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
A rocky recovery

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The taxman cometh for your virtual yard sale

Death and taxes remain certainties, and in Illinois, the latter has become more certain than ever.

This tax season marks the second year that the Land of Lincoln has targeted the gig economy by requiring companies that process digital – think PayPal or Venmo – to report payments at thresholds below what the Internal Revenue Service specifies. Under federal law, electronic payment processors don't have to report money changing hands until someone receives at least \$20,000 in at least 200 transactions. Starting in 2020, Illinois lowered the threshold to \$1,000 with at least four transactions. In recent years, a dozen other states, concerned about taxes going unpaid, also have instituted stricter requirements than the federal government, which will lower the threshold to \$600 for next tax season on 2022 money transfers.

"This is a big thing," says Tom O'Saben, a tax preparer who is assistant director for professional tax education and outreach at the University of Illinois Tax School in Urbana. "Now, people are going to receive 1099-Ks just because they might have a yard sale and they decided to accept payment from PayPal or Venmo or some other third-party electronic payment processor."

Maura Kownacki, spokeswoman for the Illinois Department of Revenue, couldn't say by how much, if any, tax collections have increased since the state standard changed last year, but the department has been using reports from payment processors to identify potential problems. "As a result of getting the 1099-K information, IDOR has been able to identify numerous taxpayers underreporting their sales and tax," she wrote in an email. "Their filing inaccuracies are being corrected and the forms will continue to work to generate significant audit dollars as well as increase compliance."

Amy Jasmon, a Springfield tax preparer, says that she has clients who didn't know the extent of electronic trails until they received 1099-Ks. "Most come to me and say, 'I've got this weird thing, I don't know what it is,'" she says. "The main people who are getting stuck

are required from processors until \$20,000 changes hands, it's been up to taxpayers who received less to divulge just how much on their tax returns. "Some taxpayers may not report the income if they do not believe the IRS has received an information return," observed the

getting 1099-Ks for services rendered, Jasmon said, but things are simpler for Lyft and Uber drivers because their driving accounts automatically keep track of mileage and other costs that can be deducted from payments so that it's relatively easy to pay taxes only on profit, as opposed to gross amounts. It can get stickier for someone who sells stuff they've owned for years.

The best way, tax experts advise, is to keep receipts so that you can prove you didn't make money from a \$100 widget that you sold for \$50. What about the \$20 tennis racket you bought in high school and sold for \$10? Absent the original receipt, Jasmon says that you could be on the hook for taxes on \$10, assuming you sold enough other stuff to trigger a 1099-K. O'Saben says there is wiggle room, but only so much. A price in a catalogue may be sufficient to convince tax collectors that you didn't make money by selling an exercise bike and so owe no taxes, he said. "If you don't have anything to support it, it will have to be income," O'Saben said. "I could zero out (income), but what I can't do is ignore it."

Those who sell things as a business as opposed to a closet-cleaning endeavor should keep records documenting all expenses, experts say. Another option, O'Saben says, is to treat merchandise as a collectible, which carries a maximum 28% levy on gains from sales of such things as sports memorabilia. Also, there are transactions involving no sales of goods or payment for work, such as money sent to kids at college via Venmo, with no taxes due despite 1099-Ks reporting money being paid to someone. Keep business transactions as far away as possible from personal payments, O'Saben advises. Payment processors are developing business platforms distinct for payments made for nontaxable reasons, he says, but the industry is prone to act conservatively.

"Most companies are afraid of being fined for violating reporting requirements," O'Saben said. "The intention is good: They're trying to capture the undercurrent of cash transactions. It's going to create a reporting nightmare, or complexity, at least in the short run. ... Congress will approach it, at some point, when there's enough alarm." □



with it are people who are trying to clean out their houses and put things on Amazon or eBay. Those internet currencies are now being tracked and people are now having to pay taxes on it."

Taxes always have been due when digital profit is made, but until last year in Illinois, it was often an honor system for small-timers: Since, under federal rules, no reports

Treasury Inspector for Tax Administration in a 2019 report that found billions of dollars at stake. Ninety-three percent of taxpayers report income when receiving funds from sources that report directly to the IRS, according to the report; just 37% report income when no records are sent independently to the tax collector. Nearly 8% of Americans in 2016 reported being paid digitally for work, according to the treasury inspector, with nearly 18% selling goods online that same year.

With new federal rules scheduled to take effect, the threshold for filing a 1099-K will drop from \$1,000 to \$600 next year in Illinois, where, until last year, the threshold was \$20,000, same as with the IRS. The bite can depend on the situation.

Gig workers in Illinois who once flew, or drove, below the tax collector's radar also are

The doctor will see you now – wherever you are

SIU School of Medicine sends health teams to underserved communities

If you won't go to the doctor, the doctor may end up coming to you.

Southern Illinois University's School of Medicine is targeting underserved communities by bringing health screening teams to churches as well as community organizations that primarily serve Black and other minority communities.

"We're trying to establish a partnership. And most importantly, we're trying to establish trust with people because it goes way back in history," said Taiwo Akinsoji, MD, program coordinator of culturally responsive health initiatives at SIU Medicine.

The Health DEPOTS program aims to create a safe space for individuals to take charge of their health through improved health literacy and advocacy.

The project is a collaboration between SIU School of Medicine and faith-based and community organizations such as the Springfield Urban League and local NAACP chapter.

"Increasing access to health care in underserved areas is one of many ways that we address health inequities," said Marcus Johnson, president and CEO of the Springfield Urban League. "COVID-19 has increased existing gaps in care. This partnership and community health care outreach strategy is designed to build a bridge that reduces it."

Medical students accompanied by a physician visit various sites in the community and screen for high blood pressure, diabetes and other health conditions. They also educate about nutrition, fitness and other healthy lifestyle choices.

Rev. Roy Newman, pastor of Fresh Visions Community Church, said the program has been well received by his congregation. He said for a variety of reasons, some members of his congregation are reluctant to go to a physician's office.

"Some are afraid to go to a doctor's office or see doctors for some reason. But they are willing to come to the church and get these screenings. I think it is important to meet people where they are comfortable and willing to come," he said.

"SIU School of Medicine has committed to being an antiracist institution, and we consider our partnerships with the community to be fundamental," said Wendi Wills El-Amin, MD, associate dean of equity, diversity and inclusion at SIU. "The new Health DEPOTS program allows us to build a greater level of trust and

create more spaces for health education.

"We want people to find us in the places they normally frequent and be able to get screened or monitored for hypertension, diabetes and obesity," she said.

The medical school is providing equipment for the Health DEPOTS and training health ambassadors to properly use the equipment. The program launched in February and is currently partnering with 10 churches and two community organizations.

Akinsoji said they hope to reach out to Springfield's Muslim community as well.

"We don't want to create a perception that we are only working with Christian groups," she said.

She added, "With increasing racial and ethnic diversity in our nation, it is important to use a culturally oriented approach to address the health needs of the community."

Physicians and medical students enjoy having more time to work with patients than they may in a clinical setting.

"We are having time to really sit down and talk with them and explain, we bring out anatomy models," El-Amin said. "And it was really interesting. We took out all the parts and it was the first time that people really are able to see what we had been talking about. It's kind of

rare to be playing with human body models and see where the liver is. . . . People have symptoms, and now have a different picture in their mind to better understand."

She added they are taking advantage of people with various skills in the congregations to monitor patients after the initial screenings. Nurses and other medical personnel, who may be a part of a particular church, will continue to monitor blood pressures and blood sugar levels within their group.

El-Amin said that often during hurried physician visits, patients are sometimes bewildered. The Health DEPOTS hopefully will allow for more complete explanations and better training on the significance of tests.

"I just think that health care is complicated," she said. "And what worries me is that people who have been given a diagnosis and treatment plans, when they get home they're like, 'I don't even know how to use this equipment. I don't even know how to do my finger stick. I don't understand what these numbers mean.' This is really an opportunity for us to build that psychological safety. That's important for people to be able to relax and to ask questions." □

These pear trees are pretty but problematic

Spring has sprung in Springfield. Redbud, dogwood, magnolia and other flowering trees are, or soon will be, in bloom. One flowering tree dominates the streetscape along many major streets and downtown. Although their prolific white blooms may appear pretty, ornamental pear trees have become a huge problem. They have been overplanted, spread easily and can overtake acres of land.

The Bradford pear tree is a thornless cultivar of the Callery pear, which is native to Asia and first introduced to the U.S. in the 1950s. Bradford pears became popular ornamental trees. As they grew, the trees suffered damage during windstorms due to their weak structure, and other pear cultivars were introduced. Although sterile, the Bradford pear can cross-pollinate with other pear cultivars, and seeds are transported widely by birds. Over time this has resulted in a proliferation of invasive pear trees with thorns several inches long that disrupt growth of other plants and insects. They provide no species diversity and also create problems for power companies. Some say the flowers smell like dead fish.

City arborist Jeffrey Reim says the city of Springfield considers the Callery pear invasive/undesirable and no longer plants it. According to a recent tree inventory of just the city's northeast quadrant, there are 183 pear trees on city property. Most local nurseries stopped selling them. Some states have banned them. Reim recommends redbud, serviceberry, American plum and flowering dogwood as alternatives.

This is just one example of an imported species having unintended consequences. Dems attack Irvin's past as a criminal defense attorney

As you probably already know, the Democratic Governors Association recently launched a TV ad blasting Republican gubernatorial candidate Richard Irvin for claiming to be a crimefighter while having defended dangerous criminals as a defense attorney.

"Richard Irvin's real record on crime?" the DGA ad begins. "For 15 years, Irvin has been a defense lawyer, profiting by defending some of the most violent and heinous criminals. Domestic abusers and sexual assaults. Kidnapper who molested a child. Reckless homicide. Even accused child pornographers. Irvin has been getting rich by putting violent criminals back on our streets. Tell Richard Irvin to stop pretending to be tough on crime and start supporting policies to keep people safe."

"For months, I've told voters that Pritzker was desperate and would do anything to win," Irvin said in response. "Now, Pritzker is trying to hijack the Republican primary because he can't run from the facts: crime is out of control, tax hikes continue, and corruption lives on in state government under Pritzker's reign." Irvin released a TV ad with much the same message the following day.

Irvin has hyped the crime problem during his campaign, blaming the governor for the deteriorating situation. Crime is being used by the GOP throughout the country as a cudgel against Democrats and the issue is no doubt helping Irvin's poll numbers as his funding from the state's wealthiest resident Ken Griffin has paid for endless TV and online ads, as well as direct mail. So, the idea of the DGA ad is to undermine Irvin's credibility with Republican voters and prevent him from winning the primary.

The Republicans pointed out a few ironies, or hypocrisies, in the ad. For instance, DGA Chair Roy Cooper was himself a criminal defense attorney. Gov. Pritzker, a lawyer, donated \$100 million to Northwestern University's law school in 2015. And Lieutenant Gov. Juliana Stratton attended Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson's first confirmation hearing for the US Supreme Court. Jackson is a former criminal defense attorney.

Unlike Irvin, however, none of those Democrats have positioned themselves as crime-fighting super-heroes.

This is all happening as the spring legislative session winds down and one item at the top of the majority Democratic Party's agenda is public safety. The party is dealing with sharp internal divisions over how to deal with the topic. This ad campaign, paid for with Democratic money,

will only reinforce the GOP's "get tough on crime" message. Not great timing.

If past is prologue, the next TV ad from the DGA will come close to a statement released last week by Gov. JB Pritzker's campaign after far-right Republican gubernatorial candidate Sen. Darren Bailey publicized a gun raffle fundraiser.

"This is just another example of how out of touch and extreme Darren Bailey's conservative views are," the Pritzker campaign claimed.

Now, roll back the clock to the 2018 Republican primary. The DGA weighed in with two TV ads, one attacking Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner, and another claiming that Rauner's GOP primary opponent Jeanne Ives was "too conservative for Illinois." The Ives-related ad went on to point out that she wanted to ban abortion, had an "A" rating from the NRA and that she marched in "lockstep with President Trump, trying to eliminate protections for undocumented immigrants."


Pritzker preferred to run against the more beatable Ives, so the DGA helped boost her bona fides. The same will likely happen this year for Bailey.

The big difference between now and then

is that the DGA didn't start running its TV ads until five days before the 2018 primary. We're now almost three full months before our June 28 primary. That suggests a far more aggressive and expensive and lengthy campaign against Irvin and, likely, for Bailey (and any other avenues the DGA wants to pursue) than we saw four years ago.

If Irvin makes it out of this primary, he will have the best chance of anyone at giving Pritzker a real run for his money. Irvin can tap limitless funds from billionaire Ken Griffin, he'll have history on his side as potentially the state's first Black governor and he has a very strong and experienced team.

Bailey so far hasn't raised the money or demonstrated that he's put together the infrastructure necessary to take on the spectacularly well-funded and staffed-up Irvin. I don't like this meddling stuff, either, but if the Democrats leave Bailey to his own devices while Irvin dumps millions into advertising and opposition research and state party leaders continue to climb on board his bandwagon, Bailey probably won't make it. □



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Guilty by association

Defending the accused shouldn't be a mark of shame.

But in the world of politics, there may not be a more loathsome creature than a criminal defense attorney.

I've been thinking about that these past few weeks as I watched Republican senators attack U.S. Supreme Court nominee Ketanji Brown Jackson and Democrats assail Illinois GOP gubernatorial hopeful Richard Irvin.

Their transgressions? At some point in their careers, they defended people accused of crimes. Never mind that our Constitution gives defendants an absolute right to legal counsel.

In our monochromatic world of soundbite politics, prosecutors are good and defense attorneys are bad.

The last person to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court with any experience as a defense attorney was Thurgood Marshall, who retired from the bench 31 years ago. And his work as a defense attorney ended in the 1950s.

That's a long time to go without anyone bringing the perspective of a defense attorney into deliberations.

According to a study by the libertarian think tank Cato Institute, defense attorneys are underrepresented among federal judges. As of April 2021, 318 former prosecutors were sitting as federal judges, more than one-third of the 880 total across

the country. This was followed by 243 lawyers who had represented the government as "noncriminal courtroom advocates." Among the smallest fractions of those who became federal judges were former criminal defense attorneys – about 76 total – and former public defenders, who numbered only 58, less than 7% of all judges.

Considering law is a diverse field encompassing nearly every aspect of the human condition, it is disappointing that we draw our justices from such a shallow pool.

The Democratic Governor's Association launched a television ad against Irvin citing his past as a defense attorney.

In a breathless voice, a narrator says Irvin defended people accused of domestic abuse and sexual assault, as if they have unearthed some hidden character flaw. Well, lawyers defend people. Sometimes they are innocent and sometimes they are guilty – but all have a right to effective counsel.

The attack is particularly disappointing considering that Gov. JB Pritzker is a lawyer himself. He ought to know how important the role of defense attorneys is in our society. The same could be said of the multitude of Republican lawyers on the U.S. Senate Judiciary committee taking jabs at Ketanji Brown Jackson.

A couple decades ago, I covered an Illinois Supreme Court race in which one candidate boasted

that he had never been a defense attorney.

I found it disappointing that this Harvard-educated lawyer embraced the idea of never having defended anyone as a mark of pride, something that would make him a better Supreme Court justice.

After all, when choosing a judge, don't we want someone with diverse experiences in a variety of areas of law?

I've spent years tracking police misconduct cases. And in my podcast *Suspect Convictions* I took an in-depth look at numerous cases of wrongful convictions. Although it is nothing new, it remains a national shame. Our country sends innocent people to prison.

Just consider that a 2019 report by the National Registry of Exonerations found between 2% and 10% of convicted individuals in U.S. prisons are likely innocent. Plus, 2,666 people have been exonerated in the U.S. since 1989.

People later proven innocent have served more than 23,950 years in prison so far. Out of every 100 people sentenced to death, four are likely innocent, but only two get exonerated.

Protecting the innocent should be the highest calling of those serving in the legal profession. I've met many bright, talented and committed defense attorneys. But I've also met some who have turned their presence as a safety net for the wrongly accused into a hammock of low expectations.

Many of those wrongly accused end up wrongly convicted because of less than zealous work by their attorneys. This underscores the critical need for a vigorous defense bar. We should be praising those who choose this important work – not casting aspersions on their character and fitness for office because they chose to serve defendants.

One of the most zealous advocates for the accused that I have met is John Hanlon, who recently retired as director of the Illinois Innocence Project. Hanlon expressed disgust for the recent political attacks against members of the defense bar.

"It's politics. That's what's going on, pure politics," he said. "It is repeated over and over again depending on what the cycle is and what office the person is seeking. They try to dirty them up with the alleged acts of their clients. And that's just a shame."

Former Scott County, Iowa, prosecutor Bill Davis said it smacks of hypocrisy.

"The people who attack defense attorneys are the same ones who extol the Founding Fathers. Have they forgotten that John Adams represented the British soldiers involved in the Boston Massacre? Our founders made a right to counsel a basic constitutional right. The system would not work without defense attorneys." □

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

A network without a net

Springfield Clinic physician tests the limits of Blue Cross and Blue Shield provider list

Yesterday, I was provided the opportunity to testify before the Illinois House of Representatives State Government Administration Committee on the impact of Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois' termination of Springfield Clinic as an in-network provider for thousands of individuals and families throughout central Illinois. These are some of the patient stories I was able to share.

As an obstetrician-gynecologist who has been in practice for 19 years at the Springfield Clinic, I have a very special relationship with my patients. I am with my patients through the most joyous times in their lives when I deliver their babies. But I am also there during the most devastating times, when they come in for a perfectly routine obstetrical visit and there isn't a heartbeat, or I have to tell my patients they have breast cancer.

I have been caring for women throughout the region for generations—I take care of my patients' mothers and grandmothers. I have delivered all of their children and their nieces and nephews. Yet, today, the relationship with my patients has been severed because Blue Cross and Blue Shield terminated our relationship as an in-network provider.

My patients deserve better.

One of my patients was hemorrhaging, and needed a hysterectomy. It would have been unreasonable for her to wait months to get an appointment with an in-network doctor, so I attempted to help her find a physician. I went to Blue Cross and Blue

Shield of Illinois' provider directory and, to my dismay, I saw a name that I was very familiar with; it was the name of the person who trained me in residency. He retired from obstetrics and gynecology 21 years ago, yet he was still listed as a provider taking new patients.


I went further down the list and saw names of physicians who do not provide obstetrical care. Many of them provide limited gynecological services, like STD testing and contraception, but they cannot care for my hemorrhaging patient. I continued through the provider directory and saw a group of names that I was unfamiliar with. I looked at the address and realized the address was not a physician's office. These doctors don't exist.

Can you imagine the frustration a patient must feel when their health plan, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois, tells them that there are thousands of providers available, but when they call an office, they're told that it will be several months before they can be seen? Or they call an office that does not provide the services that they need? Even worse, they call an office that doesn't even exist?

Can you imagine that for yourself? For your wife? Your mother? For your daughter?

My patients and the women in central Illinois need and deserve so much more. □

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A rocky recovery

Addiction, overdoses have climbed since the start of the pandemic

People are showing up at Gateway Foundation sicker than ever from drug and alcohol addiction because of various factors at play in the third year of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Many people with substance-use disorder who walk through the doors of Gateway's Springfield Treatment Center begin to shut down physically and lose consciousness. That's according to Kerry Henry, who has overseen Gateway's Springfield site for more than 20 years and is senior executive director of the nonprofit's Central and Southern Illinois Community Division.

To be revived, some have needed multiple doses of Narcan, which can counteract an overdose of opioids. Some needed to be brought by ambulance to a local hospital and stabilized before they could be considered for residential drug treatment at Gateway, 2200 Lake Victoria Drive.

"Medically and psychiatrically, they're very sick – the worst I've ever seen, and I've been here 28 years," she said.

Because some clients have delayed seeking care out of fears of contracting COVID-19, those now traveling to Gateway sites in Springfield, Jacksonville, elsewhere downstate and in the Chicago area are displaying more advanced symptoms of substance-use disorder, including higher blood-alcohol levels. Some are almost unresponsive minutes after they arrive.

Gateway officials said phone calls from clients inquiring about treatment dropped about 25% for most of the past two years. But over the past two months, requests for services have been near pre-COVID levels.

The pandemic has created unusual and varied challenges for substance users and organizations

trying to help them.

Springfield and the rest of the country are experiencing a lull in new COVID-19 cases. But those who treat substance-use disorder and deal with its results say the pandemic's social isolation and other effects have led to more drug and alcohol abuse, and eventually, more demand for treatment services.

Fentanyl fuels more overdoses

The pandemic also has fueled the flow of fentanyl into the illicit drug supply locally, law enforcement officials and treatment professionals say. Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that's cheaper and up to 50 times stronger than heroin.

The drug is cited as the main reason for an upswing in fatal overdoses in Illinois and Sangamon County even as Narcan is increasingly available to

both addicts and emergency responders.

"The common denominator is fentanyl," Sangamon County Coroner Jim Allmon said. "Fentanyl is in everything."

Some observers have said shipments of fentanyl from other countries have been easier to smuggle into the United States during the pandemic than heroin. Suppliers have used fentanyl to supplant other drugs they sell, while users sometimes prefer fentanyl, despite the risks.

There were 60 accidental, fatal drug overdoses in Sangamon County in 2021 – seven more than the 53 in 2020 and 57% more than the 38 overdoses in 2019, before the pandemic began, Allmon said.

Eighty percent of overdoses in the past two years involved fentanyl, often mixed in with heroin, methamphetamine or cocaine, he said.

The people who died appeared to be unaware

of the fentanyl, and "they did not intend to die," Allmon said. "No one knows what is in these illicit substances."

The number of ongoing death investigations by the coroner's office indicates that the trend of increased overdose hasn't abated in 2022, he said.

RoseAmber Hutchens became one of those statistics.

Her mother, Springfield resident Barbara Hutchens, 56, said her 34-year-old daughter, a single mother of two, died Feb. 4 of an overdose in a Springfield apartment that was a "known party spot."

RoseAmber, who previously worked at a currency exchange, was unemployed and using drugs full time when she died, her mother said, adding that her daughter stole to feed her habit. RoseAmber's two children weren't living with her at the time.

She had been injecting heroin and using methamphetamines since she was a teenager, Hutchens said.

During her teen years, RoseAmber also spent time in treatment facilities in Champaign and the state of Ohio, graduated from Lincoln's Challenge Academy in Rantoul and was a member of Narcotics Anonymous, her mother said. RoseAmber later attended Alcoholics Anonymous meetings in Springfield.

Toxicology results after RoseAmber's death revealed meth and fentanyl in her system, and there was evidence the drugs had been injected, Hutchens said.

Other people in the apartment had been using drugs, but there was no Narcan available, she said. "I don't know if addicts realize they can get that for free," she said.

Hutchens doubted that her daughter intended to use fentanyl.

"She probably thought she was getting heroin and meth," Hutchens said. "They are lacing everything with fentanyl now."

She said she wants the public to "pay attention" to substance use in Springfield's neighborhoods and inform police when they observe suspected "dope houses."

"People in the community need to know what's going on under their noses," Hutchens said. "Our loved ones are dying."

Overdose deaths a 'public health crisis' statewide

The Illinois Department of Human Services told *Illinois Times* in an email that opioid use, overdoses and related deaths "continue to be a public health crisis in Illinois."

There were 2,944 fatal overdoses in Illinois in 2020, or almost one-third more than the 2,219 in 2019, almost mirroring a nationwide trend, according to DHS official David T. Jones. Jones recently was named chief behavioral health officer for the state by Gov. JB Pritzker and previously was director of the division of substance abuse prevention and recovery at DHS.

There were 2,774 fatal overdoses statewide in 2021, based on provisional data. That total was 6% less than the 2,944 in 2020 but 25% more than the 2,219 in 2019. Even more people would have died without previous efforts to expand the use of Narcan, Jones said.

Data for the first three months of 2022 aren't available yet, but he said some of the factors contributing to the rise in 2020, including fentanyl, are "still very much at play."

The emotional trauma caused by the pandemic has led to an increase in a need for drug treatment and for overall mental-health services across Illinois, and that trend "is going to be around for a while, probably five to 10 years," Jones said.

The Pritzker administration recently updated what used to be called the state's Opioid Action Plan, renaming it the Overdose Action Plan to reflect the increasing use of multiple substances.

"Polysubstance use increases overdose risks, and the combined use of opioids and stimulants is particularly deadly," the plan document says.

Medication-assisted treatment recommended

The plan says the pandemic and its "associated stresses" — which include social isolation, job loss,

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the disruption of in-person treatment and recovery support services – “also play a role in increased overdose deaths.”

“To save lives, we need to reach out to and engage individuals who are at risk for both fatal and non-fatal overdose due to multiple drugs: synthetic opioids, heroin, cocaine, methamphetamine and other substances,” the plan says.

It stresses increased coordination of services, expansion of medication-assisted treatment and “harm-reduction” strategies such as making free Narcan widely available to the general public. Sites in Springfield where free Narcan is available include the Sangamon County Department of Public Health, 2833 South Grand Ave. E.; Phoenix Center, 109 E. Lawrence Ave.; and Mini O’Beirne Crisis Nursery, 1011 N. Seventh St.

The plan also targets racial and social disparities in the overdose crisis, noting that Illinois opioid overdose deaths in 2018 decreased 6.5% among non-Hispanic white residents but increased 9.1% among non-Hispanic Black residents. In 2020, non-Hispanic Black residents were more than twice as likely to die from drug overdoses than non-Hispanic whites, according to the plan.

The disparities are related to less access to treatment and support services, as well as other stresses related to disproportionately higher levels of poverty among Black people, Jones said.

Pritzker said at a March 21 news conference in

Chicago that the plan “is about deploying behavioral health assistance to support any Illinoian who is fighting opioid addiction.”

“Here’s the truth: Everybody knows somebody who is struggling – everybody – and our systems need to reflect that, because pain left in the shadows hurts

patients by referring them to other Gateway sites when the Springfield location is full, according to Karen Harrold, a Gateway program director.

The Springfield site opened a 16-bed medically monitored detoxification unit in 2020 to “better assist those clients needing medication management

Henry added: “It’s been a traumatic episode with no end with the pandemic. They’re unsure of when it’s going to stop. It’s precipitated them feeling very isolated and lonely.”

Having Narcan available in nasal and injectable form has saved lives in the community, she said, but she wasn’t surprised at the increase in overdoses.

Because fentanyl is so strong, she said, “you have to use multiple doses of Narcan to revive somebody. Two cartridges won’t be enough – usually four to six, and sometimes more.”

When serving more patients with advanced substance-use disorder, adequate reimbursement has been a problem, Henry said. Medicaid, which covers about 60% of patients, and private insurance, which covers the remaining 40%, typically will pay for inpatient stays of 28 to 30 days.


“That’s the hard part, because some of these people really need longer,” Henry said, noting that patients who don’t receive adequate treatment are at higher risk of relapse.

Another drug treatment center, Family Guidance Centers, has used telehealth services – by phone and video – as one way to provide services quicker during the pandemic in Springfield and at other locations, Chief Operating Officer Ron Vlasaty Jr. said.

Family Guidance Centers is a nonprofit organization based in the Chicago suburb of Glenview that operates a 60-bed treatment facility at 120 N. 11th St. in Springfield.

us all,” the Democratic governor said. “So if you’re struggling, know that your fight is my fight, and the government of the state of Illinois is here to assist you.”

Springfield groups try new approaches to save lives

In Springfield, Gateway Foundation, which operates a 108-bed residential facility for adults and also offers outpatient services, has worked to improve access for

to address withdrawal symptoms before beginning traditional residential treatment,” senior executive director Henry said.

In addition to the trauma that many Gateway patients have experienced in the form of childhood abuse and post-traumatic stress disorder during their lives, those seeking services often have been separated from their families and other support systems during the pandemic, Harrold said.

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As part of a “cultural shift” to improve access to services, the organization worked with Memorial Health during the pandemic to station counselors in the emergency departments of Memorial’s hospitals in Springfield, Decatur, Jacksonville, Taylorville and Lincoln to assist patients with substance-use disorder, he said.

The staff in Springfield has noticed clients’ alcohol use increase during the pandemic because of social isolation, Vlasaty said.

Despite the innovations begun during the pandemic, FGC, like many behavioral health providers, has experienced challenges in hiring enough staff members, especially people with “lived experience” with substance use, to meet the demand, he said.

Memorial Behavioral Health, an affiliate of Memorial Health, has experienced an increase in clients struggling with substance use, said Amber Olson, regional director of clinical operations. Some clients have substance-use disorder in addition to other mental-health issues, she said. During the pandemic, Memorial Behavioral Health, 710 N. Eighth St., launched the Living Room, an emergency room alternative for adults experiencing psychiatric emergencies. The free, walk-in service uses peer counselors for crisis intervention and help connecting with community resources.

As part of its harm-reduction program, Phoenix Center, 109 E. Lawrence Ave., began offering free fentanyl test strips in spring 2020 and continues to offer them with financial support from the Sangamon County Department of Public Health, center Assistant Director Sara Bowen-Lasisi said.

The test strips, along with free Narcan, clean needles, syringes and other materials, have been popular with users, she said, noting the number of people served by the harm-reduction program doubled during the pandemic and now stands at more than 700 per year.

The materials, which people can receive without identifying themselves, can be obtained by walking into Phoenix Center during business hours or ordering them for delivery by mail or in-person. The nonprofit group serves a 15-county central Illinois region.

“It’s entirely a public health program” that can prevent overdoses and the transmission of hepatitis and HIV (human immunodeficiency virus), Bowen-Lasisi said.

COVID-19 pandemic affects Gateway patients’ journeys

Tommy McNichols said his alcohol abuse got worse during the pandemic. The 31-year-old office worker for a state agency said he had been an “isolated alcoholic” for eight years, drinking one to 1½ pints of “cheap vodka” most days after work, often to the point of blackout.

McNichols, 31, of Springfield, said he believes he drank more during the pandemic because he thought his coworkers wouldn’t notice his hangover breath and his appearance through the mask he wore at work.

“They figured it out anyway,” he said.

The lack of options for social activities outside his apartment also contributed to isolation that made McNichols, who is single, more comfortable with drinking to excess, he said.

Passing out at his desk and embarrassing himself in front of a coworker were among incidents that led him to check himself into Gateway’s detox unit, he said. He has spent more than a month in the residential program.

The drug of choice for Christopher Hayes, another Gateway resident, was methamphetamine. The 32-year-old Atwood resident, a former fertilizer company worker, said he got addicted to meth several years ago and was clean for two years but relapsed during the pandemic.

More people staying at home in the early months of the pandemic, and the additional money available to people through economic stimulus checks from the government, resulted in more meth readily available in Atwood, a village about 69 miles east of Springfield, he said.

Hayes said he didn’t enjoy smoking and injecting meth most of the time. He would use meth to ease symptoms of withdrawal that included intense irritability, he said.

He believes the meth he used sometimes was laced with fentanyl, but he never overdosed.

Hayes said he has been at Gateway about three weeks and credited Gateway for giving him hope for beating his addiction so he can get back to his wife, 18-month-old son and 12-year-old step-daughter.

“It’s been a whole different world since I’ve been here,” he said. “It’s crazy amazing. I did not know who I really was.”

A recovering heroin addict who asked to be identified as Tyler said his inability to find a job at the beginning of the pandemic in spring 2020, and the related stress of being homeless and living on the streets of Springfield, distracted him from addressing his addiction.

Tyler, 32, who said he grew up in a small town south of Champaign, is going through his third stay at Gateway since the pandemic began after previously completing a 30-day rehab program in another state.

He said his use of heroin began after he received opioid prescription drugs to deal with the pain of cracked bones when he fell off a skateboard in his early 20s. A few years later, he was cut off from legal prescriptions and turned to heroin for a cheaper but similar high.

That high soon led to addiction. At that point, he said, he used heroin not to get high but to avoid the severe flu-like symptoms associated with withdrawal.

“I was using to function,” he said. “It was completely terrifying. It controlled my life.”

Tyler said he has been at Gateway about two weeks and is benefiting from the prescription medicine Suboxone, which reduces withdrawal symptoms and

helps him cope with cravings.

He said he is in treatment while on leave from his job at a local department store and plans to return to the job.

Before this latest stay, “I was pretty much dopesick for a year,” he said. “I was sick and tired of being sick and tired.”

Tyler said he is more confident than ever his recovery will continue.

“This stay is the best experience of my life so far,” he said. “This is it for me. They’re not going to see me back here.”

“Addicts are not bad people. We are broken people.” □

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Baseball is back

Some spring training reading

After a winter of discontent during which Major League Baseball owners locked out the players and essentially shut down the off-season activity that baseball fans know as the "hot stove" league, major league baseball has returned with a hard-charging one month spring training and a season that opens April 7.

Here in Springfield the off-season was anything but silent. Earlier this year Springfield welcomed a new team to our city, the Springfield Lucky Horseshoes. The Prospect League, a wooden-bat summer league of college players from across the country, approved the transfer of the former Springfield Sliders to a new ownership group that has vigorously promoted the new franchise. Later this year the Lucky Horseshoes will begin a 60-game season with home games at Robin Roberts Stadium.

If words can make hopes come true, this summer promises to be one of entertainment for Springfield's baseball fans. The Horseshoes are modeled after a minor league franchise known as the Savannah Bananas, a team that began playing in 2016 and sells out every game. Matching that feat in Springfield, or even coming close, would be quite an accomplishment.

The seasons of Jackie Robinson

The opening of the baseball season generally coincides with the publication of baseball-themed history and biography. Baseball fans of all ages love recalling the history of the game and the players of their younger days. This season marks the 75th anniversary of the event that forever changed baseball, the rookie season of Jackie Robinson. On April 15, 1947, Robinson played his first game with the Brooklyn Dodgers. Each year, the event is marked by every player in uniform wearing Robinson's number 42 as their uniform number. Jackie Robinson's accomplishments on the baseball field as a civil rights leader and hero are unmatched. He may be the most important figure in American sports.

While Robinson's life has been chronicled in biographies and dramatic presentations, Kostya Kennedy, a sports journalist and author has added to the Robinson library with *True: The Four Seasons of Jackie Robinson* (St. Martin's Press, April 2022). The biography

focuses on four transformative years in Robinson's life: 1946, his first season in the minor leagues; 1949, the year Robinson was voted Most Valuable Player; 1956, his final season as a player and 1972, the year of Robinson's death.



It is a remarkable story of a remarkable man. Robinson understood his place in the struggle for equal rights and fair treatment for all. He accepted the responsibility of silence in the face of racism and hate. In selecting Jackie Robinson to break the color barrier in Major League Baseball, Branch Rickey knew he needed far more than a baseball player. He needed a man who would represent a race proudly. Jackie Robinson was that man.

Kennedy recreates the important years of Robinson's career through interviews with fans, fellow players and family. Witnessing Robinson's impact on baseball is a valuable perspective. His influence did not end when he retired from the game, it intensified. Throughout this limited biography, Kennedy tells a life story in prose that qualifies as inspiring literature. No matter how much you have read or know about Jackie Robinson, *True* is a book to add to your collection.

Baseball's Golden Age

Whispers of the Gods: Tales From Baseball's Golden Age, Told by the Men Who Played It, by Peter Golenbock (Roman & Littlefield, March 2022), piece to *True*. Seventeen different baseball players, from the post-World War II era to the 1960s, describe their careers and lives in baseball. Most include details of how they got into the game in an era where players were not measured and scouted as they are in modern baseball.

Many of the players interviewed for Golenbock's history are of special interest to those of us in Springfield because they spent part or all of their careers with the St. Louis Cardinals, Chicago Cubs or Chicago White Sox. There are enjoyable interviews with Jim Bouton and Jim Brosnan, two pitchers whose baseball accomplishments were not spectacular but who both wrote baseball diaries of their major league seasons that became iconic baseball literature. Brosnan's *The Long Season* and Bouton's *Ball Four* were ahead of their time, exposing the sordid part of the baseball life. Skeptics scoffed, but



years later both Brosnan and Bouton were vindicated.

Interviews with Cardinal greats Stan Musial and Marty Marion are fascinating at several levels. Any baseball fan knows that Stan Musial was not only a great player, he was an outstanding person. He made St. Louis his home, he wore only the Cardinal uniform during his career and he was one of baseball's all-time greats. In his interview he is the same person recounting his love for the game and how grateful and blessed he was to play. While Marty Marion, a great Cardinal shortstop, was also a Cardinal hero, there are portions of his interviews that invoke some selective memory. Many of the players from the Jackie Robinson era, when interviewed about Robinson's first year with Brooklyn, seem unwilling to acknowledge that Robinson was far more than a player breaking the color barrier. They would like to believe, and perhaps they truly do believe, that Robinson was treated no differently than any other rookie. But history teaches us a far different lesson.

More than any other sport, baseball lends itself to history and literature. The great sports writers live on in the re-creation of their work and the books they have produced. As this season opens, it might be a good time to read one or two to remind of what impact the greatest game had on your life. □

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Matzo for Passover

The unleavened “bread of freedom”

Signs of spring are everywhere. In addition to spring flowers and chocolate, large displays of matzo have appeared in grocery stores just in time for the Passover holiday, which begins April 15 at sundown. Passover commemorates the Israelites' exodus from slavery and lasts for eight days in the diaspora. The Seder meal is a culinary retelling of that sudden flight and marks the beginning of the eight-day Passover holiday. Matzo is an intrinsic part of that deeply symbolic 15-part feast. Eating the crispy flatbread serves as a reminder that the Israelites' flight was so hasty that there wasn't even time for bread to rise.

I was mostly familiar with matzo in soup form, where the matzo is ground into meal before being delicately mixed with eggs and other ingredients to form a delicate yet hearty dumpling, served in richly flavored chicken broth. I had spoken with chef David Radwine several years back about his mother Leila's recipe for Matzo Ball soup (see “For Passover, taste a culture” <https://www.illinoistimes.com/springfield/for-passover-taste-a-culture/Content?oid=11442276>). When I talked with him again recently I asked if his mother had any other ways she used matzo in the kitchen when he was growing up.

“I can remember Mom making matzo brei when we were younger...basically scrambled eggs with matzo,” he explained. “She used schmaltz – rendered chicken fat. It’s not something that everyone has around these days, but back in the day you didn’t throw anything away. So we used every part of the animal, the bones, the skin and the fat too. Mom would crumble it up in a colander and run some water over it, just to soften it up a little bit. She’d beat up the eggs with a little salt and pepper and mix in the crumbled matzo and then fry it in the schmaltz. There’s a softness to it, but there can be a crisp edge to it as well. Everyone makes it a little different.”

The following morning was bright with spring sunshine cold and breezy, and I came in from walking the dog wind-whipped and hungry. The box of matzo I’d picked up the day before was sitting on the counter and my stomach growled at the idea of a plate of warm, carb-laced eggs. I opened the box and removed a sheet of matzo – basically a large square cracker that’s been perforated to keep it from puffing up. It has a flavor similar to a

water cracker.

I rinsed the crumbled cracker under the tap just as Radwine said his mother used to do, and I was amazed at the intense, toasty aroma that filled the kitchen. Next came the unmistakable savory aroma of onion-laced schmaltz. (It should surprise no one who knows me that I have a jar of reserved chicken fat in the freezer. It is culinary gold. You can also buy rendered duck fat at Robert's Seafood Market in Springfield.) It all came together just like any other plate of eggs, but the chewy-soft texture of the matzo, layered with the savory schmaltz and fresh spring chives, was a supremely comforting and delicious breakfast.

Matzo can also be used to crumb chicken

or fish, or used as a crumb crust for a pie or quiche. Their large size makes them an ideal base for quick individual pizzas, a new favorite amongst my kids. Another delicious preparation is this recipe for matzo toffee, adapted from a recipe that originally used saltines.

Matzo toffee

4 sheets matzo
1 cup of unsalted butter
1 ½ cups dark brown sugar
1 tablespoon vanilla
1/8 teaspoon salt
8 ounces chocolate chips (a mixture of light and dark works well)
Toppings such as dried fruit, nuts or toasted

coconut, optional
Preheat the oven to 325 degrees. Line a rimmed baking sheet with foil, taking care to cover all the edges, then line the bottom of the pan with parchment. Arrange the matzo on the baking sheet, breaking it as needed to fit it on the tray.

Bring the butter and sugar to a boil in a heavy-bottomed saucepan over medium heat. Cook until smooth, about two minutes. Add vanilla and salt then quickly pour over the matzo and transfer to the preheated oven. Bake until bubbly, about 15-20 minutes. Remove from the oven and sprinkle the chocolate chips over the top. Once melted, use a spatula to smooth the top and sprinkle with toppings as desired. □

During that time, he toured with the likes of George Jones, Garth Brooks, Hank Williams Jr. and Brooks & Dunn, but never broke through with any major hits of his own. He did co-write several zingers for others, including Tracy Byrd's "I'm from the Country" and Brooks & Dunn's "It Ain't Me, If It Ain't You" that established Marty as a verified professional Nashville songwriter. Then in 2013, for season eight of America's Got Talent, he reached the semi-final round doing a version of Bob Dylan's "Make You Feel My Love" which, after his audition tape went viral, led to a single release of his take on the Dylan classic. Always on the move, in 2019 Brown released *American Highway*, his first full album in some 25 years with the latest single "I'm a Country Boy" available on all digital platforms. In a lifetime achievement award, this coming October he will be inducted into the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame. Yessiree, that's quite a career that's still going strong, showing just how much can be done by one guy with a guitar playing music from the heart. Tickets and info are at www.backroomlounge.com where you can also see all the BRL's upcoming shows.

Joel Honey is up for the most gigging musician in town lately, and that's a good thing for all concerned. He does good songs well on guitar and vocals with the proof in the pudding being he's playing all the time. This week, I spy "Joel Honey Jams" at a couple different spots, including the Hickory River Smokehouse on Thursday and

on Friday at the Capitol City Brewing & Supply on South Sixth in Southern View as the city's latest brewery (I think that's right, unless one opened between writing this and publication!) presents its first music show. Joel also co-hosts regular open mics with Silas Tockey at Whiskey Jack's on Mondays and Boone's on Saturdays, along with one on his own this Thursday at Buzz Bomb. And he plays everywhere else all the time, so get out and say hey to Mr. Honey when you can.

In another new venue opening, the Broadgauge restaurant in Petersburg hosts acclaimed singer-songwriter Edward David Anderson in their upstairs ballroom on Saturday night. Anderson first hit with his American rock band Backyard Tire Fire, then went on to a solo career that established him as an esteemed performer in the Midwest and around the country with music in "regular rotation on radio stations across the globe for two decades." EDA calls his style of playing "black dirt music," as in "roots music, cultivated in the fertile soil of the Midwest." Catch his concert at the beautifully revived Broadgauge space in a listening room format.

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it Brutalist architecture is characterized by minimalist constructions that showcase bare building materials and structural elements over decorative design. The style emerged during the 1950s in the United Kingdom among the reconstruction projects of the post-war era. The Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon is a brutalist tower that stands 132 feet and is constructed of concrete, brick and steel. Thomas Rees provided a bequest to build the carillon and it was dedicated in 1962. With 67 bells, the carillon is one of the world's largest. More notably, however, the quality of the bells, forged in the Netherlands, coupled with the tower's location in Washington Park, distinguishes it as one of the world's finest instruments. On Sundays and Wednesdays, listen for the sound of the Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon as Springfield Park District's carillonneur, Carlo van Ulft, and assistant carillonneurs, play a wide variety of music from original carillon compositions to arrangements of classical, folk and popular music for the season.






