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Supportive housing project to break ground

Development receives city council approval despite opposition from alderman, neighbors

Construction is expected to begin in August on 22 west-side apartment units for previously homeless people after the Springfield City Council voted to support the project with \$800,000 in federal grant funds.

Advocates for the homeless said they were grateful that the council voted in favor of the federal funding for Park Avenue Residences at 3526 S. Park Ave.

“There’s certainly a need in our community,” Marjorie King, president of the board of Helping Hands of Springfield, told *Illinois Times*. “There’s not enough affordable housing for clients in the area.”


But Ward 7 Ald. Joe McMenamain, in whose ward the two-story, three-building complex will be constructed – and the only council member to vote against the project July 5 – said tenants of the project will be in danger because they will live along a relatively narrow road with no sidewalks, inadequate lighting and no public transportation stops for at least half a mile.

“It doesn’t make any sense to me,” he said. “This is a very bad location to put chronically homeless individuals. ... They’re going to be walking around in cold weather trying to get to mass transit.”

However, King and Annie Lantgen, director of administration and interim executive director of Helping Hands, said the nonprofit will provide intensive case management to all clients of the complex in a model known as “supportive housing.”

They said caseworkers will transport clients – who probably won’t have their own cars – to counseling appointments, doctor’s visits and grocery stores, so public transportation won’t be essential.

McMenamin said it’s unrealistic to think the

tenants will never venture outside on their own.

Supportive housing allows tenants to pay no more than 30% of their income for rent. Helping Hands, which already manages 24 supportive-housing units in Sangamon County, covers the rest of the rent and sometimes utilities.

Park Avenue Residences will be focused on “health and housing stability for seniors and veterans who have a disability and are experiencing chronic homelessness,” a Helping Hands news release said.

There already are 187 people in the community waiting for a supportive housing unit, King said. She is treasurer of another Springfield-based nonprofit, Deerfield Reserves, that will own the property after construction is complete in summer 2023.

Seven council members voted in favor of the project. Ward 2 Ald. Shawn Gregory voted “present” and Ward 4 Ald. John Fulgenzi was absent. Mayor Jim Langfelder didn’t vote but has supported the project, which previously received zoning approval from the council.

The city has annexed the site, previously in unincorporated Woodside Township.

Mike Niehaus, owner and president of Windsor Homes, purchased the site and received zoning approval from the City Council in 2021 when he initially planned to construct market-rate, privately owned apartments.

About 80 neighborhood residents signed a petition opposing the site prior to the zoning change, based on concerns about lack of infrastructure to support the density of the project.

Neighbors have expressed additional opposition since learning the proposed use for the site, which was not discussed during the rezoning process. Niehaus said he changed his plans when Helping Hands approached him after zoning approval was granted.

King said Helping Hands plans to reach out to neighbors soon. “We definitely will partner with the community as much as we can,” she said.

The project will be entirely government-funded.

The Illinois Housing Development Authority, a quasi-state agency, announced in January that the project will be financed with almost \$6 million in funding from the state

and federal government and from Helping Hands, which is getting its share from the additional federal funds recently approved by City Council.

Of the total, \$500,000 will come from the IHDA Trust Fund, which may not need to be repaid, according to an IHDA spokesman. Another \$4.7 million will come through a grant from IHDA, and \$800,000 will come from Helping Hands.

Niehaus will be paid \$180,000 for land acquisition, and \$4.3 million will be spent for construction. That works out to \$188,926 for each of the 23 units in the complex. There will be 22 units for clients and one unit for the complex’s manager. There will also be a community space on the first floor of one of the complex’s buildings.

Fees for lawyers and engineers, financing and other non-construction costs total \$534,000. Niehaus said those costs are required as part of government funding for the project.

Ownership of the site will be transferred from Niehaus to Helping Hands and then to Deerfield Reserves. Langten said Deerfield Reserves was formed after Helping Hands realized it wanted to delegate the specialized task of owning and running an apartment complex to another organization.

The cost-per-unit for Park Avenue Residences is related to the high cost of building materials, energy-efficiency measures and other features required in a government-funded project, Niehaus said. □

Editor’s note

In the wake of the Highland Park mass shooting, Illinois, with a reputation for having tough gun laws, has joined the rest of the nation in looking for answers. Darren Bailey, Republican candidate for governor, quickly called a press conference to say Illinois already has a red flag law, but in the case of the shooter Robert Crimo, it hadn’t been enforced. Reporters were quick to criticize Bailey, who didn’t have all his facts right, and he was dismissed as just another Republican trying to avoid tougher gun laws. Now, closer examination of Crimo’s prior run-ins with police shows that time after time law enforcement gave this troubled youth the benefit of the doubt, to let him keep his access to guns (see story on page 6). If Bailey and other pols focus on smarter law enforcement that shifts the benefit of the doubt from iffy individuals to the rest of us, that will be progress in this important debate. —Fletcher Farrar

Crisis intervention expands

Co-responder program pairs mental health workers with police

A 59-year-old Springfield woman described her life as “pure hell” before a community outreach worker from Memorial Behavioral Health helped her 40-year-old son get medication and counseling for his bipolar and schizoaffective disorders.

“Ever since then, everything has been much better,” said the woman, who operates a nail salon and asked to be identified only as Ashley.

The woman’s son, who lives with her in an apartment and was unemployed, increasingly was having emotional outbursts and threatened her with violence.

Police who were called to the apartment several times but never made any arrests, made use of the Springfield Police Department’s co-responder program, in which mental health professionals are dispatched later to look into ways of preventing violence and entry into the criminal-justice system.

In the program, a partnership between the Springfield Police Department and MBH, the professionals use de-escalation techniques and try to get people treatment they may have found difficult to access otherwise.

The program’s use of part-time mental health specialists will expand this fall to two full-time specialists who will ride along with police as they respond to calls. The expansion will be funded by a three-year, \$532,492 grant awarded in January by the U.S. Department of Justice.

The program is expected to expand further through a bill signed into law by Gov. JB Pritzker in May creating the Co-Responders Pilot Program statewide. The state’s budget for the fiscal year that began July 1 allocates \$10 million for pilot programs in Springfield, Peoria, East St. Louis and Waukegan.

It’s still unclear how much money the Springfield program will receive as a result of House Bill 4736, according to state Rep. Sue Scherer, D-Decatur.

“When law enforcement and social-service agencies work together, our communities are safer and better supported,” she said. “The Co-Responders Pilot Program will help vulnerable residents get the support they need while helping law enforcement police in a way that is both safe and compassionate.”

Sara Anderson, MBH manager of community engagement and care coordination, said the current co-responder program formally began in Springfield in 2019 and received financial support from the Springfield Memorial Health Foundation

Before that, Southern Illinois University School of Medicine worked with Springfield police to operate a temporary program.

MBH specialists such as Jamie Riedle, who assisted Ashley’s son, meet with clients and their families, who tend to be in poverty and may have needs beyond mental health, such as food insecurity and transportation challenges, Anderson said.

“We literally and figuratively meet them where they’re at, providing immediate crisis stabilization in addition to linking to ongoing resources to maintain stability in the community,” she said. “We serve the complex cases.”

Anderson said she has seen the program’s interventions reduce homelessness, unnecessary hospitalizations and the need for police to be involved in clients’ lives.

The need for the program has only grown during the COVID-19 pandemic, which has resulted in more stress and anxiety for everyone and especially those with mental illness, she said.

MBH has been working to bring mental health services to everyone, especially those in crisis, Anderson said. Mobile Crisis Response, an MBH program, recently expanded services to include both adults and children in Sangamon, Menard, Morgan, Scott, Logan, Mason and Christian counties.

Mobile Crisis Response previously served only children covered by Medicaid who were

experiencing a mental health crisis, Memorial officials said.

Schools, police or members of the public who call the MCR team at 217-788-7070 can obtain telehealth or an in-person response to a crisis, officials said.

MBH could see increased demand due to another innovation – a national health emergency 988 referral number similar to 911 – that is scheduled to go live on July 16, Anderson said.

Anderson said: “Police officers are often the first point of contact for those experiencing a traumatic event or a behavioral and emotional crisis or emergency. This partnership will allow our trained mental health professionals to assist our officers and community quicker, with a goal of creating a more sustainable pathway to support and treatment.”

Being able to have MBH specialists respond alongside police will make the co-responder program even better.

“It allows us to be there in the moment,” she said.

Springfield Police Sgt. Matt Doss, supervisor of neighborhood policing, said police appreciate all the help.

“We like to think of ourselves as problem-solvers, and this gives us the resources to solve the problem,” he said.

Ashley, the Springfield mother, said she moved to Springfield from Turkey in 2000, and her son moved from Turkey to be with her in 2012. Both are naturalized U.S. citizens.

Ashley said her son was taking medicine in Turkey that helped to manage his mental health conditions but stopped taking the medicine after he moved to America.

She said she didn’t know how to get her son help until Riedle stepped in. She helped connect him with an SIU psychiatrist, who prescribed medicine that has been effective.

Riedle also linked the man with the Illinois Department of Human Services’ Division of Rehabilitative Services. The state helped him get a job with a cleaning service that he said he enjoys.

Ashley said her son’s demeanor is much more stable, leading to less anxiety for him and for her.

“He’s back on track,” Ashley said.

She said she considers Riedle part of her family, and she is grateful for the help from MBH, SIU and the police.

“God sent them here,” Ashley said. “I really believe God has a plan for everybody.” □

CEO of HSHS Illinois Division resigns after three months

Joseph Mullany's most recent positions were also short-lived

The president and chief executive officer of Hospital Sisters Health System's Illinois division has resigned after less than three months on the job.

HSHS spokeswoman Johanna Moll confirmed the resignation of Joseph J. Mullany in response to an inquiry from *Illinois Times*.

Moll didn't answer follow-up questions, such as the reason for Mullany's resignation from a job he began on April 25 overseeing the health system's Illinois operations.

A July 5 memo from HSHS President and CEO Damond Boatwright that was obtained by *IT* said Mullany's resignation, effective immediately, was "due to a family situation." No other details were provided.

"We wish him well moving forward," Boatwright said in his memo to the HSHS Illinois Hospital Boards of Directors and the HSHS Illinois Hospital Foundation Boards of Directors. "Please keep Joe and his family in your thoughts and prayers."

The memo also said, "Joe's direct reports will now report to me as we start the search for a new HSHS Illinois president and CEO."

Mullany, who is in his mid-50s, couldn't be reached for comment.

The nonprofit Catholic health system, based near Riverton, operates the system's flagship, 422-bed HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield, as well as eight Catholic hospitals in the Illinois communities of O'Fallon, Breese, Decatur, Effingham, Greenville, Highland, Litchfield and Shelbyville, and six hospitals in Wisconsin.

The HSHS Illinois hospitals posted combined revenues of almost \$1.4 billion in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021.

St. John's posted \$598.9 million in revenues and \$27.8 million in revenues exceeding expenses, or a profit margin of 4.6%, according to the system's financial statements.

Mullany told *Springfield Business Journal* in an interview published June 1 that he found the people of Springfield and central Illinois "very welcoming, very friendly" and that he was looking forward to "making some life-long friends and being active in the community."

The native of western Massachusetts said HSHS was "a really heavily inpatient-driven organization." He told *SBJ* he hoped to expand the system's "ambulatory platform" — its outpatient services — "over the next several years."

Mullany told *SBJ* he first became a hospital CEO at age 30 and held management jobs at Detroit Medical Center, Bayfront Health System in Florida and most recently, Vassar Brothers Medical Center in Poughkeepsie, New York.

Accompanying the "Q & A" interview was a photo of Mullany with his wife, Cori, and their three daughters, ages 13, 20 and 22.

Mullany was fired as president of not-for-profit Vassar Brothers in July 2020 after holding the position for less than a year, according to a story in the *Poughkeepsie Journal*.

The story didn't say why he was terminated. *IT* hasn't received a response from Nuvance Health, Vassar Brothers' parent organization, to questions about Mullany's departure.

Mullany was hired by the Poughkeepsie hospital in January 2020, two months before the COVID-19 pandemic hit the region

between New York City and Albany served by the hospital, the *Journal* reported. His termination was reported in late July 2020.

The newspaper said Mullany "helped transform parts of the hospital into COVID units that have taken in over a hundred cases."

Before that, Mullany was regional president and CEO of a regional network of seven for-profit hospitals in Florida operated at the time by Tennessee-based Community Health Systems.

He was with Bayfront Health from February 2018 until his resignation in August 2019, according to a story in the *Tampa Bay Times*.

The *Times* story said Mullany, who left after 18 months on the job, was responsible for strategic development. During that time, he became acting chief executive of the system's flagship hospital, Bayfront Health St. Petersburg.

According to *Times* stories, he and other system leaders faced questions from the St. Petersburg City Council and unionized nurses about the hospital's finances, staffing levels and the quality of care it was providing to the needy. The hospital sits on city-owned land.

Mullany defended the 480-bed hospital against the criticisms, the *Times* reported. His resignation came two weeks after the contentious St. Petersburg council meeting.

A company spokeswoman said at the time, "We appreciate Joe's leadership and contributions over the last 18 months and wish him well."

Community Health Systems officials didn't respond to a request for comment from *IT*.

Mullany came to Bayfront Health after serving four years as CEO of Detroit Medical Center, a for-profit, eight-hospital system owned by Tenet Healthcare.

His tenure included the opening of the \$42 million Children's Hospital of Michigan, as well as joint investigations of Detroit Medical Center by state and federal officials.

The investigations in 2016 followed a *Detroit News* series about "decades of complaints about improperly sterilized instruments," according to a *News* story.

The *News* reported Mullany's "departure" as CEO in February 2017.

About the time the *News* series was published, Mullany faced another challenge when "talks broke down to extend a clinical services and administrative relationship with Wayne State University School of Medicine to extend its long-term clinical services and administrative relationship," according to a *News* story.

The *News* reported: "Mullany kept a low profile following the surgical instrument scandal, repeatedly refusing to discuss it with *The Detroit News*. In interviews with Crain's *Detroit Business*, though, he suggested the controversy was overblown and the DMC was victimized by the articles.

"He insisted the DMC was in the process of fixing the problems when the articles hit," according to a *News* story. "Even so, the hospital system was cited by state and federal regulators with numerous infractions following publication of the articles." □

FOID, red flags and restraining orders: How state laws regulate firearm purchases

Highland Park shooter was able to buy assault weapon despite previous police run-ins

A mass shooting in Highland Park at a Fourth of July parade prompted questions about how the suspect was able to obtain a gun in a state with some of the strictest gun laws in the nation.

Law enforcement officials have said that the Highland Park shooting suspect, Robert Crimo III, 21, legally purchased and possessed the Smith & Wesson M&P 15 that he used in the attack that left at least seven dead and dozens injured.

Gun laws in Illinois regulate the purchase and possession of guns and ammunition. In order to legally possess a gun, the owner must have a Firearm Owners Identification Card.

Despite the existence of two previous reports regarding apparent suicidal and homicidal tendencies exhibited by Crimo, he obtained a FOID card and was legally allowed to purchase weapons and ammunition.

In April 2019, Highland Park police responded to a call that Crimo attempted to commit suicide with a machete one week prior. The report also stated that it was handled by “mental health professionals.”

In September 2019, police returned to the home in response to a report that Crimo was using drugs, was depressed and had threatened to “kill everyone.”

Crimo and his mother denied that account. Highland Park police initially confiscated 16 knives and one sword. No one was arrested, and Crimo’s father claimed ownership of the knives, which police later returned to him.

At that time, Highland Park police completed a “Clear and Present Danger” form. The form states that clear and present danger reporting shall be used by Illinois State Police to identify individuals who, if granted access to a firearm or ammunition, pose an actual, imminent threat of substantial bodily harm to themselves or others.

The Illinois State Police Firearms Services Bureau, the administrator of the FOID card program, determines whether the subject of the clear and present danger report possesses a FOID card or has a pending application. At the time, Crimo had neither.

But three months after the September 2019 visit from Highland Park Police, Crimo did apply for a FOID card. Because at that time he was still under the age of 21, he



needed a sponsor for approval. His father signed the application, state police have said.

After Crimo submitted his application, a background check would be initiated to determine whether there were any circumstances that prohibited him from gun ownership.

Illinois law allows state police to deny an application for a FOID card, or to revoke or seize a FOID card, if they find that the current or prospective cardholder is subject to any of the following disqualifications:

- Is under 21 years of age and has been convicted of a misdemeanor or found to be a delinquent;
- Has been convicted of a felony under the laws of Illinois or any other jurisdiction;
- Is addicted to narcotics;
- Has been a patient of a mental health facility within the past five years;
- Is mentally or developmentally disabled;
- Has been involuntarily committed to a mental health facility;
- Intentionally made a false statement on the FOID card application;
- Has been convicted within the past five years of battery, assault, aggravated assault, or violation of a protective order in which a firearm was used or possessed;
- Has been convicted of domestic battery or aggravated domestic battery.

If Crimo would have had a FOID card or had a pending application at the time Highland Park police filed the clear and present danger form, analysts would have had to determine if there was a preponderance of evidence – a burden of proof that is met

when it is determined that there is a greater than 50% chance the claim is true – to issue a clear and present danger determination.

Crimo had no previous criminal convictions on his adult record. His only conviction was for possession of tobacco by a minor when he was 16 years old. Under Illinois law, juvenile convictions are sealed.

Despite the two calls to Highland Park police including the suicide attempt and the threat of violence, Illinois State Police Director Brendan Kelly said there was no reason for Illinois State Police not to issue the FOID card. State police have said there was no report from a mental hospital or provider that would have triggered a prohibitor.

And even though an unidentified resident of the family home claimed they were afraid to return to the home after the September 2019 call to the Highland Park Police, there was no order of protection.

Illinois also has a “red flag” law, officially the Firearm Restraining Order Act, which is usually pursued in circuit court in response to various actions, including brandishing of a firearm, threatened use of a firearm, and violation of an order of protection, among others.

While existing prohibitions on firearm possession are determined by an individual’s prior criminal or mental health history, firearm restraining orders are different because they are an immediate but temporary action.

Crimo’s FOID card application was one of more than 23,977 received by the Firearm Services Bureau in December 2019, and one of 309,176 received throughout the year. It was approved in January the following year.

In addition to the FOID background check, Crimo would have been subject to additional background checks through the federal National Instant Criminal Background Check System when buying firearms. Crimo passed checks on June 9, 2020, July 18, 2020, July 31, 2020 and Sept. 20, 2021.

Crimo has confessed to the shooting. He has been charged with seven counts of first-degree murder. He remains in jail with no bond pending trial.

A DIFFERENT APPROACH

Most of the conversations about helping people get off Springfield's streets over the past two decades have revolved around emergency shelter and day services. While these are necessary resources for unhoused individuals, in and of themselves they cannot end chronic homelessness, which is the goal of the Heartland Continuum of Care.

With a July 5 vote, the Springfield City Council showed its willingness to move in a new, exciting direction – to utilize federally allocated dollars more effectively by supporting the construction of 22 new permanent supportive housing units (see page 3 for related story).

Developing and expanding immediate housing with long-term leasing or rental assistance, combined with supportive services, is a crucial and effective component for solving the problem of homelessness in Sangamon County. The council sanctioned the use of \$800,000 from the city's federal allotment of HOME Investment Partnerships Program funds for this project.

Cities may utilize HOME funds for building, buying and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership, or providing direct rental assistance to low-income people. At the end of May, the city had \$1,754,034 available to commit from HOME funds.

This relatively small investment supports another \$5.2 million grant for the project from the Illinois Housing Development Authority. The most effective communities throughout the U.S. have leveraged Community Development Block Grants, HOME and local operating funding to create the capacity for housing solutions and supportive services to be delivered at a scale that can end homelessness. For that scale to happen here, we can't do what we have always done.

Let's build on this vote to start making more intentional investments in the housing resources and supportive services necessary for people to become stably housed.

And conveniently, by creating this narrative, any and all crime will now be dismissed by the sheriff's office as a casualty of losing cash bail in the state, allowing the office to not hold themselves accountable.

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

Some races benefitted from a Trump bump

Ogden and Fry conducted a poll in the days leading up to former President Donald Trump's visit to the Quincy area for a US Rep. Mary Miller endorsement in late June.

The poll of Republicans in the Downstate 15th Congressional District taken June 22-24 (Trump's visit was the 25th) found Miller leading fellow US Rep. Rodney Davis by 8 points, 46-38. When undecideds were pushed to decide, Miller's lead jumped to 10 points, 55-45. She won by 15 points, 57.6-42.4.

But if you look at the results from each day, you can see a definite trend. On June 22, Miller's lead was less than 3 points, which is about where many of the pundits speculated the race stood at the time.

On June 23, as word spread more widely about Trump's impending visit, Miller's lead expanded to 9 points, 48-39. And by June 24, the day before Trump's speech, Miller led by 12 points, 48-36.

Now, these are really small subsets in a single poll. But Republican gubernatorial candidate Darren Bailey's results in CD15 in the same poll also showed a slight upward trendline, from 52 on June 22, to 53 the next day, to 55 on June 24.

"Based on where our final polling was on several races it seems possible that that momentum continued through election day," explained Ogden and Fry owner Matthew Podgorski, who is also a Republican Party official and candidate. "Candidates that would benefit from a Trump-Bump all did better than expected just days earlier," he continued. "If highly motivated 'Trump/Bailey' voters showed up on election day while others gave up, several other races may have been affected."

Podgorski's statewide polling, for instance, had Tom DeVore ahead of Steve Kim in the GOP attorney general's race by 4 points. DeVore won by almost 10. Podgorski had Kathy Salvi beating Peggy Hubbard, the most visible Trumpist in the US Senate primary race, by "a much larger margin than the [5-point] victory," Salvi wound up with, Podgorski told me.

Hey, maybe Podgorski's polls just weren't accurate and he's making excuses here. It's been tried before by others. But I have thought since well before primary day that the Trump visit would likely reverberate throughout the state, up and down the Republican primary ballots.

The 2nd Illinois Supreme Court District might also be a case in point. The regulars and people like far-right Republican activist Jeanne Ives all backed Lake County Circuit Judge Daniel Shanes in the primary.

Instead, Mark Curran, who is known for his outrageous public remarks ("We are taking on the Establishment, the Party Hacks, the Freemasons and those that could care less that Individual Liberty and Conscience Protection are no longer cherished or protected," he told supporters last year) won the race by 2 points with almost no money.

Shanes was supposed to be the beneficiary of \$6.25 million in campaign cash from Ken Griffin via the Citizens for Judicial Fairness front group. The committee spent about \$200K to help Shanes in the primary and oppose Curran, suggesting that the people running that show were concerned, but still confident that they were doing enough to win.

And now they have \$6 million left over and no seemingly viable candidate in the 2nd.

Oops.

Also, unlike with Bailey and, to a lesser extent, DeVore, the Democrats had nothing whatsoever to do with this Supreme Court debacle. The Democratic Governors Association, the Democratic Party of Illinois and Gov. Pritzker himself all paid for advertising that boosted Bailey's Trump

bonafides. The state party paid for mailers doing the same for DeVore.

Bailey, by the way, has repaid the favor by bungling pretty much every statement he's made since the day after winning the Republican nomination.

Last week, Bailey memorably urged people to "move on and celebrate" shortly after the Highland Park massacre, even though the shooter was still on the loose at the time. Later in the week, he held a press conference to apologize and try to clean up his own mess, but hit the flub trifecta in the space of just 10 minutes. Bailey "conflated state gun control laws, misidentified a neighborhood in Chicago where violence occurred over the weekend and even misquoted a Bible verse," the *Chicago Tribune* reported.

And DeVore, the Republican Party's attorney general nominee, had this to say on Facebook just the other day: "Guess how many of those Republican establishment 'leaders', who sat idly by and watched your kids suffer for two years, called me after winning the primary? Zero!! I just might investigate them first before Pritzker!!" □



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Putin is not the chess master we thought he was

Russian President Vladimir Putin's penchant for military adventurism abroad has gained him celebrity status, thanks in part to his asymmetrical methods. His geopolitical résumé contains a number of marginal successes, including the 2008 invasion and de facto annexation of portions of Georgia, the propping up of fellow strongman Bashar al-Assad in the Syrian civil war in 2015, and the annexation of Crimea and occupation of the Donbas in eastern Ukraine in the aftermath of the 2014 Maidan Revolution. But upon closer inspection, these foreign military operations yielded more long-term pain than short-term gain. Since being invaded, Georgia aspires to join the European Union and NATO, and the al-Assad regime remains on Russian life support in the midst of the ongoing Syrian civil war.

The Maidan Revolution was important, not only because it represented Ukrainian rejection of Russian neocolonialism, it also signified a strategic defeat of Russian soft power by Western values. Putin's overhyped seizure of Crimea and support for Donbas separatists was reactive in nature, and engineered through sham referendums and empty slogans "proclaiming" the will of ethnic Russian speakers.

In the next eight years, Ukraine slowly decoupled from its traditional Russian/Soviet orbit and gravitated towards the West politically, economically and militarily. By 2022, Putin could no longer stomach his failure to reign in what he viewed as a wayward vassal state. Depleted of soft power resources, Putin's military invaded Ukraine on Feb. 24 under the faulty pretext that the Ukrainian government was a "gang of

drug addicts and neo-Nazis," among other outlandish claims.

In the four and a half months of largely stalemated war against a vastly inferior military, Putin's invasion has created tens of thousands of casualties of war, hundreds of rape and torture victims, displaced and traumatized families and a de facto embargo of Ukrainian seaports. These reckless actions will result in growing anti-Russian sentiment, especially among states dependent on Ukrainian wheat imports, but more importantly, among Russian-speaking Ukrainians Putin claims his invasion is protecting.

Politically, Putin's invasion has reaped unprecedented economic sanctions against the Russian Federation and laid bare the numerous vulnerabilities of a highly overrated Russian military while shattering the myth of its invincibility.

His grueling war of attrition underlies a complete lack of strategic foresight and is likely to achieve precisely what Putin sought to prevent. Historically neutral states Sweden and Finland applied for NATO membership in May and are expected to be approved by all member countries. When Finland becomes a member, Russian-NATO borders will have doubled, to 1,584 miles.

In a war that has no clear military objectives, Putin cannot afford protracted hostilities. Unfortunately for him, this prospect is gaining traction as the frontlines become increasingly static. Although numbers are likely higher due to the fog of war, respected open-source war tracker Oryx has visually confirmed, as of July 5, the loss of 4,586 Russian military vehicles, aircraft

time and again proven its tactical superiority. Putin's recent gains in the Donbas have been marginal at best. Military objectives he failed to achieve through basic battlefield competence have been secured with brute force and scorched earth tactics. These actions are not indicative of strategic military planning, but rather desperation.

Not only has Putin exposed the Russian military's tactical and operational shortcomings, his ill-advised invasion has united the West against Russia. Western arms supplied to the Ukrainian military have totaled in the tens of billions of dollars, with no sign of let up. The West is also working to wean itself from dependence on Russian fossil fuels. In the long run, such a move will likely have serious consequences for Russia's undiversified economy, which relies heavily on Western purchases of its oil and natural gas.

Thus far, Putin has only achieved Pyrrhic victories in Ukraine. As Russian resources dwindle and the economy constricts, Putin will eventually need more than leveled cities to invigorate domestic support for the war, not only for the general Russian populace, but also for the ruling elite. In the halls of the Kremlin, Putin has fostered a climate of ruthless realpolitik, where failure is not tolerated. If the war in Ukraine continues on its current trajectory, Vladimir Putin may fall victim to the very culture he created. □

and equipment since the war began. Most official projections put Russian soldiers killed in action somewhere between 25,000 and 35,000, in less than five months of fighting. Given these considerations, the Russian war effort is likely to become unsustainable.

Since the invasion, Putin's reputation as a master tactician has all but fizzled. In this time, the Russian military has been exposed for the overstretched, ill-equipped and incompetent Soviet throwback it is. From the Battle of Kyiv to the sinking of Russia's Black Sea flagship the Moskva, Ukraine has

Supremes: Changing of the guard

Justice Lisa Holder White replaces Justice Rita Garman on the Illinois Supreme Court

On July 7, Justice Rita Garman retired from the Illinois Supreme Court and Justice Lisa Holder White was sworn in to replace her. Garman, 78, was the longest serving judge in Illinois, having served 48 years, including 21 on the Illinois Supreme Court. Garman says she has “had an amazing career and lived the impossible dream.” Justice Lisa Holder White has “an attitude of gratitude.” She has been a judge for over two decades, serving as judge for the Appellate Court, Fourth District since 2012. White, 54, has had a distinguished career and is the first Black woman to serve on the state’s highest court. Both women are trailblazers in the judicial system.

Garman resides in Danville, and White is a native of Decatur. Because Garman announced her retirement more than 60 days before the primary election, the Supreme Court had the responsibility to appoint her replacement, who will then run for election in 2024. Garman recommended that the justices appoint White. She knew White’s work as a circuit judge and had recommended her in 2012 for the appellate court. Both Garman and White are Republicans.

Justice Lisa Holder White

Lisa Holder White lives in Decatur, where she was born and raised. She is active in the community. She is a member of the Decatur Bar Association, served on the board of the Decatur Public Schools Foundation, has an honorary doctorate

degree from Millikin University and has received numerous awards from Decatur community organizations. White is a member of the Antioch Missionary Baptist Church where she serves as a deaconess and enjoys singing in the choir. She and James, her husband of 34 years, are the parents of two adult children, Brett and Myah.

White was appointed to the bench as associate judge in 2001, at the age of 33. She became the first Black judge in the Sixth Judicial Circuit, which includes Champaign, DeWitt, Douglas, Macon, Moultrie and Piatt counties. She later served as circuit court judge and appellate court judge. She also has experience as an assistant state’s attorney, assistant public defender and working in private practice.

White’s parents moved from Cairo to Decatur in the early 1960s. Her father was a factory worker; her mother had secretarial jobs and later owned a beauty shop. They moved to the Wildwood subdivision in the Macon school district when she was entering fourth grade. She and her two sisters were the only Black students in her school. There were 48 students in her 1986 Macon Community High School graduating class.

Although her parents hadn’t gone to college, they encouraged her to be a lawyer. They thought this would be a good match since people always wanted to talk to her and she responded with convincing arguments about the topic at hand. White attended Richland Community College

and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Lewis University in Romeoville. She earned her Juris Doctor degree from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign in 1993. At the age of 50, White’s mother went to college and became a teacher and principal.

White’s first legal position was assistant state’s attorney for Macon County, where she gained experience with traffic and felony cases. She then worked as an assistant public defender litigating on behalf of those charged with criminal offenses and representing abused and neglected children. She also worked in private practice, handling criminal cases and family law. She believes working in central Illinois has been a benefit to her career as she had opportunities for a wide variety of experiences. She remembers the exact date she first met Justice Garman – March 5, 2001. They met at White’s swearing in as associate judge when Garman was running for the Supreme Court.

As associate judge in the early 2000s, White was active in securing and implementing the Redeploy Illinois grant intended to reduce the incarceration rate for nonviolent juvenile offenders. Garman was instrumental in White’s appointment by the Supreme Court to fill a circuit judge vacancy in 2008. She was then elected to the position in 2010. Garman also recommended White when there was a vacancy on the Fourth District Illinois Appellate Court. The Supreme Court appointed her to the position in 2012, and she was elected in

2014.

White is dedicated to judicial education. She served on and chaired the Illinois Supreme Court committee that provides continuing legal education for judges. She led a group responsible for planning seminars for new state court judges and frequently teaches at educational conferences that are part of mandatory continuing judicial education. She previously chaired the Illinois Judicial College Board of Trustees and presents seminars for Leadership Illinois, the Illinois State Bar Association and Illinois Institute of Continuing Legal Education. Judge White is also dedicated to giving back to the community and engaging with young people. She uses the courtroom to host mock trials with schoolchildren and provides students opportunities to learn more about career opportunities, the legal profession and what it is like to be a judge. She has also planned and hosted activities to provide Girl Scouts the opportunity to meet and learn from women who serve as judges, police officers, attorneys, court reporters and probation officers.

White says judges must understand the importance of being fair, and that it is inappropriate for a judge to make a decision based on partisanship. She says she is dedicated to the role of the court in rendering a decision in a fair and unbiased manner according to law.

White enjoyed collegiality at the appellate court and looks forward to the same on the Supreme

Court. “It’s important that people understand we don’t make the law; we interpret law,” said White. White says she intends to communicate with people about the importance of the court. People may not realize that appealing cases to the Supreme Court is not a matter of right. The Supreme Court determines what cases it will take in response to a petition to appeal. In contrast, the appellate court, with few exceptions, will hear cases decided by the circuit courts. She also emphasizes that decisions are based on the standards of review; the court does not retry cases.

White says she considers herself blessed, and feels the weight of serving on the Supreme Court and following Justice Garman, whom she deeply admires. As the first Black woman on the Illinois Supreme Court, White says she may be the first to achieve this, but not the first who was qualified. She believes diversity is important as it provides perspective. “We need many perspectives to get things right,” said White. It is important to her to be opening a door.

Justice Rita Garman

Rita Garman knew from the age of 15 she wanted to be a lawyer. Others weren’t encouraging. A professor advised her not to pursue a six-year joint degree in commerce and law at the University of Illinois and instead get an undergraduate degree in a specific field. She met her husband at the U of I and, after earning her degree in economics in 1965, they both went to law school at the University of Iowa, where she graduated with distinction in 1968. It was not a welcoming environment. Some suggested she was taking a spot away from a man. Others recommended she get a job and put her husband through law

school. Out of 160 students, there were only eight women and one African American male. She excelled and benefited from the fact that students were graded by number rather than name. After earning her J.D. degree, it wasn’t easy to find a job. She was offered the same position as a male classmate at a significantly lower salary. A law firm told her they didn’t know what they would do with her since clients don’t want to talk to women. This was the 1960s.

Garman’s career includes decades of service as associate judge, circuit judge and appellate court judge, in addition to private practice. She got her first job by luck, working in the legal aid office in Danville. That led to working in the state’s attorney’s office handling family cases and serving four years as assistant state’s attorney in Vermilion County and later working in her husband’s law firm. When an associate judge retired, she applied to be appointed. On Christmas Eve 1973, with her two-year-old daughter in the car, she heard WGN report that a woman had been appointed a judge in downstate Illinois. That’s how she learned she was selected. At the time she was one of only eight female judges in Illinois. After serving as associate judge for 12 years, she was elected circuit court judge in 1986 in the Fifth Judicial Circuit. In July 1995 she was assigned to the Appellate Court, Fourth District, and was elected to the position in November 1996. When Ben Miller retired from the Illinois Supreme Court, he recommended Garman to fill his term. She was appointed to the Supreme Court on Feb. 1, 2001, and elected on Nov. 5, 2002.

Garman has seen a lot of changes during her long career. She credits Title IX of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which outlaws sex-based

How the Illinois Supreme Court works

The judiciary is the third branch of government, but in the capital city citizens typically hear more about the actions of the executive and legislative branches of state government. The judicial branch has significant responsibilities which extend far beyond hearing cases and writing opinions. The Illinois Supreme Court licenses and oversees attorneys, handles disciplinary cases for attorneys and judges and has responsibilities for continuing legal education. Over 5,000 law firms must register with the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court appoints judges when there are vacancies on the circuit, appellate and Supreme courts and appoints people to serve on a variety of special commissions and administrative bodies.

State courts handle cases involving state laws, and federal courts handle cases related to federal laws. In accordance with the 1970 Illinois Constitution, the Illinois Supreme Court has supervisory authority over the state’s circuit and appellate courts. Prior to 1964 there was no unified court system. There are now 24 judicial circuits, and each circuit is located in one of five appellate court districts. The Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts was created to assist the Supreme Court with its significant responsibility for overseeing the court system.

Three Supreme Court justices are elected from the first judicial district (Cook County) and one justice elected from each of the other four districts. For the first time since the judicial boundaries were established in 1964, the legislature changed the court district boundaries. The change was part of the recent legislative redistricting that occurs every 10 years after the U.S. census.

Justices are elected in partisan elections for 10-year terms and may run for retention in uncontested elections for additional 10-year terms. Party affiliation is not identified when running for retention. Sixty percent of those voting must vote yes in order for the judge to be retained. Many states have at-large elections of their Supreme Court justices, but the 1870 Illinois Constitution created districts. This was done to ensure Chicago didn’t have too much power and that downstate Illinois would also have representation.

Illinois is one of seven states with partisan elections for the state Supreme Court. Fifteen states have nonpartisan elections, although in some cases candidates run with party endorsements. Sixteen states use the

“Missouri plan,” in which the governor makes appointments. In 10 states the governor appoints with Senate approval, and in two states the state legislature appoints.

Illinois Supreme Court proceedings are open to the public and are livestreamed. Annually approximately 1,600 cases are appealed to the Supreme Court and 60-70 are accepted for oral arguments. The Supreme Court convenes in the Illinois Supreme Court Building in Springfield on the second Monday in the months of September, November, January, March and May. Justices reside in the building when they are in term and have their meals together. Thus they get to know each other on a personal level.

COVID had a dramatic impact on the operations of the court. Carolyn Grosboll of Petersburg served as clerk of the Supreme Court for nearly 11 years. “The pandemic has transformed how procedures can work in the future,” said Grosboll. The court developed protocols and procedures for people to participate in the proceedings remotely, which would never have occurred in the past.

Grosboll, recently retired, had a long career, working in all three branches of government. She found working with the judicial branch rewarding. She says all of the members of the court are hard-working elected officials, and everyone she worked with was there to do a good job. —Karen Witter

The magnificent building

Tours and educational initiatives tell the Supreme Court's history

Illinois has a magnificent Supreme Court building, which was dedicated in 1908. Architect W. Carby Zimmerman modeled the building after the U.S. Treasury Building in Washington, D.C., and the Pantheon in Rome. Two large sculptures by Charles J. Mulligan flank the front entrance to the building. One is titled Justice and Power and the other Law and Knowledge. Spectacular murals by Albert Krehbiel adorn the walls of the Supreme Court hearing room and portray attributes of the law (wisdom, justice, power) and functions of the law (promoting truth and purity, protecting industry and peace, disclosing fraud and discord, destroying violence and anarchy) and continuity of the law. The large ceiling mural symbolizes the principles of law that serve to harmonize the universe.

The building was closed in 2013 for a \$13 million restoration to clean the murals, restore woodwork, refurbish original light fixtures install new HVAC, electrical and plumbing systems. During this time the Supreme Court met in Chicago.

The Illinois Supreme Court Historic Preservation Commission was created

in 2007 to assist and advise the Illinois Supreme Court in acquiring, collecting, preserving and cataloging documents, artifacts, and information relating to the Illinois judiciary. John Lupton serves as executive director and Sam Wheeler is director of history programs.

There is a law library in the Supreme

Court building which is open to the public. Several educational initiatives are underway to make the Supreme Court building and its resources more accessible to the public. The Illinois Supreme Court Historic Preservation Commission recently received a \$135,000 federal grant to digitize Supreme Court cases from the beginning of statehood in 1818 to the end of the Civil War. Cases during this time addressed transportation, immigration, women and children, slavery, the Civil War, the rise of Chicago and urban/rural disputes. This will be a valuable resource for historical researchers, students and genealogists.

A learning center is in the early planning stages which will be used to host school groups. The commission is collaborating with the Governor's Mansion and State Capitol to develop a civics education tour for middle school students. There will also be an online component.

The commission presents "History on Trial," presentations highlighting important but relatively unknown lawsuits in Illinois and American history. Plans are being developed for a retrial of the 1919 Black Sox baseball scandal.

discrimination in education, as having a big impact. She also says that in the 1970s women got into professions that were not very accessible previously. She says the old guard had daughters who wanted to be lawyers, and that made a difference. "The door didn't swing open, but the crack kept getting bigger," said Garman.

Garman is most proud of the opportunity to impact the law in a positive way. Garman says she has worked with a collegial group of justices during her more than two decades on the Supreme Court. They may agree or disagree depending on the case and may agree on one case and not another. It is never nasty and never personal. She cites the critical importance of judicial independence. Access to justice in step with the times...this was a particular challenge during COVID. Remote proceedings would have been unheard of in the past, but now

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they have proven this can be done.

Another responsibility of Supreme Court justices is to appoint justices when there are vacancies and make appointments to committees. Justice Garman has had a significant impact in increasing the number of women and the diversity of people appointed to these positions.

Judges must run for retention every 10 years. Garman was up for retention in 2022, but decided the timing was best for her to step down. She wanted to go out on top on her own terms. She has seen people stay too long and not be able to enjoy retirement. Garman has five grandchildren — ages 21 to 3. She had the pleasure of living near her oldest grandchildren in Danville, and now she wants to be more actively involved in the lives of her younger grandchildren, who live in Des Moines.

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

Stop the presses!

Go see *Newsies* at the Muni

Continuing the theme of fighting for what's right and dipping into our nation's history for lessons learned, the Springfield Muni Opera presents its the third show of the season, Disney's *Newsies*, a story based on the 1899 newsboys' strike which forced a change in the way newspaper hawkers (many of them orphaned children) were compensated. The 1992 film version of *Newsies*, in a word, flopped. Thankfully, a live musical version rose from the ashes and continues to soar to new heights, and in this production, lingers optimistically in the air, much like the dancing newsies during one of their high-stepping numbers.

As it is not your typical Disney musical, there are no lavish sets, glittering costumes nor dancing, singing furniture. *Newsies* is a social justice musical about rectifying child labor laws. It's gritty and inspiring, and it absolutely deserves to be seen. Memorable music by Alan Menken with lyrics by Jack Feldman will leave audiences tapping their toes and cheering their approval, as was the case with the opening weekend crowd.

The book by Harvey Fierstein, which was based on the 1992 film, tells the simplified story of a group of hard-scrabble kids trying to survive while making pennies selling "papes" in New York City. When the villainous Joseph Pulitzer (Rich Beans) suddenly raises the price of the papers, the newsies decide to unionize and go on strike.

This is truly an ensemble piece and everyone in it shines, but especially Shaw Riggs as reluctant leader Jack Kelly, who is thoroughly engaging from start to finish. His swagger and

gusto, wrapped in an expertly done New York accent, carry the show. He easily charms the audience with humor and passion, but also shows his vulnerable side with moments like the powerful reprise of "Santa Fe" at the end of Act One and the duet "Something To Believe In" with reporter and ally Katherine Plumber.

As the romantic foil, Katherine, Hannah Levin brings wit and likability to a role that could have come off as predictable and bland. It's easy to see how these two characters could fall for each other. Jakob Hankins, as best friend Crutchie, Peyton Knowski as Davey and Liam Busboom as the wisecracking Les, newcomers to the newsies beat, also turn in nuanced and memorable performances.

As noteworthy as the individual performances are, this show often rests its laurels on the numerous ensemble dance numbers. Rabble-rousers like "Carry the Banner," "King of New York," "The World Will Know" and "Seize the Day" showcase the ample talent in the cast. Dancers march, spin, flip, tap and seemingly float through air in a display of strength and determination as they fight for their cause. And they sing while doing it, aided by a strong pit chorus and orchestra with musical direction by Damien Kaplan.

Directing and choreographing team Morgan Kaplan and Andrew Maynerich, who have partnered many times to stage exciting, dance-filled musicals, deliver once again with this magnetic and spirited production. The show crackles with life and boundless, youthful energy while navigating a current of injustice and greed. A simple scaffold set in the background and perfect period costumes set the

right tone and keep the focus on the performers and story.

A quibble: several microphones were not working during the show and it was a shame, because several key moments were missed. I realize many factors can wreak havoc on sound and the Muni is no stranger to the issue. I just hope someday a permanent solution to the problem can be found.

While doing a bit of research on the show, I saw *Newsies* referred to as a "gateway musical" because of its ability to open the door to younger generations and get them interested in live theater. This was evidenced by not only the young cast but their enthusiastic peers in the audience. But it got me thinking, isn't all theater a gateway? From director to audience member, and everyone in between, live theater opens doors wide to the power of storytelling, the strength of community and the magic that comes from the collaborative process. And oftentimes, there are important lessons to be learned. As Medda Larkin says (played by the incomparable Mary Kate Smith), "Theater is not only entertaining. It's educational." Indeed.

Newsies continues Thursday, July 14, through Sunday, July 17. Tickets can be purchased at metrotix.com or at the box office the night of the show. □

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Fritter away

How to turn about any food into a treat

Fritters are what you call a back-pocket recipe. The same technique can be employed to turn small amounts of practically anything into a satisfying and delectable treat. It's a wonderful way to take advantage of the overwhelming variety of produce that is locally available and is a handy way to use up leftovers and minimize waste. The basic formula is the same – two to three cups of a base ingredient is mixed with an egg and roughly a half cup of binder, usually flour or breadcrumbs. This mixture is then formed into patties and pan-fried in hot oil.

While a wide variety of ingredients are good candidates for a fritter, care must be taken to minimize the amount of moisture they will add to the mixture. Ingredients like broccoli, sweet corn, cauliflower and apples work best when lightly blanched or roasted. Summer squash and root vegetables like carrots, potatoes, beets and sweet potatoes can be grated and used raw but should first be salted, drained and squeezed dry before incorporating into the fritter mixture. These savory fritter recipes can do double duty as both side dish and main, breakfast or dinner.

Broccoli Ham and Cheese Fritters

Top with a fried egg for a delicious veggie-packed brunch.

3 cups roughly chopped broccoli (include stems as well as florets)

¼ cup minced onion

1 egg

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

1 clove minced garlic or ½ teaspoon garlic powder

½ cup flour (regular, whole wheat or GF flour all work fine)

½ teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon kosher salt (use ¼ teaspoon regular salt)

4 ounces sharp cheddar, grated

½ cup diced ham, optional

Oil for frying

Briefly steam the broccoli either on the stove or in the microwave for 3 minutes. Run the broccoli under cold water to stop the cooking then drain. Squeeze the cooled broccoli dry with a kitchen towel. Chop the broccoli with a knife or in a food processor into pieces roughly the size of large peas, then transfer the chopped broccoli to a mixing bowl and add the minced onion, garlic and

mustard. Crack in the egg and mix well. Mix together the flour, baking powder and salt in a small bowl, then add this to the broccoli mixture and mix gently to combine. Gently fold in the grated cheese and diced ham.

Heat a griddle or skillet to medium-high heat. Coat with olive oil (about two tablespoons) and, once the fat is shimmering, add ¼ cup dollops of the broccoli mixture to the pan, flattening each slightly with the back of a spoon or spatula.

Cook for two to three minutes on the first side until golden brown, then flip and cook for an additional two minutes until cooked through and golden. Transfer to paper towels to drain. If necessary they can be held in a warm oven while you finish the rest of the fritters. Add more oil as necessary and repeat with the remaining batter.

Eggplant Fritters

1 large eggplant (about 2 pounds)

2 tablespoons olive oil, plus more for frying

3 tablespoons roughly chopped parsley

1 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme or ¼ teaspoon dried

½ cup breadcrumbs, fresh or dry

1 egg

¼ cup grated parmesan cheese, plus more to serve

¼ teaspoon red pepper flakes, to taste

¾ teaspoon kosher salt or ½ teaspoon regular salt

To serve:

5 ounces arugula or frisee lettuce

Shaved red onion

1 tablespoon good quality balsamic vinegar

Preheat the oven to 450 degrees. Cut the eggplant in half and rub each half with the olive oil and sprinkle with salt. Place the eggplant cut side down on a parchment-lined baking sheet and roast until tender, about 30-35 minutes. Remove from the oven and set aside to cool. When cool enough to handle, scoop out the flesh into a colander and allow to drain for about 20 minutes. Transfer the drained eggplant to a mixing bowl and add herbs, breadcrumbs, egg, parmesan, pepper and salt and mix well.

Heat 2-3 tablespoons of oil in a heavy skillet over medium high heat until shimmering. Add ¼ cup dollops of the eggplant mixture to the pan and flatten



slightly with the back of the scoop. Cook until golden brown, about 2-3 minutes per side. Drain on paper towels and repeat with remaining mixture. To serve, arrange the arugula or frisee on a serving platter and drizzle with the vinegar and an additional tablespoon of olive oil, then arrange the fritters on top and scatter the shaved onions over the top. Garnish with chopped parsley and grated parmesan as desired.

Berebere Spiced Zucchini and Carrot Fritters with Herbed Yogurt Sauce

½ pound each carrots and zucchini

1 ½ teaspoons kosher salt, divided

1 egg

2 cloves minced garlic

3 green onions, chopped

¼ teaspoon black pepper

½ cup flour

½ teaspoon baking powder

1-2 teaspoons berebere seasoning

Olive oil for frying

½ cup crumbled feta, to serve

Grate the carrots and zucchini and mix with one teaspoon of the salt. Place in a colander over a bowl to drain for at least 15-30 minutes, pressing out as much liquid as

you can. Crack the egg into a mixing bowl and beat well, then add the grated and drained vegetables, garlic and green onions and mix well. Whisk together the flour, baking powder, pepper and berebere seasoning to taste (some varieties are more intense than others). Add this to the vegetable mixture and mix gently to combine.

Heat 2-3 tablespoons of oil in a heavy skillet over medium high heat until shimmering. Add ¼ cup dollops of the vegetable mixture to the pan and flatten slightly with the back of the scoop. Cook until golden brown, about 2-3 minutes per side. Drain on paper towels and repeat with remaining mixture. Arrange on a serving platter and top with crumbled feta and serve with herbed yogurt sauce.

Herbed Yogurt Sauce

½ cup Greek-style yogurt

1 clove garlic, minced

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1 small cucumber, seeded and grated

1 tablespoon each minced fresh mint, cilantro and parsley

A small pinch of salt

Combine the above ingredients and taste for seasoning. Chill until ready to serve. □


