Consulting group makes recommendations to Springfield Fire Department

The Springfield Fire Department should fill the vacant position of emergency medical services coordinator and consider reconfiguring EMS services so firefighters can respond quicker to true emergencies, a respected consulting group says.

The Center for Public Safety Management, a 103-year-old nonprofit organization based in Washington, D.C., also recommended in a report that the city:

• Upgrade its aging fleet of fire trucks.

• Review the city's "actual costs" for providing fire-prevention services and consider charging for fire inspections and related services.

• Look into seeking "payments in lieu of taxes" from state government and other taxexempt employers and organizations as ways of increasing revenues.

Those suggestions and many others were part of a 219-page analysis of fire department operations conducted at the city's request for \$50,000 and completed in January.

Several projects set in motion by the Springfield City Council were supported by the analysis. They include the \$6 million purchase of seven new fire vehicles and \$10 million to build three new fire stations – a net increase of one station that will bring the total to 13.

Whether and when action will be taken on other parts of the report is unknown. The City Council hasn't yet heard an in-depth presentation on the report from the center.

But Mayor Jim Langfelder said he has appointed an advisory group to study all of the issues raised in-depth and report back to the council. The group includes Ward 3 Ald. Roy Williams Jr., former council members Gail Simpson and Allan Woodson, Fire Chief Brandon Blough, Deputy Chief Nick Zummo and several representatives of Springfield Fire Fighters Local 47.

"The main thing for myself is, how do we assess the report and determine what we should put in practice ... that make sense for the city of Springfield?" Langfelder said.

The report contains 33 different recommendations on topics such as capital assets, training, community risk reduction, response times, fire operations and planning objectives.

Langfelder and Blough said long-term planning and scrutiny for the fire department is especially important because of the role the department plays in the community and the cost of maintaining a Class 1 department. Class 1 is the highest rating available and one that ensures the lowest rates for homeowner and apartment insurance.

"People want that service," Langfelder said. "And we pay a premium for that Class 1 service. How do we best utilize the resources we have right now, taking into consideration all the variables ... to serve the public?"

As one of the largest expenses in city government, the fire department operates with 197 firefighters and an annual budget of almost \$45 million.

Blough said fire department personnel initially were worried that the Center for Public Safety Management would suggest cuts and determine that the department was overstaffed, as some people – including Citizens Club President Bob Gray – have suggested when comparing Springfield with other midsize communities downstate.

The center commended the department on many fronts and didn't say it was overstaffed, Blough said. "There is always room for

efficiencies," he said.

One area not covered in the report – the lack of diversity among the firefighter ranks – will be among issues the advisory group looks at, Blough said.

Out of the 197 firefighters, 193 are men and four are female. Eight of the 197, or 4%, are Black in a community where 20% of residents are Black. The department has two Hispanic firefighters.

"I am undoubtedly aware that our minority demographics need to be improved," Blough said. "The strategies employed for the last 20 years have not yielded the results that we, as an organization, have hoped for. As we come out of the pandemic, my administration is attempting different ideas and is just now about to restart the in-person recruiting efforts that we hope will bring about better results."

The report, a treasure trove of statistics, examined department operations in 2019 and 2020. The report said 11,500 of the department's almost 20,000 calls for service annually – or 58% – represented EMS services in 2019.

The number of EMS calls continues to increase as the population ages and medical technology keeps people alive longer, Blough said. The same trend is being seen by fire departments nationwide, he said.

Outdoor fires accounted for 233 of the calls in 2019, and false alarms represented more than one-third of all non-EMS calls.

The position of EMS coordinator, vacant for several years because of other budget priorities, will be filled this year, Blough said. That person will help to ensure accurate record-keeping and coordination of services between the department's emergency medical technicians and paramedics and the three private ambulance companies serving the community, he said.

The report said the department, which, by law, is in charge of EMS services in Springfield, should take steps to gauge the quality of services provided by the three companies – America Ambulance, LifeStar and Medics First. The department, which is often the first on scene and provides medical care before ambulances arrive, should look into being reimbursed by the ambulance services, the report said. SFD receives no reimbursement now.

Based on current protocol, the private ambulances, not fire department vehicles, are tasked with transporting patients to the hospital.

Blough said he is working with the ambulance companies to help them recruit workers – an especially difficult task during the COVID-19 pandemic.

To improve response times and better serve patients, the report recommended the city "explore the feasibility of implementing some type of community-based mobile integrated health care or paramedicine program."

"The city should also explore the feasibility of introducing telemedicine as part of this program and if funding for non-transport of patients would be available," the report said.

These new options might involve the use of a van in which the fire department would work with the ambulance services, Memorial Health and Hospital Sisters Health System to provide preventive care or non-emergency care to patients who call 911, Blough said. That way, the department and private ambulances wouldn't be diverted from life-threatening emergencies, response times for true emergencies would improve and the overall quality of services would increase, he said.

But implementing that change in the EMS system is probably a multiyear project, Blough said.

"I think it's a great idea," he said. "But it won't be cheap, and it's labor-intensive."

The department probably would need to bill insurers for services – something it doesn't do now, he said.

The department plans to put in place an enhanced 911 dispatching service by the end of the year, Blough said.

Costing about \$500,000, the service would reduce the time dispatchers are on the phone notifying fire department personnel about emergencies. Under the new system, dispatchers would send automated messages to all relevant EMS personnel with a keystroke, Blough said.

The system is expected to shave 30 seconds or more from the average four-minute time it takes for help to arrive after 911 dispatchers are called, he said. □

Converting the Wyndham City Centre

Developer wants to turn downtown hotel into apartments

The Wyndham City Centre hotel would be renovated for \$25 million into studio and one-bedroom apartments renting for \$700 to \$1,000 per month under a rezoning proposal headed to the Springfield City Council for final approval.

New York-based GoodHomes Co. would acquire the 30-story, former downtown Hilton building from the current owner, Tower Capital Group of San Antonio, Texas, if the project at 700 E. Adams St. proceeds.

GoodHomes will take its proposal to the City Council on July 19 after the Springfield Planning and Zoning Commission voted 4-3 on a proposed "special provision" variation to central shopping district zoning.

Because the project failed to receive enough "yes" votes – with two zoning commissioners abstaining or voting present – the number of votes needed from council members to pass will be seven instead of the usual six votes, city spokeswoman Julia Frevert said.

GoodHomes spokesman and principal David Mitchell told the commission there's a need for more market-rate apartments downtown for the 54,000 workers employed within a one-mile radius of the Wyndham.

"Your downtown core is very attractive, but it has no real meaningful residential opportunities for this workforce to live in," Mitchell said.

"What we're really trying to do is to create an exciting place to live, and it could be the first step in a revitalization of the residential part of Springfield," he said.

However, the staff of the Springfield-Sangamon County Regional Planning Commission recommended denial of the project, in part because the current and proposed future owner of the property provided "no evidence to back the assertion that the project will add needed housing for Springfield and enhance property values."

The hotel's exterior look would remain the same, but the inside would be completely redone, and the top floor would be made into a public observation desk featuring panoramic views of central Illinois, Mitchell said.

The top floor also would include a food hall and an entryway with a permanent gallery for the Sangamon County Historical Society, he said.

"We think that will enhance tourism. We think it will enhance community interest," Mitchell said, adding that the company would use "predominantly prevailing-wage labor" for

the project.

The project primarily would be paid for by GoodHomes, which has developed and financed more than \$10 billion in development over the past 15 years, Mitchell said.

He said the company would look into potential government assistance programs to build market-rate housing, including taxincrement financing, but any such assistance wouldn't be essential for the project to move forward.

A recent proposal to renovate the Myers Brothers Building into below-market-rate apartments fell through when a developer's request for low-interest financing through the Illinois Housing Development Authority failed to receive support from City Hall.

Scott Larsen, president of Tower Capital Group, which supports the Wyndham renovation project, told commissioners the COVID-19 pandemic killed demand for hotel rooms from the corporate clients the hotel had catered to in the past.

The building was constructed in 1972 and 1973 and first took on the Hilton name in 1980. It switched its brand to Wyndham in 2015.

The *State Journal-Register* reported that the brand change helped to avoid confusion with the President Abraham Lincoln Hotel across the street. That hotel became a DoubleTree by Hilton in 2013.

The Wyndham fell on hard times and was purchased by Tower in 2019 for \$7.4 million after a foreclosure proceeding. The building had a fair-market value of \$10.8 million at the time, but the value has dropped since then to \$2.8 million, according to Sangamon County property records.

Larsen said Tower was 70% done with a design to renovate the hotel and convert it into a Delta by Marriott when COVID-19 hit in early 2020.

Annual average occupancy dropped from 42.6% before the pandemic to about 27% currently, he said. It will take at least four or five years, if ever, for corporate travel to make a full comeback in Springfield and nationwide, and the Wyndham property, like many "big box" hotels, will continue to suffer, Larsen said.

The hotel had 200 employees before the pandemic and fewer than 85 now, he said, and downtown convention business isn't enough to make the hotel's business model sustainable long-term.

For years, the hotel has rented about 25

units in the hotel as apartments. Those units would be rehabbed along with the rest of the approximately 400 units, Mitchell said.

GoodHomes would keep 40,000 square feet of convention and meeting space in the building and convert 80 of the units into extended-stay hotel rooms, all to support convention business downtown, Mitchell said.

The remaining 320 units would be apartments ranging from 320 to 800 square feet, and the renovated complex would include a swimming pool, fitness center, game room, tenant lounge and tenant storage, he said.

Some commissioners were skeptical of GoodHomes' expectation that many future tenants would move in so they could walk to work. GoodHomes officials said that more pedestrians downtown would boost sales for downtown retailers and restaurants.

Some commissioners said Springfield residents, like many Midwesterners, prefer not to walk or ride a bicycle even a few blocks to work and would rather drive. Mitchell said a connected 535-space parking lot that GoodHomes controls would provide more than enough spaces for tenants' cars.

Mayor Jim Langfelder said he and Scott Dahl, director of the Springfield Convention and Visitors Bureau, along with other downtown leaders, are negotiating with Tower on the number of hotel rooms needed in the Wyndham building to provide adequate service as convention business rebounds.

The current zoning allows for up to 200 apartments in the building, but Mitchell said the project wouldn't be worth it financially with that few apartments, because rents would have to be raised and would be unaffordable for many people.

Langfelder said he and downtown leaders are trying to work out an "amicable solution" on the number of hotel rooms and apartments needed to support conventions and give a boost to downtown businesses serving downtown residents.

"We are a convention city, and we need to continue to be recognized as a convention city," Dahl said. But he said the city may not need all of the Wyndham's hotel rooms to accommodate demand for conventions.

Dahl said hotel occupancy rates citywide dropped to 31% during the pandemic. Current occupancy is about 49% and likely will increase during the busy summer tourism season, he said. The pre-pandemic occupancy rate was 55%. □

Downtown store is Springfield's first refillery

To support a local female-owned business while helping the environment, visit The Keep Store at 314 E. Adams Street. Amy Shelton is the owner and founder of Springfield's first "refillery" store which opened May 21. Bring your own jar or buy a container to purchase bath supplies, cleaning products and other personal care items by weight. The products are environmentally friendly, and other ecofriendly items are for sale.

Shelton grew up in Petersburg and developed a love of learning from her parents, who were both teachers. "I have been an avid environmentalist since my biology classes in high school," said Shelton. "However, once you become a grandparent, everything changes. Climate change was concerning enough to think about during my own lifetime, never mind my children's. It's even more frightening to think what may occur during my grandchild's lifetime." Shelton knew she wanted to make changes, including reducing the amount of waste and consumption within her own household. She learned about zero-waste stores and "refilleries" popping up elsewhere. Because there were no such stores in Springfield, she decided to open one.

This is a side enterprise for Shelton. She is an IT manager at Horace Mann, where she has worked for over 20 years. She started as a biology major in college but quit school to get married, started a family and entered the work force. She worked at Blue Cross Blue Shield for 17 years and eventually finished her bachelor's degree after the age of 40. □

Found: Death certificates of 5 killed in East St. Louis riots

Lost 1917 records complicate possible identification CRIMINAL HISTORY | Beth Hundsdorfer, Capitol News Illinois

It was a tale told by older generations to the younger generations, of men shot and killed and their bodies tossed into a creek during one of the fiercest race riots in the country. That tale was carried across the Mississippi River by those trying to escape the violence and through the generations of African American families who lived in East St. Louis in 1917.

Reginald Petty, the founder of the East St. Louis Historical Society, said he heard it. His elders told the children that 20 or 30 men were shot and thrown in Cahokia Creek. "Everyone I talked to had a story, but this is the first time I have heard proof," Petty said.

Capitol News Illinois discovered the death certificates in the Illinois State Archives earlier this year. The St. Clair County coroner's records from the time period contained death certificates of five Black men, each identified only as "John Doe," who were found in Cahokia Creek during and in the days after the massive riot.

Four were shot. One suffered a fractured skull.

"My grandparents would tell me about 30 or 40 men killed and thrown in the creek during the riots," Petty said. "This is proof that this happened. That's amazing."

The five unidentified men were buried on July 3, 1917, in St. Clair Cemetery – the day after they were discovered in Cahokia Creek. Decades later, they were disinterred and moved about seven miles to Sunset Gardens of Memory Cemetery in Millstadt to make way for the construction of Interstate 64. The records for the St. Clair Cemetery didn't make the move with them.

Checks with the St. Clair County clerk and the Illinois comptroller's office, which regulates cemeteries, failed to turn up any records for



the formerly county-run St. Clair Cemetery. Without those records, if they ever existed, there is no way to know the location of the John Does in their new gravesite in Sunset Gardens, further deepening the mystery of who these five men were who died at the hands of a riotous mob.

Petty said he considers them stitches in the fabric of East St. Louis history. "They have become part of the East St. Louis community. All of our fathers, grandfathers, uncles. That's how I will think of them," Petty said.

The death certificates detail the violence that began May 28, 1917, after a city council meeting during which angry white workers formally complained about black migrants who came from the South to East St. Louis to work in the meatpacking plants and factories that were gearing up for World War I. Mobs began attacking Black residents, pulling them off streetcars.

Illinois Gov. Frank Lowden activated the National Guard, but troops were dispersed weeks later.

Tensions boiled over on July 1. A car occupied by white men drove through the Black area of the city and passengers fired into a group on the street, according to news reports of the time. Later, another car containing police officers drove through the same area and residents, assuming it was the first car, opened fire, killing two police officers.

This led to days of violence, including the burning of homes occupied by Black people, as well as assaults and murders. The death certificates state the men died "by being thrown into Cahokia Creek during mob violence by parties unknown to us after being shot."

In response to the violence, families built rafts to cross the Mississippi River or walked for miles to reach St. Louis. Josephine Baker, a renowned actress, singer and dancer from St. Louis, once described the scene in a speech as she saw it as an 11-year-old.

"I can still see myself standing on the west bank of the Mississippi looking over into East St. Louis and watching the glow of the burning Negro homes lighting the sky. We children stood huddled together in bewilderment, frightened to death with the screams of Negro families running across this bridge with nothing but what they had on their backs as their worldly belongings," Baker said in a 1952 speech.

And as those residents fled, they told their stories of violence, Petty said, and drew the attention of St. Louis newspaper reporters who wrote stories that circulated around the country.

Lowden reactivated the National Guard, which eventually quelled the violence on July 3, 1917 – the same day the five John Does were buried in St. Clair Cemetery in East St. Louis.

More than 300 homes in East St. Louis were burned. Death estimates were officially placed around 33, but later estimates by scholars put the deaths at around 200. Petty thinks it may even be more.

In addition to the death certificates for the five unidentified men found in Cahokia Creek, there were at least 10 other death certificates found in the state archives. Three of those died from a fire in a building at Eighth and Broadway.

Are FOID cards unconstitutional?

Illinois Supreme Court avoids issuing decision

It could be a court case that expands Illinois gun-owner rights, but the state Supreme Court has twice avoided making a decision.

At issue is whether the Illinois Firearm Owners Identification Card, or FOID, is an unconstitutional infringement on a citizen's right to bear arms.

"Whenever the court can rule on an issue without having to get into the Second Amendment constitutional issue, they will dodge, they will punt," said Todd Vandermyde, the retired, longtime Statehouse lobbyist for the National Rifle Association.

The four Democrats on the high court kicked the case back to the trial court, while the court's three Republicans joined in dissent.

It was the second time the case of the People v. Vivian Brown came before the court and the second time the court declined to rule on the constitutionality of the state statute requiring Illinoisans to receive a permit to legally own a gun.

Vivian Brown is a cancer patient living near Carmi in deep southern Illinois, said Richard Pearson, president of the Illinois Rifle Association. She kept a bolt-action, single shot .22 caliber rifle in her home for her personal protection, he added.

Brown's estranged husband reported to the police that she had fired the rifle in the house. Police officers responding to her home could find no evidence that a gun had had been fired. But she was charged with possessing a firearm without a FOID card, and her rifle was confiscated.

Brown maintained in her court filing that requiring her to go through the FOID card process unconstitutionally infringed upon her fundamental right of self-defense in the privacy of her own home. And the trial court agreed, ruling the statute unconstitutional.

In 2020, the state Supreme Court kicked the case back to the trial court on a technicality. But when the case returned to White County, another trial judge again ruled the entire act unconstitutional. And again, this month the high court kicked it back to the trial court, saying its instructions had not been abided by.

"They sidestepped the issue. And why do you reckon they want to sidestep the issue? Because they don't want to rule on it because they know what the ruling should be. In the home, at the very least, it's unconstitutional to require a FOID to possess a gun," Pearson, of the state rifle association, said.

Republicans on the high court were critical of the Democratic majority's ruling. Justice Michael Burke said in his dissent Brown was never acquitted of the criminal charge. Rather, she only "obtained a dismissal on what she considered dubious legal grounds that she had never argued."

He predicted the case will return to the high court a third time and the state Supreme Court will ultimately have to rule on the constitutionality of the state gun permit law.

Vandermyde, formerly of the NRA, noted that citizens aren't required to obtain a permit to exercise such First Amendment rights as attending church or expressing a political point of view. He asked: Why should a license be required to exercise a Second Amendment right?

But Esther Sanchez-Lopez, a lawyer for the Gifford Law Center to Prevent Gun Violence, said sometimes a license is required to practice a constitutional right. For example, she noted sometimes permits are required for public demonstrations.

"And unlike attending church, guns kill people. It's a very different exercise of a right than some others," she said. "I do think it is constitutional. I think that the FOID imposes a minimal burden on law-abiding citizens. And the reality is the FOID card act really just creates a process by which someone confirms that they are eligible to possess the firearm. It's a relatively minimal burden."

White County resident Judge T. Scott Webb ruled, "Even though the Supreme Court left open the option of regulation to combat the dangers of gun violence in *Heller*, it is this court's opinion that the FOID Card Act goes too far... This act makes criminals out of law-abiding citizens who are attempting to protect their lives within their homes."

Webb cited "fees" associated with the FOID card, noting, "Any fee associated with exercising the core fundamental constitutional right of armed self-defense within the confines of one's home violates the Second Amendment."

It costs \$10 to apply for a FOID card, and if it is issued, it is valid for 10 years.

While on the surface the case would seem to be between Vivian Brown and the local prosecutor, it actually is much more complex. The Illinois State Rifle Association and the Second Amendment Foundation out of the state of Washington are bankrolling her defense in hopes of establishing a legal precedent broadening gun-owner rights, Pearson said. And the Gifford Law Center and other gun-control groups wrote amicus, or friends of court, briefs in favor of licensing gun owners. \Box

"We're not the party of Trump," Senate Republican Leader Dan McConchie told an interviewer a couple of months ago. "I'm in the Republican Party and the party of Lincoln. And at the end of the day, the important thing is that we're standing up for ideas and ideals, and not a personality. And that is what the Republican Party has been about for decades and what I believe we're going to be going forward."

At least as far as the Illinois governor's race goes, that now seems less likely.

As you undoubtedly know by now, Sen. Darren Bailey, R-Xenia, did not appear to be gaining traction until the GOP primary battlefield was reshaped as a referendum on former President Donald Trump by big money pumped in from billionaire Democratic Gov. JB Pritzker and Republican billionaire Dick Uihlein.

The question now is whether that Trump referendum will move down the ballot. Two polls showed a very tight Republican attorney general primary with huge numbers of people who can't decide between Ken Griffin-backed Steve Kim and outlandish, far-right COVID attorney Tom DeVore, who has been endorsed by Bailey. And Trump and Bailey have both endorsed US Rep. Mary Miller over fellow Republican US Rep. Rodney Davis.

And what about the state legislature?

While the House Republican Organization is formally staying out of the race in the open 87th District primary, House GOP Leader Jim Durkin has contributed \$5,000 to candidate Mary Burress. And a committee controlled by Durkin ally Rep. Avery Bourne, R-Morrisonville, has maxed out to Burress with a \$59,900 contribution. Burress, the Tazewell County Treasurer, is running against Tazewell County Board member and physician William Hauter.

The reason I mention this is that Burress is one of the only House Republican candidates I can find who is openly touting her support for former President Trump. "Mary Burress is the pro-Trump Republican working to make Illinois great again," declares a headline on one mailer, which also features a photo of her next to the former POTUS.

With Bailey surging and a recent *Sun-Times* poll showing Trump still very popular with party members, it would seem to be a nobrainer for conservative Republican candidates to publicly attach themselves to one or the other or both in their advertising and social media posts.

Bailey has decided to take the initiative. And there are some unifying threads here: House Republican Leader Jim Durkin and the 2019 gas tax hike that Durkin eventually supported.

"We've got a whole list of antiestablishment reformers who we're going to be endorsing in the next 24 hours," a top Bailey official told me late last week.

Included on the list is Sen. Win Stoller, R-East Peoria. Stoller is up against Brett Nicklaus, who is backed by House GOP Leader Iim Durkin and others close to him.


There's no love at all between Bailey and Durkin. The two clashed often when Bailey was in the House and Durkin fully backed Irvin. Both Durkin and Irvin's running mate Rep. Avery Bourne voted to double the motor fuel tax in 2019, something Bailey often pounds home on the campaign trail as the price of gas has skyrocketed. Bailey doesn't seem to have any ideas about how to repair and upgrade our woefully dilapidated infrastructure without that money, but nobody seems to care.

Bailey also endorsed Republican Don Debolt over Sen. Steve McClure, R-Springfield, who voted for the gas tax increase as well. And Bailey's backing former GOP Rep. John Cabello in his race against a candidate backed by a trade union which pushed hard to raise the gas tax. Cabello voted "No."

Kent Gray is running against Rep. Tim Butler, R-Springfield, who voted with his party leadership on the gas tax. Gray has not raised a lot of money, has a thick opposition research file and Butler hasn't taken any chances by spending big and campaigning hard. If Bailey's coattails can drag Gray across the line... whew.

Bailey's also supporting Travis Weaver against Rep. Mark Luft, R-Pekin, who wasn't around for the gas tax vote, but is backed heavily by Durkin and some unions. And he's supporting Rep. Dave Welter's opponent Jed Davis. Welter, R-Morris, is in House Republican leadership, so you already know where he was in 2019.

That was one tough vote in 2019. It took guts to take it and I still think, despite the prices, it was the right thing to do for the state's future. We'll see if Bailey tries to connect those tax dots in voters' minds or whether, as time expires, he'll just try to win these races with his personality alone. □

Illinois farmers and universities collaborate on soil health

Summer field days bring research to the farm GUESTWORK | Richard Guebert Jr., Illinois Farm Bureau president

The heat and humidity may be cranked up during the summer, but Illinois farmers are still hard at work making management decisions on their farms.

With corn and soybeans planted across the state each spring, many farmers take time in the hotter months of the year to learn about new, innovative ways they can maximize crop yields while protecting the environment. Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) supports these efforts through a series of Nutrient Stewardship Field Days each year.


Farmers care about conserving our natural resources. Preserving the soil and water quality on Illinois farms minimizes costly inputs and maximizes crop yields. Balancing production costs allows us to grow the food American families rely on, while also creating opportunities for future generations to return to the family farm.

IFB's 2022 Nutrient Stewardship Field Days are funded through the organization's Nutrient Stewardship Grant Program. The program, now in its seventh year, committed more than \$150,000 to 2022 projects and is working with 25 counties on 21 projects, including field days, throughout the state. To date, IFB has partnered with county Farm Bureaus and others on more than 100 projects across 70 Illinois counties.

So, what happens during these field days?

Field day events offer farmers the chance to share environmentally friendly tools that work well on their farms. Through research shared with their peers, researchers, universities, ag retailers and industry professionals, different types of on-farm projects can be developed to test the use of cover crops, livestock manure management, woodchip bioreactors and other technologies that improve the land. These efforts benefit surrounding communities and ultimately support our state's Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRS).

The Illinois NLRS, which was released by the Illinois Department of Agriculture and the Illinois Environmental



Protection Agency in July 2015, calls for wastewater treatment plants, urban areas and agricultural areas to reduce the state's phosphorous load by 25% and its nitrate-nitrogen load by 15% by 2025. The eventual target is a 45% reduction in the loss of these nutrients to the Mississippi River.

Field days, on-farm research and collaborative projects are all integral parts of Illinois agriculture's role in working toward the state's NLRS. IFB supports these voluntary farmer efforts by focusing on education and outreach, supporting research and implementation of best management practices, and reporting progress as it's made.

I am proud of our farmers' efforts to minimize environmental impacts in Illinois. You can learn more about the progress Illinois farmers continue to make toward NLRS goals and see a full list of 2022 Nutrient Stewardship Field Days at www.ilfb.org/FieldDays. \Box

Some politicians sell anger

Mary Miller frightens me.

Yes, I'm talking about the member of Congress from southern Illinois who is running against Rodney Davis for the Republican nomination in the 15th Congressional District.

She is not pitching policies. She is selling anger.

But I could also say the same about a whole host of candidates on the far left or far right who mix anger, pandering and rigid orthodoxies.

You may remember Miller as the person who quoted Adolf Hitler on her third day in office and said his efforts to indoctrinate the young were worthy of emulation.

It doesn't surprise me that there are people like Miller in politics. After all, I've been covering politics for more than 35 years. I've encountered plenty of cranks and conspiracy theorists during that time.

But the difference is that until recently, no one took those folks seriously. And then they began winning elections.

Today, extremists are redefining both political parties. And the country is not the better for it.

There are too many folks interested in stirring up anger but too few willing to get stuff done. The era of constructive compromise seems to be a memory of a bygone time.

My political leanings are not a secret. I believe in limited government, low taxes and protecting individual liberties. That said, I split my ticket between Republicans and Democrats in just about every election. There are good people in both parties.

I even vote for folks I often don't agree with. For example, the late Sen. Paul Simon was far more liberal than me. But he consistently earned my vote because he exhibited integrity in how he conducted himself. He was also a thoughtful individual who considered all sides of an issue.

The older I get, the more I'm convinced the key to progress is electing good people who think independently and act with integrity.

Miller is not one of those people. She is running in the Republican primary against Rodney Davis, a conservative Republican from Taylorville. By all accounts Davis knows how to bring home the bacon to his district. If he is reelected, he's in line to be a committee chair. And most folks, no matter their political persuasion, consider him to be a serious member of Congress.

But Miller, quite literally, has the Trump card. The 45th president has endorsed her and will be holding a rally for her June 25 in Quincy - three days before election day.

Miller is a member of the hard-right House Freedom Caucus along with others including Marjorie Taylor Greene, a Georgian known for comparing COVID mask mandates to steps the Nazis took to control the Jewish population during the Holocaust. Greene is said to have

lobbied Trump to endorse Miller.

Lord, help us. Miller, Greene and Lauren Boebert, the congresswoman from Colorado who falsely accused a Muslim member of Congress of being a terrorist, are card-carrying members of the Kook Klux Klan.

The 15th District was drawn by Democrats to consolidate Republican votes. Quincy is the biggest city in the horseshoe-shaped district that covers one-third of the state's counties, including much of Sangamon.

Robin Johnson, a lecturer at Monmouth College and a Democratic consultant on rural voting behaviors, lives in the 15th and perceives an angry electorate.

"I see Mary Miller and Darren Bailey signs all over the place. I sense there is a real appetite for insurgent candidates. Could Trump's visit make a difference? Yes. In a close race, it certainly could. And we know in the areas where he had rallies, he boosted his own vote totals. Whether that translates over to candidates he is campaigning for, we really don't know yet."

Davis is traditional, much like his old boss, John Shimkus. By no leap of the imagination is Davis anything but a conservative. Whether it's taxes, guns, abortion or any of the other GOP litmus tests, he comes out solidly on the right. But he has avoided the confrontational far-right politics.

In other words, he's gentlemanly with those he disagrees with. And he seeks consensus to get things done.

Miller goes for the flash. She is more about capturing headlines and soundbites than seeking legislative achievements. It is a race between hard work and Hollywood. Or maybe it's a choice between steak and sizzle.

A lot of political pundits have written Miller's candidacy off. I'm not one of them. There is a real chance she can win. She is trying to tap into a pervasive disillusionment permeating rural America.

I know of which I speak. I live in the 15th District, grew up on a hog farm and reside in a village of 650. I know rural America.

Republican consultant Patrick Pfingsten said Miller is a member of the Trump personality cult. "Miller is part of a group of people who are content on raising Cain, but never getting anything done."

He added, "And at some point, that playbook is gonna run out of plays. The dude's 76 years old and one Big Mac away from having a grabber. So, he's not gonna be around forever. And I have a really hard time believing that the party is forever in the eyes of Trump."

The question rural voters - and all of us face, is do we give into the temptation of anger or the desire to get things done? \Box

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Illinois ends cash bail

Opponents argue it will lead to an increase in crime CRIMINAL JUSTICE | Dean Olsen

The elimination of cash bail in Illinois, now about 200 days away, continues to worry Sangamon County law enforcement officials.

They fear the landmark criminal justice legislation will result in more crime even as it addresses the injustice of poor people remaining in jail pretrial while people who can afford bail are released.

The bail reform, approved by the General Assembly in January 2021 and scheduled to take effect Jan. 1, 2023, means defendants will be either held in jail without bail or released without having to post bail.

"It's anti-police, and it's a knee-jerk reaction to a false narrative," Sangamon County Sheriff Jack Campbell said about the SAFE-T Act, which stands for Safety, Accountability, Fairness and Equity-Today.

"And I think absolutely, it's going to impact our safety," Campbell said. "I don't know on Day One it's going to impact our safety, but overall, if I had a position to take, it empowers criminals."

Statements of concern aren't limited to law enforcement. Crime has become an election issue, especially as violent crime rates in Illinois and the rest of the country have risen during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Political rhetoric is intensifying daily in advance of the Democratic and Republican primaries June 28 and the Nov. 8 general election, which will determine whether Gov. JB Pritzker and fellow Democrats hold onto their super-majorities in the Illinois House and Senate. Pritzker and other Democrats have faced criticism from Republicans for the SAFE-T Act, which was passed in January 2021 and spearheaded by the Illinois Legislative Black Caucus in the wake of the May 2020 death of George Floyd at the hands of Minneapolis police.

Reformers stand their ground

Supporters of the SAFE-T Act said the current bail system in Illinois – even after statewide changes enacted in 2017 reduce bail by \$30 per day for certain charges – still unfairly penalizes Black, Hispanic and other defendants who tend to be low-income and less likely to afford bail.

"Cash bail doesn't make communities more safe," said state Sen. Elgie Sims Jr., D-Chicago, Senate sponsor of the SAFE-T Act. "I want us to be able to move to a true criminal justice system, not just a criminal legal system, and taking a holistic approach that allows for everyone to have the same access to justice regardless of where you live, what you look like or how much money you have in the bank."

He said the Sangamon County sheriff's comments left him "confused, and frankly, a bit disappointed, but not surprised."

Sims said the law wasn't a "knee-jerk" response, pointing to nine public hearings with 30 hours of testimony in the months leading up to the passage of the SAFE-T Act.

Some parts of the SAFE-T Act haven't been as controversial, such as new police training requirements and a new police officer decertification process.

New mandates for all police officers to be equipped with body cameras by 2025 have also received support, though funding has been an issue for some police departments, and police question whether officers who work behind a desk all day need body cameras.

Pretail Fairness Act draws criticism

More worrisome for law enforcement is the Pretrial Fairness Act – a part of the SAFE-T Act that includes provisions prohibiting police from arresting people for certain offenses in favor of writing a citation and setting a court date.

Many police organizations, which contended their concerns about the specifics of the SAFE-T Act weren't considered before final passage, also said eliminating the option of arrest or bail for certain offenses will result in more crime because of the possibility that those who are released pretrial will offend again.

Democratic lawmakers say law enforcement had many chances to provide testimony, and

those views were considered in the initial SAFE-T Act as well as in follow-up legislation changing and clarifying parts of the act – including new "use-of-force" restrictions – through trailer bills.

Springfield Police Chief Kenneth Scarlette said the act has "a lot of great components." He is concerned about "unintended consequences," however.

The law's changes may make criminals "emboldened" when they realize they may be less likely to be arrested or held in jail on certain charges, he said.

Scarlette worries the public may become frustrated about the restrictions on police and resort to vigilante justice.

"There's a huge unknown from my perspective as to how this radical change will play out," he said. "From a law enforcement perspective, our



goal is to get that offender off the street and hold that person accountable for what they are alleged to have committed. Our goal is to preserve the immediate safety of the citizens of Springfield."

State Sen. Steve McClure, R-Springfield, a former Sangamon County assistant state's attorney who voted against the SAFE-T Act, said the amount of bail set for defendants under the current system is based on the severity of the alleged crime and a person's criminal history.

"The purpose of the system is to get people to stop committing crimes," he said. "The more lenient you are on people, the more they will commit crimes."

The Pretrial Fairness Act sets January 2023 as the start of a new system in Illinois – the most comprehensive change by any state in the nation – in which judges must decide within 24 or 48 hours after arrest, depending on the charge, whether a defendant is jailed without bail or released pending trial.

That swift timeline requires prosecutors to gather evidence for high-stakes hearings. Critics of the SAFE-T Act said prosecutors may not have the time or resources to ensure high-risk defendants aren't released.

Moreover, the law says people charged with certain offenses eligible for probation upon conviction won't be able to be detained pretrial unless prosecutors prove they are planning to evade prosecution.

Those offenses include robbery, burglary, kidnapping, aggravated battery, witness intimidation, financial exploitation of the elderly, aggravated DUI, aggravated fleeing and eluding, and certain cases in which a firearm is discharged in a public place.

The "almost impossible" task of proving intent to evade prosecution in those cases means the law hands defendants "basically a get-out-ofjail-free card," McClure said.

"These are serious offenses that indicate a danger to the community," he said.

However, David Olson, professor of criminal justice and criminology at Loyola University Chicago, said offenses not eligible for detainment under the SAFE-T Act become detainable in certain circumstances – if a gun is used, for example.

"The devil's in the details," he said.

Olson said it's unknown how often Illinois defendants charged with offenses such as robbery, burglary or kidnapping are released without bail under current law or have their bail set low enough that they can pay it and be released soon after arrest.

Asking for changes

Campbell and officials from the Illinois Sheriffs' Association and Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police said the new law makes it more difficult for police to remove people from private property for disorderly conduct or criminal trespassing.

Police can issue a citation and a notice to

appear in court on those misdemeanor charges, but "custodial arrests" are prohibited unless the person poses an "obvious threat to the community or any person" or if their medical/ mental health" poses a risk to their own safety.

Police need more leeway to remove a person or threaten to remove him or her, said Kenny Winslow, the former Springfield police chief who now serves as deputy director of the state police chiefs' group.

Campbell, who has endorsed fellow Republican and Aurora Mayor Richard Irvin for the GOP nomination to challenge Pritzker for reelection in November, said, "Law enforcement shouldn't be this complicated."

"Imagine somebody in your front yard, or your neighbor – and this happens to us a lot – that is constantly bothering you," Campbell said. "Maybe they have a mental issue or a substance abuse issue, and you've called law enforcement and warned the person, and you have to get to work the next morning and it's 2 a.m. If they're screaming and yelling and disorderly, we issue a citation to them and drive away. How does that help you?"

Jim Kaitschuk, executive director of the Illinois Sheriffs' Association, and Ed Wojcicki, executive director of the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police, said they would like to see the General Assembly consider modifications to the law during its veto session in November and early December or during a brief "lame duck" session in early January.

The sheriffs' group continues to advocate for a full repeal of the SAFE-T Act and a redo of the legislation, while the chiefs' association pushes for tweaks.

Kaitschuk and Wojcicki both want to see the new changes in bail delayed because sections of the law are confusing and because it's uncertain the court system will be ready.

"You've got state's attorneys, judges, law enforcement that are all trying, still, to figure out exactly how this is going to come into play Jan. 1," Kaitschuk said.

Wojcicki said, "The system could put a lot of innocent citizens at risk."

Winslow added, "There is no perfect system, but we don't want to make it more lenient for these violent offenders to get out."

Sims, however, said the role "judicial discretion" will play in pretrial release shouldn't be minimized.

"The judge, as the person closest to the case, is evaluating the facts ... and reviewing the person's total record and is given the discretion to make a determination about whether a person should be held in custody and the conditions of their release, if they are released," he said.

New expenses for prosecutors


Sangamon County State's Attorney Dan Wright is requesting an increase of between 8.4% and 11.4% in his office's annual \$4 million budget to beef up his staff to handle new requirements

in the SAFE-T Act. He estimated the increase in legal, secretarial and other staff would cost between \$338,000 and \$456,000 annually.

"We have made the personnel requests of the County Board necessary to put my office in the best position to keep violent offenders off of our streets despite the significantly increased volume of work and expedited timelines imposed by the new law," Wright said.

"These changes, while well-intentioned, will strain the already limited resources of state's attorneys and public defenders across Illinois," he said.

"My concerns relate to the potential public safety impacts of unfunded mandates and unintended consequences," he said. "Nonetheless, the Sangamon County State's Attorney's Office will continue the fight against violent crime in our community regardless of any legislation that may emerge from the Statehouse."

It's unclear whether the General Assembly is interested in appropriating money to help counties cover the additional costs associated with high-stakes hearings one or two days after arrest.

No one so far has totaled the expected countylevel costs associated with the SAFE-T Act across the state. Sims said lawmakers will analyze the expenses before deciding what the legislature's role should be in helping counties comply.

The Sangamon County Sheriff's Office, which has a \$22 million annual budget, expects to lose about \$100,000 annually from the \$30 fees it charges inmates who post bail to cover fingerprinting, photographing and other expenses, Campbell said. But the sheriff said the loss of revenue isn't the reason he wants the SAFE-T Act repealed.

Other preparations underway

The Illinois Supreme Court is preparing to assist counties with the pretrial expenses of monitoring and arranging support services for defendants released while awaiting trial.

For years, counties with pretrial services have been able to receive reimbursement from the state for staff salaries, but not for the cost of benefits. Sangamon County is among counties that share about \$17 million annually in those reimbursements, according to Cara LeFevour Smith, director of the Supreme Court's Office of Statewide Pretrial Services.

The high court and the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts will spend about \$26 million in additional state funding in fiscal 2023 to station state employees in 68 counties – including Christian, Menard and Logan – to provide pretrial services, she said.

Sangamon County already offers pretrial services, but many of the 68 counties don't offer the array of services in the larger counties to make sure defendants show up for court hearings, comply with pretrial release restrictions and receive services to deal with issues such as substance-use disorder.

Illinois' Pretrial Services Act in 1987 required

each judicial circuit to establish a pretrial services agency, but a lack of funding prevented some circuits from complying with the mandate, Smith said.

The SAFE-T Act will bring "significant changes," including the potential for more people to be out of jail while their cases are pending, she said. The act will make "the existence of robust, comprehensive and supportive pretrial services throughout Illinois more important than ever," she said.

Smith said her office is working with "incredible gusto" to hire about 120 new employees for the system who will work in the counties and in technical support roles.

Judges, prosecutors and court personnel throughout the state have questions on how to carry out the Pretrial Fairness Act and deal with some ambiguous parts of the law, according to retired 23rd Circuit Judge Robbin Stuckert of Sycamore.

The Pretrial Practices Implementation Task Force has six subcommittees working to provide judges and county-level officials background and education, and come up with strategies for communicating with the public about all the changes, Stuckert said.

The task force also is working to start pilot sites, where some parts of the law can be tested before the January start date, in the counties of Franklin, Gallatin, Hancock, McDonough and Kane, she said.

An online town hall meeting on the changes has been scheduled June 23 at 4 p.m., Stuckert said. The Zoom link is available at bit. ly/3MAXqvS.

Stuckert said there "continues to be significant

misinformation about some provisions of the SAFE-T Act, including that the act will prohibit police from arresting or jailing people charged with serious violent criminal offenses, which it does not."

Sims, the SAFE-T Act sponsor, attributed this misinformation to statements by Republican lawmakers and other opponents of the law.

"This is what happens when you politicize public safety," he said.

McClure, however, said anecdotal reports of violent crimes committed by defendants in Cook County who were released on reduced bail amounts after changes in the Chicago area in 2017 indicate the SAFE-T Act could trigger a crime wave statewide.

He pointed to the crime blog CWBChicago, which has chronicled the activities of repeat offenders out on bail. The site can be reached at bit.ly/CWBChicago1. The blog says it was created in 2013 by five residents of Chicago neighborhoods who had "grown disheartened with inaccurate information being provided at local Community Policing (CAPS) meetings." The site says it has "no corporate sponsors and no backing by foundations or political groups."

Sims said critics of the SAFE-T Act often fail to consider that the COVID-19 pandemic, economic unrest, "threats on our democracy" and a "racial reckoning" – all occurring simultaneously – have fueled a rise in crime in Illinois and nationwide.

Disagreement over the research

Sims said studies of bail reform efforts in Cook County and in other states, including New York and New Jersey, have failed to connect those efforts with an increase in violent crime.

Sims' statement was backed up by Matt Alsdorf, associate director of the Center for Effective Public Policy in Kensington, Maryland, and crime researchers at Loyola University Chicago.

"Illinois is being a leader in this field," Alsdorf said. "It is certainly ahead of the curve in this trend." He said bail systems generally don't provide "good outcomes" in protecting public safety.

Defendants' lives and livelihoods are destabilized by unnecessary pretrial jail time, and multiple studies indicate release on bail doesn't assure better rates of appearance in court or lawabiding conduct before trial, Alsdorf said.

The Center for Effective Public Policy, which is supported financially by Arnold Ventures, a nonprofit philanthropic organization, is assisting the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts on an unpaid basis to implement the Pretrial Fairness Act.

McClure said he and other Republicans disagree with Sims and Alsdorf. Republicans have seen problems with bail-reform efforts in other states, he said.

He noted that a 2020 study by University of Utah professors concluded that changes in pretrial release procedures in Cook County led to a 45% increase in crimes committed by defendants released before trial.

"And, more concerning, the number of pretrial releasees who were charged with committing new violent crimes increased by about 33%," Utah law professor Paul Cassell and economics professor Richard Fowles wrote in their research paper.

The Cook County bail reform didn't eliminate cash bail but led to a slight increase in the likelihood of pretrial release for defendants and reductions in bail amounts for many offenses, according to Olson.

The Utah study contradicted a statistical review published in 2019 by Timothy Evans, chief judge of Cook County. McClure said Evans' review was biased and that Alsdorf is biased.

Evans said the Cook County bail reform has "allowed more defendants to remain in their communities prior to trial, where they can work, pursue their education and support their families. The vast majority of released defendants appear in court for all hearings. Bail reform has not led to an increase in violent crime in Chicago."

Cassell and Fowles said their conclusion differed from Evans' because they "properly analyzed" the Cook County data.

They added that the Cook County bail reforms "rely on a public safety assessment" developed with the assistance of Arnold Ventures. The Arnold Ventures risk assessment tool has been used in more than 25 other jurisdictions, including three statewide programs, in bail-reform efforts.

"If Cook County's bail reforms have produced additional crimes, then many other jurisdictions may have suffered similar harmful consequences," Cassell and Fowles wrote.

Researchers at Loyola University Chicago's Center for Criminal Justice Research, Policy and Practice reached a different conclusion. They performed an independent analysis of the Cook County data that was released in November 2020. The analysis reached essentially the same conclusions as Evans' review.

The study by Loyola's Don Stemen and Olson said they found the 2017 bail reform "increased the number of people released pretrial and was not associated with any significant change in new criminal activity, violent or otherwise, and was not associated with any change in the amount of crime in Chicago after 2017.

According to the study, 77% of Cook County defendants were released pretrial before the reform – by either being discharged from jail with no bail or with bail they paid immediately or in a few days, in most cases. After the reform, 81% of defendants were released pretrial.

Both before and after reform, the same share of defendants - 17% - had a new criminal case filed against them while on pretrial release.

The share of those defendants released pretrial who had a new violent criminal case filed against them was also the same before and after reform in Cook County – 3% – though the raw number was slightly higher after reform, according to Olson.

It's unclear whether the elimination of cash bail in Illinois will produce the same results, Olson said, noting that the SAFE-T Act makes broader changes in arrest and detainment

policies.

It's possible that the SAFE-T Act will lead to more people charged with certain types of crimes being released sooner, while other defendants, such as those charged with domestic abuse, might be more likely to be detained pretrial without bail, he said.

Campbell called the bail reforms about to begin in Illinois "a big experiment. Where we go from here will probably be determined by the crime rates after this goes into effect."

Alsdorf said, "I would not describe this as an experiment. There is a lot in this law that is backed by the research."

Shelly Heideman, executive director of Faith Coalition for the Common Good, which involves Springfield-area faith congregations, nonprofits and labor unions in advocating for racial equity, said the coalition supports the SAFE-T Act and doesn't think it will lead to a spike in crime.

Heideman said she isn't surprised by the resistance from law enforcement. "They take the 'tough-on-crime' approach," she said. "From our perspective, it's a racial-justice issue and economic-justice issue."

McClure said the Faith Coalition "is not an unbiased group. It is a Democratic group that buses people in from Chicago for their partisan events in Springfield."

He said the Loyola study was biased, as well, and he called it a "hit piece for one side" that was "driven by ideology." Olson denied McClure's allegations.

Tweaks in SAFE-T Act possible

Sims said he and other members of the Black Caucus continue to talk with law enforcement officials about their concerns and consider potential changes to the law.

"We're willing to talk about anything," except for repeal of the law, he said.

Wojcicki, the police chiefs association executive director, said, "We're pleased that the door to communications is open."

Sims said the law "doesn't, in any way, handcuff officers. It frees them up to address true threats to public safety."

And as for the possibility of delaying the Jan. 1 start of bail reform - something that law enforcement groups would welcome – Sims said, "Right now, I don't see that happening."

He said Illinois is "being seen as a national leader because of how far we've gone, but also because of how comprehensively we've addressed our criminal justice system.

"Several of my colleagues from around the country, Democrat and Republican, have lauded our work and how bold we were in undertaking this task and the manner in which we got the work done."

Ragtime is a good time

At the Muni, a melting pot of people and dreams

"You are a complacent man with no thought of history. You have traveled everywhere and learned nothing." Younger Brother, Ragtime

The Springfield Muni Opera's production of the Tony Award-winning *Ragtime, the Musical* (book by Terrence McNally, music by Stephen Flaherty, lyrics by Lynn Ahrens), is a profound civics and history lesson told through captivating performances and soaring vocals. Tackling themes of wealth disparity, discrimination and cruelty at the hands of those in power, it is also an affirmation of how much since that time, sadly, has yet to change for the better.

Based on the 1975 novel of the same name by E.L. Doctorow, *Ragtime* is told through the perspectives of three families in America at the turn of the 20th century, as it intersects the lives of a wealthy white couple, an African American ragtime musician, and a Latvian Jewish immigrant father and his daughter in pursuit of the American Dream. These fictional characters and their storylines are brought into historical focus by the introduction of real-life figures prominent in early the 1900s, including anarchist Emma Goldman, moguls Henry Ford and J.P. Morgan, educator and reformer Booker T. Washington, controversial entertainer Evelyn Nesbit (whose infamous swing is, unfortunately, absent in this production) and escape-artist Harry Houdini, among others. The melding of real and imagined characters who all share their stories, create a tale of the American experience as diverse as those who lived it.

The opening number is a melting pot of people and dreams as characters emerge to introduce themselves and tell their stories to the audience. Over the course of the show, this theme continues, as music and speech feature prominently and help paint a picture of dreams deferred, hearts broken and lives shattered. Hope and optimism live, too, but it is against an ever-present backdrop of injustice and intolerance. The line quoted at the beginning of this article was met by spontaneous applause and it was hard not to be struck by it.

With over 30 songs that range from

vaudeville, to ballads, to jazz, the cast and orchestra delivers. Michael Wallace as "Coalhouse Walker, Jr." is an effortless and passionate powerhouse; Sara Goeckner as "Mother" is empathetic and refined; Daniel Maughan is riveting as the desperate and frustrated father, "Tateh;" Anna McFarland as "Evelyn Nesbit" brings comic relief that's ultimately wrapped in a tragic package; and Karen Gerdes commands the stage whenever she's on it as "Emma Goldman." Keagan Eck turns in an honest performance as a curious "Little Boy" and Tanner Stephens as "Younger Brother" is effective as someone searching for his purpose in a frustrating world. Jeremy Goeckner as "Father" and Tiffany Williams as "Sarah" also deserve mention for turning in impressive performances. The entire ensemble brings their best and are supported by a hardworking crew that keeps the scenes moving from one to the next.

Director Reggie Guyton and his creative team are to be lauded for assembling and leading a dedicated cast and crew, committed to telling this story even while riding a wave of last-minute challenges. Their success is evidenced not only by the

resulting production but also by being an inspiring example of the adage, "The show must go on!" Example: Due to unforeseen circumstances, and within 48 hours of opening night, three cast members were no longer able to perform in either some shows, or the entire run. With 24-48 hours to rehearse and prepare, impromptu understudies took to the stage, without scripts or scores in hand, and showed their mettle. Same for the entire cast and crew who had to adjust to and embrace new performers after they had already formed bonds with and gotten acclimated to their castmates through weeks of rehearsal. And all of this occurred during a tech week with oppressive heat and humidity. I assure you, this was no small feat, but the entire production rose to the challenge. Bravo. □

What I learned at summer camp

Cooking for 160? Here's my survival guide.

"Oh my goodness! What have I gotten myself into this time?" It's 5 a.m. and the sun is about to rise. I'm in the Pacific Northwest working as a head cook at a summer camp for kids. In about three hours, I have to have breakfast ready for 120 campers and 40 staff. After I clean up from breakfast, it will be time to start on lunch. After cleaning up from lunch, I'll have to move on to making dinner.

I've never cooked for more than 20 people at a time and now I'm working alone. The title "Head Cook" implies that I have a crew of cooks and dishwashers helping me, but due to the post-pandemic labor shortages, none of those positions have been filled yet. I'm overwhelmed and on the verge of a meltdown.

I retired from dentistry and began a second career as a chef 3 ¹/₂ years ago. My previous cooking jobs have been as a prep cook and line cook in fine-dining restaurants. I'm 69 years old now and wanted the experience of running my own kitchen by the time I turned 70. Camp Zanika gave me the opportunity.

Despite the enormity of the job, I'm in a heavenly place. My kitchen window looks out over Lake Wenatchee and beyond that, the Cascade Mountains. Babbling brooks course through the camp. I take my dog for walks in the woods and return with morels by the bagful. The nearest town is 25 miles away, leaving the night sky unblemished by the lights of civilization.

I came to the job with the naive intention of networking with local farmers and serving the kids and staff fresh vegetables and free-range poultry. The truth is, with so much food to prepare, I'm often having to rely on canned, frozen and dehydrated food products. And, believe it or not, the local health department frowns on using "free-range" chickens and prefers that I instead use chickens from the large-scale poultry processors.

As if cooking for 160 weren't hard enough, I have to accommodate a myriad of dietary restrictions. I have to make gluten-free options. I have to offer lactose-free dishes. I have to accommodate vegetarians and vegans. Some of the omnivores won't eat red meat. If I try to simplify things and do all plant-based menus, the meat-eaters complain. If I put butter in the mashed potatoes, the vegans complain. If I thicken a sauce with a little flour, the glutenintolerant people get sick. Each week brings a new group of campers and the numbers of dietary restrictions change. It's driving me crazy.

As much as I'd like to put thought and effort into serving every person's dietary needs and preferences, the volume and time restraints I'm dealing with make it difficult. I often don't find out about a dietary restriction until the last minute and have to come up with something quickly (or, as we say in the restaurant biz, "on the fly"). We always keep packages of tofu and a few thawed chicken breasts in the refrigerator for these situations. But what is more boring than plain tofu and chicken?

The strategy I've employed, with great success, is having a few different vinaigrettes prepared ahead. Vinaigrettes are usually associated with salads, but have wider applications as a flavoring component for meats, fish and plain proteins. If I'm serving a meat-based main course and have to come up with a vegetarian option at the last minute, I can quickly pan-fry slices of tofu to a golden brown and dress them up with an herb vinaigrette. I'm frequently told that that it's the best tofu they've ever had. The same strategy can be used to take any otherwise boring dish from bland to exciting.

In her best-selling book (and Netflix series) Salt Fat Acid Heat, Samin Norstrat writes about when, as a novice cook at Berkeley's Chez Panisse, a chef would taste her food and tell her that it needed a little more acid or fat. We all can tell when something needs more salt, but acid and fat are often-overlooked flavor enhancers. Acid can really "brighten" up a dish. Many restaurants keep a squeeze bottle of fresh lemon juice on the line to add to a dish before it is served. Certain flavor components are soluble in fat rather than water, and a drizzle of good olive oil can make these flavors pop out.

A vinaigrette is made by vigorously mixing oil and a mild acid together and creating an emulsion. Normally vinegar and oil won't mix, but the addition of an emulsifier, such as a dab of mustard, will keep the vinaigrette from separating, at least temporarily. A classic French vinaigrette is three parts oil to one part acid. I use this ratio for dressing a salad. If I'm dressing meat or cooked vegetables and want more acidity, I'll use a 2:1 or 1:1 ratio of oil to acid. The choices of acid include citrus juices and vinegars. I like to include minced shallot, garlic or chives and often chopped herbs, such as parsley, dill or tarragon.

Roasted Shallot Vinaigrette

This vinaigrette is good on grilled vegetables and crispy fried tofu.

Ingredients

- 4 small shallots, minced
- 1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 1/2 tablespoons sherry or white wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard 1/4 cup flat-leaf parsley Salt and freshly ground pepper

Preparation

In a small saucepan, cook the shallots in the olive oil over low heat until translucent, but not browned. Take the pan off the heat and allow to cool.

Put the mustard in a small jar and mix in the vinegar. Add the olive oil and shallots, chopped parsley, a pinch of salt and pepper. Put the lid on the jar and shake vigorously.

Lemongrass Ginger Cilantro Vinaigrette

This vinaigrette is delicious on grilled tofu, chicken, or fish.

Ingredients

- 1 bunch of fresh cilantro
- 1 1/2 tablespoons grated or finely minced
- lemongrass
- 2 cloves grated or minced garlic
- 1-inch piece fresh ginger, peeled and grated or minced
- 2 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1 teaspoon fine sea salt
- 1/2 cup rice bran or canola oil
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil
- diced Thai bird chili, to taste (or substitute a dash of chili garlic sauce)

Preparation

Finely chop the cilantro, including the stems. Place in a bowl.

Remove the tough outer 2 layers of a stalk of lemongrass. Finely mince or grate the lemongrass into the bowl with a microplane grater. Add the garlic, ginger and chili.

Put the mustard in a jar and stir in the vinegar, water, lime juice, and salt. Add the oils and shake vigorously.


Pour into the bowl with the chopped cilantro, lemon grass, garlic and ginger. Stir to incorporate.

BULLETIN BOARD | There is such a thing as a free ride

W.E. Sullivan, owner of a bridge construction company in Roodhouse, visited the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago, where he marveled at the original Ferris wheel designed by George W. G. Ferris, who also owned a bridge company. Sullivan was determined to build a wheel of his own and debuted his first, Big Eli, in Jacksonville's Central Park on May 23, 1900. That wheel was a success and in 1906 Sullivan incorporated his Eli Bridge Company and took on capital investors in order to mass produce his wheels. In 1919, a new factory was built in Jacksonville where it has been doing business ever since. Later, the company produced its first non-wheel amusement ride, The Scrambler. Today, Eli Bridge amusement ride products can be found worldwide and are traditional attractions at parks, county fairs, festivals and carnivals. The original Big Eli wheel is displayed in front of the factory, but visitors can get a free ride on the operating version of Big Eli in Jacksonville's Community Park every Sunday through the summer and early autumn, weather permitting. elibridge.com.




