth center,

Camille Darden said. She said she didn't know what crime or crimes led to that incarceration but said her son had been arrested in the past for stealing a car and for driving stolen vehicles.

Milhiser wouldn't confirm details of Camren Darden's criminal history, citing confidentiality rules associated with juvenile cases.

Camille Darden said Camren was a quiet person who attended Springfield High School but didn't graduate because of his involvement with the criminal justice system.

Scarlette narrated the police video of the incident that was released in December and said at its conclusion: "Law enforcement is a dangerous profession that often requires split-second decision-making. It is this decision-making that can oftentimes be the difference maker as it pertains to active shooting incidents.

"I commend the professionalism of all responding officers, and I'm grateful this terrible incident was brought to a swift resolution. While the death is tragic, the instantaneous, organized response, which was carried out exactly how the officers were trained, clearly prevented additional loss of life."

Scarlette said the temporary closure, combined with capacity issues at the more than a dozen county-operated juvenile detention centers throughout the state, has resulted in six Sangamon County juveniles being released to family members rather than being detained even though they met criteria for detainment. \square

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DON'T BLAME STUDENTS

Marc Magliari wrote a scathing letter lamenting the public media landscape in our state and decided to blame the tuitionpaying students at University of Illinois Springfield for not shouldering the bill ("Letters to the editor," March 7). Of course, he leaves out that many other public media outlets have consolidated in recent years, often for similar reasons. Quincy University rolled off its public radio station to St. Louis Public Media not too long ago – would he call that school a failure?

His lamentations regarding public media are correct, but the target of his ire should be the Statehouse. The chancellor he criticizes successfully navigated the global pandemic, stabilizing student enrollment. Why is this important? There are bonds for facilities that must be paid for with student fees. Tuition dollars cannot go to parking lots, housing units, recreational facilities and the student union. An extended drop in student enrollment would have resulted in automatic doubling of student fees, further eroding student enrollment. The university administration, including this so-called "temp" (Chancellor Karen Whitney), worked fast to stabilize student enrollment. They succeeded.

While tuition dollars cannot be used for our own student services, the legislature conveniently never forbade them from being used to finance public items they fail to finance themselves. While many states have robust, state-funded public media, the Illinois General Assembly has decided to throw pennies at it and then force radio stations to piggyback off student tuition dollars as a "public service." Students have to vote to charge themselves

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My curriculum not the reason kids can't read

Your Feb. 29 cover story, "When Kids Can't Read," references Springfield public schools and my curriculum, *Units of Study*.

I applaud Springfield for attending to the individual differences among children as readers. It is fundamentally important to recognize that children are all different. Assessments from reading specialists and individualized support for those who need it are foundational parts of a successful education strategy. Some children will need help segmenting and blending sounds as they read, while others need more opportunities to read nonfiction texts and to develop world knowledge and vocabulary.

Springfield's programs such as Real Men Read and Compass for Kids similarly show that the district is making sound, research-based decisions that will move readers forward. The Real Men Read program provides valuable mentorship, allowing children to grow up seeing themselves as readers and thinking, "Reading is something cool people do." And Springfield's decision to supplement classroom learning with after-school and summer programs to support readers is wise. Kids need time to practice reading. These efforts make a real difference. These programs matter.

But I am sorry that, while Springfield is doing so many things right, the cover story contains inaccuracies about "balanced literacy" and about my curriculum, *Units of Study,* that may indeed ultimately hurt students.

Balanced literacy works.

My curriculum, *Units of Study in Reading, Writing and Phonics*, is a curriculum that

has been continually developed and refined for 40 years, informed by classroom-based research, by rich assessments of students and by scholarship. The approach would never have been adopted in approximately 25% of the nation's schools if it didn't yield results. It is the curriculum in a huge number of Blue Ribbon and Beat the Odds schools. The data overwhelmingly indicate that schools partnering with us demonstrate meaningful improvements in student performance and that improvements only deepen over time.

Although there were inaccuracies in the story, the article was not wrong in saying that some whole language educators used to teach phonics through immersion, hoping children would learn their ABCs through immersion, just as they learn oral language. It is true that studies have shown that most children benefit from explicit, structured instruction in phonics.

The errors in the article come from the author confusing balanced literacy with whole language, and more specifically, from confusing *Units of Study* (and me) with a belief that children grow best from laissezfaire, natural instruction. I have always been a strong proponent of explicit phonics instruction, and in general, of direct, explicit instruction. Anyone who knows my work knows I have written literally thousands of minilessons in which kids are taught through the teacher naming, then demonstrating, then guiding kids to practice a skill or strategy.

I never bypassed phonics instruction in my approach to teaching reading. My very first book on teaching reading, which predates this latest "science of reading" debate by nearly 20 years, devoted three chapters to early reading and one of those three was to phonics. I have written 22 books on phonics, well over 2,800 pages. And I have written hundreds of decodable books, including the series *Jump Rope Readers*, which are regarded by many as best-in-class.

False claims of a dramatic new reading crisis have whipped the public into a frenzy, leading whole states to mandate totally untested statewide reforms in reading. Let's instead pause, check the facts (yes, reading scores dipped during COVID, but over the 20 years prior, they have been slowly, steadily improving) and look with more care at exactly what has and has not worked for America's young readers.

I know that podcasts, blogs and social media posts have made me a scapegoat for the imperfections of early literacy education, and so I understand why your newspaper echoed those claims. But that narrative is filled with untruths and brims with blaming and shaming, a toxic brew that will not help our country, nor serve Springfield's children.


Promises of a magic bullet are tempting. Some states are mandating a short list of required programs, each costing millions of dollars, and knowledgeable educators in those states are howling with protest. This is playing out in Connecticut right now – districts like Wilton, Cheshire and Greenwich are prime examples. Rushing to purchase a whole-district basal that channels all students to read the same snippets of books despite wide differences in students' reading levels is not apt to be a panacea.

Many of those programs have been evaluated as culturally harmful, and none of them have been implemented in a district like Springfield with strong results. Some come labeled 'Science of Reading,' but the science of reading is neither a curriculum nor a method for teaching children. And in any case, it alone will not take a K-12 system to rich, cross-disciplinary standards-based work. In a too hasty effort to translate ideology to curriculum, children suffer.

It is clear there are some wise, informed educators at the helm of Springfield. Those educators need the opportunity to do a school-by-school audit to determine what the needs are in Springfield. It may be that the district needs to adopt a more tightly controlled phonics program, or to offer teachers more professional development in phonics. But as Elfrieda Hiebert's analysis of kids who do not do well on the National Assessment of Educational Progress shows, it is just as likely that Springfield's uppergrade students need more access to engaging, accessible nonfiction.

Reform in literacy will require additional funding. District 186 is underfunded. It sounds as if Springfield may be ready to invest in early literacy, and that is heartening. When spent thoughtfully, funds could make a huge difference in classrooms across Springfield. \square

Protecting and restoring our native habitat

Be part of the solution by planting milkweed and removing invasive species

Spring is always a welcome reward for enduring the cold temperatures of winter. Now that our days are filled with sunshine, the beauty of our landscape is awakening as the grass quickly greens and flowers begin to show their colors - proof of Mother Nature's magnificent design. This beauty is part of an intricate system of habitats and ecosystems: the natural environment where plants, animals and other organisms live together interdependently. The habitat provides food, water, shelter and support for survival and reproduction. One change in the habitat can impact all other elements of the habitat. Central Illinois is habitat to the monarch butterfly, and its population has changed because a crucial element of its habitat has been reduced. The good news is, we can make a difference in reversing this trend and restoring the habitat.

Prior to winter, the monarch butterfly leaves central Illinois and migrates to the mountaintops of central Mexico where the entire population is measured by World Wildlife Fund Mexico. For the last two decades the fund has reported the population's decline, which is attributed to the loss of milkweed plants – the required host plants for caterpillars of the monarch butterfly. Also, the reduction in the feeding and nesting habitats are partly due to invasive plant species that harm the habitat. What can be done about it? We can plant native milkweed, reduce invasive plant species and select herbicides that will not damage the monarch's natural habitat.

The monarch butterfly is a pollinator, and pollinators are essential because they carry pollen from the male anther of one flower to the female stigma of another flower, which helps to bring about fertilization (This is the real birds and bees story). More than 75% – and possibly up to 95% – of all flowering plants on earth need help with pollination. Pollinators help fertilize more than 180,000 different plant species and 1,200 crops. Without pollination we would not have flowers, fruits and vegetables, to name just a few. Pollinators support agriculture and add \$217 billion to the global economy.

Pollinators are crucial to supporting our habitat and milkweed is crucial to the monarch. Susan Helm of Springfield is an avid gardener, pollinator enthusiast and community volunteer. She said the monarch population in central Illinois has declined by 40% in the last two years. It is a vulnerable species, and Helm says that one small act of planting native milkweed can make a big difference in increasing the monarch population.

Milkweed is the host plant of the monarch, providing food and shelter, and is the exclusive breeding ground where females lay their eggs as the caterpillar eats only the leaves of the milkweed plant. Once the caterpillar grows large enough, it becomes a chrysalis, and in a matter of weeks a new monarch butterfly emerges and the cycle begins again.

Even if you're not an avid gardener, you can be part of the solution. Helm says growing milkweed is easy because it can be planted in a container such as a terra cotta pot and placed on a deck or patio. She is giving away 2,000 milkweed stems during the month of May through events at Springfield parks, Kidzeum and the May 18 opening weekend of the Old Capitol Farmers Market in downtown Springfield. Helm currently sits on the board of the Springfield Parks Foundation, and credits the foundation for funding the giveaways and helping with getting the word out. This is her fourth year of milkweed giveaways.

Native milkweed will also be given away at Enos Park Neighborhood Gardens, 1022 N. Fifth St., during an open house on May 11, 9-11 a.m. Carey Smith, garden manager, says many organizations will be present with giveaways, and there's ample opportunity for asking questions about

growing milkweed or planting a small pollinator pocket in your yard or community garden. Smith said updates on more native seed giveaways and events throughout the summer can be found on the Facebook page or enosparkgardens.org.

Another way we can be supportive members of the monarch's habitat is to select native plants when designing landscaping around our homes and removing any invasive plants that may be growing in our yards. Plant species that are native to central Illinois have historically been part of this landscape and are essential elements of the habitat. There are non-native and invasive species

growing in our region that were either intentionally or accidentally translocated from one ecosystem to our local ecosystem. The invasive plants compete with native plants for soil and nutrients, and they do not serve as food for the pollinators, thus harming the habitat. 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Spring crafts for kids

Spring is finally here. This is a wonderful time of year to get outside with younger children, but it can sometimes be hard to know what to do. Spring crafts are a great way to teach kids about nature, use fine motor skills and get outside. They can also be a fun way to reuse common household materials that would otherwise be destined for recycling or the landfill. Read on for some easy, eco-friendly craft ideas that use common household items and will be sure to activate your child's inner artist and nature lover.

Egg carton tulips

What you'll need:

An emptied cardboard or foam egg carton Scissors

Washable paint in bright colors like yellow, purple or pink

Paintbrushes

Green pipe cleaners

What to do:

Simply cut apart your egg carton so that the cups that held the eggs are all separated. Depending on your kids' ages, this may be a job for a grownup. Invite your child to paint each egg cup how they'd like. Once the egg cups are dry, poke a small hole in the bottom of each and push a green pipe cleaner through the hole. This will act as your stem. You can make one or a dozen of these fun tulips, and unlike real tulips you buy at the store, they'll last for years.

Milk jug bird feeder

What you'll need: An empty plastic milk jug Permanent markers or acrylic paint X-acto knife or scissors Sticks or twigs Bird seed Long string or twine

What to do:

Before you start, clean your empty milk jug well. Once it is clean and dry, use a permanent marker to draw a square on each side of the milk jug, leaving a couple of inches at the bottom. This will be the opening that birds will use to eat. Cut these squares out using an x-acto knife or scissors (this is likely a grownup job).



Use empty plastic milk jugs to help your kids make backvard bird feeders.

Below those large squares, cut smaller squares, only large enough to push a stick or twig through. Then, cut two small holes near the top of your jug. This is where you'll string through twine to hang your feeder.

Before you add your sticks and twine, invite your child to decorate the prepared milk jug with permanent markers or acrylic paint. Don't use washable paint, as this will come off in the rain.

Once your jug is decorated, cross and insert your two sticks into the bottom holes of your feeder. String your twine through as well, and hang your feeder from a tree. Fill the bottom of your feeder with birdseed. Birds will perch on the sticks to access the feed through the large windows you cut. Enjoy watching your visitors.

Tin can windchimes

What you'll need:

Tin cans, emptied and cleaned thoroughly Acrylic paint and paintbrush

String

Hammer and a nail

Metal washers or nuts

Thick tape such as painters tape, masking tape or duct tape

What to do:

Be sure your cans have clean edges. You can use tape along the rims of the cans if you are concerned about little fingers. Invite your child to paint the cans however they like. Be sure to use acrylic paint, as washable paint will come off in the rain.

Once the paint is dry, kids can use a hammer and a nail to poke a hole in the bottom of their cans. String a long piece of yarn through the hole, and tie some washers or nuts to the string on the inside of the can one to hold the yarn onto the can and another further down to make a sound when the can

Once you've tied your washers or nuts to the yarn, test out your chimes to see what sounds they make. Your child may be interested in using different sizes of washers, cans, etc. to investigate different sounds.

Finally, hang your colorful tin can wind chimes someplace where you can admire them together.

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Backyard chickens 101

If you've ever stopped to admire fluffy chicks that appear at farm supply stores each spring, you may have contemplated bringing home a flock of your own. Keeping hens is likely the most approachable form of animal husbandry with a myriad of rewards, including access to scrumptious fresh eggs, reduced kitchen waste and the sheer enjoyment of having them around. Even city folks can turn their house into a homestead with the addition of a few feathered friends, although it's important to check the ordinances where you live. Chickens (but not roosters) are allowed to be kept in Springfield as long as they are fenced in; however, nearby villages and townships may have different rules. The village of Jerome for example, does not allow chickens.

In many ways, keeping chickens isn't much more work than caring for a house cat, and these ladies can at least give you breakfast. There are some important considerations, however, when deciding if the clucky life is right for you. Chickens require daily care, which includes letting them out each morning (although automated chicken doors can allow for sleeping in), keeping their food and water full, and perhaps the greatest delight, collecting fresh eggs. The coop will need to be deep-cleaned a couple times a year, depending on its size and how many birds you have, and in the winter, you'll need to use a submersible heater to keep their water thawed.

If this sounds doable, the next consideration is the type and quantity of chickens you'll want. There are a range of varieties available at most area farm stores, and a dizzying array that can be ordered from commercial hatcheries. For beginners, it's best to get breeds that are known to be especially docile, such as Buff Orphington, Black Australorp and Easter Egger, a hybrid variety that lays colorful eggs ranging from olive green to pink. Chickens are social animals, so keeping at least three hens is important for their well-being. One chicken per person is a good ratio for keeping your family supplied with eggs. Depending on the breed, you can expect a chicken to produce about 200 eggs in their first year of laying. That number will go down slightly each year as they age, but the eggs will be larger with bigger yolks.

Before you bring your babies home, a brooder should be set up to keep them warm and safe until they are old enough to move into their permanent quarters. It is essential that it be set up in a dry, draft-free area that is free from predators or curious toddlers. New chicks will need about half a square foot of space each until they are about four weeks old, at which time they'll need about three-fourths square foot each. A plastic wading

pool or tub works extremely well as long as it has sides at least 18 inches tall (you'll quickly learn they can jump pretty high).

Chicks reared by a mama hen depend on her for warmth because they can't regulate their body temperature on their own. This is typically replicated with the use of a 250-watt heat lamp suspended over part of the brooder with a chain so that it's about two-and-a-half inches over the litter on the floor. For the first week, the chicks will need constant heat of about 95 degrees Fahrenheit when measured directly under the light. It's critical that the brooder be set up so the chicks can move under the lamp to warm up but also enough space to move to a cooler zone if they get too warm. Thermostats are useful, but observing the chicks' behavior is key. You'll know the brooder is at the right temperature when the chicks are evenly spread about. If they are all clustered together under the light, that indicates the temperature is too low; however, if they are all pressed against the sides of the brooder as far away from the light as possible, this is an indication that the temperature is too high. Gradually reduce the temperature by five degrees by raising the chain of the light about one inch every week, until the brooder temp is about 65 degrees. At this point, the babies are ready to transition into their permanent housing.

Chicken coops don't need to be fancy, but they do need to be well-insulated, ventilated and provide protection from predators. If you're handy with a hammer there are loads of DIY plans ranging from rudimentary to luxe. Repurposed doghouses or sheds are also excellent options.

Regardless of what type of coop you decide on, it should allow a minimum of three to four square feet inside the coop per chicken. Modern chickens are descended from jungle fowl and, despite being domesticated, they still have the urge to roost off the ground, so they'll need something for them to perch on at night. Wood roosts about two inches in diameter are ideal - just make sure they're removable to facilitate cleaning. Sturdy, natural branches are free and the preferred perch for most hens. And of course, nesting boxes are essential. Again, these can be fancy or repurposed and free, like milk crates turned on their sides. City folks (and anyone with a garden to protect) will need a fenced-in run where their girls can roam during the day, about 10 square feet per bird.

Chickens will start laying around 18 weeks old. The eggs will be small initially but will gradually reach normal size after a few months. You'll soon be spoiled by the incomparable taste of fresh eggs and find that any surplus supply can be quickly distributed to friends and neighbors or find their way into a myriad of recipes. Check out this week's food column on page 33 for foolproof techniques for preparing the perfect eggs every time.

Romance, drama, nostalgia or a few good laughs






The hidden gems in Rockford

Baseball, Japanese gardens, dinosaur bones, haunted history and more

Peaches aren't usually a spring treat but you can find them in Rockford along with some stunning gardens if you head 200 miles north this time of year. You also might encounter old bones and haunted spirits.

"Rockford is a little bit of a hidden gem," says Emily Plumb of the Rockford Area Convention and Visitors Bureau. "We are diverse when it comes to things to do."

Diverse indeed. At the Midway Village Museum on the city's outskirts, visitors can learn all about Rockford's history, including the Rockford Peaches. The team was part of the All-American Professional Baseball League for 12 years in the 1940s and 1950s and was made famous by the 1992 movie, *A League of Their Own*, starring Tom Hanks, Geena Davis, Madonna and Rosie O'Donnell. You also can pay homage to the Peaches at their restored Beyer Stadium on 15th Street in town.

The Midway Village Museum features Peaches' uniforms, programs, photos and other memorabilia and will host a baseball game with players in Peaches' gear on May 11 from noon-4 p.m. Admission is \$14 for adults and \$12 for seniors and children ages 5-12. Under 5 is free. The museum encourages attendees to dress in 1940s' clothing.

Other exhibits include a recreated millhouse, information on Swedish

immigrants, early aviation attempts, Rockford's role in the two world wars and the creation of the red-heeled socks that led to a boast as the home of the sock monkey. Go to midwayvillage.com to learn more.

The grounds include a Victorian village and several gardens but for an even better treat, head to the 12-acre Anderson Japanese Gardens, rated one of North America's top Japanese gardens. A stroll along the meandering paths, koi ponds, waterfalls, streams, pavilions and lush greenery will confirm the ranking.

Rockford businessman John Anderson began the Japanese garden and then hired renowned designer Hoichi Kurisu to expand it. Anderson and his wife donated the garden in 1998, and visitors can enjoy its tranquility from May 1 to Oct. 31. See andersongardens. org for information on admission and activities.

For a garden experience all year long, the Nicholas Conservatory and Gardens is a good bet. Located along the Rock River, the third largest conservatory in Illinois has tropical plants, ponds, sculptures, special exhibits and seasonal gardens on the grounds. The Secret Life of Butterflies lands March 23-May 26 and will offer a look at their whole life cycle. More information is available at nicholasconservatory.com.

Klehm Arboretum and Botanic Garden is a place to gaze at rare trees, let the kids run off steam at the children's garden with its water features and view gardens full of seasonal delights. Other outdoor spots Plumb recommends are Rock Cut State Park with trails and a manmade lake and the Rock River with water activities as the weather warms.

For a break from the outdoors, visit the dinosaur bones at the Burpee Museum of Natural History, part of the Riverfront Museum Campus along with the Discovery Center Museum and the Rockford Art Museum. The Burpee displays "Jane," said to be the world's most complete and best-preserved juvenile T. Rex, and "Homer," a teen triceratops. Housed in an old mansion, the museum has a large collection of other paleontology finds, a mock ancient forest, Native American exhibits and a smattering of live reptiles, fish and insects.

The Discovery Center will entertain children of all ages with its 250 hands-on exhibits and a giant outdoor park with mazes, water features, slides, a cave and a dinosaur bone digging site. Next door is the Rockford Art Museum with its collection of modern art and masters such as Lorado Taft, famous for his large sculptures.

You also can download a phone app that

will guide you on a public art trail throughout the city and Winnebago County. The trail highlights 60 murals and sculptures. If you visit the last weekend in May, you can take in the CRE8IV Transformational Art Mural Festival in downtown Rockford, according to Plumb.

Plumb also recommends the Tinker Swift Cottage Museum and Gardens, an historic house museum. "Some say it is haunted," she says, explaining it is built on a Native American prehistoric mound. Several television shows investigating ghosts have included the cottage.

The Cottage will host several paranormal investigation events this spring but tickets sell out quickly. Go to tinkercottage.com for information and hauntedrockford.com for tickets

The Rockford City Market's outdoor venue runs from mid-May to after Labor Day on Friday evenings and offers local produce, dairy and meat products, baked goods, prepared food, artisans' work and music.

Perfect recipes for eggs, just in time for spring

Eggs have been a symbol of spring for centuries, long before the advent of Christianity and our modern hunts for Easter eggs. The ancient Greeks, Romans and Egyptians all had beliefs relating to eggs and the creation of the universe, that the earth itself was born out of an egg. Cultures around the world decorate eggs to exchange as gifts of goodwill and to celebrate the coming of a new season. The modern custom of dying eggs for Easter stems from these pre-Christian cultures, which came to see eggs as a manifestation of spring and new of life emerging after a long winter. This pagan tradition of dying eggs to celebrate the warmth of the spring sun translated nicely to the Christian celebration of Easter, especially when eggs were forbidden in the 40 days of

The association of eggs with springtime should make sense to anyone who raises their own hens. If the idea intrigues you, check out *Backyard Chickens 101* on page 15. During the darkest weeks of winter, a chicken's egg output will decrease due to the reduced hours of sunlight each day. This is because when a hen's retina detects light it stimulates the production of reproductive hormones, so fewer hours of sunlight means fewer eggs. What may have been a meager supply over the winter suddenly becomes generous as the days lengthen.

Regardless of how they're prepared, eggs provide powerful nutrition including protein, beneficial fats and loads of vitamins. We love them for breakfast in large part because they're fast and easy to prepare, but don't count them out for dinner. Eggs can be incredibly elegant thanks to their magical ability to create their own luxurious sauce, perfect for tossing with pasta or topping a bunch of perfectly steamed asparagus. They can also brighten up and fortify devastatingly simple yet delicious dishes, whether it's finely chopped hard-boiled egg on top of caviar or scrambled alongside buttered toast.

Perfectly poached

Poached eggs always feel fancy, thanks to their association with luxe brunch dishes like eggs Benedict. What's awesome about them, especially for entertaining, is that they can be made ahead, chilled and stored in cold water for three days before quickly rewarming in hot water just before serving. I prefer to use a wide Dutch oven-type pot filled with

two quarts of water. Bring to a simmer and add a tablespoon of white or cider vinegar. Working one at a time, crack up to six eggs over a slotted spoon to allow the watery portion to drain away, then gently slip them

into the simmering water, spacing them evenly around the pot. Cover the pot and take it off the stove to sit for three to four minutes, depending on how runny you want the yolks. Carefully remove each egg with a

slotted spoon and drain briefly before serving or transfer it gently into a dish of ice water to stop it cooking. Rewarm poached eggs in hot water that's just below simmering, about 150 degrees, for two minutes. Poached eggs are delicious in a bowl of ramen, on top of a mixed green salad (Try poaching them in dry red or white wine!), or over asparagus with a sprinkle of crispy garlic breadcrumbs and spring chives.

Hard- or soft-boiled

There are countless ways to hard or soft cook an egg, but it turns out that steaming is the most effective method because the temperature of steam is much more consistent than the temperature of water boiling in a pot, where the eggs on the bottom of a pot of boiling water will be exposed to more heat. To steam eggs, bring a couple inches of water to a boil in a saucepan with a tight-fitting lid. When the water boils, place fridge cold eggs in a steamer basket, lower it into the saucepan and cover. For soft boiled eggs, steam for six minutes. For eggs with a slightly gummy center, cook for 10-11 minutes. For hard-cooked eggs, cook for 12 minutes. Remove the eggs and place in a bowl of cold tap water until cool enough to handle, then gently crack the shell by tapping it on the counter, then slip your finger under the membrane separating the white from the shell. Serve warm or cool completely to slice for salads or to make deviled eggs.

Scrambled

It's hard to mess up a scramble, but small additions and techniques can have a huge impact. For the fluffiest scrambled eggs, beat in one tablespoon of water per egg before pouring them into the hot skillet. The water basically steams the egg from the inside out while cooking, resulting in an extra fluffy scramble. If creamy eggs are what you crave, swap out milk or cream for the water. Browning the butter in the skillet before adding the eggs is another opportunity to add a layer of flavor. Add the eggs to the hot butter in the skillet and stir until they begin to look slightly curdled, then lower the heat and gently fold the lumpy egg mixture over itself while shaking the pan. When the eggs are just barely set, transfer to a warmed plate and let rest for a minute to let the egg finish cooking before serving. □





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
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
