

Start a new school year with more independence

As parents, one of our most important goals is to teach our children to be independent, but teaching those skills can sometimes be difficult and fraught. It's not always easy for kids to walk into their new roles and responsibilities with good cheer, and it's definitely not easy for parents to let go.

Our well-meaning desire to help our kids have easy, happy days (and, let's face it, sometimes just get out the door) often holds our kids back in terms of learning little life skills like tying a shoe or packing a lunch. Unfortunately, those little life skills add up to big life skills as children reach for the independence and confidence that they'll need to grow into

happy adults.

Luckily, every day is a new day to practice independence with kids, and the back-to-school season is a perfect time to think about these things. Here are some easy mindset shifts that you can consider in order to help your children foster independence during this upcoming school year:

Let them be

Kids need space to learn and grow, and well-meaning parents sometimes hover. We've all been there. Allow your kids to play in a different room without intervening, resist the urge to oversee sibling fussiness so they can work it out on their own, let your kids ride their bikes or scooters or walk ahead of you. All of this can be done safely and to your kids' developmental level, and allows them the space they need to work things out on their own.

Offer choices

You've likely heard this advice, which is to allow children to make their own choices whenever possible. The back-to-school season is full of opportunities to make choices. For younger students, this could be as simple as allowing kids to choose their own clothing, or letting them pick what the family will do with part of the weekend. For older

children, merge the ideas of choices and independence and go ahead and ask them directly: What would you like the freedom to be able to do this school

Rethink routines and chores

Involving your kids in the day-to-day maintenance of their things and their home not only splits the load for the whole family, it teaches independence and life skills. Since back to school likely has us all reexamining our routines, why not do so with an aim toward independence? If your family has a list of things that need to be done before school (put your pajamas in the laundry, wipe that blue toothpaste out of the sink, walk the dog around the block) or after school (empty your lunchbox, help manage the pile of papers in your backpack, walk the dog around the block again), involve your kids to the extent they are able.

Try not to nag

OK, so here's the kicker. As parents, we can only accomplish the above if we don't stand in the way of how it gets done. Let's say you'd like your kid to make their bed. Great, but, you might have to rethink your goal of military corners right away. Overcorrecting our kids doesn't allow them to build their life skills on their own, so whenever possible, try not to nag. If your kids are attempting to make their own choices and manage their own items or spaces, let them be.

Let mistakes happen

Mistakes and natural consequences are part of life. Of course, we love our kids and would never purposefully put them in harm's way, but this doesn't mean we have to clear the road for them, either. Our kids will come up against obstacles and make mistakes, and that's alright. We learn from our mistakes and are better for them. Our hearts are in the right place, and it can be hard not to want to intervene, but just remind yourself that we parents are playing the long game here.



Springfield teen publishes first book

"My consciousness blended into my unconsciousness" begins the new young adult fiction page-turner, *Amoeba*, by Rayna Vincent, published on Amazon in May. It's the first novel for the Springfield 14-year-old, but it probably won't be her last.

"A lot of people have asked me if there is going to be a sequel," Vincent says of the believable, emotional, tense account of Nevaeh as she fights for her life in a sinister hospital. "I can say (now) I have started to plan out a sequel." Great news – the end will leave many readers wanting more.

Although the voice of the story is unmistakably a young teen's, the insights, imagery and relatability easily cross age groups. There's a missing father and mother-daughter stress, a crush and a water-borne disease all detailed with vivid physical sensations; thought narration that moves in and out of rage, fear, betrayal, heartache, courage and determination; and a surprise reveal. Where did all of this come from? And where did this busy teenager find time to write a book?

Amoeba is the product of an online writing class in homeschool, Vincent says. "We each wrote a novel by the end of the year. The inspiration for Amoeba probably came from something I saw on YouTube and research that really scared me." She also mentions having her own experiences in hospitals that give authenticity to Nevaeh's experience. "Then it developed in my head and unfolded as I was writing."

This isn't Vincent's first writing success. Before leaving public school after sixth grade to pursue her own interests in her own time, she participated in a fifth-grade Junior

Beta Club creative writing competition and won a plaque for the best submission in Illinois. The win sent her to Nashville where she placed eighth among the national finalists.

"Writing is one of my favorite subjects. I can express my creativity and my own ideas," she said.

Vincent is skilled. She employs exactly the right level of detail to transport readers into her world. It's not just a book bag on the floor of the hospital, it's a book bag with all the zippers open. Not just a TV, a large, flat-screen television. Her verbs are active and her feelings are genuine, if not easy.

Neveah thinks expressively, as in, "I'll probably wind up being myself and doing something embarrassing." "I didn't like sad or risky topics, having to be careful with everything I said." "Who would believe the words of a child?" "He probably assumed his head was messing with him." "Mom, can't you put yourself in my position? Can't you imagine how I'm feeling?"

Vincent comes from a family of creative, independent thinkers and artists. "I've grown up with grandparents and parents that are pretty creative in multiple ways, and they've always encouraged me to express myself in creative ways as well."

Her grandmother, local gold and silver jewelry artist, teacher and singer Poppy Vincent, is very proud of her. "She's always astounded me. Everything she puts her hand to she accomplishes. She's never been one to sit idle. She was the kind of kid who would get up in the morning and be playing two different games at the same time, or drawing, painting, playing some kind of instrument,"

including piano, guitar, bass and violin.

"She's incredibly creative. She's always been writing a book, even before that class she took. Or drawing pictures. Or designing houses she was going to live in," said her grandmother. "It always seemed very unusual for her age. I've always encouraged her to go after her dream. She can do anything she puts her mind to."

Vincent's mother, Beth, says she has watched her daughter grow through long hours typing alone in her room, wrestling with insecurities that no one would like the book, the stress of deadlines and the physical letdown once the final submission was in.

"She got really sick with an upper respiratory infection when she submitted it. But her teacher said that was completely normal. 'You're a real author!'"

When she isn't writing, Vincent likes to play with her dog and two brothers, play piano, go shopping and spend time with her friends from homeschool and church.

As for advice to any other aspiring teen authors, Vincent says, "Follow through. Don't give up. And plan it through in advance or else you can get lost in your own thoughts. I will do that next time."

Also, she might add, get used to success. "It's very weird knowing that people have read it. Friends come up to me and say, 'I love your book."

In the meantime, $10^{\rm th}$ grade begins this fall, including dual credit courses for college. And, who knows – maybe that sequel.

STEAM learning opportunities for kids

Scouting America and Illinois State Museum team up for STEAM workshops

The Abraham Lincoln Council of Scouting America is partnering with the Illinois State Museum to present a monthly series of STEM workshops with engaging hands-on experiences for boys and girls ages 5–11. Programs will be offered one Saturday each month in September, October and November. After a holiday break, they will resume in February, March

and April. All sessions will be held at the Illinois State Museum, 502 S. Spring St. The series will kick off Saturday, Sept. 6.

All workshops are from 9:30 a.m. until noon. Activities will be structured based on age, and students will be grouped accordingly. There will be STEM activities in a classroom setting organized by Scouting America as well as activities throughout the museum and opportunities to engage with the museum's exhibits.

"The workshops are designed to ignite curiosity, encourage hands-on learning and foster a deeper understanding of STEAM principles in a creative and engaging way," said Ashley Beasley, STEM director for the Abraham Lincoln Council of Scouting America.

Dates and themes are:

Sept. 6 – Coding Unplugged Activities will teach coding concepts through interactive games, puzzles and team challenges. No screens are needed for this fun,

hands-on session.

Oct. 4 - Robotics Kids will explore programming and problem-solving using Spheros and Ozobots - fun, interactive robots they can code and control.

Nov. 8 - Mad Scientists This is a highenergy STEM event where kids become junior scientists, mixing, bubbling and blasting their way through fun, hands-on science activities. Curiosity, creativity and a little "madness" are all part of the fun.

Feb. 14 - Forensics Kids will step into the shoes of a young detective to explore the world of forensic science through hands-on activities such as fingerprinting, mystery solving and simple experiments. Perfect for curious kids who love puzzles, clues and a little bit of science magic.

March 14 - Simple Machines Participants will discover how things move by exploring simple machines such as levers, pulleys and wheels through fun experiments and creative building challenges. Ideal for young inventors who love to tinker, build and explore how everyday objects work.

April 11 - Digging in the Past Kids will become junior paleontologists and travel back in time to explore the world of dinosaurs and fossils. Digging for "fossils," examining prehistoric clues, and learning amazing facts about dinosaurs are all part of the fun for curious kids who like getting their hands a little dirty.

Kidzeum offers STEAM after-school program

Beginning Monday, Aug. 18, and extending throughout the 2025-26 school year, the Kidzeum, 412 E. Adams St., will offer a STEAM after-school program that encourages curiosity, creativity and confidence in a supportive, engaging environment. The program is targeted at children in first through fourth grades. It is offered Monday through Friday from 3:15 p.m. to 5:45 p.m., immediately after school dismissal, and will follow the District 186 school calendar.

Each day of the week is dedicated to a different area of STEAM - science, technology, engineering, art and math. The program is all about giving students ongoing opportunities to explore new skills, think critically and engage in hands-on learning all year long.

Families can register for the full program or choose one or more specific days of the week based on their child's interests. This is ideal for a consistent and enriching experience throughout the school year. Children are grouped by age to ensure developmentally appropriate engagement.

Each day includes a structured schedule with time for snack, free time that may be used for homework and hands-on STEAM activities. There is no program on days when District 186 schools are closed. On early dismissal days, the program will begin at the adjusted school dismissal time.

Each day of the week has a specific

Monday - Science Day

Dive into the world of experiments, discoveries and curious questions. From simple chemical reactions to exploring the human body, Mondays are all about exploring how the world works.

Tuesday - Technology Day Learn about the tech that powers our world. Students will get hands-on with beginner coding, digital challenges and explore exciting tools such as 3D printing.


Wednesday - Engineering Day Build it, test it, tweak it. Students will design and construct using everyday materials - bridges, towers, marble runs and more - while developing their problem-solving and teamwork skills.

Thursday - Art Day Unleash creativity with drawing, painting, sculpting and mixed-media projects. Thursdays focus on imagination and expression while highlighting the "A" in STEAM.

Friday - Math Day Make math meaningful with puzzles, games, patterns and challenges. Students will strengthen their number skills through activities and math-based board games that make learning fun and collaborative.

Are leaders born or made?

For 17-year-old Jordan Robinson, the new student representative on the Springfield District 186 school board, leadership appears to be a combination of innate qualities and acquired skills.

"Is Jordan a born leader? Yes," said her mom, Jessica Pope-Robinson, with a smile. "We say she was like this from the get-go. Very motivated and determined for whatever she had in her sights. Independent and resilient. And funny!"

Jordan, the youngest of five children, is a senior this fall at Springfield High School. She applied to be the Student Board representative last April after participating in the Superintendent's Student Roundtable for two years. The roundtables are held after school twice a month at the district office.

"A group of kids come together and talk to Superintendent (Jennifer) Gill about things that they see issues with, that need to be improved and things they like," said Jordan. "It's an opportunity to share our views and vantage points."

In her new position, Jordan will lead those roundtables. "I'll direct the meetings, and we'll plan some community events including Unity Day. The purpose of Unity Day is to bring all the high schools together and raise money for charities."

She'll also attend District 186 board meetings twice a month.

"Basically, during board meetings, I'll give student input. Any students who have questions or things they think should be brought up, or concerns, they can come to me about it or to the superintendent roundtables," she said.

Jordan's application included an essay and recommendations from teachers. She was then interviewed by elected board members and announced as the new student representative in May.

What does she hope to accomplish?

"I want more people to attend the roundtables. It has really great potential at the beginning of the year but by the end of the year it kind of breaks off," she noted. "I'd like to start an Instagram page for it, remind people when meetings are and clear up any confusion."

Issues she'd like the school board to address include the district's phone. absence and dress policies, and she'll be voicing student concerns on those. "A lot of students think those policies are too strict," she said.

Jordan knows that conflict can arise during discussions and has her ways of dealing with that. "I like to wait it out, see where the tides turn, and share the students' perspectives on things pertaining to us." She also uses humor, saying, "It gets people to listen more."

"Humor has been her mainstay in life," added Jessica. "It's gotten her out of a lot of stuff with her parents because she's funny, and then we laugh."

Jordan doesn't have to look far to find her role models. As she gave her mom a hug, Jordan said, "Mom is my role model. She's a rock. She kind of blazes through life. I mean, it's hard to handle five kids!"

Jessica, who is employed at the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War Museum in Springfield, said Jordan did the heavy lifting to get the position on her own. "When Jordan said she wanted to do this I said, 'Good luck!' I may have looked over her essay, but she never really asked for assistance. She has everything under control. She did it herself and called me and told me she got it. It was pretty awesome, and I'm very proud of her."

Jordan also looks to her father, Jamie Robinson, for inspiration. A supervisor at County Market, Jamie suffered a stroke several years ago and is still recovering. "If I ever need motivation, I mean this guy, he's walking again," said Jordan. "If he can do that, I can do this."

Jessica talked about the stress that affected the entire family. "Their dad almost died. He's made a lot of progress. When he came home, he was in a wheelchair and now he walks without a cane."

She said all the kids have had to be resilient, "Iordan was a freshman when that happened, so a lot of attention was taken away from her and all of them because so much attention had to go to him. They had to be a little more grown up than they would have."

Among Jordan's many accomplishments and activities are membership In the National Honor Society and Model U.N. and helping to produce the fall school play. She takes mainly advanced placement and honors classes. She volunteered this summer at College for Kids at Lincoln Land Community College and works weekends at Pizza Ranch, saving money for college.

"My savings account is looking pretty good," she said. She hopes to attend University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and major in political science or public health, then possibly attend graduate school in Washington, D.C. Running for elected office is not out of the question, Jordan said.

Through volunteering, school leadership activities and working at a restaurant, she has honed skills in organizing and motivating people.

"For our student roundtable projects, I make sure everyone has a small task, so they don't have to take on a load of work. I supervise people at work, too. I've learned skills like efficiency, figuring out the quickest way to do things, along with technical skills and obviously customer service. Sometimes my manager says, 'Alright Jordan, you got this."

What parent wouldn't be proud of a high-achieving student who takes on a leadership role working with elected officials for the betterment of local education? When asked what advice she might have for other parents with a child showing leadership qualities, Jessica replied, "I just love them and support them." Then she added with a laugh, "And I feed them a lot."

Jordan agreed. "Food is a great motivator. Mom is a great cook. When someone asks me, 'What is your favorite restaurant?' I say, 'My house!""


