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# Health workers help address disparities

An apartment fire put Willie Taylor out of his home two years ago on Springfield's east side and threw his life into chaos.

A survivor of two strokes who deals with high blood pressure and other health problems, Taylor, 71, is on more stable footing these days. He attributes the improvement to Derek Rimelspach, a community health worker based in a primary care clinic at Springfield's Southern Illinois University School of Medicine.

"If it wasn't for that guy, I don't know what I would have done," Taylor said of Rimelspach, 46, who helped him find temporary housing and get a new Social Security card and birth certificate.

Rimelspach also helped Taylor, a retired former cook, fill out forms and applications that resulted in him moving into his current home, a subsidized apartment in Capitol Plaza, 1210 E. Washington St., also on the east side.

About 5,200 clients in Sangamon County and elsewhere in central and southern Illinois – including Springfield, Taylorville, Lincoln, Jacksonville, Carbondale, Decatur and Quincy – receive a variety of non-medical services from SIU community health workers each year.

The 10-year-old program is supported by a mix of about \$1.5 million in annual grants, contracts and federal funding, according to Molly Williams, a health care administrator in SIU's Office of Community Health Work. Included is a \$500,000, three-year total commitment of funding split equally between Springfield Memorial Hospital and HSHS St. John's Hospital, and \$135,000 over a three-year period from the United Way of Central Illinois. Donors also provide support through the SIU Foundation.

Erin Jones, SIU's director of community

health, said the program helps to reduce the health disparities people face because of poverty, emotional trauma and other disadvantages by addressing what are known as the "social drivers of health"

Studies document that 80% of a person's health is influenced by factors outside of what happens inside a doctor's office or hospital, Jones said. Those factors can include the quality and stability of their housing, food insecurity, neighborhood and family violence, and income. Income disparities can be stark in Springfield, and the long-term effect of those disparities can

be seen in life expectancy.

Dr. Shreepada Tripathy, a pediatrician and data strategist in SIU's Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, made a presentation on the topic this year to members of the Massey Commission, which is examining ways of reducing racial and economic disparities in the community in the wake of the July 2024 killing of Sonya Massey.

Tripathy examined a national database of death records and other data and found that life expectancy in certain census tracts in Springfield's north and east sides can be 10 to 20 years shorter than in census tracts in more affluent areas, including parts of the west and south sides near Lake Springfield.

The variation includes life expectancies as low as 62 to 65 years in certain parts of inner-city Springfield and more than 80 years in other parts of the city, its suburbs and in rural Sangamon County.

The differences corresponded with income levels, Tripathy said.

When looking at data by ZIP code – a different geographic identifier that can include a wider variety of income levels – Tripathy found that the ZIP codes 62702 and 62703 had the shortest life expectancy (72 to 74 years) of any ZIP codes in the county. Life expectancy in the United States currently is 77. People in ZIP codes with higher income levels enjoyed some of the longest life expectancies – more than 80 years in 62711, for example.

Illinois Times found that the Springfield area

posts some of the highest economic disparities by race in the United States. In particular, the newspaper found that based on Census data, the Springfield metro area posted the highest Black poverty rate in Illinois in 2023 – 40.3% – and the fourth-highest Black poverty rate among more than 240 other metro areas in the United States with 10,000 or more Black residents.

Black residents in Sangamon County are concentrated in neighborhoods on the city of Springfield's east and north sides, where they make up between one-third and three-fourths of residents in some census tracts. Those neighborhoods have some of Sangamon County's highest poverty rates – between 30% and 50%.

The connection among poverty, income and life expectancy is logical, Tripathy said. If someone is struggling to afford "bare necessities," he or she often will prioritize rent and food over medicine and doctor visits to check and treat high blood pressure and diabetes, Tripathy said.

Community health workers can help improve life expectancy as well as day-to-day living, Jones said. She wasn't surprised by the differences that Tripathy found by Census tract and ZIP code.

Community health workers can help intervene in the trends by assisting clients with access to income support services, housing, mental health counseling and medicine, Jones said. They also can help clients establish a medical home with a primary care provider, bring them to appointments and avoid unnecessary visits to the emergency room, Jones said.

"I do know that they have a harder time accessing care," she said. "They have a harder time with transportation. ... and it interrupts their health care."

SIU's 38 community health workers come from a variety of backgrounds, Jones said. Some are based in medical clinics. Some are stationed at Washington Street Mission and Helping Hands of Springfield. Many have direct ties to the neighborhoods they serve, which can help break down the mistrust in the medical community that many people harbor, she said.


Without a doubt, their assistance has improved and saved lives, she said.

"They know they are making a difference," Jones said. "They have hard days when things are not going their way, but there are those days when they see a patient just thrive, whether they are finally getting a test they needed or maybe the surgery they needed or maybe getting housing."

Rimelspach, the community health worker who helped Willie Taylor, said, "We see a lot of sad situations and people in tough spots. We meet people where they're at."

# City Council adopts property registry

Code aims to crack down on problem property owners, but critics say it doesn't go far enough CITY COUNCIL | Maggie Dougherty

The Springfield City Council passed an ordinance Tuesday night creating a registry of properties with repeated housing code violations. The registry will include rental properties, personally owned residences and commercial properties – but not all of them.

This is not the comprehensive landlord registry advocates have pushed for since the council voted it down two years ago. Rather, the ordinance doubles as a logistic change to the housing code and a measure to target "bad apple" property owners.

Mayor Misty Buscher, who introduced the change, said it was spurred by the Illinois General Assembly exploring a ban on crime-free housing ordinances during its spring session.

Prior to Tuesday's vote, city code included both criminal and housing code violations under the same statute. As written, a future statewide ban on crime-free ordinances could have jeopardized the city's ability to respond to repeated housing code violations and protect renters from negligent landlands.

"That's part of why we're separating (the code), so that if there is legislation passed ever that you cannot have a chronic nuisance ordinance, we can still crack down on our problem properties," Buscher said.

The second reason for the change is to give the city more teeth in addressing properties with repeated citations. The proposal makes several updates, including steeper fines and placement on an online public registry after three or more independent housing code violations within 12 months.

Owners of cited properties – including the partners or managers behind limited liability companies – would be required to register their names and contact information.

The cited property designation will now apply to all buildings on a property, rather than the city addressing them one by one. Buscher says this will help confront large problem properties such as the 23-building Olde Towne apartment complex, the subject of a protracted legal battle with the city.

"If you have a rotten apple, you're not

just attacking the rotten part, you're talking about the whole apple now," Buscher said. "This ordinance allows us to do that, not just separate out specific buildings of a big campus that might be deteriorating."

Residents and some alderpeople called a landlord registry long overdue, with many raising concerns that the proposal did not go far enough.

A sticking point in last week's discussion came from the ordinance's property-level approach, rather than an owner-level approach. If a homeowner or landlord owns a handful of properties, only the subset with repeated violations would be added to the registry. Critics said the code would be stronger if all properties of the violating owner were added to the list.

The council found compromise on an amendment introduced by Ward 10 Ald. Ralph Hanauer. The final amendment mandated that owners of three or more properties with the cited property designation will be required to register all of their properties, not only those with violations.

They will also be subject to a fine of no less than \$5,000.

The council voted unanimously to adopt the ordinance as amended, except for Ward 5 Ald. Lakeisha Purchase, who was absent for the vote.

Jill Steiner, president of the Springfield Independent Coalition for Our Neighborhoods (ICON), said that limiting the registry to problematic landlords is a reactive approach which will delay relief to residents.

"It can't be, 'this is a registration for bad landlords,' because then something has to go terribly wrong and somebody has to live in that terribly wrong place before you get on the list," Steiner said, citing the long timeline for tenants to wait for the completion of three administrative hearings on three separate incidents.

ICON previously expressed disappointment with the ordinance, issuing an opposition statement to the proposal and asking council members to table it for a later date. In particular, the coalition was concerned the ordinance was discussed

without proactive outreach to community organizations and without addressing what they see as the key issues at hand.

After learning the rationale for the ordinance, Steiner said ICON appreciated the "extra tool in the toolbox to address properties, whether privately owned, multiunit, an LLC or a corporation." However, she still hoped to see further discussion of a landlord registry.

"You haven't done what we really want to have done, which is a landlord registration," Steiner said.

Of Illinois' 10 largest cities, Springfield is one of only three that does not require all landlords to register their properties with the city.

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## **Protecting properties in perpetuity**

Sangamon Conservancy Trust celebrates its 25th anniversary

The property is accessed by a bucolic, barely two-lane road that winds its way through a canopy of trees, occasionally revealing hardy corn stalks on each side reaching for the rural Menard County sky. An inconspicuous sign near a private residence marks the spot where Abraham Lincoln's first sweetheart, Ann Rutledge, died in a log cabin 190 years ago. It's about as pastoral a setting as you can find in Illinois, and Harry Schirding wants to make sure it stays that way.

"I don't really want to legislate from the grave, but I like the idea of being able to feel like it's going to continue to be farmed," Schirding said as he looked across his land north of Petersburg. "That's really the best use for it."

Schirding has 830 acres under a conservation easement with the Sangamon Conservancy Trust. The easement limits what the land can be used for both now and in the future. Schirding and his three siblings inherited the land from their late aunt, who looked into an easement before her death.

"She had it as a farm and that's the way she wanted it to be kept," Schirding said. "We want to restrict what future generations can use it for."

Schirding's property is part of a growing number of acres under conservation easements through the Sangamon Conservancy Trust

(SCT), which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. The trust is a nonprofit organization formed in 2000 to help support the goals and objectives of the Sangamon County Soil and Water Conservation District. Since then, the CST has become one of a limited number of land use trusts available in Illinois, and has 4,200 acres currently under conservation easements.

The CST recently held a 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration at Jubilee Farm, a 164-acre center for ecology and spirituality operated by the Dominican Sisters just west of Springfield along Old Jacksonville Road. The sisters placed their property under a SCT conservation easement several years ago.

"Having wild places is essential for our own humanity, our understanding of who we are in relationship to the rest of creation," said Jubilee Farm cofounder Sister Sharon Zayac. "From the very beginning, we looked for a way that would ensure that this land be preserved from development and that it would be kept for habitat."

Zayac said the Dominican Sisters explored different ways to establish conservation easements, but they initially found that their relatively small tract of land wasn't large enough for many groups that could hold those easements. Then, they discovered the SCT and have been pleased with the arrangement that protects their land in perpetuity.

"We have a variety of soils and woodland, woods and pasture areas with Illinois native wildflowers and grasses which we have been restoring," said Zayac as Jubilee Farm's llamas and alpacas grazed nearby. "The easement is a way to respect the integrity of the whole earth community."

A conservation easement is a voluntary and legally binding agreement between a landowner and a land trust like the SCT, or between a landowner and a government agency. The easement permanently limits uses of the parcel, and the land trust is responsible for making sure that the landowner adheres to the terms of the agreement.

The landowner retains legal title to the property and determines what type of land uses will be allowed what uses will be restricted. Subdivisions, commercial timber cutting, landfills, surface mining, billboards, animal confinement feeding operations, wind turbines and solar fields are examples of prohibited uses on conservation easements.

The Sangamon Conservancy Trust has a primary coverage area consisting of Sangamon, Christian, Macon, Logan, Menard, Cass, Morgan, Macoupin, and Montgomery counties. Farmland and natural areas in other counties can be considered by the SCT on a case-by-case basis.

Sangamon Conservancy Trust Chair Barb Mendenhall has been involved in the trust since its 2000 inception.

"I was the executive director of the Sangamon County Soil and Water Conservation District and we saw an opportunity and a need for an organization that would do conservation work," Mendenhall said. "We accept easements and also receive grants that wouldn't be available to the soil and water district."

Although conservation easements are donated at no charge to the trust, landowners incur some expense through the procedure. Land appraisals must be performed to determine the fair market value of the property, and the SCT charges a conservation fee to help fund the annual compliance inspections that must be done as part of the easement.

Easements come with a possible federal income tax benefit, and land in a conservation easement can be sold, bought or inherited. But easements do not remove the property from local tax rolls, and the property is still subject to eminent domain.

Mendenhall said it's all about protecting the land as it exists now.

"A lot of land has been sold for development, and we want to make sure that farmers who want to farm can keep their land in farming forever," Mendenhall said. "We can also help keep natural areas intact according to the property owners' wishes."

Tom Skelly of Springfield is one of the original SCT board members.

"We see prime farmland in particular being used for a lot of solar development, and it's just not the best use for prime farmland," Skelly said. "That's always been an issue with the trust and is one of the main reasons we exist."

Bob Komnick owns more than 500 acres in Sangamon County's Curran Township and his easement with the SCT will keep the land as it exists now, a combination of farmland and natural

"My dad told me before he died, 'Don't break it up or sell it,'" Komnick recalled. "I've got one son who farms but none of his children want to, so I'm going to keep it all together as one chunk and it will be taken care of."

According to the American Farmland Trust, between 2001 and 2016 approximately 2,000 acres of farmland and ranchland were lost each day to development in the U.S.. The 2017 Census of Agriculture for Illinois revealed that there were 2,436 fewer farms since 2012.

Most of the easement acreage overseen by the SCT consists of prime farmland, and that's why current board member Ted Megginson plans to place much of his southern Sangamon County land into an easement with the SCT.

"We have kids coming in behind us and hopefully they will have the same feelings about the land as we do," Megginson said. "I enjoy being a part of the Sangamon Conservancy Trust. It's good to see it growing, and it seems like we've got a farm or two on the docket all the time. It's really rewarding." □

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# Securing mental health funding

Public referendum to establish board, tax increase set for spring

Social workers and mental health providers informed the county's Mental Health Commission earlier this month about the possible ways they could benefit from dedicated funding and planning from a community mental health board.

The vast majority of counties in Illinois have these boards, which approve funding for local social service organizations through some form of tax revenue. The boards, which are also known as 708 Boards, provide a more consistent avenue for mental health providers to fund their work when compared to applying for fixed state or federal grants.

While grants regularly prop up nonprofit organizations, 708 Boards – which are named after the decades-old Illinois bill-turned-law to grant the creation of such boards through a public vote – can stabilize nonprofit funding for public mental health services and related efforts. Tony Kirkman, executive director of Piatt County's Mental Health Center, told *Illinois Times* the 708 Board formed in Piatt County less than a year ago has already begun to pay dividends for mental health professionals.

"Most of the other counties around us have had these in place for years – understanding that that's how you maintain access to care," Kirkman said. "It allows you to forecast and to budget so much more easily, to establish community partners because you know you're going to be around. There are just a lot of benefits of having a sustainable revenue source because we're already stretched thin, personnel-wise."

Kirkman said Piatt County ended up funding its mental health board through a 0.10% property tax increase, which translates to \$100 in additional property taxes for the owner of a \$300,000 home. Winnebago County set up its mental health board through a half-cent sales tax on all purchases over \$100.

## Sangamon County Mental Health Commission

The recently formed Sangamon County Mental Health Commission – a separate short-term entity formed by the Sangamon County Board earlier this year – is set to share a report with the County Board by December. At the commission's August hearing, a broad range of voices supported the idea of Sangamon County creating a mental health board to help fill gaps in care for a number of county residents.

Springfield police officer Chris Jones, a member of the county mental health commission, said the department's co-response model with Memorial Health is funded through a federal grant. Jones also emphasized that grant funding is responsible for a lot of Sangamon

County's mental health network.

"Over the past five months, we've heard about all the great programs here in Sangamon County, but they're grant-funded. The 708 Board would sustain, and create stability for these programs here in Sangamon County, to continue and to expand," he said.

Federal grants are expected to decrease over the next few years as the Trump administration has attempted to freeze various avenues of government spending, spurring lawsuits from both beneficiaries and watchdogs.

Barbara Wheatley, lead clinician for Memorial Health's mobile crisis response unit, told the commission the county could benefit from a dedicated co-response team.

One social worker from Auburn Community School District 10 told the commission that they could use more reliable transportation methods to get students to see counselors in Springfield.

"We work real closely with the Lincoln Prairie (Behavioral Health Center) outpatient program for our students, but they do not provide transportation to Auburn, so they won't pick our kids up," said Melissa Warwick, a school district social worker.

Warwick, who has a caseload of almost 250 students, said there was no dedicated transportation for children to get to Lincoln Prairie Behavioral Health Center, a roughly 20-minute drive from Auburn.

"There are agencies that will go to Auburn and pick up, but they're not reliable. We've got families that call the number and set it up for the date and time, and then the car is a noshow, and then the family has then missed their appointment," she said. "If you miss one of two appointments, you're bumped from the list, and then they lost their counseling spot."

## Mid-Illinois Medical District Commission

Brian McFadden, Sangamon County administrator and a member of the Mid-Illinois Medical District Commission, said at August's MIMD meeting that a property or sales tax increase could provide a mental health board between \$7 million and \$8 million a year. He also told the Commission he'll be presenting more on expected revenue at next month's mental health commission meeting.

Champaign County, which has a similar population size to Sangamon, distributed almost \$6 million to mental health programs and services through its 708 Board last year.

Ryan Croke, president of the Mid-Illinois Medical District Commission, seemed positive about progress in the months since the County Board decided to place a referendum for the March 2026 primary election.

"I think there's really good community leadership consensus that this is the right thing to do," said Croke, who works for the state as the first assistant deputy governor for health and human services.

"Voters of (Sangamon) County will have an opportunity to fund mental health services in a way that many other counties – Christian, Macon and lots of others – have been doing, in some cases, for decades." □





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
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# **Massey Commission strives for long-term change**

Sen. Turner says 'still more work to be done' as hiring reform signed into law

While Illinois law enforcement agencies will soon be required to ask for, and provide, entire employment records for any applicants seeking to become a police officer, the Massey Commission is seeking to continue its work in order to actualize its upcoming recommendations.

The law was a response to the killing of Sonya Massey, who called 911 last summer from her home only to be shot and killed by a sheriff's deputy who had a history of misconduct across previous stints as a police officer.

State Sen. Doris Turner, a family friend of Massey and her family, described the legislation she introduced as "the first of its kind in the nation" and supported the idea of the commission continuing work in some form beyond a final report. The police hiring reform bill was signed by Gov. JB Pritzker at an Aug. 12 ceremony that included the Massey family.

"I believe that there's still more work that needs to be done, whether it continues as the Massey Commission or whether it continues as another iteration of that," she said. "I do believe that there will be some form of a body that will allow that work to continue," she told an *Illinois Times* reporter afterwards.

Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton, who announced a run for U.S. Senate earlier this year, said getting the bill passed was part of her elected duty.

"Something tragic happened right here in Springfield last year," Stratton said at the bill signing. "Although nothing we say or do will bring Sonya back, it is our responsibility as leaders to do everything in our power to deliver change."

## Ferguson Commission members visit Springfield

Police shootings have long been a national problem, gaining more attention as mobile videos documenting violence by police began to circulate on social media nearly in real time.

Three members of the Ferguson Commission, which was convened in the wake of a Missouri police officer shooting and killing teenager Michael Brown Jr. in 2014, visited the Massey Commission the night before Pritzker signed the hiring reform bill.

In the years since Brown was killed, Missouri police have killed more than 300 people. In the 13 months since Massey was killed, almost 30 people in Illinois have been shot and killed by police.

Nicole Hudson, a member of the Ferguson Commission who visited the Massey Commission's August hearing, said the final report the Springfield team submits is just a stepping stone towards community change.

"I would say to people, 'There's one call to action: it's work on racial equity in this region, here's 189 ways to get started," Hudson said, referring to the almost 200 calls to action the Ferguson Commission included in its final report.

Commissioner Sunshine Clemons, founder of Black Lives Matter Springfield, explained a desire to restrain the number of recommendations the Massey Commission includes in its final report.

"One of the things that I've struggled with all along is I'm worried about putting things in this report that could be considered the small wins," Clemons said to the Ferguson members in attendance, explaining her original desires with the final report. "You want to make sure something gets done; my first thought was I don't want any of that in it, I want only the big swings."

She explained how she understood that the recommendations are just that, recommendations, and won't directly change the county without further legwork.

"We'll make sure we get something that really impacts this community, but I also recognize the (Sangamon County) Board doesn't have to do anything," Clemons said.

Members of the Massey Commission have made it known that actually creating change will come in the months and years after their official report is submitted to the County Board.

One public commenter, Tom Davis, suggested the commission invite community stakeholders

to next month's hearing as a way to drum up community engagement and commitment to the commission's ultimate goals.

"This commission could draw up a list of a top 100 accountable bodies," Davis told the commission. "Everything from businesses, universities, hospitals, all these social services – maybe it would exceed 100 – but to get your name invited by the Massey Commission to get involved and invest in the implementation, that might be impressive to some people that otherwise are not engaged."

### First steps of legislative change

The bill signed into law will also expand the number of counties required to establish a Sheriff's Merit Board, a team that usually has some members appointed by a county sheriff to review deputy appointments and other administrative issues. While Sangamon County has a merit commission, its online information is scattered. In comparison, Champaign County has a Sheriff's Merit Commission that regularly posts transparency updates.

Despite support of Turner's bill from members of the Illinois Sheriffs' Association, Sangamon County Sheriff Paula Crouch – who replaced Jack Campbell last fall and has been invited to Massey Commission work group meetings – filed her formal opposition to the legislation in early April.

Crouch did not respond to a request for comment.

At an early August work group for the Massey Commission, Springfield NAACP president Austin Randolph Jr. expressed the need for sensible legislation to override any given sheriff's agenda.

"My concern is what happens two years, three years, four years down the line," Randolph said. "We're looking further down the road – (Crouch) might not be here 10 years from now. There could be other issues, but if the pieces are in place that have teeth and accountability and responsibility, then that person can be held culpable. The problem is, nobody's responsible... The next sheriff can come in and say, 'Forget this,' because it's not policy, it's not law, it's not with the county. And that's been the problem for years. Each sheriff can do what he or she wants to do."

Sheriffs, who are elected and often run uncontested, have outsized control over their departments when compared to other law enforcement offices. The race for Sangamon County Sheriff was last contested in 2018 and is up for grabs again next year.

At the bill signing, Pritzker condemned how it took the loss of Massey's life to reveal then-deputy Sean Grayson's past actions.

"Officers with histories of serious disciplinary issues should not be serving in those capacities in our communities," Pritzker said. "Those histories should not come to light only after the disaster happens."

Going into effect in January, the law aims to increase accountability for police departments and steer departments away from hiring cops with histories of misconduct.

Turner said the law could have prevented Grayson from being hired by the Sangamon County Sheriff's Office in the first place.

The law could have also given the Riverton Police Department reason to not hire James Hillyer, a police officer who bounced around almost a half dozen departments for decades before being arrested in 2023 and charged with possession of child pornography, official misconduct and grooming. A police database maintained by Invisible Institute, compiled through Freedom of Information Act requests, shows Hillyer was fired from at least two other police departments prior to being hired by Riverton Police.

Hillyer ended up serving less than a year as part of a plea deal and is now required to register as a sex offender for life. Most people convicted on child pornography charges serve at least five years of prison, according to the U.S. Sentencing Commission.  $\square$

# **Unlikely bedfellows**

Some Illinois Republicans work with teachers' union

Some Republicans in Illinois have taken to regularly bashing Republican state legislative leaders for seeking support from the Illinois Education Association, a teachers' union that has for decades worked to help elect Republicans who are sympathetic to their issues.

With longtime wealthy Republican contributors and fundraisers dying, moving to warmer climes and/or retiring, the IEA and more conservative labor unions can help close the funding and precinct worker gap. But those who do are instantly declared to be persona non grata "Republicans in Name Only" by some folks who want no ties whatsoever with public employee unions.

On the surface, at least, it's a legitimate policy dispute. Former Gov. Bruce Rauner wiped out years of hard work by the IEA when he insisted that Republican legislators reject the teachers' union because he hated public employee unions and believed all Republicans should do the same.

But by relying mainly on money from Rauner and some of his pals, the Republicans lost a more permanent revenue source. Politicians may come and go, but the unions are always there. So when Rauner and his ilk pulled up stakes after suffering humiliating statewide defeats, it was only natural that at least some Republicans would renew their relationships with the IEA and others.

When asked about this schism at the Illinois State Fair's Republican Day, Senate Republican Leader John Curran pointed out that he lives in a "purple" district and will work with anyone who works with him. Curran said he looks at the members of the IEA who live in his district, not the union itself.

"I think it's incumbent upon Republicans to represent your districts," Curran said. "This is a very diverse state. A one size fits all is not the path to ultimate victory and success in this state."

"We have got to reflect the communities we represent, first and foremost" Curran said. "That's success. It is not a blanket party one way or another."

House Minority Leader Tony McCombie told my associate Isabel Miller that 46% of the IEA members in her district are Republicans. "I think you find that in a lot of our rural areas," she said.

"I think, like with every organization, especially as a leader, it's important that I have a relationship with every organization," McCombie said, adding that the IEA has "been helpful to the caucus."

McCombie differentiated the IEA with the National Education Association, however, saying the NEA "has gone too far left for us." She said the IEA is different.

Failed 2022 attorney general candidate Tom DeVore has attracted thousands of online followers and regularly attacks both Curran and McCombie for their IEA ties. He's gone so far as to repeatedly claim that the IEA represents Chicago teachers, even though the Chicago Teachers Union is most definitely not part of the IEA.

DeVore has endorsed a primary opponent against McCombie and against at least one other House GOP member, Rep. Charlie Meier, R-Okawville.

McCombie and her allies will likely have to spend significant money to defend the leader and Meier – money which could've been used to defend against a predicted House Democratic onslaught next fall. That prospect only buttresses McCombie's claim from earlier this summer that DeVore is a "Democrat operative." Whatever he says, the end result is Democrats benefit.

Americans for Prosperity Illinois is expected to go all-in for McCombie in the primary. The group will also help her caucus fend off the

Democrats next year.

Meanwhile, Downstate Republicans often complain that urban Democrats turn up their noses at rural Illinois. During Republican Day, however, Republican DuPage County Sheriff James Mendrick made a claim about rural Republicans that could haunt his announced gubernatorial bid.

Like Darren Bailey in the 2022 governor's race, Mendrick is running for governor on a tough-on-crime agenda. But he said Bailey just didn't get it.


"He had no ability to really do anything about (crime). No offense to him, but he's a farmer," Mendrick said about Bailey.

That "farmer" crack didn't sit well with Bailey's former campaign manager Jose Durbin.


"Taking a swipe at farmers in a state built on agriculture is a strange way to ask for votes - especially in a GOP Primary largely made up of rural voters," Durbin told Isabel. "Perhaps Jim should try other ways to promote his failing campaign. Darren Bailey's roots in farming mean he knows hard work, responsibility and how to deliver results − exactly what Illinois needs to fight crime and get back on track." □

And when you're ready, there's pie. Here are a few highlights for your next fall getaway together.

### **Children's Museum of Illinois**

No concessions, but tables and chairs are available in the Mess Hall and in the outdoor picnic area for those who bring their own snacks and meals.

For families with children ages 2 through 10 years ready to discover and play, this is a fun, colorful and memorable place to visit. For executive director Rikki Parker, "It's all about the joy, the look in kids' eyes, such as when they climb the (two-story) climbing structure for the first time."

The Central Climber, which replaced the former climbing gym in 2024, is one of the newer features of this award-winning 27,000-square-foot interactive play, arts and sciences facility that opened in 1990 and gets bigger and better every year.

"(The climber) is not just indoor playground equipment," said Parker. "There are various ways to plan and go through it, and it encourages healthy risk tolerance and how to use gross motor skills, so kids have fun while they're learning."

In addition to the climbing structure, a new working 20 foot by 5 foot Illinois Waterways table, complete with a lock and dam, demonstrates how agricultural goods are transported using the Illinois waterway system; an outdoor sound garden offers a different kind of sensory experience; and the new 7,000-square-foot Heroes Hall features law enforcement and first responder activities, a dispatch center, sheriff car, ambulance, miniature hospital and more.

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




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# **Rock the Conservatory**

SYPG kicks off 20th anniversary season Sept. 13

The set list is kept secret to heighten the anticipation. But if you like live music and dance with some art thrown in, you won't be disappointed.

Company dancers from the Springfield Youth Performance Group (SYPG), along with professional rock musicians, present the rousing "Rock the Conservatory" on Saturday, Sept. 13 at 8 p.m.

The venue itself is a draw. The Grant Conservatory of Music and Dance is located in the former Elliott Avenue Baptist Church. Rock the Conservatory is staged in the sanctuary of the building, framed by stained glass that provides "a warm hug for the audience," according to Taryn Grant, SYPG founder and executive director.

"During Covid, the church shut down and never reopened," said Grant. "We had been looking for a venue to house SYPG and the Illinois Symphony Orchestra, and this was the perfect location to bring both together and provide multiple, large performance spaces along with classrooms, storage and convenient parking."

Rock the Conservatory kicks off SYPG's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary season, and the community is invited to the immersive experience. "The music and entertainment begin the minute you walk in the door," said Grant. "During intermission, there will be activities in the lobby including an artist painting a piano. This year's Rock the Conservatory is bigger, more intense and fast-paced. The audience is on the same level as the dancers. Our professional musicians on the stage have local ties and now work in Chicago, Nashville and New York. Nothing, to me, is more exciting than live music."

The band is led by Tommy Sagins of Chicago, originally from Sherman. This is the fourth time SYPG has presented Rock the Conservatory, however, "Every show we do is brand new," said Grant. "We never do the same show twice or the same choreography twice. We owe that to the audience. It's our responsibility to surprise them and bring them a new gift, especially during this anniversary season."

She added that the performers rise to a new level to make the shows even better than the year before.

Tickets for Rock the Conservatory are available for \$30 each at sypgfoundation.org,

with 250 to be sold. She encouraged those buying tickets on the website to also read where their ticket money goes. "When you purchase a ticket, you are investing in the outreach work we do. All of the proceeds go back into the community for our outreach programs," said Grant. Those programs include free, after-school dance classes offered at the Boys and Girls Clubs of Central Illinois, whose participants are then included in SYPG stage productions.

Partnering with Enos Elementary across the street from the Conservatory, Hope School and the Boys and Girls Clubs, SYPG also offers the Mighty Movers program for children with developmental delays. Other outreach programs, all free of charge, include the Smile Co., where fairy tale characters visit children in need of a smile who are sick or in a special circumstance; Books on Stage where book

characters come to life to instill a love of reading in school children; and Bravery Ambassadors, with SYPG company members and alumni involved in community projects and mentorship.

Community service is a large part of the SYPG experience. "By the time our dancers are filling out college applications, they have years of community service under their belts," said Grant. SYPG also hosts a chapter of the National Honor Society for Dance Arts, recognizing outstanding artistic merit, leadership and academic achievement in dance students.

Also coming up this fall, SYPG will present The Nutcracker Ballet Dec. 6 and 7 at the Sacred Heart-Griffin High School auditorium. Auditions for dancers 5-17 will be held Aug. 23, 2:30 p.m. at the Conservatory.

Grant promises some new and exciting features in this year's Nutcracker. "The

performance will be one hour without an intermission. The show moves quickly with a narrator so all ages can enjoy and understand the story."

She says the performance will feature the traditional Nutcracker story but updated to be culturally sensitive, with new scenes and costumes. In addition to the show, there will be activities in the lobby including crafts, a children's library and special characters to meet.

As far as the Nutcracker performers, Grant sees value in starting young. "Giving them the platform to perform at a young age is where their self-esteem begins to develop. They're proud of being a part of the performance and of what they've created. We plant the seeds and then nurture them. We want their experience with performing to be very positive, and we have never turned a child away in 20 years."





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


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# Celebrating the life and legacy of Marsha P. Johnson

Phoenix Center to hold events Saturday and Sunday

The Phoenix Center invites the community to a weekend of celebration in honor of what would have been activist Marsha P. Johnson's 80th birthday. The festivities include a fundraiser dance party, an afterparty and a free film screening, all paying tribute to the life and legacy of one of the most iconic figures in LGBTQ+ history.

Marsha P. Johnson was a fearless Black transgender activist and drag performer who played a central role in the 1969 Stonewall uprising in New York, considered a turning point in the gay rights movement. She adopted the name Marsha P. Johnson after moving to Greenwich Village. When asked what the "P" stood for, she'd famously reply, "Pay it no mind," a witty and defiant response to questions about her gender.

Johnson was born Malcolm Michaels Jr. on Aug. 24, 1945, in Elizabeth, New Jersey, the fifth of seven children in a working-class, religious family. Assigned male at birth, Johnson began dressing in girls' clothes around the age of 5. Her parents were disapproving of her self-expression and she was often bullied by the boys in her

neighborhood. During a 1992 interview, she described being a young victim of sexual assault at the hands of a 13-year-old boy, after which she stopped cross-dressing and decided the idea of being gay was "some sort of dream" rather than a realistic possibility.

In 1963, Johnson graduated from Thomas A. Edison High School and moved to New York City. The 17-year-old brought one bag of clothes and \$15 with her. Though she often struggled to make ends meet, living in Greenwich Village became the catalyst for embracing her identity and discovering her passions, despite the challenges she often faced being Black and queer.

A prominent figure in New York's gay community, Johnson was a member of the

Gay Liberation Front (GLF) and, with her close friend Sylvia Rivera, cofounded the radical activist group Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries (STAR). She was also a vibrant presence in the city's art scene, modeling for Andy Warhol and performing with the drag troupe Hot Peaches. Known as the "mayor of Christopher Street," she was a welcoming and beloved figure in Greenwich Village. Later in life, she became a dedicated AIDS activist with ACT UP, beginning in 1987.

Johnson died in 1992 at the age of 46 and an investigation into her death remains open to this day. A 2017 Netflix documentary by director David France, *The Death and Life of Marsha P. Johnson*, looks at both the mysterious circumstances surrounding her death and her life's work advocating for LGBTQ+ rights, particularly for trans women of color. Johnson continues to inspire movements for equity and justice into the present.

"Marsha P. Johnson was a fearless and fly woman who dedicated her life to helping people," said Ricki Marvel, a local singer/ songwriter and activist who has agreed to host the birthday event. "This weekend of events will give us a chance to honor one of our trancestors and reflect on our power, as well as the challenges BIPOC trans folks face."

"This weekend is about honoring Marsha's legacy the way she lived: with joy, resistance and beauty," said Teresa Silva, executive director of The Phoenix Center. "We invite everyone, LGBTQ+ folks and allies alike, to come together, celebrate and support the work that still needs to be done." □

## Dance, remember and rise - together for Marsha

The celebration kicks off at 6 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 23, with a high-energy Dance Party Fundraiser at The Inn at 835. Guests will enjoy an immersive Marsha-themed party atmosphere, music, dancing, community and joy - all in the spirit of Marsha's enduring message of love and liberation. Attendees are invited to wear an outfit Marsha would have inspired. She was well-known for wearing colorful thrift outfits, bold costume jewelry and crowns made of fruit and flowers.

The celebration continues Saturday night with an afterparty at Clique, 411 E. Washington St.

On Sunday, Aug. 24, at 1 p.m. the community is invited to a free screening of the acclaimed documentary, *The Death and Life of Marsha P. Johnson*, followed by a guided discussion. The film explores the life, activism and mysterious death of Johnson, while highlighting the ongoing fight for trans rights and justice. The screening will take place at Out on Second, 120 E. # Fall garden projects

The first golden leaves of autumn are just beginning to turn, but don't put away those gardening tools just yet. There are still plenty of growing days left in the season. Indeed, late summer is the perfect time to plant quickgrowing veggies that thrive in cooler weather. Spinach, radishes (especially vibrant pink and green watermelon radishes) carrots, kale, green onions, beets, broccoli raab, cabbage, turnips and rutabagas are all excellent candidates for sowing from seed in a fall veggie garden. Mulching in garden beds and around shrubs with fallen leaves puts pesky yard waste to good use and is especially important around newly planted trees or perennials to protect them from cold Illinois winters.

It's also an ideal time to begin dreaming and planning for next year's garden. Folks looking to install an entirely new garden space can begin now by laying a tarp down over the intended garden area and weighing it down with rocks or bricks to prevent the tarp from blowing away over the winter, smothering weeds and making the soil easier to turn come spring. This chemical-free method is well-suited to practically any kind of garden, from bountiful veggie gardens to eyecatching flower beds.


#### Make kokedema




exercising their creative muscles in this hands-

# Take a family camping trip

Growing up, my family were car camping people. Both my brother and I were involved with scouting, and my parents kept an upto-date Kampgrounds of America (KOA) directory in the sideboard in the living room. I vividly remember one trip to the Outer Banks where it rained so much that the tent flooded and I spent the night in a van with a half a dozen mosquitoes.

Despite once being a surly, soaked tween, I went on to do some enjoyable car camping with my boyfriend (now husband) into my 20s and early 30s, but haven't been since becoming a parent. Presumably, it was too overwhelming to attempt sleeping in a tent when my babies and toddlers were only half decent at sleeping in their cribs and then beds, but now that everyone is much older, I am thinking we ought to try a family camping trip.

The benefits of family camping appeal to me – spending time in nature, getting away from our screens and developing an appreciation for the natural world. Both of my kids mostly enjoy hiking, wading into creeks and lakes and being outdoors. I also think they are both old enough to help set up camp and do some camp chores.

With an autumn trip in mind, I consulted several family blogs and articles about tips for planning our first family camping trip. These particular tips resonated with me:

#### Use books to prepare kids


Camping overnight in a tent can be a little hard to conceptualize for kids, and when

things are hard to imagine (the first day of school, for instance), many parents like to turn to books. Some books to get kids excited about and invested in camping are:

Flashlight by Lizi Boyd

— This picture book has
no words and is a good
option for your youngest
campers.

Henry and Mudge and the Starry Night by Cynthia Rylant – We love a Cynthia Rylant book, and this one is about



a sweet family hiking and camping trip that includes a pet.

Cooking in a Can: Campfire Recipes for Kids by Kate
White and Debra Dixon –
Enough said.

The Camping Adventure Book for Families by Linda Hamilton – I had the chance to peruse this one at the gift shop at Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site and it has loads of great ideas to look through while you are planning your camping trip.

The Lonely Planet Kids'
Survival Guide – This is
probably overkill for a laidback car camping trip, but
my kids have read and reread

this one over the years and know what to do if they come across a bear, so it gets points for engagement.

#### **Choose your destination wisely**

This seems obvious, but stay with me a second. Honestly, if you are nervous about camping, many experienced family campers suggest simply pitching a tent in your own backyard as a starting point. This do-ahead strategy allows your kids to get used to all the excitement and new night sounds, while providing a super-easy plan for bailing as needed. If you are ready to step it up, choose a camping destination that has family-friendly activities. Many campgrounds and camp sites have spots for fishing, hiking, playgrounds, game rooms or arcades and even swimming.

## **Keep meals fun and easy**

Camping is the perfect opportunity to keep meals simple. Clearly, s'mores should be involved. And since the kids are already roasting marshmallows, let them "cook" their own food as well. Kids can help shop and prep simple food ahead, plan one-pot meals or assemble simple things like sandwiches and hot dogs.

## Pack the right stuff and plan some fun stuff

Choose the right gear — this is different for everyone but might include the correct-sized sleeping bags that trap heat for smaller kids, easy to set up tents, bug spray that works for you and your family and children-friendly flashlights and headlamps that won't blind everyone. Be sure to throw plenty of layers in the car, especially if it is going to be cool or you anticipate kids getting muddy or damp. Lastly, include some fun stuff such as card games, fairy lights, giant bubbles, bikes and scooters, binoculars, bug-catching equipment and bird calls. □

# **Upcoming art shows and festivals**

Art is a small word that belies the huge impact it has on a community. Art is a language that can connect diverse groups and individuals through both shared experiences and differences. It helps build community pride with cultural identity while introducing new ideas and perspectives. Art even has a role in economic development as cultural events attract tourism, bringing in visitors who help support local businesses and contribute to the local economy.

One of the gems of Springfield's art scene is the community-based nonprofit Springfield Art Association (SAA). In its goal to support the visual arts, the SAA not only offers art education classes in just about every medium, it also hosts exhibitions and an annual fine art fair.

The SAA Collective at 105 N. Fifth St. in downtown Springfield has two exhibitions that are open through Thursday, Sept. 25. "Confluence" showcases the works of Laura Anderson and Leslie Stalter who are both educators at Lincoln Land Community College and juried artists of the Collective. The exhibition "presents immersive pieces that blur boundaries between organic and manmade forms, inviting viewers into a space that feels both new and strangely familiar."

Seeking to highlight diverse voices expressed through pastel, acrylic, mixed media, oil and charcoal in works both realistic and abstract, "PLEIADES" presents the bold strength of women artists in the 21st century. Artists Sarah Anderson, Julie Brown, Delinda Chapman, Denise Church, Catherine Flynn, Ruthann Mazrim, and Sheri Ramsey are featured in the exhibit at the SAA Collective.

The "Statewide: Illinois Artist Showcase" exhibit, on display through Aug. 30, celebrates the diversity and creative talent throughout the state by highlighting the work of talented professional artists, aged 21 and older, who are living and working in Illinois. The show is at the SAA's M. G. Nelson Gallery, 700 N. Fourth St.

Artists from across the country will gather on the lawn of Edwards Place for the SAA's 37th Annual Edwards Place Fine Art Fair. This art fair is the highlight of the year for the SAA and the weekend-long event includes live music, food and exhibits. It is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 20, and Sunday, Sept. 21, at Edwards Place, 700 N. Fourth St.

"Perceptions of Nature," a solo watercolor exhibition by Donald Landry, will be on display at the Hoogland Center for the Arts, 420 S. Sixth St., from Sept. 14-29. Landry, a member of the Sangamon Watercolor Society, has been painting for almost 50 years. He says most of

his work is of local landscapes in places such as Washington Park, Lincoln Memorial Garden and Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site. The society will host an artist's reception from 1-3 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 14.

The Illinois State Museum, 502 S. Spring St., is hosting the fifth installation of the annual NOIR art exhibition, "NOIR V: Resilience," through Tuesday, Sept. 2. The exhibit, curated by Austin Wells and Elijah Miller, features photography, mixed media, oil and acrylic paintings, pastel work and other artworks by Black artists highlighting the theme of resilience. Artists use their work to "celebrate and preserve Black culture, traditions and values, fostering a sense of pride and belonging."

The Fae Folk Art Collective is a nonprofit organization dedicated to presenting visual, performing and literary arts with fantasythemed events. With the Fae Folk Art Festival IV: Mythical Creatures the collective hopes to create a safe, Renaissance faire-inspired

atmosphere for all ages. Look for an art market, literary area, poetry open mic, costume contest, performances by Capital City Improv, Zwei-Dumm Productions, The Pretty Peculiars and Maverick Moon, plus interactive games, activities for kids and food trucks. It will be held on Saturday, Sept. 6, at Union Square Park, 212 N. Sixth St.

The Pharmacy Gallery and Art Space, 623 E. Adams St., was created in 2011 to "to cultivate and celebrate expressions of multidimensional artists." The gallery also serves as an art studio, performance venue and arts center. The member group exhibition, "HINTERLANDS," which is an exploration of the idea of areas beyond city bounds and the "less developed and hard to reach locations," runs through November. Also ongoing is "Bob Waldmire," a display of the works of the iconic Route 66 hippie artist. It will be displayed through 2026 in celebration of the route's 100 anniversary.

**Art Spectacular** is a festival of art, music

and children's programs. Founded by Rees Carillon Society board member Barb Walker, the art show is a professionally juried fine art and craft show featuring museum-quality works. The participating artists are among the region's and nation's most-recognized for their original work in a variety of media. Works of art and crafts range from \$50 to \$7,500. In addition to a silent auction and gift basket raffle, the event features hourly carillon performances and other performances by local musicians, artist demonstrations, a kids' art sale and food. The show is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 13, and Sunday, Sept. 14, at the Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon, 1740 W. Fayette Ave.

Springfield has a living, breathing art community and it never disappoints. We are lucky to have some incredible talent among us and plenty of places in which to experience their work. Give yourself the gift of time to explore the exhibitions and experience how art can connect us.  $\square$

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## What is PrEP?

PrEP, or pre-exposure prophylaxis, is medicine people at risk for HIV take to prevent getting HIV from sex or injection drug use. PrEP can stop HIV from taking hold and spreading throughout your body. PrEP has been approved by the FDA.

## Why Take PrEP?

PrEP reduces the risk of getting HIV from sex by about 99% when taken as prescribed. Among people who inject drugs, it reduces the risk by at least 74% when taken as prescribed.

## Is PrEP Right for You?

PrEP may benefit you if you test negative for HIV and -

you have had anal or vaginal sex in the past 6 months, and you:

- have a sexual partner with HIV (especially if the partner has an unknown or detectable viral load),
- have not consistently used a condom, or
- have been diagnosed with an STD in the past 6 months.

you inject drugs and

 share needles, syringes, or other injection equipment.



If you are a woman and have a partner with HIV and are considering getting pregnant,

## The Legacy Theatre Come from Away Sept. 26-28, Oct. 1-5 and Oct. 8-12



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### It's a Southern thing, y'all

The tomato pie is the refined, elegant cousin of the tomato sandwich

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, my wife, our dog and I resided in our converted school bus in different areas of the country. We made an effort to shop at local open-air farmers markets whenever possible, enjoying all the regional produce. However, my wife often said, "There's nothing better than a good Illinois tomato!"

Back in central Illinois, we're finally enjoying our local tomatoes. We always mark the summer's first ripe tomato with a BLT, a sandwich beautiful in its simplicity: smoky bacon, juicy tomato slices and a smear of mayonnaise between two slices of toasted sandwich bread (never crusty artisanal bread) with an optional lettuce leaf.

During our time in the South, we discovered the simple pleasure of the Southern tomato sandwich: soft white bread, ripe tomatoes, salt, pepper, and, most importantly, Duke's mayonnaise. Though it never surpassed my beloved BLT, this modest sandwich, often delightfully soggy with tomato juices, holds its own appeal. Nowadays, once my BLT desires are met, I bypass the Southern tomato sandwich and gravitate toward its more refined and elegant cousin: the Southern tomato pie. The tomato pie swaps out the pallid sandwich bread with a flaky pie crust, the tomatoes are joined by sweet onions and grated cheese and everything is held together by the inevitable addition of Duke's.

Anyway, this is a short story for a long recipe. This is a great savory pie. I encourage you to try it. If you are intimidated by making your own pie crust, buy a premade pie crust at the grocery store. But it won't be as good as homemade.

#### Southern tomato pie

Serves 6 to 8

Ingredients:
For the crust:
1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
3/4 teaspoon kosher salt
3/4 teaspoon black pepper
1 stick of unsalted butter- frozen
Ice water

For the filling: 1 1/2 pounds ripe tomatoes, sliced crosswise into 1/4-inch thick slices 2 teaspoons sea salt, divided 1 tablespoon olive oil 1 medium red onion, thinly sliced
3/4 cup mayonnaise
(preferably Duke's)
3/4 cup yellow sharp cheddar cheese, shredded
3/4 cup aged white cheddar cheese, shredded
2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1 large egg, lightly beaten
1 cup low-moisture
mozzarella cheese, shredded,

Preparation: Make the pie dough: Well ahead of time, place a medium mixing bowl, box grater and butter in your freezer to thoroughly chill.

Prepare some ice water.

divided

Combine the flour, salt and pepper in the chilled mixing bowl. Grate the frozen butter directly into the flour mixture through the large holes of the chilled box grater.

With your hands, gently toss the grated butter in the flour until combined. The cold butter should end up the size of peas. Drizzle ½ cup ice water into the mixture, stirring until the flour is evenly moistened. With your hands, gather the dough into a ball, transfer it to a floured work surface and knead gently until it comes together. If the dough starts feeling warmer, put it back in the fridge for 10 minutes to chill. Do not overwork. Form into a disc, wrap in plastic and refrigerate for at least one hour or overnight.

Prepare the tomatoes: Season both sides of the tomato slices with ½-teaspoon of salt and arrange them on a wire rack set over a rimmed baking sheet. Let them sit for 15 minutes, then pat dry with paper towels. Flip the slices and continue to let them sit, patting dry and turning every 15 minutes for one hour or until a significant amount of liquid has been released.

Prepare the pie crust: Lightly flour a clean work surface and rolling pin. Unwrap and roll out the dough, starting in the center and rolling up to, but not over, the top edge of the dough. Return to the center, and roll down to, but not over, the bottom edge. Continue rolling and rotating the dough a quarter turn at a time until it forms a circle at least 11

inches wide and 1/8-inch thick.

Carefully transfer the dough to a 9-inch pie plate, avoiding stretching or pulling. Gently press it against the bottom and sides. Trim any excess dough with scissors, leaving ½-inch beyond the rim. Fold this extra ½-inch under itself, making it even with the rim, and crimp with a fork.

If you have the time, freeze your unbaked pie crust overnight. This allows the gluten to relax fully, preventing shrinkage or slumping during baking.

Blind-bake the empty pie shell: Adjust oven rack to middle position and preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Lightly prick the chilled pie shell all over the bottom in 1/2-inch intervals. Line pie shell with a double layer of aluminum foil, loosely folding over the edges to prevent burning. Fill with pie weights, dried beans or rice. Transfer to a parchment or foil-lined rimmed baking sheet and bake until the crust begins to brown around the edges, 10 to 15 minutes. Remove from oven and carefully remove liner and pie weights from par-baked crust and bake the now uncovered crust until the bottom is baked through and set, and just beginning to turn golden brown, about 2 to 5 minutes. Set aside and let cool about 30

Prepare the filling: While the crust cools, heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add onion and 1/2 teaspoon salt, then cook, stirring occasionally until browned and softened. If the onions begin to stick or get too

dark, add 1 to 2 tablespoons of water. Transfer the cooked onions to a paper towel-lined plate and set aside.


In a medium bowl, combine the mayonnaise, yellow cheddar, white cheddar, mustard, garlic powder, pepper, and egg. Stir until well mixed, then add 3/4 cup of the mozzarella. Spread about 1 cup (half of the mixture) evenly over the bottom of the cooled pie crust.

Pat tomatoes dry one last time and arrange half of the tomato slices in a single layer on top of the mayonnaise mixture. Scatter half of the cooked onions over the tomatoes. Spread the remaining mayonnaise mixture over the onions and tomatoes, then layer the remaining tomato slices and onions on top. Finish by sprinkling with the remaining 1/4 cup of mozzarella.

Bake for 35 to 45 minutes or until the cheese is melted and the top is puffed and golden brown. If the crust edges brown too quickly, cover them with aluminum foil or a pie shield. Allow the pie to cool on a wire rack for at least one hour before slicing. Serve at room temperature.  $\square$



From a young age, Bennie Strumpher had a passion for coins.

"I became interested in them when I was about 10 years old," he said. "My dad worked at a coal mine and he came home with a sock full of coins – they paid him in silver dollars. So he laid the coins out on the table. They were pretty and I fell in love with them."

From sorting through silver dollars in a bank vault as a child to traveling along the trade show circuit with his family as an adult, Strumpher's love affair with coins helped guide his life.

In 2007, he found a place for that love

to take root when he bought Decatur Coin and Jewelry, a business that has been located at 104 N. Main St. in downtown Decatur since 1972.

Bennie Strumpher wasn't the only Strumpher with an affinity for coins. His daughter, Samantha, happily followed in his footsteps.

"I went to a lot of coin shows with my dad," she said. "I'd take coins around to dealers and sell them for him. I'd leave with a box full of coins and I'd come back with a hand full of checks or cash."

"She was really little, probably 10 or 12 then," Bennie Strumpher added.

And she's been by her father's side at Decatur Coin and Jewelry since



the very beginning, mostly handling the vintage costume jewelry customers bring in.

"I love being with my dad and experiencing with him daily the passion he has for this place, and that he's helped me



create, as well," she said.

Handling everything from coins, pocket watches and vintage paper money to costume, gold and silver jewelry, Bennie and Samantha believe it's their ethics and service that make their business stand out from others. "We're a 'pay-it-forward' organization," Bennie Strumpher said. "If you have something worth a lot of money, we're going to offer you a lot of money, about 90 percent on the dollar. We have paid out over 14 million dollars to people just like you in the past few years," Strumpher said.

"We are professional numismatists and travel the coin show circuit buying investor grade coins that we seldom encounter here at the shop.

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### Robert Moore reflects on his life

Bending the arc of history toward justice

To track Robert Moore's life and career is to study one person's successful journey in the Great Migration of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. To see this Springfield man's connections to other major events such as the Cuban Missile Crisis and the Civil Rights Movement adds a personal dimension that makes history feel more real

Born in 1943, Moore grew up in the Jim Crow era in a Mississippi farming community. He graduated from an all-Black high school after never experiencing an integrated school. He declined a scholarship to play basketball in junior college and enlisted in the U.S. Army, setting him on a life journey that he boldly designed.

He describes all of this in his autobiography, *Off My Neck*, published Aug. 1. He says the title "doesn't just reflect a moment. It reflects a lifetime. It bridges my journey as a Black man growing up in Mississippi who found his purpose in life in Illinois."

The book is short, as autobiographies go. I read a pre-publication manuscript that was 61 typed pages – about 25,000 words – and in final editing.

The book's best stories describe Moore's encounters with racial strife and how he responded. While on leave from Fort Riley, Kansas, in 1962, he writes: "I quietly staged my own rebellion against segregation by removing the 'Whites Only' sign from a

water cooler in my small town in (Algoma), Mississippi."

Two years later, riding on a Greyhound bus that stopped at a café in Arkansas, Moore was, as a Black man, accustomed to buying his hamburger around the back of the café. "I challenged this practice by entering the (front of the) establishment and asking to be served," he writes, adding he was wearing his Army uniform at the time. "There must have been a pause. .... Well, I was served. These experiences became part of my long career of fighting for human and civil rights across the nation."

After three years in the Army, he moved to Rockford, Illinois, to live with his brother and eventually began a career in law enforcement. He later transferred to Springfield with the Illinois State Police to work on affirmative action; moved back South to serve with the Savannah, Georgia, police department; then relocated to Springfield and was appointed U.S. Marshal for the Central District of Illinois by President Clinton in 1994. His final job was serving as police chief in Jackson, Mississippi.

Moore initially moved to Rockford because his brother had already migrated there, and he did not want to stay in Mississippi. He became one of five to six million Blacks to relocate voluntarily from the South to the Midwest, Northeast and West between 1910 and 1970. In Rockford

he briefly had three jobs – the last one at a Chrysler manufacturing plant that ended in disappointment – before applying at the Winnebago County Sheriff's Office. He got the job and soon discovered he was the only Black deputy sheriff working on patrol.

A major catalyst occurred in Moore's career when he and a white deputy were discussing whether the Illinois State Police had any Black representation, and his white colleague "said he knew of none because they could not pass the written test. This statement became a challenge to me," Moore said.

Moore took the ISP test, easily passed it and became a state trooper in 1972. Three years later, he was relocated to Springfield to become ISP's affirmative action officer, and later, its Equal Employment Opportunity director. That positioned him to develop programs and write articles for national publications about recruiting minorities to law enforcement.


In 1994, when under consideration for the U.S. marshal position with the support of U.S. Senators Carol Moseley-Braun and Paul Simon, Moore faced adversity, dealing with a clerk's fabricated allegations of racism and sexual harassment. He survived that onslaught and became the first Black U.S. marshal in central Illinois, serving from 1994 to 2002.

Moore devotes short chapters to his various positions, along with anecdotes about his family, including his wife, Barbara, who was a teacher, and his siblings who migrated to Illinois and Pennsylvania. He sometimes leaves the reader wishing for more details, such as all he had to consider on 9/11, when he was U.S. marshal, or what he has done in the past 20 years in Springfield as a consultant on civil rights and law enforcement issues.

But I respect a writer's prerogative about what to say and what to leave out. Moore's new book is a worthwhile case study and shows us how one person can bend the arc of history toward justice. His entering the front of a café for whites did not gain the fame that Rosa Parks did, but as Moore writes: "Just as I lifted the weighty foot of segregation off my neck, so can young brothers and sisters."






