

With a little help from my friends

Fraudster didn't do it alone

Chris Schaller, a former mortgage broker imprisoned in June for fraud, had partners who included two state employees, according to a 2018 court affidavit used to obtain a federal search warrant for contents of Schaller's cellphone.

In addition, three appraisers whom Schaller relied on have been disciplined by the state Department of Financial and Professional Regulation.

The FBI started its investigation in 2014, according to the affidavit, after the bureau received tips that Schaller had begun living a lavish lifestyle. Schaller, according to the affidavit, had purchased a Corvette, a Mercedes, houses and acreage.

The two state employees, including one who works for Illinois State Police, were partners with Schaller, according to the affidavit prepared by FBI agent David Hood, who wrote that the three were suspected of engaging in illegal gambling operations using a bank account belonging to the two employees, whom *Illinois Times* is not naming because they've not been charged with crimes.

Mark Wykoff, attorney for the state police employee, said he had no comment. "I don't know anything about any of that," the other state employee said when asked about allegations contained in the search warrant application.

In 2017, investigators searched trash from a Springfield home where one of the employees stayed and found a ledger. "The ledger detailed a list of wagers placed on professional and collegiate sporting events," Hood wrote in the affidavit. "The pieces of paper indicate approximately \$21,150 in wagering over a three-day period."

Over the course of 22 months between 2012 and 2014, nearly \$352,000 flowed through the joint bank account established by the two state employees, according to the affidavit. During that time frame, one of the employees deposited \$53,300 in cash into the account in a series of

nine deposits ranging from \$9,000 to \$300, according to Hood's affidavit. "Evidence suggests these significant cash transactions could be associated with an illegal gambling operation," Hood wrote.

Cash from the two employees, according to Hood's affidavit, may have been used to help purchase a home a decade ago. In the space of 30 minutes, the two state employees purchased \$38,000 in cashier's checks, with each of four checks, from four different banks, in the amount of \$9,500, which is \$500 below a \$10,000 threshold at which financial institutions are required to report cash transactions to the government, Hood writes in his affidavit. Each check was made payable to Schaller, who purchased a cashier's check for \$6,559.98 four days later. That same day, a trust with Schaller as the sole beneficiary bought a Riverton home for \$44,559.98, the exact sum of the five cashier's checks, according to the affidavit.

Fifteen months later, in 2013, a 22-year-old man who made \$9 an hour bought the house for nearly \$87,000 via Schaller, who helped with paperwork. After closing, the title company released proceeds from the sale, more than \$86,000, to the trust controlled by Schaller. Five days later, Schaller transferred \$38,105 from his bank account to the joint account held by the state employees who'd given Schaller cashier's checks, according to Hood's affidavit. Eighteen months later, the man who'd bought the house defaulted, and U.S. Bank, which had purchased the note from Diamond Residential Mortgage, Schaller's then-employer, foreclosed. The deal was one of 10 cited by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation as an example of Schaller's misdeeds, which found that he'd falsified paperwork, and so fined him \$128,000 in 2018 and revoked his mortgage loan

originator's license.

In 2017, according to the affidavit, Schaller processed a home loan for the 91-year-old mother of one of the state employees. Shortly before the loan went through, she purportedly signed an affidavit stating that she wanted to move from Jacksonville to Springfield so that she could be closer to her doctors, according to the affidavit and the 2018 IDFPR order revoking Schaller's state license. Earnest money for the house purchased in her name came from the joint bank account controlled by the two state employees, according to Hood's affidavit.

After the deal closed, the employee established garbage service in his own name at the Springfield home while his mother continued living in Jacksonville. FBI surveillance and trash recovered from the house established that the employee was living in the house with his children, according to Hood's affidavit. When questioned by authorities, the employee's mother said that the affidavit with her signature stating her desire to move to Springfield was fraudulent, according to the IDFPR order.

Schaller had many allies, according to a Diamond employee who spoke to the IDFPR and FBI. IDFPR disciplined three real-estate appraisers after the employee told the department and the FBI that they were involved in efforts to establish valuations that would help green-light mortgages so that Schaller could earn commissions. The appraisers include Nathaniel Radwine, whose state license was suspended indefinitely in 2019; Sean McKinney, who received a reprimand and a \$4,500 fine in 2020; and Lora L. Metcalf Crocker, whose license was revoked in 2020. She also was fined \$7,000.

Between 2011 and 2016, Crocker appraised approximately 40 properties and set values predetermined by Schaller, according to a 2020 consent order with the IDFPR, which says that she requested additional compensation for doing so. Radwine discussed valuations with Schaller and "may" have accommodated requests to establish specific values, according to an IDFPR consent order. McKinney, the IDFPR alleged, accepted appraisal assignments that he should have rejected because they included inappropriate conditions.

The Diamond employee who named appraisers during his interview with the FBI and IDFPR said that Schaller kept a maroon folder containing letterhead from banks, hospitals, a home inspection company and other entities,

with letterhead created by erasing the contents of legitimate letters so that fake ones could be created so loans would be approved. "Anytime a legitimate letter would come in, he'd add it to the folder," the employee told the FBI and IDFPR. When a credit score was low, Schaller enlisted a self-storage company to falsely assert that a borrower had a history of paying rent on time, the employee said.

Illinois Times is not naming the employee, who remains with Diamond Residential Mortgage, because he has not been charged with a crime or sanctioned by state regulators. He did not respond to an email or telephone message requesting comment. The employee admitted signing documents with clients' names and impersonating dead people when calling banks to get payoff amounts on mortgages if a deal involved a deceased person. What began as innocuous shortcuts in signing clients' names to routine paperwork grew into something more, the employee said. One example was a request to change a foreclosure date on paperwork prepared by a sheriff's department, he said. "I was like, dude, this is insane," the employee said.

Schaller, the employee said, asked others to sign clients' names on documents and otherwise break rules. "It would get to the point where he would ask for something outlandish," the employee told the feds and IDFPR. "It got to the point where, I'm not doing this anymore, and he would move on to the next person. They would get to the point where they wouldn't do it anymore, and he'd move on to the next person."

The employee had never worked in the mortgage industry before Schaller hired him.

"He said this is normal, this is what you do," the employee told the FBI and IDFPR. "He was very hungry and always encouraged other people to be hungry as well. ... Unfortunately, a lot of us made very poor decisions."

After Schaller fell under investigation, Diamond Residential Mortgage agreed to establish a \$1.28 million fund to make consumers whole.

In a written statement, a spokesperson for Diamond Residential Mortgage said, "From the beginning, the company instructed its employees to fully cooperate with federal and state authorities in their thorough investigation and the company also cooperated in the criminal prosecution of Mr. Schaller. Schaller took advantage not just of Diamond's customers, but of the company and its employees too. The company went on to strengthen its processes and procedures consistent with its consent order with the state of Illinois." □

Can race riot site become part of National Park Service?

Study to result in recommendation to Congress

The National Park Service (NPS) is conducting a “special resource study” to determine if the 1908 Springfield Race Riot site meets the criteria to be included in the national park system. Public comments are being accepted online now through Sept. 3 (see link below).

The NPS hosted a meeting Aug. 10 to explain the process and invite public comment. Approximately 100 people filled the meeting room at the NAACP office on South 11th Street. Those present included elected officials and the great-grandson of Ida B. Wells. There were representatives of the NAACP, Hospital Sisters Health System, Springfield Urban League, ACLU, Black Lives Matter Springfield, Springfield African American History Museum, Route History, Jewish Federation of Springfield and the Sierra Club. These groups, and individual citizens, expressed their united support for national recognition of the site and inclusion in the national park system.

The Springfield Rail Improvements Project led to the discovery of the remains of five homes that were burned during the 1908 Springfield Race Riot. An archaeological excavation of the site has been underway near Madison and 10th Streets since 2014 by Fever River Research. The Illinois State Museum is the repository for the artifacts. The special resource study, which is being conducted at the direction of Congress, will evaluate the archaeological site as well as other locations and buildings around Springfield that played an important role in the riot and its aftermath. The 1908 Race Riot led to the formation of the NAACP.

There are 423 units in the national park system, and only 63 are national parks. There are numerous other designations. For a site to be recommended for inclusion in the national park system, it must contain nationally significant natural and/or cultural resources and represent a resource that is not already adequately represented in the national park system, or comparably represented and protected by another entity. It must be feasible for the NPS to manage over the long term. And, the NPS must be the best entity to manage the site, compared to other agencies or organizations. The study will determine if the race riot site meets these criteria.

Julie Bell, cultural resource manager for the NPS based in Denver, explained some of the questions to be answered. Is the story to be told important to U.S. history? Is the story being told somewhere else? Can people get access to the site? How easy or hard will it be to staff? What is the

cost to the NPS for acquisition and staffing? Are there any threats to resources to be managed? Are there partnership opportunities?

The study got underway in March 2022. A final report will be submitted by the National Park Service to the Secretary of the Interior in Spring 2023. The NPS doesn't take an official position during the study; however, the final report will include a specific recommendation related to inclusion in the national park system. Tokey Boswell, NPS associate regional director, said that 60-70% of the special resource studies result in “positive findings.” Of those, about 75% become a national park system site. The NPS cannot independently add a site. That takes an Act of Congress, signed by the president. Or, the president has the authority under the Antiquities Act to declare a site a National Monument within the national park system, which does not require approval by Congress.

The public comment portal on the NPS website invites people to answer questions about their vision for preserving the race riot site and how it should be managed; what types of activities and experiences are desired; what features, values and stories are most important; and, whether they support designation as a unit of the national park system. There is also an opportunity to

There is widespread bipartisan and community support for telling the poignant stories of the 1908 Springfield Race Riot. Hanson is leading the massive Springfield Rail Improvements Project. The company engaged one of its consultants, RDG Planning & Design, headquartered in Des Moines, to develop a conceptual design for a 1908 Race Riot memorial. They also created a stakeholder group with local members, including the NAACP, to provide input to the design. A bronze sculpture of a tree symbolizing a lynching tree is one of the powerful features of the proposed memorial. The growing GOP gap

Gubernatorial candidate Darren Bailey loved by right-wing but alienates moderates

To win the Illinois governorship, Republican candidate Darren Bailey needs to capture the votes of moderate and independent voters, particularly in the suburbs, and there is serious doubt whether he can accomplish this, former Gov. Jim Edgar told *Illinois Times*.

“There really aren’t many moderates left in the Republican Party. So, when you talk about ‘moderate Republicans,’ what we are really talking about are independents who often vote Republican,” he said.

Edgar said he has made up his mind on who he will vote for but will not disclose it publicly. State Sen. Bailey’s positions on abortion, guns and other social issues are repelling moderate and independent voters, he added.

Edgar said Bailey projects an affable, non-threatening persona when chatting one-on-one. But when he gets behind a podium and delivers prepared remarks, he is often off-putting to moderates and independents.

“OK, he’s won the primary by being conservative. But if he’s going to win the general election, he’s going to need to moderate his message,” he said.

Edgar suggested de-emphasizing his rhetoric against abortion and for gunowner rights and hitting hard on economic issues such as taxes and jobs. But he said the key to scoring an upset against his Democratic opponent, JB Pritzker, is to emphasize the escalating crime rate in the Chicago area.

“There are many in the Chicago area who are concerned about crime. Some people want to move because of it. It’s not as big an issue downstate, but it may play in Chicago,” he said.

Pritzker enters the race with the advantages of incumbency and a nearly unlimited war chest because of his enormous personal wealth. In 2018,

he spent \$218 million of his own money to get elected. *Money* magazine has noted that Pritzker, an heir to the Hyatt hotel fortune, is the wealthiest elected official in the United States.

Edgar and others interviewed for this article said Pritzker has the advantage going into the race, but there is a possible path to victory for Bailey, albeit a narrow one.

Former state treasurer Dan Rutherford said he has seen far too many political upsets during his career to write off Bailey but agreed he needs to moderate his message.

“He is so far right and so blatant about it. I sense that he leads with that a lot. I think leading with economic, fiscal, financial issues is a lot safer route,” Rutherford said.

During his time in the General Assembly, Rutherford, a Republican, was relatively fiscally conservative but was supportive of same-sex marriage and other gay-rights legislation. He identifies as pro-life and generally opposed gun control measures.

Recently, Bailey compared legal abortion in the United States to the Holocaust, a statement many people found offensive.

“In regards to religion, Illinois isn’t like grandpa’s Illinois. Illinois is a very diverse state,” Rutherford said. “And gay marriage wasn’t a whisper in grandpa’s age, and interracial marriage wasn’t accepted like you see today. ... And you know, when it comes to guns, given his position, I don’t think I would lead on issues like that – especially when you’ve got a shooting at Six Flags. And you’ve got the 4th of July destroyed for (Highland Park) families – all in Lake County.”

Also, Rutherford noted that Bailey has not always been judicious in choosing the legislation he has sponsored. For example, the Xenia lawmaker sponsored a resolution calling for making Chicago a separate state.

“That is a testament to the depth that a person has thought and prepared to become a major executive. Yeah, he got his press pops when he sponsored that. But that has to be measured against

where you see your future. Look at Barack Obama. Barack was cautious with regards to not just his (bill) sponsorships, but his votes. Part of that was in preparation if he decided to pursue higher office. From what I understand of his past, I don’t think Bailey has done this.”

Rutherford said Bailey runs the risk of Pritzker using his past involvement with such legislation to define him as divisive or radical.

Pat Brady, a former chairman of the Illinois Republican Party, said Bailey is making a mistake in closely aligning himself with Donald Trump.

“Unequivocally embracing Trump, who lost the state twice by more than a million votes, is not the way to get elected,” he said.

Brady, who is pro-choice, said Bailey needs to focus on persuading suburbanites, particularly women, to support him.

“What I’ve said for a long time is that you can get the most conservative candidate – who doesn’t scare suburban women. And what’s happened in the last eight days has really been a giant step backwards by making abortion and the Holocaust comparison front and center.”

Both Edgar and Brady said they anticipate Bailey will carry downstate Illinois but added that won’t in itself be enough to win statewide office.

When asked how Bailey’s positions will play with suburban, moderate voters, Rutherford said, “Well, let me think here: Abortion? No. Guns? No. Religious positioning? Not really.”

He added that he anticipates most Republican state lawmakers will distance themselves from Bailey.

“Some of the southern Illinois players may embrace and participate, but I think you’ll find that the majority of (Republican) legislators are going to try to just play their own campaign, keep their heads down and avoid eye contact.” □

Addressing the fears of a new school year

In the wake of the horrific tragedy in Uvalde, Texas, many children and their parents are dealing with additional fears that have arisen in light of returning to school. While some anxiety about starting the new school year is common, beginning school in the wake of such an enormous tragedy has put many children and parents on edge.

Jonathan Ponser, manager of Memorial Behavioral Therapy Services in Springfield, says parents must first deal with their own fears. “You have to come to terms with your own thoughts and feelings about it before you’re able to provide support to your child,” states Ponser. “If you’re conflicted and not feeling safe, your kids will see right through that.”

One way of addressing fears is to realize that a mass shooting at a school is actually quite rare. “If it was something happening all the time, we’d be numb to it. The fact that we aren’t is a good thing, because it shows it doesn’t happen frequently,” explains Ponser.

According to statistics provided by Ponser, based off data from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, only about 2% of student homicides happen in schools, with the remainder occurring off-site in the community. Mass shootings are 10 times more likely

to happen in restaurants, and homicide in general is 200 times more likely to happen in a personal residence. “Schools are the safest place for a person to be in terms of likelihood for homicide,” says Ponser.

Another reassurance is that Springfield School District 186 schools and local police are proactive when it comes to dealing with potential security threats.

“I feel like anything that has been even a rumbling of a threat around here, authorities have been quick [to act],” states Ponser. “I feel that is encouraging that they’ve been clearly monitoring things pretty closely in this area.”

After dealing with their own fears, then it’s time for parents to check in with their children, listening to what they have to say and addressing fears as they arise. Ponser warns against answering unasked questions because “there might be things that we’re thinking they are worried about, but it might not be those things. If we are bringing up things that they haven’t even thought about, now they have even more anxiety.”

Answering in an age-appropriate manner is important. Younger children don’t necessarily need to have a lot of details. Older children may need to be

reminded that a plan is in place should any potential dangers like fires, tornadoes or shootings happen at school. Drills for these events have best practices put into place to keep everyone safe.

Fifteen schools in District 186 house The Children’s MOSAIC Project, which provides master’s-level therapists who work closely with school social workers and principals to identify students who are struggling with mental health concerns. Students who are referred to MOSAIC are supported not only with mental health services, but additional concerns are addressed such as housing, medical and other social equity issues. Programs like MOSAIC can nip potential problems in the bud, plus also provide support for children who are dealing with excessive fears.

To ease our fears about life in general, Ponser suggests we “focus on things that we do have in our control. That can decrease anxiety and help us feel more at ease with the world in general.”

For children who may seem stressed or worried, Ponser advises encouraging them “to engage in other activities to help them feel more empowered, more in control, more calm. If there’s a hobby or something they are really interested in, maybe this is a good time to do those things, especially if they are feeling very

worried. In times when I’m doing something I’m good at, I feel good about myself. I have control over it, and everything in my life feels more secure.”

Many parents feel moved to become involved in social or political movements, such as gun regulation or gun abolition movements. This can make parents feel like they are doing something, which can be another effective way of dealing with anxiety.

If you feel anxiety is greatly affecting your daily living, or affecting your child, speak to your primary care physician. If you feel a mental health crisis is imminent, call 988 for immediate assistance. The Suicide & Crisis Lifeline offers 24/7 call, text and chat access to trained crisis counselors who can help people experiencing a mental health crisis or any other kind of emotional distress.

The Living Room at Memorial Behavioral Health, 710 N. Eighth, can help adults age 18 and over who are experiencing a mental health crisis. Walk-ins are welcome, Monday through Friday, 10:30 a.m.-6:30 p.m.

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Pritzker attacks Bailey over abortion, social media posts

The ongoing uproar over Darren Bailey's 2017 claim that the Holocaust "doesn't even compare on a shadow" to the lives lost to abortion reminded me of a scene in an old movie called *A Bronx Tale*.

The claim Bailey made on Facebook exploded into view courtesy of a brutal TV ad by Gov. JB Pritzker's campaign. The ad begins with an announcer previewing an already-used video clip of Bailey saying he would not allow a woman who was raped or a victim of incest to have an abortion. "You may have thought you heard everything that Darren Bailey had to say about abortion," the voice-over person says before the clip is played. "But that's not all Darren Bailey has said," the person continues as the newly unearthed clip is shown to viewers.

The closing tagline of "Darren Bailey, too extreme for Illinois," is then flashed on the screen. That's pretty close to the same language used in Democratic ads which aired during the Republican primary.

There are those who say that, judging from

experience, if Pritzker is using something this over the top in August, then oh my goodness, he must have some really strong opposition research in store for voters when the campaign cranks up this fall.

That could very well be, and it doesn't help matters much right now that Bailey's billionaire GOP primary benefactor Richard Uihlein has not directly contributed any money to Bailey's campaign since the primary, so attacking when your opponent can't fight back in-kind has its advantages. Bailey released a response video to another Pritzker TV ad (calling him out for hypocritically taking millions in federal farm subsidies while opposing other government social programs) that has so far received views in the hundreds, not the millions who would see something on TV.

Either way, this is a true political beat-down. And it didn't stop there. Bailey at first walked his comments back by saying, "The Holocaust is a human tragedy without parallel. In no way was I attempting to diminish the atrocities of the Holocaust and its stain on

history. I meant to emphasize the tragedy of millions of babies being lost."

Then, the very next day, Bailey told Fox 32's Dane Placko that his words were "taken out of context as they typically are," and blamed reporters.

Then, Bailey was asked by a Fox Valley radio station host if he needed to apologize. Instead of doing so, Bailey laughed and said, "The Jewish community themselves have told me that I'm right," and went on to claim that "the Jewish rabbis" he'd met with had told him he was "actually right."

Bailey inexplicably kept the story alive, and Pritzker took full advantage, pounding away at his opponent every chance he got. And since then, the Pritzker campaign has piled on by providing some opposition research to reporters about other Bailey Facebook posts. And the Illinois Muslim Civic Coalition recently issued a press release complaining that "Multiple social media posts by gubernatorial candidate Darren Bailey and his wife are Islamophobic, anti-Semitic, and xenophobic."

And that brings me back to the movie, which follows a young Italian-American boy as he learns life lessons from those around him, including from some mobsters.

In the scene, a biker gang known for busting up bars unwittingly walks into a mob-owned bar and, after being told they could stay for a couple of beers, begins to cause trouble. The top mob boss tells the bikers to leave. After being rudely rebuffed, he quietly walks to the front door and locks it, then turns around and faces the bikers: "Now youse can't leave," he says.

The mob boss' underlings immediately stream in through the back door brandishing baseball bats, pistols and other implements of destruction and absolutely pummel the bikers, who are then dragged outside and beaten some more, including by bystanders.

And that's basically how the rest of this campaign is going to go, even when/if Bailey's coffers are replenished. Pritzker never took his foot off of Bruce Rauner's political throat four years ago even though he was way ahead in the polls, and he kept whacking Richard Irvin long after Irvin was clearly no longer viable in the recent GOP primary. It's just how they roll over there. Toss in the fact that Pritzker helped found a Holocaust museum, and abortion rights is an issue which appears to animate him, and you can understand the desire to go all-out on this one. □

I write to compliment Dean Olsen on his recent article regarding the Navigator CO₂ Pipeline proposed to run through Sangamon County. Our residents have every right to insist on our safety ("CO₂ pipeline project proceeding," Aug. 4).

Please contact your township officials and Sangamon County Board members to implement minimum CO₂ pipeline setbacks from housing, businesses, nursing homes, schools and other occupied buildings so that if the pipeline ruptures (and pipelines always rupture eventually) that we can minimize the number of people that will be asphyxiated, as happened in Satartia, Mississippi.

Secondly, insist that Navigator pay for the EMS to acquire all-electric emergency vehicles that will be needed over the life of the pipeline in advance of a rupture, because gas-powered engines cannot run in the presence of a CO₂ rupture and our taxpayers should not be required to fund them. No news isn't good news

Just because we haven't heard it, doesn't mean it isn't true

Recently I was struck by a conversation I had with a progressive friend. When I noted the significant decrease in extreme world poverty over the past two decades – a remarkable achievement that has attracted relatively little news coverage – he responded by confidently denying that this was so. His reasoning was instructive: If this were true, he said, he would have heard about it by now.

Reasoning from an absence of news is a familiar, and often justified, phenomenon. If you are worried that your favorite sports team is thinking of trading its star player, it would be reasonable to regard the absence of news as indicating that the player has not yet been traded.

But as my friend's case makes clear, this sort of reasoning can also lead us badly astray. Suppose that your preferred news sources do not regularly report on a given topic. If you assume that they do offer coverage on that topic, you risk making the sort of mistake my friend made.

There are many examples of this sort of situation. Early in the pandemic, for example, those who assumed that their newspapers were keeping them fully informed of the known health risks of COVID-19 were mistaken.

Faulty expectations of news coverage in the United Kingdom were implicated in people's mistaken impression of the prevalence of sexual harassment on college campuses. And matters are particularly acute for local news: Many of us continue to assume a degree of coverage that does not reflect the dramatic decrease in the number of local news outlets.

Thus arises a subtle but pervasive problem in the way we consume news. Unlike the more familiar, but still very important, problem of



“fake news,” which requires us to distinguish true reports from false ones, the problem here concerns our response to an absence of news. How we respond to such absences can be as important as how we respond to news reports themselves.

Our problem, then, is to determine when it is proper to interpret the absence of news as indicating that there is nothing newsworthy to report. When is it proper, in other words, to endorse the “no news shortcut”?

Cases in which this shortcut is proper are easy to come by. If I haven't heard that the Eiffel Tower has collapsed, it probably hasn't.

But not all important information is as memorable, as simple to convey or as certain to be widely reported as the news of the collapse of the Eiffel Tower. The state of campus politics, the incidence of white supremacist rhetoric in police departments, the conditions in your local prison – such matters might not be reported by the news outlets you favor.

To rely on the “no news shortcut” in these cases is to persist in whatever beliefs you happen to have about the state of campus politics or the conditions in your local prison. This is a problem when your beliefs are false or outdated.

One feature is what political scientists

David Broockman and Joshua Kalla call the “partisan coverage filtering” bias, which arises when one's preferred source of news is selective in its coverage. In research not yet published, Broockman and Kalla provide initial evidence for the manner in which this bias reinforces one's deeply held political beliefs. Consider a devotee of Fox News: He may dismiss reliable reports regarding climate change on the grounds that he hasn't encountered such reports on Fox.

So when can we safely employ the “no news shortcut”?

Simply being aware of the problem can help.

In addition, we need to be aware of the broad range of assumptions we make when we employ this shortcut. We are assuming that the relevant facts are readily observable, that reporters are competent and would succeed in publishing their findings, and that we would come across any relevant reports in the course of our daily routine. When these assumptions are true, following the “no news shortcut” is relatively safe; when they are false, it is risky.

In the age of social media, it is tempting to suppose that we are constantly being kept informed of all that is newsworthy. But this is an illusion, and a dangerous one at that: Our faulty expectations of coverage can lead us to feel highly confident in matters on which we are badly mistaken. □

More businesses seek to open in Sangamon County as cannabis sales climb

In many ways, the legal pot industry in Springfield is flowering, but the success of the industry's next phase appears to be in the City Council's hands.

Home to three adult-use marijuana dispensaries – and with four more dispensaries potentially on the way in the next 12 months – Springfield is in the sights of a half-dozen or more entrepreneurs who want to open small-scale cannabis cultivation centers known as craft grows.

But advocates of these indoor centers – led by Sherman resident and north-end native Jeff Fulgenzi, 51, the son of Ward 4 Ald. John Fulgenzi – contend current zoning rules are too restrictive for this sector of the state's two-and-a-half-year-old cannabis industry to thrive in Springfield.

The City Council updated Springfield's zoning law for cannabis establishments in late 2019, before the state's adult-use cannabis law that passed

the General Assembly and was signed by Gov. JB Pritzker took effect on Jan. 1, 2020.

"We think there's tremendous opportunity for continued growth in the market for boutique cannabis, which is like craft beer," said Fulgenzi, a former state employee who serves on the board of the Illinois Craft Grow Association.

But Fulgenzi, a former Republican Sangamon County Board member who is married to

Republican County Board member Annette Fulgenzi, said current zoning in Springfield created "investment exclusion zones," primarily in "long-vacant industrial use structures in the north, east and southern areas of Springfield."

Ward 3 Ald. Roy Williams and Mayor Jim Langfelder recently proposed an ordinance that eventually would relax the current zoning requirements, and Fulgenzi was lobbying for its

passage.

But the proposal failed on a 4-6 vote of the City Council on Aug. 16, with several council members saying the proposed changes were too drastic or their constituents were against the plan.

Voting in favor were council members John Fulgenzi, Shawn Gregory of Ward 2, Roy Williams Jr. of Ward 3 and Joe McMenemy of Ward 7. Voting “no” were Chuck Redpath of Ward 1, Lakeisha Purchase of Ward 5, Kirstin DiCenso of Ward 6, Erin Conley of Ward 8, Jim Donelan of Ward 9 and Ralph Hanauer of Ward 10.

Langfelder, who didn't take part in the vote, said he will ask the Springfield-Sangamon County Regional Planning Commission to study comparable zoning rules in other communities and make recommendations in the next 30 to 60 days.

The mayor said he's interested in bringing a tweaked proposal back to the council, though he acknowledged that Springfield may lose some potential craft grow investors because of the delay.

Fulgenzi and representatives of several other craft grow companies said they now will consider opening facilities and employing people in other central Illinois communities that are recruiting them. That way, they said they could meet the state's one-year deadline for newly awarded craft grow licensees to open facilities.

Maurice Williams, an Athens resident who is part of a craft grow company called Lincoln Labs and not related to alderman Williams, said: “With the shocking result there from the aldermen, it just really seems like Springfield does not want to be proactive on what's going on around them. It's just lack of awareness. People just have that stigma with marijuana. ... It's not going away.”

Fulgenzi added, “It's unfortunate that these businesses are going to be forced to leave town due to, I think, a lot of misinformation and demagoguery by one of the aldermen.” He said he was referring to DiCenso. She has denied Fulgenzi's allegations.

If the council had given its blessing Aug. 16, the Springfield Planning and Zoning Commission, and then the council, would have considered the proposed ordinance, which would change the city's zoning ordinance in the coming months to allow craft-grow and cannabis infusing operations to open in industrial zones as close as 200 feet to residential zoning and 500 feet to schools and day care centers.

The current Springfield zoning ordinance requires at least 1,500 feet of setback for craft grows and 2,500 feet for infusers. The 2020 marijuana law gives municipalities and counties wide latitude when it comes to zoning restrictions for cannabis businesses – they can even outlaw adult-use businesses in their jurisdictions.

DiCenso, a Democrat on the officially nonpartisan City Council, has been critical of Fulgenzi for what she sees as overly aggressive lobbying tactics, the decision by Fulgenzi's father

not to recuse himself from the debate, and the overall effort to change the zoning ordinance.

“I'm shocked that a man who is married to a County Board member and the son of a sitting City Council person thinks he should get special treatment,” DiCenso said.

She said she has long been a supporter of legal cannabis and has used Springfield's dispensaries, but the proposed zoning changes go too far.

“What we have in place currently is what's appropriate for now,” she said. “We were very

buds into oils, gummies and other concentrated products.

The current zoning ordinance confines craft grows and infusers to areas zoned for industry and businesses. The proposal would tweak the setbacks only in industrial zones.

Springfield's zoning rules for craft grows and related businesses are more restrictive than the rules for dispensaries and among the most restrictive in the state, Fulgenzi said.

“There's tremendous hypocrisy here when the

he said.

The city's setback requirements make almost all industrial zones in Springfield ineligible for cannabis businesses because of the city's setback requirements, he said.

Among the companies that received craft grow licenses from the state this year, a half-dozen or more would like to open in Springfield but will leave for other, more welcoming communities if the zoning restrictions aren't eased, Fulgenzi said.

“Every industrial park in town has this ‘exclusion zone,’” he said. “There are homes near every one of these.”

Unlike investors with dispensary licenses, who are granted those licenses for specific parts of the state, those with craft-grow licenses can open anywhere in Illinois.

Record cannabis sales and tax revenue

No craft grows have opened yet in Illinois, but other parts of the industry appear to be continuing a steady upward climb in production and revenues.

Pritzker announced this summer that the state experienced a 50% increase in total tax reported from adult-use cannabis, from \$297.7 million in the fiscal year that ended in June 2021 to \$445.3 million in the fiscal year that ended in June 2022. Total adult-use cannabis sales also rose 50%, increasing from \$1 billion to \$1.5 billion, respectively.

The Democratic governor said cannabis tax disbursements to local governments increased 77%, from \$82.8 million in fiscal 2021 to \$146.2 million in fiscal 2022.


“Illinois has done more to put justice and equity at the forefront of this industry than any other state in the nation and has worked to ensure that communities hurt by the war on drugs have had the opportunity to participate,” Pritzker said in a July 25 news release.

“The \$1.5 billion in sales of adult-use cannabis in Illinois translates into significant tax revenue, with a portion of every dollar spent being reinvested in communities that have suffered for decades,” Pritzker said.

Total sales of adult-use cannabis – which is taxed at total rates ranging from 30% to 40% or more by the state and local municipalities and counties – reached \$135.6 million in July. That was the highest since the \$137.9 million in sales reported in December 2021, according to the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation.

The City Council has decided to devote half of revenue from the city's 3% sales tax on recreational marijuana sold by three privately owned dispensaries to help pay off city government's pension-related debt. The council is directing the other half for economic development on the east side, and the first round of grants to businesses there have been awarded.

The city has received \$1.4 million to \$1.5



deliberate in how this ordinance was drafted. I've been a strong supporter of cannabis because we put strong protections in place for neighborhoods and for homeowners, and we feel like we want to stick to that.

“Things can change. I'm not opposed to change – lowering the setback to a reasonable degree. But a 200-foot setback is not reasonable.”

Fulgenzi responded: “People historically have chosen to build homes adjacent to industrial parks. They wanted to live near where they worked. The existing zoning allows chemical plants or steel manufacturing in industrial zones without the setbacks

that are required for craft grows.”

Under the proposal, any cannabis businesses qualifying for zoning approval still would have to ask the council and receive a conditional-use permit before proceeding.


The proposed new setbacks also would apply to infusers, which are businesses that process cannabis

council allows loud bars, gaming and liquor stores within 100 feet of neighborhoods while craft grows and infusers have to be 1,500 feet away,” he said.

At a time when interest rates and building costs are skyrocketing, Fulgenzi said craft-grow investors such as those associated with his company, Rt. 66 Rec LLC, are looking for abandoned buildings to renovate. And he said the supply is most plentiful in Springfield in low-income areas that are zoned industrial.

Craft grows in Illinois are indoor-only operations that operate with 5,000 square feet and may be allowed to expand to 14,000 square feet. They cost several million dollars to start but are more affordable than the huge cultivation center operating in Lincoln and elsewhere in the state where marijuana is grown in factories covering up to 210,000 square feet, Fulgenzi said.

Craft grows, like their larger counterparts, are not open to the public, sell their cannabis only to dispensaries – not directly to the public – and face stringent state-mandated security requirements,





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million in cannabis-related taxes so far and this year has budgeted \$456,000 each for pensions and east-side economic development, according to Springfield budget director Bill McCarty.

The city also receives \$150,000 in state cannabis tax revenues each year, and by law, must devote that money to crime-prevention programs and training, he said.

The additional money the city is able to devote to funding pension liabilities will save taxpayers in the long run and avoid the need for future cuts in city services, he said.

Cannabis-related tax revenue for the city climbed steadily during 2020 and until mid-2021 but has since leveled off over the months and posted a “bit of a decline” the past six months, McCarty said.

Even though demand for legal cannabis for people 21 and older continues to increase statewide, McCarty said he doubts demand will rise much in Springfield and the rest of Sangamon County.

“Any new dispensaries will just cannibalize the existing demand,” he said.

Cannabis businesses seek to open in Sangamon County

New York-based Ascend Wellness’ recreational cannabis dispensary at 3201 N. Horizon Drive, visible from Interstate 55, opened in November 2020 in a former Outback Steakhouse. The company’s first site in Springfield continues downtown at 628 E. Adams St.; it opened for adult-use customers in January 2020 and has served medical cannabis clients since 2016.

When asked about cannabis demand and sales in Springfield, officials from the publicly traded company, which also operates a cultivation center in the Pike County community of Barry and dispensaries in Collinsville, Fairview Heights and the Chicago area, wouldn’t comment on specifics.

Ascend spokeswoman Kathleen Olivastro said in an email that the “cannabis business in Sangamon County remains healthy. There is a strong medical and adult-use customer base in the area.”

Maribis of Springfield, which operates an adult-use and medical cannabis dispensary in Grandview at 2272 North Grand Ave. E., opened a second recreational cannabis location in April 2021 at 3025 Lindbergh Blvd. in Springfield, in the former AMC Parkway Pointe 8 building.

Maribis’ owner, Chicago-based lawyer Laurel Dineff, couldn’t be reached for comment. Maribis has filed a petition for a zoning change to allow a dispensary at 2451 Denver Drive, near I-55 on the city’s northeast side.

The zoning application indicates the company wants to move from Grandview. The Springfield Planning and Zoning Commission is expected to consider the request at its Sept. 21 meeting.

Chris Stone, a Springfield resident who is an Ascend shareholder and the landlord for Maribis’ Parkway Pointe location, is among investors who

have been granted several craft-grow licenses, and he has consulted with other craft-grow entrepreneurs on their license applications.

Stone was among the original investors in the company that first opened the dispensary downtown that later was acquired by Ascend.

He said he expects demand for adult-use cannabis in Sangamon County to revert from “exponential, month-over-month growth” to 3%-5% growth in 2022 and beyond.

“I could see more growth, but it’s going to be more tapered,” he said.

As in other parts of the state, broader groups of adults are learning about the many uses for cannabis, depending on the potency of THC, the chemical compound that causes euphoria, he said. For example, he said people are finding out about edibles and other forms of marijuana they can enjoy without having to smoke and inhale.

Stone used baseball terminology to describe the status of the legal pot industry in Illinois. “We’re in the second or third inning of this deal,” he said.

Pamela Althoff agreed. The former Republican state senator from McHenry County is now executive director of the Cannabis Business Association of Illinois.

Supporters of the industry have done an “extremely good job” of “normalizing the responsible use of cannabis” and dispelling the notion that marijuana is a “gateway drug,” she said.

Inflation that is driving the cost of essential goods and services may be dampening demand for cannabis, but she said the resolution of lawsuits that have allowed more dispensary licenses to be awarded will make cannabis more accessible across the state.

There are 110 dispensaries currently operating, and licenses for 180 more have been awarded, all to businesses that have qualified as “social-equity applicants” as part of the state’s effort to diversify the cannabis industry.

A social-equity applicant must have majority ownership and control by people who have either lived in an area disproportionately impacted by the war on drugs, been arrested or convicted of cannabis-related crimes, or have family members arrested or convicted of those crimes. Applicants also can qualify based on the backgrounds of their employees.

Three of these businesses have been awarded conditional adult-use cannabis dispensary licenses to open somewhere in Sangamon or Menard counties and identify locations sometime in the next 180 days.

The businesses, which either couldn’t be reached or didn’t return emails and calls from *Illinois Times* seeking comment, are: Dealership LLC, based in Western Springs and affiliated with Clean Slate Holdings as manager; Bolden Investments III LLC, based in Maywood with Charles M. Bolden as manager; and Herban Quality Control LLC, with Chicago residents Kamau Murray and Brian Scruggs as managers.

As it does with craft grows, the Springfield City

Council requires all dispensaries, even for sites with appropriate zoning, to receive council approval for conditional use permits, or CPUs.

The craft-grow debate has attracted interest beyond Jeff Fulgenzi’s company. Stone said the potential Springfield craft grow sites he is interested in could progress without the zoning ordinance change Fulgenzi is seeking, but he and other cannabis entrepreneurs would appreciate a reduction in the setback requirements.

The current setbacks “definitely could be a negative in terms of job opportunities,” he said without specifying the setbacks he would prefer.

Stone said he plans to submit conditional-use permit applications to the city for sites in the northeast and southwest quadrants by the end of August.

Langfelder said he favors Fulgenzi’s proposed changes to the setback requirements because “it puts in play existing areas” for development.

“We have buildings that are underutilized,” the mayor said, noting that the CPU process creates a “check and balance” in which the council can consider neighborhood concerns that may vary for each case.

Stone said he has hopes the disagreements over setbacks can be resolved soon.

“I believe a majority of the City Council and the mayor are committed to easing setback requirements and making some other changes to the cannabis ordinance that will attract businesses,” he said.

Stone said he doesn’t think the regional planning commission study of setbacks “will substantially delay a future amendment to the cannabis ordinance.

“I believe there will be discussions to produce an ordinance that neighborhood associations, City Council and the mayor and industry can get behind and be introduced and potentially passed by the end of the year or sooner.”

East side resident and Springfield native Dameon Johnson said Springfield’s zoning ordinance ruled out so many potential sites for his craft-grow license that his company, Emerald Valley Industries LLC, left Springfield.

Emerald Valley received zoning approval from the village of Tilton, near Danville, to renovate an existing building there, he said. The approval was confirmed by Tilton’s village clerk.

Emerald is awaiting state approval for its designs so it can proceed in Tilton, Johnson said. He said he and his two business partners are Black, and two of the three live in the state-designated “disproportionately impacted area” in Springfield – primarily the north and east sides.

Johnson said he would like to develop future craft grows in Springfield, so he hopes zoning ordinance changes eventually are approved.

“I love my community. That’s never going to change,” said Johnson, 44. “I just hope our business climate gets a little better in Springfield.”

Fulgenzi said two of his three partners – Sonny Day, who is Black, and Gary Alexander – lived in Springfield’s disproportionately impacted area at the time they submitted their application. If allowed to open, their craft grow would have employed 25 to 30 full-time workers when fully operational, he said.

One of the sites Fulgenzi was considering, in the 2700 block of South 11th Street, is in DiCenso’s ward. DiCenso said she has been contacted by constituents who worry that a craft grow would emit unwanted smells, and the air-handling equipment would be loud.

Fulgenzi said those concerns are unwarranted, and he said 96% to 99% of any smell would be removed by high-tech air-scrubbing equipment.

He said he uses cannabis to deal with chronic migraine headaches and neck pain. The expansion of adult-use cannabis makes these health benefits available to people who don’t want to or can’t get their doctors to certify applications for the state’s medical marijuana program, he said.

“Any notion that somehow we’re creating a risk to homeowners or school children is absolute nonsense,” he said.

In a dig at DiCenso, chief of staff at the Illinois Department of Natural Resources – part of the Pritzker administration – Fulgenzi said, “Some elected officials are preying on the fears of the public in a misleading way to stop Gov. Pritzker’s program.”

DiCenso said it’s “rich” that Fulgenzi, a Republican, is now a supporter of Pritzker.

“I don’t think anyone’s preying on the fears of the public,” she said. “I think we’re listening to what our constituents are saying. That’s the job – listening to your constituents and respecting what they want. ... I’m not fearful of marijuana. I’m fearful of going too far too fast, and then you can’t go back.”

Tender, flavorful chicken breasts

The secret is yogurt marinade

Chicken breasts can often be quite dry and bland. They have a low fat-to-protein ratio, and fat content is a major contributor to flavor and moistness. Chicken breasts just aren't something you can throw in a pan and come up with something flavorful. Nonetheless, they are extremely popular and convenient because they cook quickly, but by the same token, they are easy to overcook. There is an easy way around these shortcomings.

Chicken breasts benefit greatly from spending time in a marinade. A marinade is basically a liquid used to flavor and tenderize proteins. Most marinades are acidic and the low pH helps change the protein structure so it cooks faster and softens the texture. But for marinating chicken breasts, a vinegar-based or citrus-based marinade can often toughen the proteins to a rubbery consistency.

Yogurt tenderizes meat much more gently and effectively. The reason yogurt works so well as a marinade is due to the living microbes and lactic acid they produce. The microbes in yogurt help break down protein, making chicken breasts moister and more tender. The lactic acid in yogurt is less acidic than vinegar or citrus juice and reacts with the food in a gentler way, which means the chances of a yogurt marinade breaking down a piece of meat too much (making the meat mushy) are pretty low. Yogurt marinades also create a uniquely textured and flavorful crust around proteins due to the caramelized dairy proteins and sugars.

The gentle tenderizing effect of lactic acid in a yogurt marinade has the additional advantage of allowing you to plan ahead of time for a busy week. You can prepare a big batch of yogurt-marinated chicken and divide it up into smaller portions in resealable freezer bags and pop in the freezer for up to two weeks. When ready to use, pull a bag out of the freezer, let it thaw in the refrigerator overnight, and then proceed with the recipe.

Yogurt marinades are popular in Indian and Middle Eastern cuisines. Yogurt-marinated chicken breasts lend themselves well to grilling. The combination of caramelized yogurt and smoke is especially delicious.

Yogurt Marinated Grilled Chicken Breasts with Indian Spices

Serve this with steamed basmati rice or grilled vegetables.

Ingredients

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
1 cup of plain whole-milk yogurt
¼ cup coarsely chopped fresh cilantro leaves and

stems (plus extra for garnish)
½ medium onion, coarsely chopped
3 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped
1 2-inch piece fresh ginger, coarsely chopped
1 tablespoon fresh lime juice
2 teaspoons garam masala
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1/2 teaspoon ground coriander
½ teaspoon ground turmeric
1 teaspoon smoked paprika
¼ teaspoon cayenne
2 teaspoons kosher salt plus more for seasoning
1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
2 tablespoons olive oil plus more for brushing the grill
Thinly sliced raw onion for serving
Lime wedges for serving

Preparation

Using a meat mallet or heavy skillet, pound the chicken breasts to an even half-inch thickness. With a fork, poke holes in the chicken to allow the marinade to penetrate to the interior. Transfer to a resealable gallon plastic bag.

Blend the remaining ingredients in a food processor until smooth. Pour yogurt mixture over

the chicken, seal the bag, and turn until well coated. Marinate chicken in the refrigerator for at least three hours or overnight. Remove the chicken from the refrigerator 30 minutes before you are ready to grill.

Prepare coals for direct heat if you are using charcoal. Allow for one side of the grill to be the "cool" side. If using a gas grill, heat one side to medium high (about 425 degrees F to 450 degrees F). Brush grill grates with oil. Let the excess marinade drip off the chicken; season with a little additional salt. Arrange the marinated chicken pieces on the hot, oiled grates. Grill the chicken breasts for 3-4 minutes per side, turning once, until browned and cooked through.

Garnish with thinly sliced raw onions and chopped cilantro. Serve with lime wedges.

Yogurt-Marinated Chicken Skewers with Middle-Eastern Spices and Garlic Yogurt Sauce

Serves 4

Serve this with couscous or a tabbouleh salad.

Ingredients

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into bite-size chunks
1 cup plain whole-milk yogurt

Zest of 1 lemon
1 tablespoon lemon juice
3 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped
1½ tablespoons za'atar (see note below)
½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
¼ cup coarsely chopped fresh mint leaves
2 tablespoons olive oil plus more for brushing the grill
8 wooden skewers soaked in water

For the yogurt sauce

½ cup plain whole-milk yogurt
Zest of 1 lemon
1 garlic clove, grated
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Note: Za'atar is a Middle Eastern spice blend usually consisting of dried thyme, oregano, marjoram, sumac and toasted sesame seeds. Look for it in the international or spice section of your grocery store.

Preparation

Place the chicken cubes in a resealable gallon plastic bag.

Combine the yogurt, lemon juice and zest, garlic, za'atar, cinnamon, salt, pepper and mint in a food processor or blender and pulse until smooth. Pour the yogurt marinade over the chicken cubes, seal the bag, and turn until well coated.

Marinate the chicken in the refrigerator for at least three hours or overnight. Remove the chicken from the refrigerator 30 minutes before you are ready to grill.

To make the garlic-yogurt sauce, place ½ cup yogurt in a small bowl. Stir in the lemon zest, grated garlic clove, salt and pepper.

Prepare coals for direct heat if you are using charcoal. Allow for one side of the grill to be the "cool" side. If using a gas grill, heat one side to medium high (about 425 degrees F to 450 degrees F). Brush grill grates with oil.

Let the excess marinade drip off the chicken. Thread the chicken cubes on the skewers. Season with a little additional salt. Arrange the chicken skewers on the hot, oiled grates. Grill the chicken skewers for 3-4 minutes per side, turning once, until browned and cooked through.

(If using a meat thermometer, remove the chicken from the grill when the internal temperature reaches 165 degrees F.)

Serve the skewers with the yogurt garlic sauce. □

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The church of baseball

The making of a movie classic

"I've tried them all, I really have. And the only church that truly feeds the soul, day in and day out, is the church of baseball." Annie Savoy in *Bull Durham*.

Ask any fan to name their favorite baseball movies and the 1988 classic *Bull Durham* is probably on the list. Baseball films come in many different forms. *Field of Dreams*, was based upon a short story written by Canadian author W.P. Kinsella. The original title was *Shoeless Joe Comes to Iowa*. *The Pride of the Yankees*, starring Gary Cooper, was a 1942 film biography of Lou Gehrig who had died from ALS in 1941. Baseball great Babe Ruth played himself in the film.

Baseball-themed films make up a substantial slice of sports cinema. The list includes *Major League*, *The Sandlot*, *A League of Their Own*, *Fever Pitch* (based on an English football novel), biographies of Roger Maris and Jackie Robinson, and my all-time favorite, *Bang the Drum Slowly*. I know I have missed a few. Feel free to tell me the next time you see me.

Bull Durham is somewhat unique as a baseball movie. The baseball scenes are few and far between. More action is filmed in the locker room and team bus than on the field. A substantial number of scenes take place in the bedroom and home of Annie Savoy, portrayed by Susan Sarandon. Depending upon your point of view, *Bull Durham* is a story about America's national pastime. Whether that is baseball or sex I will leave to others.

For Ron Shelton, *Bull Durham* was the quintessential example of the adage, "write what you know." Shelton played minor league baseball for several years in the Baltimore Orioles organization. His career mirrored that of the film's character, Crash Davis, portrayed by Kevin Costner, a decent player lacking that final bit of skill and luck to make it to the major leagues. Crash did make it to the Major Leagues for 21 days. On a bus road trip with his teammates, he wistfully recalls the joy of being in "The Show."

The Church of Baseball opens with several chapters of autobiographical material about

Shelton's life. A great deal of the author's personal baseball experiences found their way into the *Bull Durham* screenplay. Ron Shelton wanted to write a baseball movie and he pitched to Hollywood producers a baseball version of the Greek comedy *Lysistrata*. His final product was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Original Screenplay, losing out to the Dustin Hoffman, Tom Cruise film *Rain Man*.

The Church of Baseball chronologically tells the story of *Bull Durham* from the pages of a screenplay to eventual production as a movie. Of course, there were a myriad of steps along the way, including selling the screenplay, finding a studio for production, casting actors for the various roles, finding a location for shooting the film and finally creating an oeuvre that makes *Bull Durham* part of baseball lore.

But Shelton has far more than just the story of a baseball film to tell readers. He details quite a bit about movie production and film making. His explanations are detailed but easy to understand. Additionally there are countless stories about the movie and cast itself. They begin with Shelton learning after the movie has gone into production that Crash Davis, the character he believed he created, was the name of an actual living former major league player. The real Davis had attended Duke University

and served in the Navy during World War II. Prior to the war, Davis played three seasons for the Philadelphia Athletics. Learning that he still lived in North Carolina, Shelton met Davis during filming. It turned out to be an eventful meeting.

Shelton is also candid about the battles with the studio during filming of *Bull Durham*. There was displeasure with Tim Robbins, the third star of the film who plays the young pitcher "Nuke" LaLoosh. For several days there was a cross-country battle between Hollywood and North Carolina. Frayed tempers make filming more difficult and, as Shelton tells the story, his anguish is palpable.

Whether telling readers how the script came into being, how the movie found a studio, how the cast was selected or how it was finally filmed, *The Church of Baseball* is a storehouse of information and anecdotes and an overall entertaining story. Reading Ron Shelton is almost like having him in the room with you discussing his work while you laugh and reply with a few of your own favorite baseball anecdotes and movie memories. As Annie Savoy correctly or incorrectly quotes Walt Whitman, "I see great things in baseball. It's our game, the American game. It will repair our losses and be a blessing to us." □
