





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An “old-school” candidate in a new district

Nikki Budzinski seeks Democratic nomination in the 13th Congressional District

Pragmatic, bipartisan, driven.

Those words are used by both Republicans and Democrats to describe Nikki Budzinski, who is seeking the Democratic nomination for the 13th Congressional District.

But her friend U.S. Rep. Cheri Bustos, D-Moline, uses a different term: “old-school.”

The Springfield native said Budzinski has the best-run congressional campaign in the nation. Bustos added she calls her “old-school” because she carves a middle path for herself.

“She is a strong advocate for working people and unions but she also wants to see businesses do well. She’s willing to reach across the aisle and work with Republicans. To her, ‘compromise’ is not a bad word.”

Don Tracy, head of the Illinois Republican Party, isn’t so sanguine about Budzinski’s candidacy in the eel-shaped district that stretches from East St. Louis to Springfield to Decatur and ends in Champaign-Urbana.

“Well, it was designed for a carpetbagger, Nikki Budzinski, a labor organizer and activist who lives in D.C. You know, she obviously has some very powerful friends, like (Gov. JB) Pritzker and (U.S. Sen. Dick) Durbin,” Tracy said during an interview last fall. “Obviously, she got somebody to draw the district just for her, by just taking the pockets of Democrat voters in places like East St. Louis and in parts of Springfield and, of course, university towns like Champaign. They connected the dots and carved up central Illinois.”

Budzinski bristles at the notion that she is a “carpetbagger.” She notes that she grew up nearby in Peoria, attended University of Illinois in Champaign and worked for Pritzker’s administration in Springfield and Chicago. She said she now has a residence near Springfield’s Washington Park. Budzinski, 45, is single and lives with her French bulldog,

Lulu.

Former Gov. Jim Edgar, a Republican, who got to know Budzinski when she was an Edgar fellow, said she brings civility to the political process.

“She had experience with the unions, but she could work with the Republicans. You could tell she got along with the Republicans, made some good friends, and that paid off for her when she was in the governor’s office or wherever she would work with Republican legislators.”

Bustos said, “Nikki knows that

Republicans are not our enemies. They are our opponents when we run for office. But we govern together. You have to be able to work with them to get things done.”

While the 13th District was drawn by Democratic state lawmakers to favor a Democrat, Bustos anticipates it will be highly contested this year and that neither Budzinski or her eventual GOP opponent will be in want of campaign cash.

“I think this is the only district in downstate Illinois where a Democrat could win,” Edgar said. The former Republican governor was mum on who he will vote for.

“I live about a half a block into the new district. I vote on a secret ballot, so I won’t say how I will vote. But I will say I have voted for Democrats in the past,” he said.

Budzinski said she supports abortion rights and universal background checks for firearm purchases, but also believes she can find common ground with Republicans.

“I think we could pull Democrats and Republicans together to agree upon the fact that Medicare should be able to negotiate over

the cost of prescription drugs,” she said. “I think that we should be focusing on putting money back in the pockets of working people. And we can do that by lowering the cost of prescription drugs, by extending the child tax plan, something that helps to support working families with children at home who are struggling to make ends meet.”

Tim Drea, who heads the Illinois AFL-CIO, said he and his family have become close with Budzinski during her time in Springfield.

“She is very moderate, and politics is the art of the possible,” he said. “When she negotiated the minimum wage increase for Gov. Pritzker, she knew how to get it done. And it was the art of the possible. Those are always very difficult bills to negotiate. You compromise here and a little compromise there. But the prize is increasing the minimum wage for workers across the board.”

Budzinski has worked as the political director for the United Food and Commercial Workers. She also has served as a senior adviser to Pritzker and as chief of staff for President Joe Biden’s Office of Management and Budget.

She is widely considered the favorite to win the Democratic nomination. But David Palmer, a Champaign insurance broker, is also on the ballot. There are four GOP hopefuls seeking their party’s nod: Terry Martin, a Springfield journalist; Regan Deering, a Decatur community activist; Matt Hausman, a Champaign engineer; and Jessie Reising, a Decatur lawyer.

Former Gov. Edgar said of Budzinski, “She is someone who can get things done because she can work with people of different persuasions. And she knows how to say ‘no’ in a pleasant way that’s not going to get you too upset.”

Bustos said an example of this is when she was contemplating seeking the Democratic nomination for governor four years ago.

“Nikki called me and told me she was going to be working for JB Pritzker’s campaign. I told her how disappointed I was. But, you know, most people wouldn’t have made that call. They would have just let me find out some other way. That’s why I call her ‘old-school.’” □

Kin of deceased inmate sue

Lawsuit filed on one-year anniversary of death at Sangamon County Jail

Sangamon County Sheriff Jack Campbell and his underlings at the county jail, as well as the company that provides medical care to inmates under contract with the sheriff's office, are targets in a federal lawsuit filed April 28 on behalf of the estate of Jaimeson Cody, who died last year after an altercation with guards.

Plaintiff's attorneys allege that "grossly obese" guards, one weighing as much as 400 pounds, another nearly 300 pounds, put nearly 700 pounds of weight on Cody's back as he lay prone on the floor outside his cell.

The death a year ago was ruled a homicide by the county coroner's office after an autopsy, with a pathologist determining that Cody died from asphyxiation. Nearby inmates told Illinois State Police investigators that Cody said "I can't breathe" in the moments before jailers cuffed him, then noticed that he was turning blue. Prosecutors have filed no charges.

In addition to Campbell and five frontline jailers – guards Cody Grigsby, Kyle Meyer, Scott Meyer, Paul Garrett and Nicholas Ortega – defendants include nurse John B. Kling and his employer, Advanced Correctional Health. Attorneys for Cody's estate say that Kling got out of the way of jailers, then kept quiet and stood by, doing nothing to help Cody as he suffocated a few feet away. "The excessive/deadly force used on Jaimeson Cody...resulted from the jail's written and unwritten policies, which prevented medical staff from having any control or input over the use of force on pretrial detainees such as Jaimeson Cody," wrote plaintiff's attorneys Sharon D. Elvidge Kelley and Jon D. Robinson.

Citing the pending litigation, Campbell declined to comment.

Kelley and Robinson don't ask for a specific amount in the lawsuit. Prior jail litigation has proven expensive for county taxpayers, who eight years ago paid nearly \$5.3 million – half for the plaintiff and an equal amount for lawyers who defended the case – to settle a lawsuit filed by the widow of Paul Carlock, who died after a 2007 struggle with guards who sat on the prone inmate after shocking him with Tasers. It was the costliest case ever for the county. Kelley and Robinson also represented Carlock's widow.

Cody also was tased, as many as five times, before he died. The county destroyed video of the Carlock encounter, saying that destruction of records that should have been preserved was an innocent mistake. In the current case, a surveillance camera aimed at the area outside

Cody's cell, where the inmate struggled with guards, didn't activate.

Campbell defended jail staff in the Carlock case and also has backed jailers in Cody's death, telling the media in the aftermath that guards were faced "with a nearly impossible situation" and that they were trying to stop Cody from harming himself. The struggle began when guards attempted to get Cody out of his cell after finding that he had apparently cut himself. Arrested on suspicion of aggravated domestic battery and aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, Cody had been in jail less than 24 hours when he died.

"Our officers used the methods and techniques that they learned through their training," the sheriff wrote in a written statement issued after the death and before autopsy results were complete. Campbell has subsequently declined comment on the matter and could not be immediately reached.

Campbell in years past has told the press that he sometimes allowed deputies to tase him if they caught him not wearing a proper uniform. "We don't feel you can fire too much," Campbell told the *State Journal-Register* in 2010, shortly after Pat Burns died after deputies deployed Tasers 22 times while trying to arrest him after he broke into a home. "You use the Taser until the person complies with our order."

In the Cody lawsuit, plaintiff's attorneys write that the sheriff's statements about Tasers show a pattern of brutality.

"Defendant Campbell has developed and

allows a culture of excessive tasing and force by his public statement regarding tasing, and his public absolution of officers' conduct in the press before the actual facts are known, his failure to have/or implement training and jail regulations, and failure to (sic) any accountability of his correctional officers' use of excessive force, Campbell's words, actions and non-action gives tacit if not actual approval of the extreme/deadly force applied to Cody," lawyers write.

Cody, 39, left behind a daughter, a son, his father and mother and a stepmother.

In a written statement issued by plaintiff's attorneys, Dan and Cindy Cody, Jaimeson Cody's father and stepmother, said that they sued to get answers from the sheriff. They also said that no one has accepted responsibility or been held accountable for Cody's death.

"(W)e decided that waiting any longer was simply unacceptable," the Codys wrote. "We knew immediately that the only way to honor Jamie's memory and get answers we so desperately needed was to file this lawsuit today, on the anniversary of his death. ... And even if we never fully understand why he passed away so tragically, by raising our voices together we can at least help ensure that no other family has to suffer as we have over these past 12 months." □

Women for Women gives \$58,000 in grants

Five local organizations are receiving a total of \$58,000, thanks to the Women for Women giving circle at the Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln. Since 2008, Women for Women members have pooled their resources to build an endowment topping \$1 million and award more than \$488,000 in grants to organizations that improve the lives of women and children. The 2022 grant recipients are:

Educational Center for the Visually Impaired – \$8,000 to provide education, training and accessibility tool kits designed to help visually impaired women monitor and maintain health and wellness for themselves and their families.

Enos Park Neighborhood Improvement Association – \$20,000 for the Creative Reuse Marketplace located on Fourth Street in downtown Springfield. This innovative program is designed to foster creative reuse of materials that would have been thrown away, while also providing job training for low-income, unemployed and/or homeless women. This is the third grant for the Creative Reuse Marketplace.

Girl Scouts of Central Illinois – \$7,500 to provide at-risk adolescent/teen girls training in computer literacy, technology and life skills in partnership with the ComputerBanc.

Refuge Ranch, a horse ranch in Rochester, where equine-assisted activities and mentoring are used to empower at-risk youth and women. A \$10,000 grant will be used to expand indoor facilities to extend the Bridges Mentoring Program and Freedom Reins Adaptive Riding Program from seasonal to year-round.

The Parent Place – \$12,500 for its Nurturing Parenting Program to provide supervised parenting time for low-income noncustodial parents and their children in order to help build healthy parent/child relationships.

Awards will be presented at a Women for Women members reception in May. Membership is at an all-time high, with 116 members of this giving circle. For more information, go to <https://cfl.org/> □

Russian orphan finds a home and success on Illinois farm

Anya Irons has been digging in the dirt since she was a girl.

First, in a small garden plot at the Russian orphanage where she lived until she was 15.

During a 10-day sponsored stay in 2003 with the Ioerger family at their farm near Minonk, north of Bloomington, the 15-year-old's eyes lit up upon seeing their spanning farmland and small garden, where she spent part of her trip working in the soil and lending a hand wherever she could.

"I had a dictionary with me but I couldn't tell them how much I appreciated them," said Irons, who spoke only Russian at the time. "I just drew pictures for them those 10 days."

Lowell and Janet Ioerger (pronounced yay-ger) adopted Irons two months after that trip, and today, the 34-year-old has grown a one-acre garden to 15 acres of produce and flower gardens and nine greenhouses at the centennial farm.

"I was the happiest kid in the world," she remembers, adding that in Russia, children cannot be adopted after they turn 16.

The Ioergers have two sons – Zach and Jacob – around Irons' age, and the couple also wanted a daughter.

"It took me a while to call them Mom and Dad – I never had parents," Irons said. "It took a while to get used to it, and there were a few kids who came back to the orphanage (after being adopted), and they were heartbroken. But my parents said, 'You're not going anywhere.'"

"Now I feel like I've always been here."

As the years go on, Irons' memories of the orphanage fade and are replaced with technicolor memories of building a successful flower and produce operation. Today, Irons, her parents and her two young daughters partner with 40 regional florists and sell their fruit, vegetables and flower arrangements at farmers markets and the farm's retail store – Triple I Garden Shop.

As the busy selling season starts soon, the

greenhouses, many of which were converted from hog buildings, are filled with 4,000 potted plants and flowers of all sizes and different arrangements.

Walking through one greenhouse, Irons, with her daughters, Lyla, 9, and Ali, 6, in tow, points out how each pot has a different "recipe" and blend of colors. She holds up one pot, noting she named the arrangement "Candyland," and touches a hanging planter, explaining that one is called "Grandma's Choice" because the flowers bear her mother's favorite colors.

Aside from the potted plants, veggies and herbs are starting to grow in the 20,000 square feet of greenhouses, almost ready to be planted in the nearby garden plots.

Although the arrangements are a family project, Lowell Ioerger said Irons is the real artist as she has a special knack and creativeness, earning customers

from as far away as Nebraska.

Their work gears up in early March, with the family arranging hundreds of planters a day. By the first week in May, the family will start selling and traveling to regional farmers markets – one of Lyla and Ali's favorite activities.

"The girls love going to the garden to pull carrots or pick other vegetables to get ready for the farmers markets," Irons said. "They beg me to go to the markets."

Irons met her husband, Richie, while attending Illinois Central College, and the two live down the road from her parents. She begins to choke up as she talks about her relationship with her daughters and how different her childhood was in an orphanage with 150 other children. She dubbed her girls "farmers at heart."

"With my 9-year-old, I'll ask her what she wants

to be and she'll say, 'Mommy, I want to be like you, a farmer.'

"She sees the joy in me."

Since about 2005, the farm has converted more of its corn and soybean fields to the gardens, and the Ioergers now raise fewer hogs and cattle.

Aside from fresh-cut flowers, potted arrangements, herbs and produce, the Ioergers sell beef, eggs, jams, jellies and more.

Lowell Ioerger said there's a feeling of fulfillment in growing flowers and produce, compared to corn and soybeans.

"You're selling directly to the public and eating your own food," he said.

Ioerger explained he was reading a newspaper article in 2003 about sponsoring Russian orphans, which prompted him and Janet to attend a meeting, where they chose Irons from 100 photos presented.

"When she came here, she just fit into our family so well," Ioerger said, adding that two years later, the family adopted another 14-year-old girl, Kristina, from the same orphanage. Irons was roommates with Kristina at the orphanage, and now they're sisters. Kristina is a hairstylist in the Bloomington area and helps out on the farm regularly.

"We were always taking in stray kids," Ioerger said, explaining many of their sons' friends would stay at the house as well as nieces and nephews.

Irons' parents enjoy watching their daughter build on her successes and pass her skills down to her daughters.

"It's very therapeutic looking at the flowers, knowing we did this, we created this," Irons said. "It's amazing." □

Here's an idea. To avoid a late finish, start earlier

Plus a primer on the big state budget

The Illinois Senate adjourned its session April 9 just after 3 o'clock in the morning. The House adjourned about three hours later, as the sun was coming up.

This wasn't the first time that the chambers worked into the wee smalls to finish their work, including a budget, and it probably won't be the last, but it's getting to be a bit much.

Senate President Don Harmon told me afterward that, in the future, he would like to "avoid" adjourning session that late.

Harmon claimed that because of the "remarkably collaborative and cordial working relationship" among Democrats in the Statehouse, the willingness to accommodate each other and to try to make "late adjustments to deal with ideas that came from this part of one caucus or that part of another caucus," all led to a very long night.

"In the old days," Harmon said, "a prior Speaker might have said, 'Noon on Thursday and we're done.' This time, we were trying to work and adjust and adapt and add and subtract things at the request of the caucuses. And it did lead to a

schedule challenge at the end."

I can understand that explanation, but it was still severe for a whole lot of folks. Start earlier.

OK, let's talk about that state budget. I'm going to throw some numbers at you, but I'll try to make this as simple as I possibly can.

If you want an idea of how crazy this fiscal year has been, just check the projected revenues when the Fiscal Year 2022 budget was enacted last year and compare them to where they are now.

Last spring, budget-makers settled on a \$44.4 billion total revenue projection for FY22. As of last week, that number had risen to a whopping \$49.2 billion – an increase of more than \$4.8 billion, or almost 11 percent.

The unanticipated new money didn't come directly from the federal government. But it was no doubt a result of the federal economic stimulus programs. The only debt paydown appropriation in the original FY22 plan last year was \$928 million to repay interfund borrowing, and no tax breaks were included.

But, now, because of that new revenue, ad-

ditional debt payoffs, a larger rainy-day fund and mostly one-time tax breaks will total \$5.3 billion this fiscal year, a \$4.4 billion increase above the originally enacted spending plan (not including the payoff of federal covid-related loans).

The end-of-year surplus had been projected to be \$1 billion, but that money was rolled into the overall spending plan by the new supplemental FY22 appropriation, and the state will now end this fiscal year in June with just \$68 million cash, but with \$1 billion in its heretofore empty rainy day fund instead of the \$600 million initially proposed.

The new fiscal year, which begins July 1, will see its projected revenues drop by \$2.6 billion, or about 5.4 percent from the latest estimate for this fiscal year. But that's still a 5 percent (\$2.175 billion) increase over the FY22 estimate the budget-makers relied on last year.


Debt paydown and tax relief will fall from a high of \$6.37 billion (including about \$1 billion to pay off federal COVID-related loans) this fiscal year to just \$640 million next fiscal year, a difference of \$5.73 billion.

Nondiscretionary spending will fall by \$51 million net, but most of those spending top-lines will see increases. That can happen because, as noted above, the state's remaining \$1 billion in COVID-related debt will be paid off by the end of this fiscal year. Pension payments and transfers-out will each rise by about \$300 million, and group health insurance payments will increase by about \$400 million.

"Discretionary" spending – apart from debt payoffs and tax relief – will increase by about \$2.6 billion (\$22.289 billion this fiscal year compared to \$24.867 billion next fiscal year). The increases include P-12 education (\$550 million), higher education (\$240 million), human services (\$1.2 billion), public safety (\$300 million) and general services (\$225 million).

The end of the coming fiscal year may be tight on paper. General Fund revenues are projected to be just \$2 million higher than total spending next year. Yes, the state will have \$1 billion in its rainy-day fund just in case, and the state's bill payment cycle can easily be expanded well beyond its current two weeks. But a worse than expected economic downturn could still cause some fiscal pain, although not nearly as much as in the days when the state had no cushion at all (or even no budget). □

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Be curious, not judgmental

Passover, Ramadan and Lent all came to an end during the past few weeks and I've found myself thinking of the oddest thing: a cow.

When I was about 5, a life-size statue of a cow appeared in our neighbor's front yard. The Hereford stood a silent sentinel on Academy Street in Galesburg and left many perplexed.

Where did it come from? Why was it there? And what was its meaning?

It was the subject of neighborhood discussions. Adults found the need to weigh in among themselves about the inappropriateness of the bovine edifice.

When I'd walk to school, I'd pass right by the creature and stop with friends to look at it. Our tiny hands would stroke its plastic side.

One day after school I asked my mother, "Why is there a cow in front of Davey's house?"

My mother was silent and contemplative for a moment. She said, "Davey's family is a different religion than us. They are Jewish. The cow must be part of their religion. But don't mention it to Davey."

Of course, I did.

"Davey, do you have a cow in your front yard because you're Jewish?"

He gave me a perplexed look and said, "No, my dad belongs to the Jaycees and his friends in the club thought it would be funny to stick a cow in our yard."

My 5-year-old curiosity was quenched, and I went about my day with an answer to my question. I would no longer be confused by the misguided notion that livestock statuary had something to do with modern Judaism.

How did my mother come up with the goofy idea that the cow was some sort of theological statement? It beats me. But her mistake is an all too common one in our society. Too often we make assumptions about those who in some way identify differently than ourselves.

It's a tiresome but all too common exercise.

For example, when I was a college student, my roommate was African American. We both had pictures of our nieces on our desks. Inevitably, when a white person would drop by our room, they would see the picture on his desk and they would say, "Oh my, he's got a kid."

Strangely, no one ever asked my roommate the identity of the person in the photo or assumed that the image on my desk was anyone other than my niece.

They made a judgment about him based on a difference – in this case race – rather than facts. The false narrative didn't serve anyone particularly well – particularly if we are interested in mending divides – rather than broadening them.

Wouldn't it have been better for someone to just ask my roommate, "Hey, Danny, who is in that photo?"

I'm 57 years old. I have never tasted alcohol. And for decades I've put up with people making assumptions about why that is. The most common thought expressed: "Scott doesn't drink because it's against his religion."

Nope. I'm a Christian who recognizes that Jesus drank wine to celebrate, hydrate and commemorate. I don't drink because I had an alcoholic grandparent and have never seen much appealing about the custom. But to each their own.

Last year, my wife and I took a vacation in a nation where the state religion is Islam. A well-meaning friend, who watches a lot of Fox News, took me aside and begged us not to go. She said Muslims hate Americans and our lives would be in danger.

Despite her desperate pleadings, we took the

trip and found ourselves treated with kindness and hospitality. When we saw customs different than our own, we didn't make assumptions. I'd make conversation and just ask.

I learned a lot not only by asking questions but by observing. For example, I saw a couple who appeared to be Iranian and on their honeymoon. The woman was wearing a black chador, a cloak that extends from head to toe.

For a person of my generation, the garb inevitably conjures memories of thousands of angry demonstrators outside the U.S. embassy in Tehran shouting "Death to America." But I saw no anger or hatred.

In fact, it was fun to watch her flirt with her groom, like honeymooners the world over. And when a wind came off the ocean she would stretch out and let the cool breeze fill her chador as a child might.

It would be easy to focus on the differences between our two cultures. But that small act served as a reminder of our shared humanity.

To quote that great American television philosopher Ted Lasso, "Be curious, not judgmental." □

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Doing battle with ‘long COVID’

SIU providers help patients deal with persistent symptoms after original COVID-19 infection

The sniffles, cough and fever that accompanied Tia Wessel’s COVID-19 diagnosis were gone after a few weeks, but the rapid heartbeat, fatigue and dizziness that frightened and frustrated the 33-year-old Jacksonville resident continued for more than a year.

“It was a horrible feeling,” she said. “You want to know if you’re ever going to be back to normal.”

Active, slim and healthy, Wessel was among the estimated 10% to 30% of COVID-19 patients who deal with a variety of long-term effects from the coronavirus infection.

Known as “long COVID,” the condition

has more than 200 potential symptoms and is the focus of a growing number of medical studies, new treatments and outreach efforts across the country – including in Springfield.

“We don’t know much about it. In fact, there’s not even a consensus on what to call it,” said Dr. Vidya Sundareshan, an infectious-diseases specialist at Southern Illinois University School of Medicine. “You need a good team to diagnose and treat it, and that’s what we are building now.”

The condition affects people of all ages, including children, whose experience with respiratory problems can last longer than in adults, she said.

SIU’s Springfield campus in November began operating a Post-COVID Recovery Clinic – a collaborative group of SIU Medicine’s primary care doctors, nurse practitioners and specialists – to better serve the growing number of patients seeking care for long COVID and supplement what is offered by other providers in central Illinois.

The SIU medical providers try to help patients address symptoms that persist, or begin, more than four weeks after a patient’s initial COVID-19 diagnosis. The symptoms can last months or years after the initial infection has subsided.

After an initial visit to the clinic, a patient’s

situation is discussed by a team that includes specialists in infectious diseases, cardiology, pulmonary medicine and psychiatry. Recommendations then are made for treatments that can include traditional and new medicines and physical therapy.

Long COVID symptoms can vary

Patients’ symptoms can range from severe fatigue, shortness of breath and problems thinking clearly – known as “brain fog” – to loss of taste and smell, rapid changes in blood pressure, insomnia, constipation, ringing in the ears, hearing loss, blood clots and strokes.

“People are just so desperate to get

better,” said Sundareshan, a member of the Post-COVID Recovery Clinic team who is a medical adviser to the Sangamon County Department of Public Health. She has played a key role in the community’s response to the COVID-19 pandemic since it hit Illinois in spring 2020.

“There’s some information now about what works and what doesn’t, but we still have a long way to go,” she told *Illinois Times*.

For now, the clinic only accepts doctors’ referrals of adult patients and not self-referrals from individual patients. Clinic providers plan to start a patient support group May 9.

The support group will operate virtually in the beginning and allow doctors to tap into patients’ experiences – what has helped them and what hasn’t – and provide emotional support, Sundareshan said.

“It helps them to know that they’re not alone in going through this,” she said.

The clinic is serving about 50 patients so far, but thousands more probably could benefit from its services, she said.

In Sangamon County alone, more than 55,000 people have been officially diagnosed with COVID-19. About 380 of those residents have died. Ten percent to 30% of those diagnosed with COVID-19 equals 5,500 to 16,500 people in Sangamon County, 313,300 to 940,000 statewide and 8 million to 24 million nationwide.

“We’re trying to understand the magnitude of the problem here,” Sundareshan said. “Definitely the resource is available for somebody who’s having symptoms that are interfering with their daily life and quality of life.”

Avoiding long COVID is another reason for people to be vaccinated against COVID-19, she said. The condition appears to be more common among the unvaccinated, though the vaccinated also have been affected, she said.

The American Medical Association says long COVID can be caused by “direct cell damage” from the virus. Long COVID also can involve symptoms related to a lengthy hospital stay – when someone is bedbound and in an intensive-care unit for weeks. Symptoms also can appear after recovery.

“With COVID itself, you see a variety of symptoms – a 30-year-old dying or a 70-year-old essentially being unscathed and asymptomatic,” Dr. Devang Sanghavi, medical director of the intensive-care unit at Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, Florida, said on the AMA website.

The reason for the variation, Sanghavi said, is “there are various patient factors

at play,” reflecting the “interplay with the immune system of a person, and then the impact that both those things have on the body.”

Some patients face stigma

Early on in the pandemic, doctors encountering what later was determined to be long COVID thought “this is not possible, and we really questioned what patients were saying,” according to Dr. Greg Vanichkachorn, a long COVID expert and occupational medicine specialist at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota.

But as the pandemic continues, “we are questioning our understanding about coronaviruses,” he told *Illinois Times*. “And much of the research over the past two years really has focused on trying to figure out how this condition presents. ... This condition can look like a lot of different things.

“I think the most important takeaway from all of this is that we have evidence that this is not just a condition that’s due to a mental-health issue like depression or anxiety, which is something that many patients early on were told,” Vanichkachorn said. “There seems to be something more at play.”

It’s not unusual for viral diseases such as measles, influenza, shingles or mononucleosis to cause longer-term health

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problems, Vanichkachorn and Sundareshan said. Such problems were reported in research after outbreaks in the 2010s of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) and Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS) – both of which are coronaviruses, Vanichkachorn said.

“The only difference now is that it’s happening on such a widespread scale that it’s receiving much more attention this go-around,” he said.

The condition is under-diagnosed in part because of the initial dismissive attitude of the medical community, he said.

“Patients have felt abandoned and marginalized because of their symptoms,” Vanichkachorn said. “Most have tried to get care early on, and they were told things like, ‘This is all in your head,’ or ‘This is impossible, and you need



to tough it out.’ And that leads to all sorts of self-doubt and anxiety and depression and so forth.”

The responsiveness and empathy from doctors have improved, he said.

“Providers are just really interested to get adequate, up-to-date information and training on this so they can begin helping patients, but it’s a long, uphill battle with getting out the information,” he said.

Post-COVID recovery clinics like the one at SIU are becoming more common across the country, mostly in large cities and at large, academic medical centers, Vanichkachorn said.

Various treatments being tried and studied

Treatments and results can vary and are evolving. For long COVID patients with fatigue and brain fog, doctors sometimes prescribe the antiviral COVID-19 treatment drug Paxlovid – and even COVID-19 vaccines for patients who haven’t been vaccinated or boosted – all to reduce

symptoms.

Exercise, physical therapy and strength training can help with some symptoms, and fatigue can be reduced with conventional treatments for sleep apnea and by promoting regular sleep routines and avoiding the use of screens before bed, Sundareshan said. High-dose antacids have been prescribed for loss of taste.

Vanichkachorn said “olfactory training” may speed up the recovery process for both senses by smelling specific substances – clove, lemon, eucalyptus and rose – for 15 seconds twice a day for several weeks or months. More information is available at bitly/MayoCOVID or abscent.org.

Area patients deal with long-term symptoms

One of the SIU clinic’s patients, Jeff Six, a 62-year-old grain farmer from rural Bluffs in Scott County, hasn’t been able to taste or smell much of anything for five months. He was diagnosed with COVID-19 in late

Six said he and his wife were so sick that they feared they eventually would be hospitalized and die. They finally were able to receive the infusions at Illini Community Hospital in Pittsfield and started feeling better two days later, he said.

Neither he nor his wife has been vaccinated, and they remain skeptical about the benefits of the COVID-19 vaccine, he said. Six said his 88-year-old mother, who came down with COVID-19 while living in a Pike County nursing home, died in September 2020, before vaccines were available.

Six said COVID-19 left him with little taste and smell, though the antacids prescribed by the Post-COVID Recovery



Clinic have helped with a bad taste in his mouth. He said he and his wife appreciated the compassionate care they both received at Illini Community and that he has received at the SIU clinic.

Even though his residual symptoms haven’t improved much – “It’s horrible not being able to taste and smell” – he said he has peace of mind that SIU providers are monitoring him and paying attention to all the details of his COVID-19 experience.

“They got up close and personal with me,” he said. “They have been very caring.”

Andy Coop, 52, of Jacksonville, said he found his joint pain aggravated by a bout with COVID-19 that began in July 2021 and included a five-week stay at Jacksonville Memorial Hospital, 22 days of it on a ventilator.

The increased pain is in his elbows, shoulders, wrists, hands and hips, he said.

November 2021. His wife, Jamie, 58, got sick shortly after him.

The couple’s early symptoms included severe body aches, weakness, nausea and diarrhea. Six said he and his wife were turned down for monoclonal antibody infusions at hospitals in Jacksonville and Springfield because they showed up more than 10 days after the onset of symptoms.

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He also deals with residual numbness in his buttocks, outer thighs and left foot.

But Coop, a former Jacksonville police officer, said he was able to return to work in Springfield as a firearms eligibility analyst for the Illinois State Police. He said he takes anti-inflammatory medicine and Vitamin B-12 supplements, which has helped but not eliminated the pain, and he is under the care of a rheumatologist.

Coop said his doctors don't know when his long COVID symptoms may abate. "It's kind of a wait-and-see type of approach," he said.

He praised the doctors and nurses at Jacksonville Memorial. "The whole staff just treated me with such respect and dignity," he said.

Jacksonville Memorial staff members from throughout the hospital were exhausted and discouraged after caring for so many COVID-19 patients who died, he said. They visited him in his room after he was taken off the ventilator and before he was discharged.

Coop said they told him: "You're a miracle." They told me they needed this victory."

At the time Coop was infected, he and his wife, April, who later contracted COVID-19 but didn't need to be hospitalized, hadn't received any vaccine. "I wasn't 100% comfortable with it," he said.

Both Coop and his wife have since been convinced of its value and gotten vaccinated.

'It was the most frustrating thing'

Wessel, the Jacksonville resident who was healthy up until her COVID diagnosis, is a registered nurse and deputy director of operations for SIU Medicine. She is assisting with the setup of SIU's Post-COVID Recovery Clinic and has given many COVID-19 shots and boosters.

She said she lost her sense of taste and smell for just two-and-a-half weeks. What didn't go away were a high heart rate – up to 190 beats per minute – and shortness of breath and dizziness whenever she would hold her arms above her head to fix her hair in the morning or bend over to put on clothes or use her front-loading washer and dryer.

It got so bad that she couldn't walk her dog or play on her backyard trampoline at home with the 8-year-old son of her partner, Michael Griffiths, a Jacksonville firefighter.

Wessel said she was diagnosed with COVID-19 in December 2020, a few days after Griffiths, 50. That was a time when neither of them had access to a COVID-19

vaccine, she said, adding that both are now fully vaccinated.

Griffiths came down with only mild symptoms. But Wessel's symptoms were so bad that she had to lie down multiple times in the morning as she prepared for work, and felt worn out once she got to the office. "It was the most frustrating thing," she said.

Wessel said she isn't a patient of the SIU clinic but has seen SIU specialists on her own who have told her the virus caused swelling in the two bottom chambers of her heart.

An increase in her blood pressure medicine has helped some, but she said she just had to endure the long-term symptoms. She has been able to continue working throughout.

Wessel's heart rate and dizziness problems continued until July 2021, then with some breaks in symptoms until February 2022, when she began to feel more normal.

"I would go weeks feeling fine, then it would come back again, sometimes with new symptoms," she said. "There were nights I would wake up drenched in sweat, and I would have to change my clothes and sheets.

"The worst time I had was lying in bed watching TV, and I felt my heart racing and stabbing chest pain," she said. "From going to the doctor so much, I knew there wasn't anything 'bad' happening. It was just a side effect of having COVID. This was a scary feeling that also would happen riding in a car, sitting at my desk at work or on exertion with activity."

Some long COVID patients "feel good for a while, and then something happens" such as exposure to cold air, and their symptoms return, Sundareshan said.

Vanichkachorn said almost 30% of patients with long COVID aren't able to work for months after their initial infection, and some develop long-term disabilities.

"What's become apparent is that patients with long-haul COVID have a really hard time with function, and that includes getting back to work," he said.

"Everyone does get better, so I don't want people to be totally hopeless about this," Vanichkachorn said, "but it's a change in how they do things in their life. ... We don't know what the super-long trajectory of this is going to be." □

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

Taste testers review tequila options

Tequila and I have had a somewhat complicated history. In fact, there was a time when even the very thought of having any made me ill. Since then, however, I've discovered that there's a lot more to tequila than margaritas, lemons and salt. And that there are many, many kinds of tequila out there beyond the Jose Cuervo that we're all familiar with. So, I was particularly pleased that I was asked by *Illinois Times* to participate in a tequila tasting. My fellow testers included a professional who generally doesn't drink but who possessed a fine nose and sense of taste, a food industry professional with vast knowledge of tequila, and another *IT* freelancer who was no stranger to the culinary arts.

While we waited for everything to be set up, we learned that most tequilas come from the Mexican state of Jalisco and that tequila is distilled from the agave plant. And, much like with French wines, the tequila industry sets strict standards for what can legally take the name tequila – for example, at least 51% of the fermentable sugars must come from the blue agave plant.

Before starting, it was suggested that we focus on the following categories: nose (aroma), initial taste, body, finish, smoothness and price. In general, we tried to follow the guidance.

Two of the eight varieties we tested were felt to be better for casual drinking or mixing margaritas. All reviewers found the Milagro to be sharp with limited flavor notes other than that of distilled alcohol. I commented that it smacked one in the head as tequila that was

meant to fire up a margarita machine, and another quipped that it was likely Jose Cuervo's cousin. Likewise, the panel found Corralejo to be better-suited for mixed drinks rather than sipping, thanks to its distinctive tequila smell and strong alcohol punch at the end.

Another two tequilas in the group are owned and produced by celebrities – Michael Jordan's Cincoro brand and Kendall Jenner's 818.

Despite the fact that I was pulling for MJ, everyone found Cincoro to be sweet with no bite and a strong taste of vanilla. It surprised us in that it tasted the least like tequila despite being made from 100% agave. Basically, unlike MJ, it had very little heft to it.

818 had a very strong vanilla nose to it. I found it to have an aroma of perfume. Others found it overpowering and one even commented that it was, like Kendall herself, "just too much."

Of the remaining four, all tasters found them to be more complex and interesting varieties. El Jimador is named after the worker who cuts the agave plants. We initially struggled to identify its nose until someone figured out that it was nutmeg. We all liked the fruity aroma and the spiciness provided by the nutmeg, yet it went down smooth, although I detected a very small note of bitterness at the end.


The 1800 Cristilano is a new type of tequila, which is essentially extra-distilled through charcoal for a particularly smooth and clear drink that still manages to preserve the floral notes associated with fine sipping tequila. I likened it to a "gateway" tequila that would be helpful in introducing the liquor to those generally unfamiliar with the spirit. Everyone

liked its smoothness and floral notes, with one taster appreciating the initial fiery taste that became "buttery" and "mellow" on the back end.

Another favorite, the Corazon, managed to maintain the standard tequila aroma we all know while maintaining a smoothness that made it a good sipping spirit. Compared to the Cristilano, we all knew we were drinking tequila. This was a "blanco" tequila – meaning that it's generally not aged. Because of that, we all found it to be agave forward, with notes of pepper and citrus that gave it a spicy, yet smooth, finish.

Our last tequila sample was the Clase Azul. It was a late entrant, having been brought in by our food industry professional at the last moment. This brand came packaged in a striking ceramic bottle with a metal stopper that doubles as a shot glass and a bell. Each bottle is hand-crafted by a Mexican company staffed predominately with women, with each worker receiving fair wages in addition to two meals per day, transportation, day care services and tuition for school. Drink this tequila and you can feel good about yourself as well.

Clase Azul is a reposado, meaning it's rested for up to 12 months in oak barrels. Everyone loved the sweet agave odor with its herbal notes, but we also detected hints of cinnamon, caramel, nutmeg and vanilla. There was a depth and complexity present. As good as it was for sipping, we all thought that it would elevate a margarita into something special.

Strawberry-rhubarb trifle for Mother's Day

Delicious, stunning and easy

My family has a decades-old tradition of baking a three-dimensional lamb-shaped cake for Easter. It started when I was a kid and has become a tradition that I've enjoyed with my own children. We'd hold our breath each time we unmolded the three-dimensional cake, praying that he'd come out of the pan in one piece, then decorate him with coconut, jelly beans and spring flowers. However, over the past two years, for a myriad of reasons, the poor lamb cake has been forgotten. He's been baked, swaddled tightly in plastic and frozen the week leading up to the holiday. (I've learned that the best way to keep the poor lamb intact is to frost him while still frozen hard.) I've fully intended to finish and serve the cake, but somehow in all the pre-holiday fuss he's twice now been forgotten.

Late in the afternoon on this most recent Easter Sunday, my eldest shot up from her chocolate-induced stupor and exclaimed, "We forgot the lamby cake, *again!*"

"I thought about it yesterday evening," I replied, "but it was too late to start on it after we finished dyeing eggs so I figured we'll just use it to make a trifle for Mother's Day like we did last year."

"Oh yeah! That's OK. Trifle is yummier than the cake anyway."

Indeed, a trifle is one of the most supremely delicious and adaptable desserts you can make. A traditional British confection featuring whisky-soaked cake, creamy custard and juicy berries, trifles are as easy to make as they are stunning to behold. And while it can be an excellent way to show off your tender homemade pound cake and flawless custard sauce, you can also take any multitude of shortcuts or make adaptations as you see fit. Store-bought cake or cookies will work well,

and if you don't want to turn on the stove you can substitute jam for the rhubarb filling. Pudding mix can stand in for the custard sauce, or you can just skip the custard entirely and use sweetened whipped cream. Any kind of berries work well, in addition to honeyed peaches or roasted apples.

Strawberry-rhubarb trifle

For the filling:

4 cups diced rhubarb
½ cup sugar
½ cup water

For the custard:

3 cups cold whole milk
½ cup sugar
¼ cup cornstarch
6 egg yolks
1 teaspoon vanilla bean paste
1 tablespoon brandy or Grand Marnier, optional
1 tablespoon butter

To assemble:

4 cups cubed pound cake (shortbread cookies or vanilla wafers work also)
4 cups sliced strawberries
1 cup cold whipping cream
Brandy or Grand Marnier for sprinkling cake, optional

Combine the rhubarb, sugar and water in a nonreactive saucepan over medium high heat. Cook, stirring frequently until the mixture comes to a boil, then reduce heat and continue to cook for 5-10 minutes more until the rhubarb has softened and the mixture is thick. Remove from heat and allow to cool completely.

Meanwhile, combine the cold milk, sugar and cornstarch in a heavy-bottomed saucepan over medium heat. Cook, stirring constantly until the mixture comes to a boil. Continue to cook for two minutes until the mixture is thick enough to coat the back of a spoon, about two minutes. Remove from heat. Whisk a small amount of the hot milk mixture into the egg yolks to temper, whisking vigorously so as to prevent the eggs from scrambling. Pour the egg yolk mixture into the pan with the milk mixture and return it to the stove. Stirring continuously, bring the egg-milk mixture up to a gentle simmer over medium heat and cook for an additional two minutes. Remove from heat and whisk in the vanilla, liquor if using, and butter. Cool completely. This can be done by refrigerating overnight (allow to come to room temperature before placing in the fridge) or by placing the bowl of custard into a large bowl filled with ice water. Stir the custard frequently until cool to the touch. This rapid-cooling method can also be used with the rhubarb mixture above.

When ready to assemble the trifle, combine the sliced strawberries and cooled rhubarb mixture, stirring gently to combine. In a mixer or by hand, whip the cream to soft peaks.

Place a layer of cake cubes in a three-quart glass trifle or souffle dish. Sprinkle with liquor, if using, then spread half of the strawberry-rhubarb mixture over the cake cubes, followed by half of the custard and half of the whipped cream. Gently rap the dish on the counter to expel any air bubbles, then repeat the layers. Decorate as desired with fresh berries, and chill until ready to serve. □

May you enjoy your May weekend, and I'll see you next week. □

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






