# **HSHS** to pay cyber attack settlement

Class action suit of \$7.6 million for personal information compromised by hackers

A court hearing is scheduled Dec. 4 to finalize a \$7.6 million settlement that would pay people whose personal information was seized by hackers in a targeted cyber attack that temporarily crippled Hospital Sisters Health System in 2023.

The nonprofit health system, based in rural Sangamon County near Riverton, discovered the suspicious cyber activity "by an unauthorized third-party threat actor" on its computer network in mid- to late August 2023, according to Sangamon County Circuit Court documents.

The breach caused the personal information of almost 869,000 former and current patients to be disclosed and resulted in several lawsuits to be filed against HSHS, which posts about \$2.8 billion in annual revenues and operates HSHS St. John's Hospital in Springfield as its flagship.

The cases were consolidated in a class action lawsuit in January 2025, and a tentative settlement was reached this summer. The Dec. 4 hearing will be conducted by Circuit Judge Adam Giganti.

The breach temporarily disabled HSHS' clinical, administrative and communication systems. Officials from HSHS, which has nine hospitals in Illinois and four hospitals in Wisconsin – including HSHS St. Francis in Litchfield and HSHS St. Mary's in Decatur – haven't said who was responsible for the attack or whether a ransom to resolve it was demanded or paid.

People affected by the attack were notified

by mail this year and had until Nov. 14 to submit a claim. Each person had the option to request up to \$5,000 in damages for documented out-of-pocket losses associated with the incident or to request an unspecified "alternative cash payment."

A document from the settlement administrator said: "It is expected that a significant amount of money will remain in the settlement fund after all expenses and all other benefits have

been paid. All of this remaining money will be divided equally between everyone who claims an alternative cash payment."

Lawyers representing affected patients are in line to receive \$2.6 million, in addition to other costs and expenses, from the settlement.

All class members are eligible to enroll in two years of CyEx Financial Shield, a comprehensive service that comes with \$1 million in financial fraud insurance.

HSHS declined to answer most questions from *Illinois Times* about the cyber attack, including how much financial damage it caused to the system and what the system has done to prevent another such attack.

An HSHS spokesperson said in an emailed response: "HSHS denies any wrongdoing. Additionally, at the time of the settlement, no evidence was found that any personal information or protected health information was misused in instances of fraud or identity theft as a result of this incident. Individuals who may be a part of the settlement class received a notice in the mail in September. HSHS remains focused on providing the highest quality patient care."

The son of a former HSHS St. John's patient told *Illinois Times* that he filed for an alternative cash payment from the settlement on behalf of his mother, who died this summer.

The Illinois man requested anonymity because of fears that his mother's identity would be exploited further by hackers.

He said it's possible that the HSHS data breach was the source of identity theft involving his mother that he learned about in recent months when hundreds of dollars in Verizon cellphones and Xfinity equipment were purchased and billed to his mother after her death.

The man said he was able to have the purchases canceled, but the experience was a hassle as he and other family members were dealing with grief from the loss of his mother, who was in her 80s.

"Everybody's the victim here," the man said. "You get all this anguish when you least need it. There are just a lot of immoral people out there. ... This is one thing I didn't think I'd have to deal with. Does this all go back to HSHS? I don't know. Maybe. ... There's got to be a better way of keeping and storing this information."

A 2025 report from IBM said the global average cost of a data breach was \$4.4 million, a 9% decrease over 2024, because of "faster identification and containment."

# Editor's note

"Accountability, without systemic transformation, is not justice," the Massey Commission writes in its elegant "Response to the Grayson Verdict," posted on the commission's page on Sangamon County's website (sangamonil.gov). The Oct. 29 verdict brings a "breath of hope" and a "whisper of justice," the statement reads. "We are called now to listen to the pain that persists beyond the courtroom. ... And to act with courage, determination and imagination so that every person who calls for help is met with dignity, humanity, and respect. ..." For the past year, the Commission has painstakingly gathered information about needed reforms, and much of that background has already been posted. The Commission's final report is to be published on the webpage by Dec. 1. The recommendations regarding the dangerous intersection of mental illness, race and law enforcement will be critical to the project's credibility. "The work of justice is long," the Commission writes, and it will take Sangamon citizens working together to implement reforms, "building a community worthy of Sonya's memory." — Fletcher Farrar, editor

From a young age, Bennie Strumpher had a passion for coins.

"I became interested in them when I was about 10 years old," he said. "My dad worked at a coal mine and he came home with a sock full of coins – they paid him in silver dollars. So he laid the coins out on the table. They were pretty and I fell in love with them."

From sorting through silver dollars in a bank vault as a child to traveling along the trade show circuit with his family as an adult, Strumpher's love affair with coins helped guide his life.

# No progress for Police Community Review Commission

Formed to provide oversight but continues to struggle with vacancies, lack of action

The city of Springfield's Police Community Review Commission approved an extension of the window that citizens can file complaints from 15 days to 30 days – though the city council will also have to approve the change – during its final meeting of the year on Nov. 6. In addition, Sunshine Clemons, founder of the Springfield chapter of Black Lives Matter, stepped down from the commission after five years of service, leaving three vacant spots on the seven-member board.

The Commission was formed 20 years ago as an independent government body to provide oversight for the Springfield Police Department by addressing complaints from Springfield residents about police interactions and reviewing internal affairs investigations.

Clemons said the Commission did not review many cases during her time on the board – the last time a complaint was reviewed by the Police Community Review Commission, or PCRC, was in March 2023, when commissioners heard about the appeal of a disciplinary action from 2022. Despite mandated cooperation from SPD when a complaint is brought to the board, the PCRC process, Clemons told *Illinois Times*, felt aimless.

"The way that it's structured just felt like a waste of time," she said. "We (PCRC) can recommend (reprimands), but the police department doesn't have to actually adhere to what we say. It's really just a suggestion that they can listen to if they choose to. The main reason that I stepped down is because the way that the commission is set up. In my opinion, we're never going to disagree with the findings of the chief because so far what I've seen is there's no punishment issued because there was no evidence to prove what the person was saving."

According to the original 2005 ordinance founding the Commission, "any person who feels aggrieved by action or inaction of a sworn officer of the Springfield Police Department shall be entitled to file a complaint," but all complaints to the Commission are recorded by the city's Community Relations office and then forwarded to the SPD deputy chief of professional standards, also known as internal affairs. "Internal affairs will investigate the complaint and render a final report of findings... any person dissatisfied with the internal affairs' findings may file an appeal with the PCRC within 15 working days.

A hearing on the matter shall be scheduled within 30 days." The PCRC then votes on a recommendation related to the police department's findings, which can mean one of several options:

- 1. The PCRC concurs with the finding of the chief of police
- 2. The PCRC does not concur with the finding of the chief of police
- The case should be referred back to SPD internal affairs for further investigation
- 4. The case be continued in another PCRC hearing, due to a lack of four votes for any of the above options Clemons, who has been on the

commission since former Mayor Jim Langfelder and former Springfield Police Chief Kenny Winslow asked her to join in 2020, said at times she thought the PCRC might be viewed as a form of bureaucratic cover for the Springfield Police Department due to rarely, if ever, disagreeing with police investigative findings. Three of the remaining four members on the Commission have law enforcement experience.

"It's like (the PCRC is) there to pretend that they're going to listen to us, but the end result is they're just going to do what the police say or want them to do,'" said Clemons, expressing her concerns of community perception. "That was really,

really hard for me. Especially because, at that time, we had a different corporation counsel person who was very, very strict on what we could say and what we couldn't say, so we weren't even really allowed to explain ourselves (to complainants)."

The PCRC has received and reviewed three complaints related to SPD since 2020, Ethan Posey, director of Community Relations, told *IT*. The idea to expand the complaint window from 15 days to 30 days, along with some new marketing materials, indicates the PCRC is attempting to invite more community interaction.

Since the Commission's recommendations are non-binding, the Springfield City Council has to vote to approve the change for it to take effect. However, no ordinance has appeared on the council agenda for any of the three meetings that have taken place since the PCRC's Nov. 6 meeting.

With Clemons resigning, the Commission is down to its minimum requirement of four members, which means it would lack a quorum should a single commissioner be absent. A Springfield resident reached out to *IT* after showing up to a scheduled Oct. 16 PCRC meeting that was canceled without prior notice. The PCRC later rescheduled the meeting for Nov. 6 and said the October meeting was canceled due to a lack of quorum.

Posey said at the November meeting he recommended multiple applicants be approved to fill the vacancies but is unsure of the status of those applications. He did not specify the number of applications received.

"There have been a number of individuals who have submitted applications to be members of the Police Community Review Commission. I have given recommendations to accept people that have submitted (applications), and I don't know where the process has been moved past that," Posey said. "For lack of a better term, there are applications waiting in the queue to be approved or denied but there are multiple applications that we are waiting on updates on."

However, Mayor Misty Buscher has no plans to fill the vacancies on the PCRC, Amanda Brown, the city's communications director, wrote to *IT* Nov. 24.

"While we are working on filling members of the (Mayor's) boards and commissions, the PCRC is not one of them," Brown wrote. □

# Budzinski intervenes in local housing dispute

Pacific Management promises improvements for low-income residents

U.S. Rep. Nikki Budzinski is demanding to know why a building management company accused of failing to provide safe and clean living conditions in one of its Springfield-based apartment buildings has not taken action.

Budzinski, a Democrat who represents Illinois' 13<sup>th</sup> congressional district, sent a letter Nov. 24 to Pacific Management Inc., seeking answers about Sangamon Towers, 424 N. Fourth St., which residents and workers say is plagued by bedbugs, mold, human waste in public places and insufficient security protocols.

The privately owned building receives funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to provide affordable housing for low-income, elderly and disabled residents.

"We don't operate like that and those are things I don't expect to hear," Pacific Management president and CEO Jeffrey Richards told Capitol News Illinois.

Budzinski said the building was flagged to her office by the local chapter of the Service Employees International Union, which has members that work or live in the building. SEIU Healthcare is a union representing home care and nursing home workers in the Midwest.

"This goes well beyond a simple light bulb that needs to be changed," Budzinski told Capitol News Illinois in an interview. "This is about uninhabitable living conditions, and these are residents that are paying to live there. They deserve to have safe, healthy living conditions."

In late August, after months of conversations with residents, Budzinski approached HUD with the concerns, requesting information about the frequency of inspections and compliance with HUD standards.

HUD responded in a letter on Sept. 12, saying that it had only received one formal complaint about the Sangamon Towers property, which had received a high score on its last inspection: 94 out of 100. Publicly available HUD data confirms that score.

Yet, past reporting has documented HUD's inspection process as failing to flag dangerous living conditions in federally subsidized housing. HUD has since shifted to a new set of standards for inspecting publicly subsidized housing, but full implementation of requirements to meet those standards has faced delays.

Although Sangamon Towers received a satisfactory score on the inspection, HUD's September letter to Budzinski notes deficiencies

"for cockroach presence in two units and a mold-like substance in a bathroom of another unit." Neither issue was associated with the original complaint submitted to HUD.

Budzinski asked residents and local stakeholders why they hadn't filed more complaints. The answer she got back: fear of retaliation.

In her letter to Richards, the Pacific Management president and CEO, Budzinski wrote that the resident who filed the complaint to HUD was allegedly treated differently by management, including delayed delivery of mail and delayed resolution of work orders filed by the resident.

"Due to this alleged retaliation by management, other residents were hesitant to follow suit with their own complaints," Budzinski wrote.

Pacific Management owns 17 residential properties in Illinois, most of which serve low-income and senior communities in northern and central parts of the state, including Chicago.

Illinois Times reported similar complaints about Near North, another property owned by the company in Springfield, while a 2023 article by Wednesday Journal documented numerous violations at a property in Oak Park.

In an email to CNI, Oak Park Trustee James Taglia said he had the building inspected and found a similar situation as was reported at Sangamon Towers.

"They racked up more than 500 violations for 200 units," Taglia wrote. "It's a constant battle, and we are currently fighting with them over the exact same things."

Reacting to *Illinois Times*' coverage,
Richards attributed the issues to Springfield's
unhoused population, some of whom suffer
from addiction and mental health issues. The
building is directly south of Washington Street
Mission and across the street from St. John's
Bread Line, two social service agencies that
work with the unhoused. The most direct path
between the two nonprofits for those seeking
food and services is a small alleyway behind
Sangamon Towers.

"In turn, those external issues impact Sangamon's tenants, operation and security on an ongoing basis," he said.

Richards added that management was working on addressing the issues, including by contracting for 24/7 security at the property. The company does not practice or tolerate retaliation against residents who submit complaints, according to Richards.

Budzinski said she would follow up again with HUD and continue working with state and local partners if she did not receive a satisfactory response to her letter from Pacific Management.

"We're going to continue to pursue this until we get answers and we see action from

this management company that they are going to fully address these very serious concerns that the residents have," Budzinski said.

Affordable housing advocates said this situation is not unique and worry that proposed budget cuts to HUD will make situations like this one more common.

"Inadequate HUD budgets and the government shutdown, the terminations of staff at HUD are making it much more likely or inevitable that these types of situations might become more frequent or more difficult to deal with," said Bob Palmer, policy director at Housing Action Illinois.

In June, the Trump administration proposed a 51% cut to gross discretionary funding for HUD in 2026. The budget proposes eliminating programs such as Section 8 housing choice vouchers, project-based housing, public housing and housing for the elderly and people with disabilities.

"It's crucial that this housing be maintained and preserved because there is such a shortage of affordable housing in Springfield, in the rest of Illinois and the rest of the country," Palmer said.  $\Box$

# **Another encampment ends**

City, Heartland Housed have new protocol for street outreach

Crews dispatched by the city on Nov. 24 cleaned up what remained of an encampment of homeless people in the 800 block of North Ninth Street in Springfield that had persisted since the spring.

Cleanup of the site – spread across three vacant lots owned by the city, Sangamon County and a private landowner – took place in the morning after caseworkers from the city and a nonprofit serving the homeless worked with the encampment's residents in recent weeks to move them into indoor shelters and other alternative living arrangements.

The city's plan was "not to force anyone out," Ethan Posey, director of the city's Office of Community Relations, told *Illinois Times* on Nov. 21. The city didn't have the authority to force people from publicly owned land, he said, adding that city officials wanted to move the homeless to indoor accommodation out of concern for their safety.

As many as 15 people had set up tents to shield themselves from the elements at the site – in an area on the west side of North Ninth, set back from the sidewalk and in between some large trees.

Josh Sabo, executive director of Heartland Housed, said street outreach specialists from the nonprofit and members of Posey's Community Outreach Team worked together to assist people at the encampment as part of a newly developed protocol – a detailed plan of steps – to do a better job of developing trust and coordinating outreach services when assisting unhoused people who are staying outdoors in the Springfield area.

"There have been a lot of different efforts that have been growing, and so we're finally hitting this point where we have critical mass to really be able to implement a more effective structure for addressing street outreach," Sabo said.

Though less visible than a homeless encampment along North Grand Avenue that was cleaned up a year ago, the North Ninth encampment had generated complaints from neighbors about noise and concern about messes created when homeless people rummaged through garbage cans in a nearby alley.

The new protocol will be carried out by workers whose numbers have increased in recent months. Compared with a year ago, Posey's outreach team now has three workers instead of one. And in the past year, Heartland Housed – with money from Sangamon

County, PNC Bank, Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln, Springfield city government and Capital Township – has hired a full-time street outreach coordinator, a full-time outreach specialist and two part-time specialists.

However, Sabo said local efforts to serve the homeless and provide additional affordable housing and support services could take a step backward over the next year because of new policies from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development under President Donald Trump.

Sabo said the Springfield-based Heartland Continuum of Care and other nonprofit partnerships serving the homeless nationwide could see a 70% reduction in federal funding because of new priorities for future competitive grants based on directives from the Trump administration.

The directives would move federal funding away from "housing first" and other long-term housing initiatives in favor of short-term housing and work requirements.

"This is not necessarily a welcome change to help us," Sabo said.

The cut would reduce the current \$600,000 in annual funding for Springfield-area homeless service agencies to \$180,000, he said

If that potential cut became reality, there would be enough money for housing support

services for 23 formerly homeless people, instead of the 79 people currently being served with HUD funding, Sabo said.

# **Camping ordinance falters**

A previous encampment at the southeast corner of North Grand Avenue and North Fifth Street was cleaned up in November 2024. Posts on social media alleged that city officials had forced people to move and then discarded their belongings without their permission. Those claims weren't true, but the city could have done a better job of communicating its efforts to the general public, Mayor Misty Buscher said.

At the time, one-time grants totaling \$75,000 and intensive casework assisted many unhoused people at the encampment to get off the street and into hotels, shelters and more stable housing, Posey said. Some of them have ended up back on the street.

Controversy surrounding what to do about the encampment in front of the Near North Crossing shopping center culminated with the Springfield City Council debating a potential outdoor camping ordinance in September 2024.

If enacted, the ordinance would have allowed police to remove homeless people from public lands, fine them up to \$750 and jail them for up to two years.

Prompted by a U.S. Supreme Court

ruling in June 2024 that said anti-camping ordinances don't violate the Constitution, many communities, including Peoria, have adopted the controversial ordinance.

In the end, the Springfield City Council never voted on an ordinance. One of the proposal's sponsors, Ward 5 Ald. Lakeisha Purchase, withdrew the measure from consideration.

Buscher, who also was a sponsor, said she has no plans to resurrect the idea.

"There was a big public outcry, the public didn't want it, and a lot of the council members didn't want it, so we dropped it," Buscher said. "Half of my community doesn't want people sleeping on the road or on the sidewalk or whatever, but the other half of my community thinks they have that right.

"And it's not illegal to live outside. It is illegal to use some drugs, but not all drugs. It's a balancing act: How do you be human, help the person in the best way you possibly can and still make sure your community respects how you do that. It's really important that we acknowledge these are people and they have families, and they have feelings, whether they're unhoused because of financial issues or familial issues, addictions or mental-health issues."

"So as the mayor," Buscher said, "my platform now is, how can we just get these people to the resources they need?" □

question on the ballot. If collected and filed with the city clerk by Dec. 15, it would go on the March primary ballot. If collected and filed by Aug. 3, it would go on the November general election ballot.

After the County Board voted no on my resolution for a binding referendum to enact recall for the county sheriff, I and others started collecting signatures to put this on the ballot in the November 2026 general election. We already have a large number of the 6,359 signatures needed. We should work together to get both measures on the ballot as soon as possible.



## **LESS GOVERNMENT**

This measure represents an unnecessary expansion of government power into what has always been a private commercial relationship between two consenting adults — a landlord and a tenant. A lease agreement is already governed by state property and contract law. The city's role is to enforce existing safety and building codes, not to pre-approve or license private commerce.

By conditioning every rental transaction on a government license and inspection, this ordinance inserts the city directly into private enterprise, creating new fees, administrative burdens and forced entry into private dwellings – even when no complaint or violation exists. That's not public safety; that's regulatory overreach.

It also risks distorting the housing market. Smaller landlords – many of them local, working-class residents – will either sell their properties or raise rents to cover new costs. The result will not be safer housing, but less affordable housing and more concentration of

ownership in large corporate hands.

We all want safe homes. But we already have housing codes, fire codes and complaint processes to handle problem properties. Expanding bureaucracy over every rental unit is unnecessary, invasive and economically harmful

I urge citizens and the Springfield City Council to continue to reject this ordinance and instead focus on targeted enforcement against negligent landlords – not a blanket policy that penalizes everyone for the actions of a few.



# State targets SNAP program error rate

Congress' "Big Beautiful Bill" that passed last summer could prove to be far more damaging to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program in Illinois than most people know. A SNAP "death penalty" is built into the budget reconciliation law.

Before we go further, there's a caveat: The US Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service has not yet released definitive guidance for how the federal government intends to enforce the law.

As I've told you before, Illinois' SNAP "error rate" (providing too many benefits or not enough) was 11.6 percent last year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The new law requires states with error rates above 10 percent to pay 15 percent of the SNAP benefit costs.

That would translate to a \$705 million price tag for Illinois – which is obviously money the state cannot afford.

Analyses from several experts claim that if Illinois does not lower its error rate and cannot pay the full federal penalty of potentially hundreds of millions of dollars, then the SNAP program may disappear here.

The widely held assumption was that if the state couldn't pay the error rate penalty, then SNAP spending would be lowered by the same amount. And that could still happen if the coming federal guidance allows the state to reduce eligibility. But benefits would have to be cut by up to 17 percent if none of the \$705 million penalty can be paid. Not good in an era of rising grocery prices.

However, according to those experts, if the state can't pay the penalty in the 2027 federal fiscal year, which begins next October, the entire SNAP program could quite possibly be shut down in Illinois.

An analysis by David Super, the Carmack Waterhouse Professor of Law and Economics at Georgetown University, concluded that "(I)f a state does not pay its state share, USDA could find the state in violation of the Act and terminate the state's participation on that basis."

The only option, according to Super, would be if the state cut SNAP eligibility, which would lower the cost of the program and, therefore, the state's cost share.

This topic came up in testimony to an Illinois House appropriations committee last month by Illinois Department of Human Services Secretary Dulce Quintero. "The state match requirements are all or nothing," Quintero told the committee. "If we're unable to pay all of the state share, we will

receive no federal funding, putting the entire SNAP program for Illinois at risk."

Again, this could change when FNS releases guidance.

The governor's office is confident the state can lower the state's error rate (and therefore the penalty) in the coming months. They're hiring 250 people to tackle the problem. They're also re-training workers, rolling out some new tech to alert caseworkers to potential errors and to evaluate data collected from recipients, as well as "identify and resolve Integrated Eligibility System defects." They're requiring more info about shelter and medical costs (big reasons for the error rates). And they're reinstating six-month eligibility periods instead of annual reviews, and doing in-person interviews. They're also conducting a public awareness campaign.

According to IDHS, "inadvertent" recipient errors make up two-thirds of the error rates. An example: "A customer applied for SNAP and reported \$570 in monthly rent paid to the landlord. During Quality Control Review, IDHS discovers their rent is \$500,

with \$70 paid to the landlord for utilities and internet."


Another third is blamed on agency errors: "A caseworker verifies the customer's income as \$525 but accidentally enters \$255 in the eligibility system."

Despite all the hype about fraud, IDHS insists it's "less than 0.10% of errors."

Illinois' error rate has historically been lower than 10.6 percent. The state claims that a big reason for the increase is "technical errors." Quintero told the House appropriations committee last month that the feds "moved the goalposts" in 2022 by including technical mistakes in the error rates. New Jersey, Quintero pointed out, saw its error rate skyrocket from "below 4 percent to 35 percent" after that federal change.

Whatever the case, a whole lot is riding on the state's effort to lower its error rates, including possibly the very existence of SNAP here. □





# **Enjoy Christmas Traditions in St. Charles**

If you are longing for a nostalgic holiday experience devoid of blow-up Santas, crammed retail stores and "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas" played endlessly on the radio, look no further than St. Charles, Missouri. The historic city's Christmas Traditions festival runs from Nov. 28 through Dec. 24.

Visitors will find unique holiday characters strolling streets festooned with greenery, chestnuts roasting over open fires, international gift-givers joining old-fashioned carolers and a touch of Charles Dickens' imagination.

Most of the festivities happen on weekends with afternoon parades as a highlight, but Wednesday evenings bring "A Christmas Carol" stroll. It is complete with actors portraying Jacob Marley, Scrooge, the ghosts of various Christmases and a Victorian toy vendor, transforming Main Street into 1840s London.

"You feel like you are in a storybook," says Ryan Cooper, the signature events producer for Greater Saint Charles. "These unique characters set us apart from other Christmas events."

The full cast is 100 people with 30 different Santa characters, including a new

Chilean Santa joining those representing other countries and time periods. Nine acapella groups offer a variety of music from the 1930s and 1940s, Civil War-era Christmas songs, Victorian carols and barbershop favorites.

Also new this year is "The Toy Chest," an exhibit of the most popular toys from 1900-2000.

Old favorites such as collectible character trading cards popular with children, a gingerbread village and exhibits on Christmas trees and holiday food are back.

It costs nothing to participate in general activities but you can pay extra for Santa photos, special concerts and performances, purchases from unique shops and lots of enticing fare from restaurants, bars and food vendors.

The folks in charge have plenty of experience putting on the month-long celebration. It draws 250,000 visitors from throughout the U.S. and other countries each holiday season, according to Cooper.

"It's gotten a national reputation," says Cooper. Last year, NBC's "Today Show" gave Saint Charles and its tradition a shoutout as the "Merriest Main Street in America."

Cooper says the longevity of Christmas Traditions is a tribute to local citizens and the emphasis on getting in touch with the simple roots of St. Charles' history stretching to 1769. The city was Missouri's first state capital and hosted Meriwether Lewis and William Clark as they began their Corps of Discovery Expedition of the West.

"We've idealized it a bit," Cooper acknowledges, "with an emphasis on a simpler, rustic, nostalgic Christmas that you don't see every day. People connect with the pure joy of the holiday."

Christmas Traditions opens from noon to 8:30 p.m. on Nov. 28 with a tree lighting

at 5 p.m. It ends with a Santa send-off on Christmas Eve, when it is open 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Regular hours are Wednesdays and Fridays from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., Saturdays noon to 8:30 p.m. and Sundays noon to 5 p.m. Parades kick off at noon Saturdays and Sundays, and candlelight processions end each day a half hour before closing.

Cooper says coming early on Sunday afternoon might be the best time to avoid the largest crowds. Parking usually can be found in the many lots in town. Wheelchair users may want to stick to accessible sidewalks rather than negotiate cobblestone and brick streets.

Some visitors might be overwhelmed by all the sights, smells and sounds so the festival also offers a free, sensory-friendly experience. For information on that and other Christmas Traditions activities, go to discoverstcharles. com or call the Greater Saint Charles Convention and Visitors Bureau at 636-946-7776. □



# **Christmas 1975: Bell bottoms and the Boss**

Fifty years ago was a rocky time for America. While then-President Gerald Ford dealt with fuel's dwindling supplies and increasing prices (drivers waited hours at gas stations), he survived two assassination attempts, extended tax cuts and hailed the metric system. The latter fared as well as the Vietnam War. Former Teamster president Jimmy Hoffa disappeared in 1975 and the U.S. rushed to escape Vietnam as Saigon fell to the North Vietnamese.

The U.S. government failed in its years-long effort to deport Beatles star John Lennon over his anti-Vietnam stance and his influence on like-minded young voters. Bill Gates geeked out developing software for an early personal computer and helped form Microsoft to do it.

In his national column in the Dec. 25, 1975, *State Journal-Register*, humorist Art Buchwald described his gift list for readers. Mood rings topped it. The popular jewelry showed your mood by changing colors to reflect it – dark colors meant things were bad. Buchwald nixed the idea because the emotion detector would show readers "how depressed (they) really were." For women, Buchwald wanted to gift the Equal Rights Amendment, but said experts told him it wouldn't pass that year. Or the next. (Or the next, or the next...)

Popular culture took our minds off the news but made us afraid to go back in the water. The movie *Jaws* hit theaters, making cinematic history with a mechanical shark whose greatest threat was its inability to work. Unlike the shark, the Boss ran well. A young Bruce Springsteen careened to the top of rock 'n' roll with his album *Born to Run*. (Ear worm? Enjoy it, it's a classic.)

Springsteen's album - or 8-track tape made a great holiday gift that year for teens or adults, but kids weren't interested. Boys' top gift wish was an Evel Knievel action figure and stunt cycle. Accident insurance was extra. Knievel was an oft-injured daredevil performer best known for jumping his motorcycle over 14 buses. Girls wanted dolls "that walk or talk" and pizza ovens, while most kids asked for 10-speed bikes and Star Trek kits, according to the Dec. 21, 1975, State Journal-Register. 'Tweens and teens wanted striped toe socks (knee highs with individual pockets for each toe – like gloves for your feet, except gloves were comfortable). While popular culture had some lasting hits that year, popular fashion did not, thankfully.

At \$470, microwave ovens were out of reach for some gift-givers but touted for their ability to cook "by temperature, not time, thus eliminating overcooking or undercooking!"

Dawsons on North Dirksen Parkway advertised the relatively new cooking appliance – and free demos.

If you needed to buy gifts on the cheap, Springfield's SuperX drug stores were promoting fruit cakes for 88 cents apiece or mixed nuts for 69 cents. For higher budgets, the Jewel Box downtown had enameled cigarette boxes for \$8 to \$9, or Tobin Jewelers nearby had 10K, gold-filled Omega wristwatches for \$200.

For hipsters, nothing could surpass the "luxurious acrylic fur" bean bags on sale at Wolfson's downtown for just under \$50. (The real fun was when the lounging chairs exploded and spewed hundreds of foam microbeads that clung to your clothes.) Buyers could add a pair of polyester bellbottom pants for their hipster, too. Those microbeads needed fabric to stick to. There were plenty of bellbottoms in that popular Christmas wish list tome – the JCPenney catalog. (View it online at: https://christmas.musetechnical.com/ ShowCatalog/1975-JCPenney-Christmas-Book) For more conservative types, a sherbert-colored, polyester leisure suit was sure to please.

Illinois Times, which began publishing in 1975, had an article in its Dec. 25 issue about ideas for the "person who has everything." They included psychedelic glasses or the "Whistle Switch," a "Clap On, Clap Off Clapper" contraption that started and stopped your TV, radio, coffeepot and lights. Lindley's flower and plant store on South Sixth Street had poinsettias ready for cash-and-carry or delivery. Customers paid by the bloom with a whopping 15- or 16-bloom plant topping out at \$20.

IT's holiday calendar encouraged Springfieldians to attend the Washington Park Carillon's Christmas Eve concert. On Dec. 21, ragtime fans could listen to Scott Joplin-style music on Springfield's new public radio station, WSSR-FM (now NPR-Illinois), or the Boston Pops Christmas show on WILL-FM.

For a glimpse into how Springfield's elite would celebrate, the *SJ-R's* social columnist, Pauline L. Telford, wrote an in-depth piece about the Illinois governor's plans. Then-Gov. Dan Walker was celebrating by having his seven children and their guests, plus one grandchild and other family members, stay at the heavily decorated Executive Mansion. (Remember when governors lived there?)

Bet none of them got bean bag chairs. □

# **Taking stock**

Nutrient-rich turkey stock is key to host of delicious dishes

If you've never before made your own turkey stock, let this be your official notice to do so. With turkey prices expected to reach record highs this season, it makes sense to get as much gobble for your dollar as possible. The resulting aromatic, collagen-rich stock is the key to a host of delicious dishes, from hearty turkey and white bean chili to turkey a la king and even restaurant-worthy pan sauces.

Unlike broth, which is typically made by briefly simmering meat and vegetables, stock is made by slow-simmering bones for hours to break down and extract their collagen and bone marrow, yielding a rich, unctuous stock. Broth, though still flavorful, tends to be thinner, while a good pot of stock will actually gel when chilled.

Vegetables such as carrots, onions and celery are typically added to both stock and broth to enhance their flavor and don't even need to be peeled first — simply wash off any dirt or debris before tossing them into the pot along with the bones. You can even use just the peels. It works well to stash carrot and onion peels, celery trimmings and parsley stems in a freezer bag to have ready whenever you're ready to make stock or broth. In this way, you can create gallons of flavorful, nutrient-rich stock for mere pennies that's guaranteed to taste far better than any pricey store-bought alternative.

Roasting the bones first in a hot 450-degree oven before simmering will add a layer of savory depth to the finished product and is a worthwhile step, even if they're already coming from a roasted turkey. Include the giblets if you have them, including the neck, heart and gizzard, but not the liver, as it can give the stock a bitter flavor. Spread the bones out in a roasting pan or you can even roast them straight in your soup pot as long as it is oven-safe. Roast until the bones are crispy and golden brown, about 30 to 45 minutes. Add them to your pot along with a couple of bay leaves, a handful of whole black peppercorns and a few sprigs of thyme, optional ingredients that add nuanced flavor to the stock. A splash of cider vinegar is another optional ingredient that helps to break down cartilage and extract minerals from the bones. Use about one tablespoon of vinegar for every gallon of water.

It's important never to add salt when making stock because it's intended to be a foundational building block of other dishes. Additionally, if the recipe calls for the stock to be reduced by simmering it to evaporate water, salted stock could easily become excessively salty.



Stock can be made either on the stovetop, in a slow-cooker or in a pressure cooker. While the first two methods require at least 8 hours of simmering, stock prepared in a pressure cooker is ready after just two hours. Once the stock has finished simmering, strain out the bones and vegetables and pour it through a fine-mesh strainer into freezer-safe jars (ones with no shoulder) or into zip-top freezer bags. Once cool, the stock can be refrigerated for up to one week or frozen for several months.

#### Turkey à la king

Ingredients:

4 tablespoons unsalted butter

8 ounces sliced mushrooms

1 onion, diced

1 carrot, diced

1-2 stalks celery, diced

2 tablespoons flour

2 cups homemade turkey stock, hot

2 cups shredded cooked turkey

½ cup heavy cream

3 tablespoons dry sherry

1 cup frozen peas

Salt and black pepper, to taste Chopped parsley, to garnish Cooked rice, buttered noodles, biscuits or toast, to serve

Melt the butter over medium-high heat until it foams. Add the sliced mushrooms and cook until they have released their moisture and become golden brown, then add the onion, carrot and celery. Cook until the vegetables have softened slightly and have become aromatic, then sprinkle the flour over the vegetable mixture. Cook, stirring to incorporate the flour, for another minute or two, then add the hot turkey stock. Bring the mixture to a simmer, then reduce the heat and cook for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the turkey, cream, peas and sherry and cook, stirring occasionally, until the mixture has thickened slightly and is hot, about 10 minutes.

Taste for seasoning and adjust as necessary, then garnish with parsley and serve over hot cooked rice, noodles, biscuits or toast.






