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Putting the state back in the grandstand

Next year, let's think Illinois

Is there anything more subjective than music?

One person's Ernest Tubb is, well, another person's Ernest Tubb. Same with Boy George, or Foreigner. None are playing the state fair this year because there is no fair and, in the case of Tubb, no Tubb. He died in 1984, but not before twice appearing at the fair, most recently in 1971.

Grandstand shows, through the years, have been uneven affairs. For every Heart, which put on a show to remember back in 2009, there is a Tony Orlando, who surely gave event planners fits trying to decide whether he or the Dallas Cowboy Cheerleaders should go on first when they appeared on the same bill nearly 40 years ago. The cheerleaders opened, and Orlando, freshly cleaned up from a cocaine addiction, soon became a big deal in both Vegas and Branson. It's nice to think that the state fair might have been a springboard for his comeback.

There have been plenty of Illinois performers on the grandstand stage but not enough of them, and too many of the same ones. Nothing against Cheap Trick, Styx, REO Speedwagon or Head East, but every 70s arena rock band has its day, and that was a long time ago. But not at the fairgrounds, where these groups have just kept coming back, five or even six times.

If we ever have a fair again, we should strive for more Illinois-centricity in grandstand shows, which might be tricky, since the Land of Lincoln isn't known for producing country artists, which long have been to grandstand shows what mustard is to corn dogs. Still, there's Alison Krauss, who hails from Champaign and ranks third on the who-has-the-most-Grammys list. Have her headline a show opened by Gretchen Wilson and a resurrected Uncle Tupelo and that would be plenty enough country music for one

fair.

Not everyone who was born in Illinois or grew up in Illinois or settled in Illinois, either temporarily or permanently, is state fair material. Miles Davis, arguably the greatest musical genius Illinois ever produced, never played the fair, but that's fine. Jazz doesn't belong in grandstand shows unless it's Benny Goodman, and the King of Swing is no longer with us. Neither is Juice Wrld, but if he were, a show featuring him and the Smashing Pumpkins would make for a memorable evening. Chance the Rapper? Of course, if he doesn't win the White House, Kanye West might have time to join Chance on stage. Neither John Prine nor Sam Cooke, rest in peace, would have needed opening acts, but if they did, Curtis Mayfield would have done fine.

We're closer to Chicago than Nashville, and

so the fair's failure to book blues acts over the years is almost criminal. It's too late for Junior Wells, James Cotton, Muddy Waters, Koko Taylor and so many others, but Buddy Guy still tours, and he might be able to convince Harmonica Hinds to join him at the fair. Adrian Belew, guitar master who's played with likes of Frank Zappa, David Bowie and the Talking Heads, isn't from here, but he once lived in Springfield. Get weird, put him on stage with Guy and see what happens.

Let's have Urge Overkill open for Patti Smith and hope the grandstand is still standing when they finish. If we need to take the edge off, there's always Liz Phair. The grandstand stage is a big place with plenty of room for large ensembles. Earth, Wind and Fire has played the fair once, but that was in 1995. Bring 'em back. Same with Chicago, which has four fair gigs under its belt, most recently in 2001.

While quotas are rarely good, they might be worth considering when it comes to grandstand acts, which are known for losing money. Require that at least half of the headliners in any given year be from Illinois, even if they moved (a lot of people are doing that these days) shortly after birth. Who knows? With a state fair version of a residency requirement, maybe we'd have better music than we've had before, even if we don't break even. □

When the president sent troops to Chicago

Oregon Governor Kate Brown calls them "Trump Troops." This refers to the unidentified federal paramilitary forces being inserted into domestic law enforcement in Portland and, apparently considered for Chicago. "We do not need federal troops in Chicago," Mayor Lori Lightfoot said at a press conference Monday, after widespread looting downtown the night before. The entire federal activity is fluid and unclear as to its purpose, goals and constitutionality. Though not a direct parallel, the situation calls to mind the Pullman Strike of 1894 in Chicago.

As a result of the Depression of 1893, George Pullman had reduced the wages of workers making Pullman Sleeping Cars that he leased to most American railroads. He had created a "model community" (now Pullman National Monument, <https://www.nps.gov/pull/index.htm>) where the workers were basically required to live. It was a self-contained community with stores, etc., run by Pullman. But when Pullman cut wages, housing rents remained unchanged. This resulted in a wildcat strike by the workers.

About a third of Pullman employees were members of the American Railway Union (ARU), founded and led by Eugene Debs. George Pullman refused to negotiate with his workers. At the request of Pullman workers, the ARU agreed to a boycott that shut railroad traffic from Chicago to 27 other states.

The mayor of Chicago at the time was John Hopkins. He had fallen out with George Pullman over business matters. Consequently, he was not interested in helping Pullman, and, indeed, Chicago police collected contributions for the strikers.

Governor John Peter Altgeld had been elected with labor support and refused to send state militia to assist Pullman in breaking the strike.

But, the U.S. Attorney General, Richard Olney, convinced President Grover Cleveland to send federal troops to Chicago, ostensibly to enforce a federal injunction against obstructing railroads,

Freshman Democrat speaks out against Madigan

"I need to be able to look myself in the mirror every day," Rep. Terra Costa Howard (D-Glen Ellyn) explained to me recently, stating why she decided to call for House Speaker Michael Madigan's resignation.

"More importantly," the freshman suburban Democrat said, "I had to look at my daughters and remind them what it means to do what's right."

Costa Howard said she didn't take a poll before making her decision. "My data collection is what I hear when I talk to people, the emails I receive, the comments that are on my Facebook pages. That speaks volumes," she said. "I live in a community where I am out publicly all the time, so I talk to people all the time." And they have all been giving her an earful about Madigan.

"There are people who are unhappy that I stepped out on this," she said when pressed. And some of those folks run labor unions. "We have labor unions who are upset. They're disappointed that I would say anything," she said, but quickly pointed to her own pro-labor voting record. "I'm not really sure how much more I can say about where I stand about unions. It's incredible to me that anybody would question those values."

She did, however, vote against the minimum wage hike, which was a major union priority last year - although Madigan himself has blocked or watered down several such pay increase proposals in the past.

Costa Howard also talked about a confrontation at a recent weekend event with a "buddy" who is also a "high-ranking labor person."

"It got really ugly," she said. "And the beauty of it was everybody around me went after him about it."

"What I found to be so ironic was him having this whole conversation about power and, you know, keeping the working person in power. "And I looked at him and I'm like, the only reason anybody has power is if somebody gave it to them. When you take that away, who are they? The emperor has no clothes in that situation and people need to wake up and see that."

That's what I've been telling the "mushrooms" for years: You're the ones who have all the power. Without you, Madigan has no majority. And no majority means no power. The entire caucus has revolved for decades around getting Madigan's most vulnerable members reelected, whether they

agreed with those decisions or not. Vote your conscience and then make him go out and reelect you, not the other way around. They never listened.

While Costa Howard was quick to say she didn't want to "make it sound like it's all organized labor," she did claim that she knows colleagues who "received calls from 'certain groups' to say, 'Stand down, don't expect us to financially support you if you [call on Madigan to resign].'" And I find that really troubling."

And what about her colleagues? "Do I have colleagues who are upset because they may feel I put them on a hot seat? Well, I can't control other peoples' districts, I can only control myself and what's best for me and my district and what the people of the state of Illinois are looking for with leaders."

Costa Howard said she will not vote for Madigan if he runs again for House Speaker. But she said she won't reject any money spent on her behalf by the state party he controls.

"I am the Democratic candidate for the


48th district. So, saying I'm not supposed to be supported by the Democratic Party is not fair. It's my party; I represent the party and when individuals make contributions to the Democratic Party, they expect it to be used on Democratic candidates, which I am one of."

She did say, though, that she would refuse direct cash contributions from Speaker Madigan's personal campaign committee.

And what about objections made by some of her colleagues that she and others have no plan for what happens after Madigan steps down? What should happen?

"Exactly what happened in the Senate," when Senate President John Cullerton abruptly retired last year, she said. "There is a caucus, a conversation about who should step up to be speaker. They were able to do it in the Senate."

Terra Costa Howard is genuinely liked by many of her colleagues and she hasn't been a showboat who instinctively sought refuge with the knee-jerk anti-Madigan's of the world. It's going to be fascinating to see what happens to her in the coming weeks and months. □

CAMP COMPASS GOES VIRTUAL

For the past five weeks, more than 215 elementary students from District 186 participated in virtual Camp Compass, an online summer learning program. Thirty-two incredible District 186 teachers, supported by three phenomenal administrators and a stellar academic team of five literacy, math and technology coaches, instructed students daily in reading and math via live Zoom classes.

Attendance and engagement exceeded all expectations, with 75 students having perfect attendance. On average, 173 students participated each day. With small class sizes of six to eight students and two teachers per class, students received individualized instruction, meaningful feedback and social-

emotional support.

Additionally, volunteers delivered school supplies, books, food and enrichment activity kits to students' homes each week. Students, parents and staff have been showering praise upon the program. Preliminary results show 93% of students improved in at least one math assessment and 97% improved in at least one reading skill.

Congratulations to all the staff and volunteers who made virtual Camp Compass possible and successful.

striking or even "ordering, directing, aiding, assisting or abetting any person in the commission of the acts forbidden."

As with the current situation, however, there was more politics than public safety in the deployment. Altgeld's seminal biographer, Harry Barnard, notes in *Eagle Forgotten: The Life of John Peter Altgeld*, Attorney General Olney was a railroad lawyer – "one of the biggest in the nation."

There was also decided bias and bigotry in the national media. The current president rails against some amorphous "ANTI-TIFA" and blames violence on anarchists and hoodlums: "The 'protesters' are actually anarchists who hate our country." In 1894, the *Chicago Tribune*, precursor of today's Fox News, was a corporate, capitalist establishment promoter. On the Pullman Strike, the paper reported that "anarchy" prevailed in Chicago, that the strike was in reality a "revolution," that the issue was not and never had been the Pullman workers' wage question, but a contest between "law and order" and "lawlessness and anarchy."

Governor Altgeld sent a letter to President Cleveland that is equally applicable today: "[A]ll these troubles were local in character and could easily be handled by state authorities. The newspaper accounts have in many cases been pure fabrications, and in others wild exaggerations." The letter continued:

"I submit that local self-government is a fundamental principle of our Constitution... To absolutely ignore a local government in matters of this kind...not only insults the people of this State...but is in violation of a basic principle of our institutions. The question of Federal supremacy is in no way involved... Federal supremacy and local self-government must go hand in hand, and to ignore the latter is to do violence to the Constitution."

Attorney General Olney replied: "The paramount duty of the President of the United States is to see that the laws of the United States are faithfully executed and in the discharge of that duty, he is not hampered or crippled by necessity of consulting any Chief of Police, Mayor or even Governor."

History continues to repeat and political interest continues to govern policy. □

1,000 cases and counting

COVID-19 continues to spread in Sangamon County

At the beginning of the year, scenes from our current reality might have seemed as though they were out of science fiction. Mask wearing has become the norm, or at least should be, according to medical experts. Grocery stores are urging one family member per cart and have floor markings to promote distance. Lines for COVID-19 testing can stretch dozens of cars deep. News of outbreaks at restaurants, bars and long-term care facilities have become commonplace.

Earlier this month, Sangamon County registered 1,000 reported cases. As of the morning of Aug. 11, according to data compiled by *The New York Times*, Sangamon County reported 1,274 cases total. Slightly more populous Champaign County had reported 1,686. In Sangamon County, more than 30 infected people have died. Many were residents of The Villas long-term care facility in Sherman. More than 700 people have reportedly recovered, with hundreds of others reportedly in isolation. As of Monday, Aug. 10, less than 10 COVID-infected patients were hospitalized, according to county officials. Over the past weekend, Aug. 8-9, 61 more people in Sangamon County tested positive. On Aug. 11, Sangamon County hit a record for the highest confirmed cases in a single day, 51.

Sangamon County Department of Public Health director Gail O'Neill said contact tracers have found a notable amount of cases can be attributed to social gatherings. "The weather's gotten nice and people are wanting to get out and about. ... Many are reluctant to wear masks when they're out of their home and away from people that they don't usually live with." O'Neill said people should remain cautious of gathering in groups outside their immediate household.

Testing options have been in flux. Testing outside the Sangamon County Department of Public Health building on South Grand Avenue is operating again under SIU School of Medicine. The hours are 9 to 11 a.m. and 4 to 7 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. The Illinois Department of Public Health also offers testing on the state fairgrounds on Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. At both sites, people of any age can be tested for free regardless of symptoms. Memorial's Respiratory Screening Clinic on South Sixth Street and a testing site at a Walgreens on North Ninth Street are other options. Both require appointments. The wait time for results vary. O'Neill said people who learn they were around an infected person should wait three to four days

before getting tested, as that's how long it can take the infection to become detectable.

Gov. JB Pritzker's administration invested \$5 million in a mask-wearing campaign, meant to promote masks and proper usage (cover your mouth and nose, for instance.) That was announced earlier this month, around the same time Sangamon County was one of 11 counties on a public health warning list, a list from which it was later removed.

During an Aug. 7 press conference, Pritzker announced related emergency rules filed by the Illinois Department of Public Health and said, "This is a make or break moment for the state of Illinois, for making sure that people are doing everything they can to mitigate, to reduce the spread. And so this is a moment for us to enforce the masking requirements across the state." The rules focus on a system of warnings and fines for schools, child care providers and businesses that

fail to enforce mask-wearing.

During the conference, Pritzker gave a nod to the capital city, saying Springfield is among the places that have put in their own "enforcement mechanisms." At the end of July, Mayor Jim Langfelder issued a sixth emergency order which declares patrons of bars and restaurants must have assigned seats that they do not leave except for limited scenarios. Establishments must keep occupancy to only the seats available. The city announced it would be conducting compliance checks and fining establishments accordingly. "It is unacceptable that a business might have to shut its doors and residents are out of work because some individuals feel inconvenienced by wearing a mask," Langfelder had said in a release. □

Spit test

U of I begins COVID-19 saliva testing

University of Illinois Springfield saliva testing for the new coronavirus is up and running as of Aug. 11. Researchers at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign developed the so-called SHIELD test. The tests are being used at all three U of I campuses. The university system said it wants to supply the tests throughout the state and nation.

Starting Aug. 17, anyone spending time on the UIS campus as a student, faculty or staff member must be tested once per week. "We're going to do surveillance testing, not symptomatic testing," said Karen Whitney, interim UIS chancellor, during a webinar last month. The conversation was about education and COVID-19. Whitney told attendees of the coming school year, "It's gonna be a roller coaster."

Interruptions should be expected, said Whitney. "We will pause, I have no doubt. We've got 4,000 students, 700 employees. Right now we probably won't have more than 10% of anybody on campus at any one time." Fewer people on campus, increased cleaning and required mask-wearing are additional mitigation measures in place, along with the mandated weekly saliva testing. For students who test positive? "We will have quarantining spaces on our campus so that our students won't have to upend their life," said Whitney.

On Aug. 10, the University of Illinois System announced a new "university-related organization" that will make the technology available nationally. The test has rapid results and costs less than nasal swabs, according to a news release. Results are ready within six hours. According to the release, "The quick turnaround time for test results is a key in curbing the virus, allowing isolation early enough to limit spread of the infection as well as narrowing down past exposure to allow more effective contact tracing. It also identifies and isolates people with asymptomatic cases who would otherwise spread the virus unknowingly."

Springfield designates BLM Solidarity Day

New resolution also requires anti-racism training for city employees

The Springfield City Council approved an anti-racism, anti-violence and anti-hatred resolution that declares May 31 BLM Solidarity Day. That was the day thousands of people participated in a vehicle procession organized by Black Lives Matter Springfield in the wake of the police killing of George Floyd.

The resolution also requires anti-racism and cultural competency training for all city staff, commissioners and contractors. It encourages investment in wards 2 and 3, changes suggested by Ward 3 council member Doris Turner. "It's a great vehicle for us to move forward with that structural change and it will then codify or put into action and put into our policies and procedures, all of the nice words that were in the resolution," Turner told NPR Illinois.

Most city council members had signed on as cosponsors for the measure, which honored the area's chapter of Black Lives Matter as well as E.A.T., which is Education and Action Together. Both Springfield groups organized anti-police brutality rallies after Floyd's death at the hands of the Minneapolis police. The council voted in favor of the resolution with Turner's updates, deciding to forgo changes proposed by Mayor Jim Langfelder.

On Wednesday, Aug. 5, Langfelder proposed last-minute changes during a council meeting that would have included language to recognize the NAACP Springfield chapter and the city's 1908 Race Riot, which sparked the founding of the national organization for the rights of people of color.

However, the majority of city council members voted down the chance to include those changes, to Langfelder's frustration. "We can talk all we want about unity and working together, but this kind of flies in the face of it," he said. Ward 2 council member Shawn Gregory said he respects the NAACP, but argued for the resolution to stand without change. "It was created to include others who traditionally are not in this, despite the struggle for our community," he said, before voting "no" to discuss the amendment. "And I would like for them to continue to be in that and not be overshadowed by the NAACP."

In 2018, NAACP Illinois and the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police developed 10 Shared Principles which promote values around areas

such as community policing and diversity. Springfield previously adopted the principles, and Langfelder proposed reaffirming those principles in the weeks after anti-police brutality protests earlier this year. The council tabled that resolution, with some arguing the city needed to adopt policies that would put those principles into action before reaffirming the city's commitment to them.

Teresa Haley, head of Illinois and Springfield chapters of the NAACP, took issue with the civil rights group and history of the race riots being left out of the anti-racism resolution. The move was "divisive," she said. "We aren't trying to outshine anyone. We are trying to uphold the NAACP and our beliefs and improve race relations not only in Springfield, not only in Illinois, but throughout the whole country." Haley spoke at the end of the meeting, hours after the resolution had been approved. She said she felt the community should have been involved in developing the resolution.


The resolution commits the city to being a place where hatred, racism and violence are unwelcome and states, "Springfield will be a beacon for the inclusion, tolerance and respect for all," while also committing to work in partnership for "stronger cultures of kindness, compassion and understanding." It also promises engagement with the public through meetings with community groups and continual review and improvement of diversity training and policies. □

A photographer's eye-opening year

After ups and downs, Zach Adams reflects, "It made my family stronger."

"Eye-opening."

That's how Zach Adams describes the year 2020. Within five months, Adams went from working full time and doing a bit of photography on the side, to being laid off during quarantine and becoming a stay-at-home parent, to watching his photography business take off as he was able to take more pictures, to dealing with the sudden, severe illness of his beloved four-year-old daughter.

Adams is still trying to process all the changes he's been through this year – good and bad. Ultimately, he feels grateful for it all.

"It made my family stronger. It made my extended family stronger. It got me back in touch with friends I haven't been in touch with for a long time. So as much as I want things to go back to normal, I'm grateful," he said.

At the beginning of March, Adams spent his

days at his job detailing cars and his evenings and weekends at home with his wife and daughter, trying to book photo shoots on the weekend and fit in time for taking pictures any place he could.

He was laid off from work when statewide quarantine measures closed businesses. With his wife still working full time, Adams became the full-time caregiver to his daughter Kinley. The 47 days he spent at home with her is a time he cherishes.

"I got to know her personality, I got to know how she thinks, I got to know how she learns. That's when I truly found out how smart she is, how she pieces things together and remembers things," Adams said, his devotion to his daughter evident in his voice. "Kinley means the world to me. I just love her so much."

While he was laid off, Adams also began to devote more time to photography. He began by

taking pictures around the house, documenting life during quarantine and his experiences with his daughter. He also began scrolling through Facebook, looking for different events that he could photograph around town.

The first one he attended was the Reopen Illinois rally on May 16. He wasn't there either to support or to protest – just to document what was going on. After the rally, he loaded his photos to his Facebook page, 1221 Photography.

"I didn't think much of it. But I posted it on 1221 and it went viral. I woke up and it had 4,000 likes, and it kept growing and getting shares. Eventually the Facebook algorithm showed that my photos had reached over half a million people. It was eye-opening."

Adams first became interested in photography in high school at the suggestion of one of his

art teachers. He started getting serious about photography in 2017, when his wife and dad bought him a professional-quality camera for Father's Day. After that, he read and watched everything he could get his hands on to learn about the function of the camera and the craft of photography. He started booking gigs, first with family and friends, shooting maternity photos, senior portraits and family portrait sessions. Each year business picked up a bit more.

He explains his passion for taking pictures this way: "The thing I love most about photography is being able to stop time at that moment and capture, at that moment, as much sadness, happiness, any type of emotion I can, in that moment."

Adams' talent for capturing the emotions of the moment made itself clear with the photographs he took of the Black Lives Matter rally held in Springfield on May 31.

“When I got there, it was one of the most emotional and powerful experiences I’ve ever been around. As I’m walking and taking pictures, when we got to the Capitol, there were times when I was in tears behind the camera, seeing everyone together, seeing everyone together for one cause, all different races, all different ages,” he said.

As only the truly talented and inspired can, Adams was able to channel that emotion into his photographs of the event. One of the most iconic images he captured was that of a young Black child and an older white woman clasping hands as they laid on the pavement.

Once again the photos were widely liked and shared on social media, and several were published in *Illinois Times*.

Robert Sill, Curator of Art at the Illinois State Museum, became a fan of Adams’ photography when Adams began submitting his images to the Museum’s COVID-19 collecting initiative.

“Whether capturing the emotionally charged energy of a protest rally or a quiet moment of domestic tranquility, Zach Adams possesses the trained eye of a gifted photographer. He has an uncanny knack for distilling the moment, sweeping a crowd and finding some visual truth. His compositions are richly textured tonal explorations in black and white. His mastery of light and texture, of dynamic compositional balance, of capturing human emotion, all combine to elicit emotional responses in the viewer,” Sill said.

Sherry Gunn of Pittsboro, Indiana, said that she first became aware of Adams’ photos when his pictures of the Black Lives Matter rally came across her Facebook feed.

“They were very moving photos and I specifically recall feeling as if I were looking at pictures of the Civil Rights Movement. Zach did an excellent job at capturing the moment,” she said.

Adams got a sense of just how deeply his images had touched people when he happened to be at Menards wearing a T-shirt featuring one of his photographs. He was approached out of the blue by an older white man.

“I could tell he’d seen my pictures. He shook my hand and said ‘I know I don’t know you, but I will march for you. I’ve seen your pictures, and I’ve never seen Black Lives Matter rallies from that angle before or understood before. I will march for you.’”

Another time, Adams was approached in the Culver’s parking lot by another, older white man who pointed out that Adams’ brake lights were out. The man looked him in the eye and said, “I want you to be safe.”

“At that point I got emotional, because at no point in my life has an older white man who I don’t know looked out for me,” Adams said, musing that just maybe things are changing in this country, a little bit at a time.

As Adams’ pictures gained traction on social media, his photography business started to take off. Requests for gigs started to come in, as well as

requests to purchase t-shirts with his iconic Black Lives Matter rally photo on it.

Then, towards the end of July, his daughter’s school reached out. Kinley wasn’t acting like her normal, outgoing self.

In the coming days, it became clear something wasn’t right. Kinley complained of headaches and pain in her eyes. One morning she woke up with slurred speech. At the hospital, a CT scan and MRI revealed a lesion on Kinley’s brain. She was referred to the St. Louis Children’s Hospital for testing and treatment.

Over the past few weeks, Kinley has been in and out of the hospital in St. Louis – at one point being rushed there by ambulance from Springfield when she couldn’t stop vomiting. She has spent 11 days as an inpatient, undergoing countless blood tests, IV treatments and brain scans. Adams and his wife struggled with the fear and helplessness that comes from watching your child suffer and not being able to fix it for them.

Throughout the ordeal, they have been buoyed by an outpouring of love and support from friends, family and fans of Adams’ photography.

When Gunn read about Kinley’s medical issues on Facebook, she offered to start a GoFundMe account on his behalf to defray the costs of medical bills and travel to St. Louis. As a pediatric nurse and a mother whose own children have been hospitalized, she realized that it can be nerve wracking for parents facing mounting bills, especially

in the middle of a pandemic.

“Parents should be bedside when their kids are ill and need them, and unfortunately many parents have to choose between being bedside with their child or keeping a roof over their head,” said Gunn.

“I was just overwhelmed that a complete stranger did that for me,” Adams said.

It looks like Kinley will be OK. The consensus of her medical team seems to indicate that she may have contracted West Nile Virus, which is responding well to antibiotics and steroids. She is now at home with her family and looking forward to starting T-ball at the end of August.

As for Adams, he is still taking pictures and working to build his photography business. He dreams of a day when he can make photography his full-time occupation, whether as a photojournalist or a portrait photographer. And throughout it all, he stays positive.

“As long as I kept my daughter positive and I kept a positive attitude, I’ve seen that positivity will outlast the negative times. That’s why I wear a mask that says positive vibes only.”

No fair

In a normal year, the Twilight Parade would be kicking off the Illinois State fair tonight, but 2020 has already been anything but normal. COVID-19 cancelled the Fair for the first time since World War II, affecting everything

from agriculture to nonprofits who rely on revenue from working the gates and Grandstand. In this issue, we examine the ripple effects of not having a fair, plus offer some suggestions for how to enjoy fair activities on your own.

Politics with no parade

2020 candidates must get creative in lieu of in-person options

Doris Turner can't remember a time in the past 30 years she hasn't been a part of the Twilight Parade. "It is such a Sangamon County tradition. And it seems like we're losing so much of our traditions during this time of pandemic ... it really is a drain on our community as a whole," said Turner, a Springfield city council member and chair of the Sangamon County Democratic Party.

"The Twilight Parade was not only symbolic of the opening of the state fair, a major event in Springfield and central Illinois, but it was a time when all of our candidates, all of our officeholders, would get together in one place, meeting and greeting constituents."

For the first time in recent memory, the state fair is canceled. At the same time, candidates from the top of ticket on down are struggling to get out campaign messaging mid-pandemic. In-person events such as the parade are chances for candidates to connect with constituents, and the fair is steeped with other political happenings, such as booths for officeholders, Republican and Democrat days and related gatherings. In a world where voters are deluged with political ads, face-to-face events are still valued. But now alternatives must be used to get out the message, and to get out the vote.

While the big talk of 2020 is the presidential race, Springfield-area voters have other contested races to consider. One with national attention

is the race between Democratic nominee Betsy Dirksen Londrigan and incumbent Republican Rodney Davis for the 13th Congressional District. Londrigan came close to unseating Davis in 2016. Numerous county races are uncontested, though Republican state's attorney Dan Wright faces Democratic hopeful Michael Drake. Of 15 county board positions up for election, six will have Democrats and Republicans facing off, while the rest have Republicans running uncontested.

Turner said social media is more important than ever and Rosemarie Long, chair of the Sangamon County Republican Party, agreed. "I think social media tops the list of the new and most-used tools for campaigning," said Long. Another tried-and-true socially distant method will also be put in practice — phone calls. But in general, Long said this year is "definitely going to be exceedingly difficult." For safety reasons, canvassers won't be knocking on doors to have conversations about candidates.

John Keating, a lifelong Springfield resident and 32-year-old stay-at-home parent, is running for office for the first time this year as a Green Party candidate. He's running to represent the 96th Illinois House District. With little funding and no paid staff, social media and a website are two of the ways he's getting out word of his candidacy and position on issues. "My social media platform is very organic. I've built it over a num-

ber of years through the activism that I've done," he said. Earlier in the year, he earned attention for counter-protesting demonstrators who are anti-mask and COVID-19 related mandates. He also helped organize anti-racism demonstrations. He said he plans to have online forums as well as in-person ones in outdoor settings with social distancing. Keating said for his generation, it's "second nature to take pictures of things, post what we're doing. And for me, it's a way to show people that they aren't alone."

Get-out-the-vote efforts generally will be different this year. Voters will be urged to cast their ballots by mail. While running for the top spot in Illinois, Gov. JB Pritzker blanketed registered voters across the state in 2016 with applications to vote by mail. "Candidates have found that's an effective tool for them," said Matt Dietrich, spokesperson for the Illinois State Board of Elections. A new election law requires all county clerks to send out applications to vote by mail to registered voters. Dietrich said priorities are to educate voters of the options available to them and ensure in-person voting options are "as safe as possible." Early voting hours will also be expanded. And one thing even those who don't vote this year will likely notice — Election Day, Nov. 3, was declared a state holiday. □

Animal exhibitions adapt to the times

For city kids, the Illinois State Fair provides a rare glimpse into rural life. A walk by the barns often shows a livestock farmer in action, mucking out stalls and tending to animals. “Want to milk a cow? Here ya go kid, grab hold and squeeze.” Though it takes practice, most of us get the hang of milking well enough to squeeze out a little bit of milk, as well as gain a new-found appreciation for farmers. In mid-day, it’s not uncommon to look up and see a pair of feet, attached to the body of a farm kid grabbing a nap in the heat of the day in the loft above the animals’ stalls.

The smells of fresh grain or hay – or of fresh manure – are a sensory experience not soon forgotten. Seeing baby pigs, or watching them being born, is a highlight for many children, as is walking through barn after barn of farm animals. The pride on the face of an FFA or 4-H exhibitor showing their animals is remarkable.

With the cancellation of both the Illinois and Du Quoin State Fair, the Department of Agriculture (IDOA) has stepped up to provide an alternative for animal exhibitors. “The director of agriculture and the governor wish to provide each participant, aged 8-21, an opportunity to exhibit their animals,” according to Brian Sager, the general livestock superintendent of the Junior Livestock Expo for the IDOA.

The Junior Livestock Show will be held in Springfield at the Illinois State Fairgrounds two weekends in September. Sept. 11-13 is reserved for beef cattle, sheep, dairy goats, pygmy goats and rabbits, while Sept. 18-20 will showcase swine, dairy cattle and meat goats. According to a press release, “IDOA will be awarding ribbons to Champions, Reserve Champions, Grand Champions, and Reserve Grands in each species and will also be paying out premiums based on total entry monies received in a ‘jackpot’ style format.”

Sager assures the public that the exhibition will be “done in a safe and appropriate manner given the COVID-19 situation, in order to help guard each exhibitor, their families, visitors and staff.” Face masks are required, as is social distancing, while overnight camping is discouraged.

A Junior Horse Show will be held at the Du Quoin State Fairgrounds in late August featuring the English style, with the Western style held the following weekend in September.

What may happen to these events if Sangamon or Perry counties revert to Phase Three, with a limit on gatherings of 10 people or more, is up to the governor and the IDOA director, said Sager. These activities “are really intended



for the exhibitors and their families,” Sager states, though visitors may attend.

While the Governor’s Sale of Champions has been canceled, Sager emphasized, “We really are talking about opportunities for our young exhibitors. They are the future of our livestock industry.”

Members of 4-H are adjusting to a virtual animal showing this year, says Carissa Davis, extension educator with 4-H Youth Development. After signing up, 4-H members will upload a 60-second video, showing their animals in the same way as they would live, displaying all sides of the animal, plus walking or handling them, depending on the species. A judge will review these short videos from a remote computer, give ratings and feedback and award ribbons.

Though the Sangamon County 4-H livestock auction was also canceled, the Sangamon County 4-H Foundation has been working to solicit donations from local businesses and farmers so that exhibitors can still receive awards for their efforts.

The public may view the animals and all other 4-H projects virtually at www.facebook.com/LMS.4H/ after Aug. 12.

While we may miss our chance to milk a cow or see a newborn pig this year, young people throughout Illinois are still working hard to raise and show the highest-quality animals possible. For the rest of us, we may participate in this aspect of the fair as we do many areas of life these days – virtually. □

No fun and no funds

Fair cancellation impacts nonprofits

Many people will have more time on their hands this August. During a typical August, thousands of individuals volunteer at the Illinois State Fair staffing parking lots, admission gates and Grandstand concessions to help local charities and community organizations raise needed funds. No fair means a significant loss of revenue for these organizations. The American Business Club of Springfield (ABC) and its many partner organizations, the Animal Protective League and Rotary Club of Springfield Sunrise are just a few examples of nonprofits who are impacted. The loss of revenue is easier to quantify than the loss of social interaction and camaraderie associated with volunteering at the fair.

ABC has been responsible for gate admissions since 2004 and has handled Grandstand concession sales since 1954. ABC members partner with volunteers from other community groups, which receive a donation for their efforts. You can’t enter the Illinois State Fair without passing by one of these volunteers. More than 3,000 people devote over 19,000 hours to manage this operation, which is a year-long process to organize. Last year, ABC donated more than \$90,000 to 59 different organizations for their help at the admission gates. And, ABC awarded nearly \$60,000 in grants from revenues generated through Grandstand concessions.

Church groups, sororities and fraternities, middle and high school clubs and sports teams, the Faith Coalition for the Common Good, Brother James Court and the Kiwanis Club are examples of organizations that helped last year and received funding for their programs. Many return to volunteer every year. Participants also have fun, even when they work 10-hour days.

Kevin Lust has been involved at the fair since ABC first became responsible for admissions and says the social aspect can’t be overstated. Friendships have been formed that continue over many years, and Lust says their involvement is a tremendous recruiting tool. ABC has grown to be the largest Ambucs chapter in the country, with over 220 members. Ambucs helps people with disabilities, and ABC donates dozens of specially designed AmTrykes to local children and veterans.

The Springfield Southeast High School Baseball Team has volunteered with ABC for many years. Coach Brad Leininger cites many benefits, in addition to raising money for uniforms, practice equipment and other needs. He credits ABC with giving teams the opportunity to work together. “We are a family, on and off the field,” says Leininger.

Working at the fair brings families together, and Leininger says he benefits by getting to know

parents he isn’t able to talk to while on the field coaching. Separately from ABC, Leininger also helps organize barn cleaning, which is often described in more colorful terms. This is another way youth sports teams and community groups raise money during the fair. “Working at the fair helps teach kids a work ethic,” says Leininger.

The Animal Protective League (APL) is located just north of the fairgrounds on Taintor Road. For over 20 years, APL has raised funds during the fair by operating a campground and parking cars. This has grown to generate \$25,000 - \$30,000 annually, and the funding comes at an important time as donations typically slow down in summer. APL is now considering creative fundraising alternatives, such as having a virtual parking event.

Deana Corbin, APL executive director, also cites the social benefits. She says volunteers are essential, and APL is lucky to have so many people who are generous with their time. She is amazed that some volunteers take vacation time to help because they like doing it so much. Many campers return each year, forging friendships with other campers.

The Rotary Club of Springfield Sunrise has operated a parking lot near the corner of Sangamon Avenue and Peoria Road for many years, thanks to a partnership with Ace Hardware, which owns the property. All proceeds are allocated to a community grants program, which helps disadvantaged children. The Sunrise Rotary Club distributes around \$10,000 annually to local organizations that help youth, and parking revenue generates a significant portion. Many fair visitors choose to park in the lot because proceeds help kids. Although it is challenging to staff the lot for the duration of the fair, members enjoy the camaraderie and getting to know each other better.

The irony is that so many organizations are needing to raise money while restrictions are in place on people gathering and numerous fundraising events have been cancelled. There is no simple way to replace funds normally generated through the fair. With no state fair, organizations will miss out on funds, and the many volunteers will also miss the fun associated with working at the Illinois State Fair to support a cause that is important to them. □

Building a butter cow

In my early 20s, I worked at a dairy in Longmont, Colorado. The company, which was part of the grassroots movement to revive home milk delivery, was known for having the creamiest, most delicious milk in the state of Colorado. In the early morning hours, long before anyone else was awake, milkmen (and women) dressed in pristine white uniforms would leave cold, glass bottles of milk on the doorsteps of families all over town. Everything about it felt wholesome and simple, and I loved being part of it.

Initially, I started working at the company's country store, which was located at the base of Rocky Mountain National Park. Year-round, I would sell milk, half-and-half and whipping cream in glass bottles to friendly locals. In the summertime, I hand-scooped ice cream for excited tourists preparing for their ascent up the breathtaking mountainside into Estes Park, hoping to view the craggy, awe-inspiring summit of Longs Peak. During the winter months, I worked hard to keep the decadent homemade eggnog in stock, a feat that sometimes proved impossible.

I loved working at the country store, but I knew that there were better job opportunities available to me through the company, and soon I had a new job writing the weekly newsletter. *The Moo News* included information about the company, employee spotlights, farm information, recipes and a listing of local events. It was distributed to customers along with their weekly milk delivery and passed out with the employee paychecks. Because of *The Moo News*, I discovered how much I enjoyed writing, and I also learned a great deal about all things dairy-related. That's why, when my editor phoned me about writing an article about the Illinois State Fair Butter Cow, I jumped at the chance. Some people may find such an assignment "udderly" ridiculous, but to me, it felt like coming home.

The Butter Cow is a life-size cow crafted out of 500 pounds of butter and has been an icon at the Illinois State Fair since the 1920s. Sadly, for the first time since WWII, the fair was canceled this year leaving many people, including my children, wondering what they would do without their annual trip to see their favorite bovine friend.

Lucky for us, *Illinois Times* and Prairie Farms were one step ahead and collaborated to create a miniature butter cow contest. Contestants of all ages are asked to create a miniature cow out of butter and submit photographs of their creations to the *Illinois Times* website. Jumping at the chance to make any kind of mess, my kids were

delighted when I told them about the contest, and as I began setting up sticks of butter on the table for them to sculpt, I wondered aloud how I could ever again tell them not to play with their food.

What surprised us most about crafting with butter was how quickly everything within reach gets covered in a thin, slippery layer of goo. Therefore, my middle child, the one who doesn't like to get her hands dirty, declared that butter cows are "disgusting" and quickly opted out of the project. My other two children didn't seem to mind, though, and had a great time. My oldest daughter chose to use the same approach that the actual butter cow artists do and expertly molded her butter around a cow figurine we happened to have on hand. Not to be outdone, my two-year-old son grabbed a plastic bear out of the toybox and began wildly slathering it with gobs of golden butter. I'm not sure if using a bear is against the contest rules, but since 2020 is the year that anything goes, I'm guessing it will be okay. □

DIY fair food

Even though the 2020 Illinois State Fair was cancelled due to the pandemic, folks can still go out and find ways to celebrate Illinois. The very first state fair was held in 1853 in Springfield and showcased new and improved methods of agriculture and livestock production, innovations in labor and industry, the arts and education. It's still possible to keep this spirit of the Illinois State Fair alive, even if folks have to wait another year before sipping a lemon shakeup or zooming down the big slide.

Illinois grows some of the best tomatoes and sweet corn in the world, so stop by a local farm stand and score a dozen freshly picked ears and ripe tomatoes, then make your way over to one of Springfield's locally owned butcher shops and pick up some juicy pork chops and a jar of Riley's seasoning to recreate a fair favorite at home.

In 2002, Riley's Seasonings partnered with the Illinois Pork Producers to debut the now-famous pork-chop-on-a-stick at the State Fair and have sold thousands in the years since. To make this at home, liberally season the chops with Riley's Seasonings and let them sit in the fridge for at least 30 minutes to allow the savory spices to permeate the meat. Soak thick skewers in water before spearing the meat to keep them from catching fire on the grill, then sear the chops over medium-high heat until lightly charred on both sides.

You can also roast corn on the cob in your home oven just like the pros at the fair. Preheat your oven to 350 degrees and trim the top of the corn, remove the tassels and remove the first layer of husk; however, don't completely shuck the ear of corn. Place the corn directly on the oven rack and roast for about 30 minutes until the husk is brown and pulling away from the corn. When you remove the corn from the oven, wrap it in a dish towel and set aside for about 10 minutes until cool enough to handle, then simply remove the remaining husks and serve.

The Wine Experience at the State Fair, sponsored by the Illinois Grape Growers and Vintners Association, has become a major feature of the fair in recent years, featuring local wine, craft beer and live music. A short drive to Danenberger Family Vineyards in New Berlin checks all those boxes. Owner and winemaker Susan Danenberger makes top-notch wines from estate-grown fruit right here in central Illinois, served in DFV's stylish tasting room, in addition to seasonal Hand of Fate craft beers on tap. They've converted the front porch of the tasting room into a new outdoor stage with a spacious lawn area, perfect for getting your groove on while still socially distancing.



There's no butter cow this year, but folks can get up close and personal with real cows and dairy goats at local dairy farms. Prairie Fruits Farm in Champaign sells award-winning goat's milk cheeses and gelato out of their store on the farm, open on Sunday afternoons from 1-4 p.m. Guests are invited to safely enjoy a cheeseboard and a glass of wine or craft beer at distanced tables in their pavilion.

Ropp Jersey Cheese in Normal makes a variety of cheeses on site, using the milk from their herd of registered Jersey cattle. Jersey cows, with their large brown eyes and fawn-colored coat, are known for producing milk that is particularly rich in protein and butter fat, which results in some of the best cheeses around. The farm store is open Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m.-5:30 p.m. and welcomes visitors to come and see how their product is made first-hand. There is a visitor viewing area where folks can watch cheese makers hard at work, and they will even take you on a walk through the cow barn if you wish. In addition to the line of cheeses, the farm store sells local eggs, beef, pork, honey and hand-dipped ice cream.

You may not be able to visit the fair this year, but you can still enjoy many of the tastes and treats associated with the Illinois State Fair. □

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State Fair food fix

DIY corn dogs and fried green tomatoes

A year ago could anyone have envisioned a summertime in the Land of Lincoln without the Downhome Music Festival, Muni Opera, International Carillon Festival or the Illinois State Fair? For the first time since 1945, the usually bustling fairground has been silenced. The beer tents are empty. No concerts in the Grandstand. No butter cow. It's just not fair.

As committed as I am to clean and healthy eating, I must confess that what I'm really missing is my once-a-year indulgence in all my favorite state fair foods: Vose's corn dogs, fried green tomatoes, honey ice cream from the Illinois State Beekeepers Association and paper cones of piping hot Cullers French Fries with a squirt of malt vinegar. The desire still remains while the means of fulfilling that desire has been taken away. So this summer I'll have to be satisfied with a DIY Illinois State Fair food fix. I'm going to set up outside, invite over a small group of masked friends, stay six feet apart, crank up Steely Dan's "Alive in America," make some corn dogs and fried green tomatoes, and party like it's 2014!

Campfire Corn Dog Recipe

Recipe courtesy of Chef Kieron Hales-Zingerman's Cornman Farms

Corn dogs premiered at the Illinois State Fair in 1946. You could skip all the fuss and buy pre-made frozen corn dogs and nuke them. But you won't get the lovely just-fried texture of the cornmeal coating.

Materials needed

Heavy loaf pan
2 wide-mouthed Ball jars
Heavy wooden skewers or single-use chopsticks, cut to 6 inches length
Tongs
Paper towels

Ingredients

Package of hot dogs
2 cups pancake mix (The kind that requires oil, eggs and milk. Or make your own mix from scratch.)
1 cup milk
2 large eggs
½ stick unsalted butter, melted
4 tablespoons cornmeal
½ teaspoon onion powder
½ teaspoon garlic powder

1 cup AP flour
1 ½ qts. peanut or grapeseed oil. (Or use bacon fat if you really want to up your game.)

Preparation

Cut the hot dogs in half and insert skewer into the cut side, pushing ¾ the way in.

Whisk together milk and eggs in a quart Ball jar. Gradually add pancake mix, and keep whisking until batter comes together. Add the cornmeal, onion and garlic powder. Whisk until just moistened. Be careful not to overmix. Pour melted butter slowly into the batter and stir gently to incorporate.

Fill the second wide-mouth Ball jar with 1 cup AP flour.

Pour frying oil into a heavy loaf pan leaving 2 inches of space at the top. Heat frying oil to approximately 350° F. (See note below.)

Fully coat the skewered hot dogs in the jar of flour.

Shake off the excess flour and dip in the batter jar until fully covered. Pull up slowly. Allow it to drip for 5 seconds to remove the

excess batter.

Carefully dip the corn dog into the hot oil half way and count to 5 seconds. Then

gently lower the rest of the corn dog into the oil. Fry the corn dogs no more than 2 at a time to keep the oil temperature from dropping. Turn with tongs to achieve even golden browning. Fry for 2 minutes each side, until golden brown.

Remove from the oil with tongs and place on paper towels to cool.

Serve with ketchup or mustard.

Note: Check oil temperature with a deep-fry thermometer. If the oil is too hot, the batter won't stick. If oil is not hot enough, the corn dogs will be greasy. If a thermometer is not available, put a wooden chopstick in the oil. If you see bubbles starting to appear around the chopstick, it's ready for deep frying.

Fried Green Tomatoes

Though you won't find them fancied up like this at the fair, I like mine topped with a few shrimp and some Creole Remoulade Sauce.

Ingredients

½ cup AP flour
1 large egg, beaten
½ cup ground cornmeal (or ¼ cup corn bread mix and ¼ cup polenta for a

crunchier breading)

4 firm green tomatoes (Select tomatoes that are firm, but not rock hard. They should give a little when gently squeezed.)
¼ teaspoon kosher salt

½ cup peanut or canola oil (or just enough oil to cover the tomato slices)

Preparation

Place the flour on a small plate, the beaten egg in a small bowl, and the cornmeal (or cornmeal/polenta mixture) on another small plate.

Cut tomatoes into 1/3-inch slices with a serrated knife. Sprinkle both sides of each slice with a little salt to draw out moisture. Place in a colander set over the sink to drain about 10 minutes. Blot the tomato slices with paper towels to absorb excess moisture.

Dip the tomatoes individually into the flour, shake off excess, then dip into the egg wash and then dredge in the cornmeal. Place the breaded tomatoes on a cooling rack set over a sheet tray.

Pour oil into a skillet to a depth of about 1/2 inch and heat to 350 degrees F.

Carefully lower tomato slices into the hot oil and fry until golden brown, about 3-5 minutes per side. Transfer to a paper towel-lined plate, season with salt and keep warm while frying the remainder.

Creole Remoulade Sauce (optional)

Ingredients:

½ cup mayonnaise
2 T. fresh squeezed lemon juice
1 scallion, thinly sliced
1 T finely chopped parsley
1 T. Creole or whole-grain mustard
½ t. Tabasco sauce
¼ t. garlic powder
¼ t. kosher salt
½ t. paprika
¼ t. cayenne pepper

Preparation:

Whisk all ingredients together in a small bowl. Keep covered and refrigerated until ready to use. □

Greetings, music friends and fans! Welcome to the column that normally would be all about the Illinois State Fair, but since there is no fair in 2020, we can reminisce some and ruminate upon the state of the state fair. Does that sound fair to you? I will do my best to avoid using all the variations and definitions of the word “fair” and its grammatically correct relations that allow it to be an adjective, adverb, noun and verb, but it just wouldn’t be fair to the punny side of the street to not attempt a fair amount of flitting at the multi-purpose word. So as we’re not feeling fine about the cancellation of the fair and not even feeling fair-to-middling on the subject, perhaps we can add some fairings to this column and move it along faster and there will be no fare involved. Fair enough?

The big daddy of entertainment at the state fair was, is and always will be the Grandstand shows. You can find a list of all Grandstand acts from 1946 to 2016 at the website of the Illinois State Fair Museum Foundation, making for a veritable history of American show business. The WLS Barn Dance featuring Roy Rogers and Trigger was here in 1946, along with “10 most-famous barber shop quartets,” among other exciting acts. In my opinion, highlights through the decades include Louis Armstrong in 1958, The Three Stooges in 1960, the Dick Clark Show in 1962 and the Smothers Brothers, the Osmond Brothers, the Brooks Sisters and the Johnson Sisters, all in 1964.

I’ve heard stories about 1968, when The Who, in a seemingly mismatched package show, opened for The Association. In 1969, Iron Butterfly played, and if eye-witness reports are true, their drummer passed out after a 23-minute drum solo in the central

Illinois summertime humidity. 1971 brought us Merle Haggard, Red Skelton, Guess Who, Doc Severinson, Pat Boone, Jerry Lee Lewis and more, for a banner year. Jumping to 1974, jazz and instrumental music made an appearance with Dave Brubeck and Herbie Mann, plus Herb Alpert & The Tijuana Brass Band, along with a disappointed bunch of top-40 rockers when Bachman-Turner Overdrive cancelled. 1977 was a fantastic year with KC and the Sunshine Band, Johnny Cash, Bob Seger and the Bay City Rollers, plus Captain and Tennille, Marilyn McCoo and Billy Davis Jr., Charley Pride, England Dan and John Ford Coley, all topped off with the great Glen Campbell. The list goes on and on, but you get the idea of the incredible roster of artists that came every summer to entertain fairgoers.


My personal claim to fame on the Grandstand stage comes from opening up for Willie Nelson and Family in 2001 with my friends and bandmates, as Tom Irwin and the Hired Hands. Then, as the original bass player in Mr. Opporknockity, with more friends and bandmates, we opened up for Journey in 2002. My favorite story there is the telling contrast of Willie and Journey, as the Family band welcomed us with open arms in the green room, but the Journey bunch escorted us all out before the boys in the band from the Bay would even enter the room.

I’m not out of fair stories, but I am out of space so, next week I shall regale you with more fair-eee tales. Be sure to check out all the venues that are still open and hosting fairly fair-like fare at their festive establishments. Also be safe, follow protocols and be thankful for all those helping us get through these crazy times of the pandemic. □

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
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


