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More details on proposed data center

The proposed \$500 million data center that CyrusOne wants to build in southwestern Sangamon County would generate up to \$6 million more each year in property taxes by the early 2030s, an official from the Dallas-based company told *Illinois Times*.

"It would be a real asset to the county," Bradd Hout, location and power strategy director for CyrusOne, said in an interview before a public hearing scheduled by the Sangamon County Board for the evening of Dec. 3 at the BOS Center.

If the Republican-controlled, 29-member County Board approves a conditional permitted use in an area zoned for agriculture, the company would begin construction in 2026 on the first of six proposed 250,000-square-foot buildings and complete each one within a year to 18 months, Hout said.

Hout addressed concerns from critics who have said the tax benefits could largely evaporate if CyrusOne later sought a major reduction in assessed property value. Promising property tax benefits and then seeking any substantial reduction would be "disingenuous," "unheard of" in the company's history and "not aligned with CyrusOne's commitment to being a transparent, responsible partner in communities where we operate," he said. "Property tax assessments will follow standard county procedures in accordance with Illinois law."

Promising tax benefits and then backpedaling to seek any substantial reduction would be "disingenuous" by the company, "unheard of" in the company's history and "unlikely in the near term," Hout said. He noted that CyrusOne isn't seeking any tax breaks as part of any economic

incentive package.

The company is seeking zoning approval from the County Board to establish a 636-megawatt data center, the first in the county, on 280 acres of farm ground in Talkington Township, immediately north of Swift Current Energy's \$800 million Double Black Diamond solar farm.

Illinois Times was the first to report on plans for the data center Oct. 17. The newspaper then reported Nov. 7 that the timeline for County Board consideration had been lengthened at least a month, putting a potential vote on zoning at the County Board's Jan. 13 meeting.

Hout said Dec. 2 that additional engineering and design work the company needs to submit to Sangamon County officials could further delay that timeline. He said the company now hopes to seek an advisory recommendation from the Sangamon County Zoning Board of Appeals and a final vote from the County Board by the end of March 2026.

Critics of the project have called for as much as a six-month delay in consideration of the project so all of the pros and cons can be studied and debated. Sangamon County government officials have created an online question-and-answer page on the project at https://tinyurl.com/SangamonData.

Critics question the touted economic benefits of the project. They also say the large electrical demands of data centers contribute to rising energy prices and rates in the Midwest and will make it harder for Illinois and the rest of the country to reduce dependence on climate change-causing fossil fuel power plants.

center doesn't appear to be a major concern, at least not yet, because of what CyrusOne describes as a proposed "closed-loop" cooling system that makes water use comparable to a typical office building.

The primary beneficiaries of any property tax revenue increases for the site would be the Girard-based North Mac school district. Other affected taxing bodies would include Sangamon County government, Talkington Township and the Virden Fire Protection District.

The project would create more than 500 temporary construction jobs over the multi-year construction period and more than 100 permanent full-time jobs for workers with technical, facility management and operational roles, CyrusOne said. Hout said, "Project labor agreements would be used to prioritize union labor and local workforce participation in the construction."

The number of permanent jobs created wouldn't be large, but Ryan McCrady, president and CEO of the Springfield Sangamon Growth Alliance, a local economic development group in favor of the project, said the property tax benefits would be "tremendous" and "transformative" for the affected entities.

He estimated that farm ground designated for the project currently generates less than \$20,000 a year in property taxes, compared with \$6 million in the future.

For comparison, McCrady said it would take 600 new homes, each paying \$10,000 a year in property taxes, to generate an amount equivalent to what the data center would pay. But he said those homes would create additional demands for school districts and other taxing bodies that the data center wouldn't create.

CyrusOne operates more than 55 data

centers worldwide. In Illinois, it operates a data center in Lombard and Aurora – both smaller than what is proposed for Sangamon County.

CyrusOne contracts with various companies for data storage and transmission, Hout said. When asked whether major AI providers such as Google, Facebook or Amazon would be customers of the Sangamon County data center, CyrusOne officials said they cannot disclose specific customer information because of confidentiality agreements.

Most of the land for the proposed site, which Hout said would be purchased if zoning approval is granted, appears to be connected to ownership groups related to Dowson Farms of Divernon.

The U.S. Department of Justice announced in 2014 that Dowson Farms paid \$5.36 million to the federal government to "resolve allegations that it conspired to avoid statutory caps on federal farm subsidy payments from 2002 through 2008, under terms of an out-of-court settlement" in which the business didn't admit liability.

The announcement said federal prosecutors had alleged that Dowson Farms' principal owners, John J. Dowson, John C. Dowson, Darrel Thoma, Amy D. Thoma, and Melissa D. Vorreyer, "violated the False Claims Act by creating multiple entities, falsely claiming that these entities were actively engaged in farming separate and distinct from Dowson Farms. As a result, Dowson Farms' owners allegedly received farm subsidies to which they were not entitled."

Dowson Farms is also the landowner for the vast majority of the Double Black Diamond Solar farm, adjacent to the proposed data center site. Darrel Thoma told IT in 2022 that they had entered into a long-term lease with Swift Current Energy. \square

Grayson's attorneys ask for new trial

Defense files motion claiming judge erred by allowing jury to see certain evidence

Former Sangamon County sheriff's deputy Sean Grayson's lawyers say he deserves a new trial for the 2024 murder of Sonya Massey because the presiding judge erred when allowing the jury to hear Grayson's disparaging remarks about Massey after the fatal shooting.

"As a result, the events following the shooting had no relevance to the issues in the case," attorneys Daniel Fultz and Mark Wykoff wrote in their Nov. 26 motion for a new trial. "The only purpose served by the introduction of that evidence was to improperly inflame the passions of the jury – which was substantially prejudicial to the defendant."

Sangamon County Circuit Judge Ryan Cadagin is expected to rule on that argument, and others in the motion, at the scheduled Jan. 29 sentencing of Grayson.

The 31-year-old Riverton resident, currently incarcerated at the Sangamon County Jail, was convicted Oct. 29 of second-degree murder after a trial that was moved to Peoria County because of concerns that extensive pretrial publicity would make it too hard to select an unbiased jury in Sangamon County.

The jury of nine women and three men – all Peoria County residents – found that Grayson's fatal shooting of Massey, 36, in her unincorporated Woodside Township home on July 6, 2024, met all of the criteria for a first-degree murder conviction.

But the jury opted for the less-serious second-degree murder conviction because of a mitigating factor. The jury found that Grayson believed he was acting in self-defense but still deserved to be convicted of murder because that belief was unreasonable.

Requests for a new trial and for a conviction to be thrown out, which also is part of Grayson's motion, are almost never granted at the trial court level. However, the arguments presented in the motion, as well as whatever sentence Grayson receives, could be cited in any appeal Grayson's lawyers will be allowed to file in the next few months.

Sangamon County State's Attorney John Milhiser, who prosecuted the murder case with First Assistant State's Attorney Mary Beth Rodgers, said the defense's motion "is standard practice after a trial. We do not believe there

is any merit to the defendant's assertions in his motion and are preparing and will file our written response."

A second-degree murder conviction carries a potential penalty of four to 20 years in prison, with the potential for any time served to be cut in half for good behavior. With credit for time served and good behavior, Grayson could end up serving, at most, fewer than 10 years in prison.

A second-degree murder conviction also would allow Cadagin to sentence Grayson to probation and no prison time.

A first-degree murder conviction in this case would have carried a mandatory 45 years to life in prison without the possibility of probation.

The motion for a new trial said Cadagin unfairly allowed the jury to see police-worn camera video of the fatal confrontation inside Massey's home that included Grayson's statements and actions after the shooting even though Grayson's lawyers asked before the trial that the jury not be shown the post-shooting footage.

"The video featured the defendant's coarse language and graphic depictions of Ms. Massey's injuries," the motion said. "The defendant argued that the strong, negative emotional associations could improperly

influence the jury's impartiality."

Experts who testified at the trial at Milhiser's request said Grayson, who responded to Massey's 911 call about her suspicion of a prowler in the neighborhood, failed to realize that she was dealing with mental illness and modify his behavior.

The experts said Grayson let his temper get the best of him and provoked a confrontation rather than taking steps to de-escalate the situation. Experts called by the defense contradicted conclusions reached by the prosecution's experts.

With another deputy at his side, Grayson shot Massey in the face after a tense few seconds in which he yelled that she wasn't complying with his orders to put down a pot of hot water from her stove.

A few frames of bodycam video – shown in freeze frames to the jury, but undetectable to the regular viewer – showed her lifting the pot over her head and starting to throw the water in Grayson's direction when Grayson fired three shots at Massey, with one of the bullets striking her.

When Grayson was outside Massey's house, his own body-worn camera recorded him telling other police officers, "This fucking bitch is crazy" and "it fucking happened so goddamn quick. ... She set it up on purpose.

... I didn't have a fucking choice. ... We barely got missed."

Elsewhere in Grayson's motion for a new trial, his lawyers said Cadagin erred when he ordered Grayson detained before his trial. The Fourth District Appellate Court agreed with Grayson's lawyers, but prosecutors appealed to the Illinois Supreme Court, which ordered Grayson detained until the high court made a final ruling.

The Supreme Court ultimately didn't rule before the trial in Peoria County. The court then dismissed the appeal as moot.

The motion also faulted Cadagin for barring the use of certain phrases and opinions by the defense's experts during the trial, and for rejecting a jury instruction proposed by the defense on the justification for police use of force.

In addition, the motion said Cadagin shouldn't have prevented the defense from introducing evidence about Massey's "propensity for violence" based on her behavior the day before the early morning shooting. □

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
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Sober living house for LGBTQ+ in the works

Julie Benson enlists an apprentice after years of helping Springfield's unhoused

Casey Prather credits a sober living home run by Springfield resident Julie Benson to playing a part in the longest stretch of sobriety he's experienced in his adult life.

Prather calls Benson's Home Sweet Home Sober Living home, which he began living at almost two-and-a-half years ago, "unlike any other" he's experienced. Now, the pair are working together to find a new residence to create a sober living space for LGBTQ+ individuals.

Before entering one of Benson's two sober living homes, Prather, who is gay, had spent about 15 years among almost two dozen inpatient residential rehab facilities and sober living homes, largely in Illinois.

"After you discharge from (rehab), obviously they want to try to get you into some sober living or some type of aftercare program, and I kept saying, 'I want to find somewhere that's LGBTQ inclusive.' A lot of facilities (claim to) be LGBTQ+ friendly; it doesn't necessarily mean they are," Prather told *Illinois Times*. "I just felt like I can't be the only gay man out there that felt that way throughout my treatment process and finally, they found me a place to go."

Prather was sent to a facility in Cleveland, Ohio, and realized Springfield could use its own LGBTQ+ sober living home. "Somebody shouldn't have to travel eight-and-a-half hours for treatment," he said.

Benson, who turned 65 on Dec. 2, has been helping people experiencing homelessness in Springfield for the better part of the last decade. She started a street ministry in 2016, distributing clothing and supplies to unhoused people. After she retired in 2018, she incorporated Helping the Homeless as an official nonprofit and accepted donations, but avoided grant funding or other formal structure, preferring to operate on her own.

In 2022, Benson launched a one-woman business venture related to her nonprofit work and took out a bank loan to buy a house on South Fifth Street, then another one on South Fourth Street a few months later. She told *IT* that there's been a consistent need for more stable housing to help people seeking recovery, and that Prather is the one to lead the charge for an LGBTQ+ home.

"You get people who are like-minded, who have been through some of the same trauma, some of the same situations... It's better to be around people who understand what you're going through," Benson said. "I never was into

drugs or drinking, but I have the empathy and the compassion for it. Casey's been there; he can say to somebody, 'Been there, done that,' and they need that kind of support. And since there isn't a facility in this town for the gay community, we feel like we need one."

Both said they hope to carry forward Benson's work, and Prather is working on forming his own nonprofit, The Prather Foundation for Recovery.

The duo's current goal is to find a property in Springfield that can house six to eight LGBTQ+ people in recovery. Benson said she has discussed the new sober living project with numerous social service organizations and medication-assisted therapy centers around Springfield and all have been supportive of the idea.

Benson charges between \$300 and \$475 per month to rent a furnished room, depending on the size of the space, and includes Wi-Fi, laundry, utilities and some house supplies. In contrast, other sober living houses in Springfield often charge \$700-\$800

a month for a shared room.

Benson engages in a person-focused approach by imposing far fewer rules for her sober living home residents than what is typical of such houses. For example, there's no curfew, no mandated check-ins and no limit on how long someone can stay as long as they pay rent and are a respectful roommate.

"If you're somebody who can't sleep at night – because you've got bad sleep patterns or you've got anxiety or something – in a place like that, you can't walk out the front door and go down the block and get some fresh air and smoke a cigarette and clear your mind and look up at the stars," she said. "You do that at my houses because I don't call anybody and say, 'What are you doing walking out the front door?'"

There is random drug testing, though Benson stressed it is not routine nor does she utilize a zero-tolerance policy in case someone relapses and positively tests for drug use.

"I give people chances, especially if they say to me, 'You know what, you're right. I messed up, I'd really like another chance,' and then I communicate with them often to try to make sure that they're on some kind of a good track. It really is different than the other houses in town because I'm getting guys coming from other houses to mine; they want to come to my houses," she said.

Perhaps the most significant difference is the privacy Benson provides by filling rooms individually rather than doubling up residents. Prather said he had to share a room at all the other rehabilitation centers and sober living homes he stayed in.

"It's hard to sleep in a room when you're just feet away from a complete stranger. For me, I've never been to a house that has allowed occupants to have their own room," he said. "I've been to so many different places, and I see it doesn't work out for people (who share rooms). That's a big reason why people move out, they get into arguments; they get into fights. We want a peaceful place to call home where people can have their privacy and their dignity."

Turner and Coffey agree on veto session bills

Local state legislators discuss transit, assisted dying bills at Citizens Club forum

While state politicians Sen. Doris Turner and Rep. Mike Coffey represent different parties, both were displeased with two of the bills passed during October's veto session. At a Tuesday evening Citizens Club forum held at the Hoogland Center for the Arts, they shared their thoughts on a transit reform package to avert Chicago public transit service cuts and a bill allowing medical aid in dying for terminally ill adults, which would be through a drug that must be self-administered.

Turner, a Democrat, and Coffey, a Republican, both voted against the transit bill, explaining that the reform package to fill a funding gap for the Regional Transportation Authority in the Chicago area did little for central Illinois, though a move to fill the funding gap for the RTA felt inevitable.

"The reason why I voted no is because I really felt like it was more of a bailout for Chicagoland and wasn't going to benefit downstate," Turner said. "There was going to be some type of legislation that was going to be passed, because just looking at what was happening in Chicago with transportation, you knew something was going to happen," she said.

Earlier versions of Senate Bill 2111 included more significant tax levies than what ended up in the draft approved by the Statehouse: a Chicago area sales tax increase and an increase on toll road charges by 45 cents before future increases tied to inflation. Coffey took issue with most of the bill.

"I want Chicago to be successful. I'm not one of those downstaters that believes, 'Forget about Chicago. We don't need them,'" Coffey said. "No, we need them. We need Chicago to be the best big city in the country, because it's a money generator for us all to prosper,

but you have to put some parameters on what they're doing up there. We didn't do any of that, and this bill was catastrophic."

Both legislators cited their faith when asked why they voted no on Senate Bill 1950, also titled the End-of-Life Options for Terminally Ill Patients Act, but said they wrestled with their votes.

"This, I will tell you, this was one of the hardest bills that I've ever been a part of on the House floor," Coffey said. "Normally, when you're on the House floor, I'll be talking like this and no one will be paying any attention to what you're saying and they're just talking. This particular day, on this particular

issue, you could hear a pin drop and I will tell you, it was difficult," he said.

"I couldn't wrap myself around it and (vote yes), but I will tell you that every single person that spoke on that bill gave very compelling answers either way. I mean, at one point, I had tears in my eyes listening to these stories."

Turner even said she prayed that the bill would not be called for a vote.

"I'm serious. That was my prayer: Please tell me this bill is not going to hit the board," she said. "I voted no; I just couldn't bring – my faith just would not bring me to vote yes."

She added that the bill barely passed the Senate and indicated at least one yes vote

came from party pressure.

"One of the leaders, I'm not going to say who, came over and spoke to my seatmate and she ... was kind of browbeaten into voting yes," Turner said. "But it is still sitting with the governor. He has not said whether he's going to sign it or not, and there are still people that are advocating, 'Please don't sign it."

Both lawmakers were supportive of House Bill 576, which increases privacy protections for elected officials and allows them to spend campaign money on security expenses. It overwhelmingly passed both chambers. \square

BETTER OPTIONS

Last Sunday was one of those rare, beautiful late-autumn days perfect for being outside. Unfortunately, our neighborhood was blanketed in a thick haze of leaf burning smoke. By mid-afternoon, the smoke was so heavy it dimmed the Christmas lights on my neighbor's house across the cul-de-sac. While I have a Springfield address, I live in an unincorporated area not covered by the city's ban on burning.

As I breathed in the acrid air, I found myself thinking about the young children who live nearby, my own family's health, my neighbor who has asthma and others who struggle with respiratory issues. I thought about my sister-in-law, who died from lung cancer. For many people, leaf smoke isn't just unpleasant, it can be dangerous.

The health risks associated with leafburning smoke are well-documented. Fine particulates and toxins released during burning can trigger asthma attacks, worsen heart and lung conditions, and increase respiratory symptoms in children and older adults. The good news is that safer and healthier alternatives are readily available:

- Mulch leaves back into the lawn using a mulching mower blade. Chopped leaves settle between the grass blades and break down naturally, improving soil health.
- Compost the leaves at home. Simple instructional guides are widely available
- Use paper yard waste bags and take leaves to a recycling or composting center where they are turned into valuable organic material on
- Use leaves as mulch around trees, shrubs and flower beds.

I hope more of our neighbors will consider these cleaner, healthier alternatives to burning. They protect our health, improve our soil and preserve the beauty of the days we'd all like to spend outdoors.

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

Scarecrows in the cornfields

Considering the aesthetics of wind turbines

Often, when driving on I-55 to and from Chicago, I while away the hours with word games. (How many words mean "dull"?) Until I reach McLean County, that is, when the towers of the Twin Groves Wind Farm come into view. Even though they've stood there for years – the farm was built way back in 2008 - they still catch the eye. For every local who complains that these Brobdingnagian contraptions block the scenery, others enthuse that they provide the only thing worth looking at in this part of the state.

Our part of the state is likely to see many more of these energy plantations. The counties south and west of Springfield used to be central to the state's energy future because of the coal that lies beneath them; today it's because of the wind that blows over them. One such farm is the \$450 million multiphase, multicounty Grand Prairie Energy Park whose developers hope to install some 60 wind turbines in Montgomery County and Sangamon County over the next several years. That project should have smoother sailing now that the General Assembly has forbidden local governments from banning wind projects if they meet the State of Illinois' own not very onerous rigorous standards. Many of those bans were based on the impact the turbines have on local views which will now become harder to impose.

Oh well. You say "to-may-to," I say "to-mahto." You say "killing democracy," I say "saving the planet."

A passing glimpse of one from the highway does not convey just how big they are. The wind turbines proposed for the Grand Prairie Energy Park will stand 377 feet tall at the hub, which makes them taller than the Illinois Statehouse. The tip of the top blade will be taller still, fully 55 stories or so above the ground. There is nothing else in the rural environment that comes close, unless you count tornado funnels.

As travelers know, wind towers don't actually block our view of the rural landscape. They are too slender and their usually having been painted white means that on gray days they practically disappear. Not that there's much left to view in mid-Illinois to begin with. Most of what made the traditional Illinois farmstead visually appealing – the corn cribs, the barns, the hedgerows - have been destroyed by modern farming. What one can still see in our rural parts, and see a lot of, is sky. The clouds are



our mountains, a fit subject for a Constable if we had one. Unfortunately, wind towers are tall enough to penetrate navigable airspace, so that even if they do not block the view of our skyscape, they distract from it.

Judging from public comments, it is the things themselves that offend a lot of people. The towers don't "fit in," which is, like, really important in the Midwest. Wind towers are vertical, Illinois is horizontal; a cornfield is "natural," a turbine is mechanical. The turbines are sleek and elegant; sleek and elegant is as out of place Downstate as Carhartt at a cocktail party. The corn plants growing all around may be as consummately engineered an energy collection system as any wind turbine, but it still looks like a corn plant. Wind turbines look like scarecrows designed to frighten off androids.

In fact, the mere presence of these contraptions bothers some who are driven by what we might call (with apologies to H. L. Mencken) a libido for the tidy. A farmer who freaks out at seeing a single weed in a bean field the size of Jerome will object to towers simply because they're not soybean plants. This rather specific aesthetic is easy to lampoon but you run into the same narrow-mindedness about tidy

lawns in our better subdivisions.

There are no easy answers to the problems wind farms cause the sensitive, but their presence introduces lots of interesting questions. Usually regulations seek to compensate people whose property value has been diminished by the actions of others. But can one have a right to a view that extends over other people's land? If she leases a chunk of a field for 30 years to a wind farm, can a neighbor be said to trespass on the views of a neighbor a half mile away?

Illinois lawmakers at all levels have tended to avoid such tricky questions. The new state rules were meant merely to standardize the approval process in order to speed the transition to a 100 percent clean electricity system by 2050. The new rules thus offer no joy to opponents of wind farms in general or to rural aesthetes offended by what could be described as kinetic sculptures. As a result, the ugliest thing to loom on the landscape in the next few years is likely to be ever-larger resentment of Springfield in our rural parts. □

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State report card improves for District 186

"We're excited to have a trajectory that's showing growth."

Six schools moved up, four moved down, and overall things seem to be improving with proficiency, graduation and chronic absenteeism rates. That in a nutshell is the finding for Springfield's District 186 schools in the 2025 Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) Report Card that tracks performance at the state's public schools.

Lanphier High School plus Addams, Fairview, Butler, Wilcox and Dubois Elementary all improved their overall rankings on the state Report Card, while Southeast High School, Grant Middle School and Black Hawk and Enos Elementary all saw their rankings drop. A number of schools had one or more groups that earned top marks in English/Language Arts, math, and/or science proficiency, although comparisons with previous years' proficiency come with an asterisk because ISBE benchmarks for these areas were changed this year.

The percentage of District 186 students graduating from high school in four years increased by two percentage points from last year to this year, and the percentage of students absent from school has continued to

decrease by one percentage point each year.

District 186 Superintendent Jennifer Gill is pleased with the progress shown on the 2025 Report Card.

"We know where we need to go, and we're excited that we are on that path," Gill said. "We're excited to have a trajectory that's showing growth."

The Springfield Education Association (SEA), the labor union that represents approximately 1,150 District 186 educators and other employees, is also happy with some of the report card results.

"Overall, it is a report card of more good than bad, and we are not upset about that," said SEA president Aaron Graves.
"We attribute the success to the diligence of committed students, parents, grandparents and guardians who value education, the supportive principals who help empower staff members and students, and the teachers and other educational professionals working within 186 to make it all happen."

Advance Illinois, an independent policy and advocacy organization that promotes a healthy public education system in the state,

noticed a generally positive trend in the 2025 Report Card.

"It is encouraging to see continued gains on some critical metrics and some narrowing disparities between student groups," said Advance Illinois president Robin Steans. "Illinois students are continuing to recover from COVID, and it shows."

However, Steans said that the Report Card shows there is still a lot of work to be done.

"Inequities persist and some stagnating and worrisome data points underscore important ongoing challenges," Steans said.

Graves agreed with Steans and said the inequities between individual Springfield schools are "not something to celebrate."

"Every school in Springfield 186, in which the community's children and our union members work tirelessly, should be provided with the same opportunities for a serene, calm and safe opportunity to learn," Graves said. "Every school should be good enough for us to send our own kids to, academically and otherwise. We attribute the continued poor designations to lack of transparency, a general focus on the 'shiny object' rather than


what needs to be polished, and a system of education that appears not to be troubled by this disparity."

"We can never count anyone out."

The ISBE Report Card ranks schools' performance with what it calls summative designations, which are, in descending order, exemplary (top 10% of all schools), commendable, targeted, comprehensive and intensive.

Lanphier High School moved up from intensive to targeted from 2024 to 2025. Addams and Fairview Elementary rose from comprehensive to commendable, Butler and Wilcox Elementary went up from targeted to commendable, and Dubois Elementary rose from comprehensive to targeted.

"When we see schools like Lanphier move from intensive up to targeted, and Addams School moving to commendable for all of the work that they are doing, those are moments where we can show success," superintendent Gill said. "Lanphier is a large high school with a lot going on. They moved into a new building, and principal Alicia Miller has

put a lot of things into place. To see them recognize this with growth this year is a true celebration."

The new ratings were celebrated at a recent District 186 School Board meeting by board president Erica Austin.

"We should not count out some of these schools, because a lot of times the perception is that because they are on a certain side of town or because they are underserved, that they can't possibly meet these expectations," Austin said. "The schools on that list absolutely surpass everyone's expectations, so we can never count anyone out."

Austin is a frequent visitor to District 186 schools, and is inspired by the progress she sees at many of them.

"Any child can learn and any school can grow. You just have to put the effort into it," Austin said. "I had tears in my eyes [when the Report Card results came out] because it lets me know that our work is not in vain. The mentorship that we are giving to these kids is actually working. They are taking it to heart, and it gives me a great feeling."

Graves said the SEA is proud of the District 186 students and the educators who made those Report Card success stories possible.

"We know how hard it is to make it happen, and are very proud of the work of each school that has done so," Graves said.
"We are also simultaneously troubled to see
the continued run of lesser ratings for several
of our schools where we know we have lots
of wonderful students, parental support and
educational professionals working tirelessly
every day."

No District 186 school achieved the top exemplary ranking, but several remained at commendable from 2024 to 2025 including Ball Charter, Iles, Laketown, Lincoln Magnet, Lindsay, McClernand, Owen Marsh, Ridgely, Sandburg, Southern View, and Springfield High. A commendable rating means that a school must have no underperforming student groups and a high school must have a graduation rate higher than 67%.

Of the four schools that declined in their summative designations, Black Hawk, Enos and Southeast High School all dropped from commendable to targeted, while Grant Middle School moved from targeted to comprehensive. Franklin Elementary retained its targeted status.

District 186 now has four comprehensive schools – Graham, Grant, Lee and Matheny-Withrow – a ranking that places those attendance centers in the lowest-performing 5% of schools in Illinois. There are also four intensive schools, or those that have completed a full four-year comprehensive

support school improvement cycle, but whose performance remains in the lowestperforming 5%. Those include Feitshans and Harvard Park Elementary plus Jefferson and Washington Middle schools.

"When we look at our schools that have just one subgroup that didn't make it, we know exactly what we need to do," Gill said. "But other schools are grappling with the idea of moving down, so we want to make sure we're doing everything that we can to support them on their journey."

That support includes a continuation of the instructional and leadership support from the district's Teaching and Learning Team and Instructional Support Services Team, which aims to improve school culture, teaching and learning practices. The key is to provide consistent support throughout the district, according to assistant superintendent of teaching, learning and school culture Nicole Moody.

"Consistency means that our students are at school, they're getting their work done, they have all of their assignments, and families understand what students are expected to do," Moody said.

"Improve student growth and proficiency"

District 186 officials are pleased with the

overall proficiency scores in reading and mathematics that are contained in the 2025 Report Card. Reading proficiency in the district is at 35%, up from 26% in 2024 and 23% in 2023. Math proficiency stands at 21%, up from 17% in 2024 and 16% in 2023.

Science proficiency, measured separately at the fifth, eighth and 11th grade levels, reached a high point last year in District 186 but went down slightly across the board this year.

These year-to-year comparisons aren't as straightforward as they have been previously. The ISBE adopted new assessment performance levels for this year's rankings that are designed to better track academic achievement and college readiness.

"Prior performance levels mislabeled many students, often indicating that students were less academically successful and prepared for college than they actually were," said ISBE in a prepared statement. "The new benchmarks for proficiency align across English/Language Arts, math and science assessments and grade levels and reflect real college and career readiness expectations. As a result, the 2025 proficiency rates set a new baseline and cannot be compared to prior years."

District 186 has taken these new measurements into account while claiming growth successes for Springfield students.

"District 186 officials report growth in the overall proficiency scores. While this increase in proficiency is in part due to the 'right sizing' of scores, the academic increases show growth and movement in the right direction," Superintendent Gill said. "District 186 believes that the implementation of new curricula and teaching practices in both ELA and math have also contributed to the increases in both subject areas. The new Illinois benchmarks for proficiency now better reflect the teaching and learning happening in classrooms, which prepare students for college and career readiness."

There are district success stories contained in the proficiency data, as several schools had one or more groups of students that earned nearly all of the possible points for proficiency in English/Language Arts (ELA), math or science. These include Addams, Ball Charter, Butler, Blackhawk, Hazel Dell, Franklin, Iles, Lincoln Magnet, Lindsay, Owen Marsh, Sandburg, Southern View, Wilcox and Springfield High School.

"We plan to continue to utilize the District and School Improvement Plans to improve student growth and proficiency with academics alongside social, emotional, and behavioral learning supports," assistant superintendent Moody said. "We will continue to build understanding on what these standards mean and how the standards are taught and learned within our multitiered system of support."

Graves credited SEA members for being a part of the improved English/Language Arts

scores.

"Our union members pushed hard through our Literacy Task Force, along with key community members, to make certain that central office administration made the transition to an improved elementary and middle school literacy curriculum," Graves said. "Every staff member involved in literacy has worked very hard to improve our instruction, differentiate classroom instruction, and has juggled a plethora of interventions as well."

The SEA is proud of the small gains made in math proficiency, but Graves said the best way to further improve the scores is for District 186 parents to become more involved in preparing their children. Students should know their shapes entering kindergarten, know basic addition and subtraction facts by the end of second grade, and know basic multiplication and division by the end of fourth grade.

The district-wide drop in science proficiency, however, is nothing to celebrate.

"We know that, in this rapidly changing world, the students that we are developing will need specific scientific skill sets in order to traverse the global landscape," Graves said. "SEA has lobbied hard to bring back a focus on science and social studies after seeing a lack of basic scientific knowledge, history and geographical awareness. We are hopeful to see this effort materialize in the purchase of elementary curricula, improved professional development, and time set aside for students to discover the wonders of science and the earth around them."

"We're getting back to those pre-COVID numbers again."

The percentage of students graduating in four years from the three District 186 high schools increased by two percentage points from 2024 to 2025. That number has been steadily increasing over the last three years.

The Lanphier High School graduation rate is now 71%, up from 65% in 2024 and 53% in 2023. Southeast High School's graduation rate is at 75%, up from 70% in 2024 and 60% in 2023. At Springfield High School, the graduation rate is 84%, up from 83% in 2024 and 74% in 2023.

"We are so impressed that they were all well over 70% and into the eighties," Superintendent Gill said. "Across all three high schools we're seeing continual growth patterns for a 13% increase over the last three years. So it feels like we're getting back to those pre-COVID numbers again, which is a celebratory moment."

The rate for students graduating in five and six years has also remained steady. This measurement tracks students that are not able to finish their high school credit requirements in four years, but remain in school to complete those requirements and earn their

high school diplomas.

All three high schools also increased the percentage of students who are on track for graduation, beginning in their ninth-grade year, by six percentage points. Assistant Superintendent Moody said there has been a diligent effort over the last three years to increase support for students and families to remain on track for graduation, or get back on track as needed.

"We have multiple indicators of success that we look at for our schools and our district, and those are about getting our students ready for college and careers," Moody said. "So our graduation rate is important, and we've really been putting a lot of effort into making sure our students have a strong start in high school and contributing to that is our ninth grade on track."

"Impacts student learning and achievement"

Forty-one percent may seem like a large number when you're talking about students who are chronically absent from school. A student is considered chronically absent if they miss 10% or more of their total school days, regardless of the reason for the absence.

The District 186 chronic absentee rate is 41% in 2025. But that's an improvement on the 42% from last year and 43% in 2023. The

chronic absenteeism number includes any absence, including the five mental health days which students are allowed each year.

A student is considered chronically absent if they miss two days a month during the school year for any reason.

"Chronic absenteeism remains a challenge and an area of concern for improvement within our district and Springfield community," Superintendent Gill said. "Several more schools would be commendable if it were not for their chronic absenteeism rates. Although we communicate relentlessly, this is largely out of our control in some cases."

Assistant Superintendent Moody said although the chronic absenteeism numbers are improving, it remains a focus for the district.

"We know there are challenges in getting kids to school," Moody said. "We have staff and liaisons that help to support our families and students with getting to school. And not just getting to school on time."

But absenteeism is a bigger problem at some schools, and those facilities need extra help.

"Our chronic absenteeism rates vary across schools, so we are working at every school," Moody said. "There are some targeted interventions that we need to do to increase supports at certain schools where there may be more challenges to make sure that all of our students are at school and getting their lessons that they need for their next steps."

Advance Illinois President Robin Steans said the challenges facing District 186 are not unique in the state's public school system.

"Like many districts across the state and country, Springfield is struggling on a number of fronts, including with chronic absenteeism, which we know impacts student learning and achievement," Steans said. "It is encouraging to see strong teacher retention, and when taken as a whole, the district's performance should remind us that schools have a hard and essential job to do and the state needs to quicken its work to bring District 186 and every other underfunded district to adequacy so they can increase support, resources and rigor for students."

The SEA's Graves said the chronic absenteeism data, while not good, is "trending in the right direction at least."

"As an old colleague of mine used to say to parents, 'You get your kids to school rested, on time, every day, and we can do miracles with them," Graves said. "SEA implores parents to partner with us and get their children to school, ready and willing to learn and be part of the academic culture, and then watch them grow." \square



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Superintendent search underway

Jennifer Gill's 12-year tenure as Springfield School District 186 superintendent will come to a close when she retires at the end of the current school year in June 2026. Meanwhile, the District 186 School Board has been hard at work finding Gill's replacement, and announced an updated interview and hiring schedule at the Nov. 3 school board meeting.

Prospective candidates for the position have until Dec. 5 to apply. Candidates will be presented to the school board at the Dec. 15 meeting, with candidates being interviewed from late December through mid-January. The new superintendent will be appointed Jan. 27 and begin work on July 1, 2026.

The District 186 board asked the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB) to convene a total of 18 focus groups involving 166 people over two days to discuss what qualities the ideal new superintendent should embody.

The focus groups included administrators, teachers, staff, parents, community members, students and union leaders.

The IASB's Carmen Ayala, the former Illinois State Superintendent of Education and the leader of the District 186 superintendent search effort, made a presentation during the District 186 board meeting about the focus group results. Ayala reported that all of the focus groups felt District 186 is comprised of dedicated and passionate educators with deep community roots and that a new district leader should reflect those qualities.

Based on focus group input, the new superintendent should be ready to address fiscal challenges, teacher retention, post-pandemic academic recovery, equity and consistency across programs, and rebuilding community trust with a unity of purpose.

Ayala proposed wording for the published job description, which the District 186 board unanimously approved, that states the ideal candidate will be "a supportive leader who values and uplifts staff, prioritizes student safety and discipline, and drives academic rigor, equity and community engagement. Expectations center on integrity, visibility and communication. We are seeking a long-term, authentic leader who connects deeply with the Springfield community and is a visionary leader who can bring fresh ideas and

innovative practices while building trust across all stakeholders."

Jordan Robinson is a Springfield High School student and was part of a superintendent search focus group. He was pleased to bring a student perspective to the process.

"A lot of students find value in District 186 but also can recognize some inequities between the schools, and maybe we can work on a way to solve that," Robinson said. "Students have a very significant viewpoint because they give you something that's unique that not every other focus group can give you. The process is very interesting, and I think we can really help with it a lot."

District 186 Board member Buffy Lael-Wolf is heading the board's superintendent search effort, and said this painstaking approach to hiring a new leader is the best way to proceed.

"The Board of Education very much wants to get this right because we know how important a superintendent is to our community," Lael-Wolf said. "Getting this right is super important, and we want to hear all the voices and get all perspectives before making a decision."

Lael-Wolf added that the outgoing superintendent will be a tough act to follow.

"We've been blessed with a good one for

many years and those are big shoes to fill," Lael-Wolf said.

Gill has been superintendent of Springfield Public School District 186, which serves more than 14,000 students, since 2014.

Gill is a lifelong resident of Springfield and graduate of Springfield Public Schools, attending Dubois Elementary, Grant Middle and Springfield High schools. She began her teaching career in the Jacksonville Public Schools as a fifth-grade teacher, then served in the Springfield Public Schools as a teacher, district office administrator, and building principal at both Vachel Lindsay and McClernand Elementary. Gill was director of teaching and learning at McLean County Unit 5 School District in Bloomington-Normal prior to being hired as District 186 superintendent.

Gill comes from a family of educators. Her grandmother taught in a one-room schoolhouse in rural McLean County. Gill's mother was an orchestra teacher in Springfield Public Schools, and her father taught reading and English in the Tri-City School District in Buffalo

"It's been a joy to work and serve in the district in which I grew up," Gill said. "Springfield is a great place to grow up, raise a family and work."

Gill observed that "we've weathered a few

storms" during her 12 years at the District 186 helm, but "we've done so in a way that allows us to come out on the right side of things in the end."

According to the IASB, the average length of service for an Illinois public schools' superintendent is less than three years. When she started her education career, Gill said she never dreamed of being a superintendent, much less the leader of District 186.

"I was very content being a teacher, but I always wanted to see if I could help the school district on different levels throughout my tenure," Gill recalled. "I credit my mentors for the opportunities I have had along the way, including (former Superintendents) Diane Rutledge and Bob Hill, and all the people that have given me a chance and said, 'Hey, we see something in you, and we want you to be in this committee or take this opportunity."

Gill said the passage of the onecent, countywide sales tax in 2018 to fund District 186 capital improvements is one of the highlights of her career.

"When I started, the community told us we needed to do something to our facilities, to make them spaces where our students can learn and grow for the next 100 years," Gill said. "That was a huge community endeavor, and I never will stop saying thank you to the taxpayers for allowing that to happen so we could create the schools that we wanted to see our students learn and thrive in."

Gill has advice for the new superintendent when that person walks in the door on July 1.

"Get to know the community leaders, work alongside them, reach out to them, have coffee or lunch with them," Gill said. "Do the things that you need to do to learn what's going on that will help Springfield to be better, not just District 186, but the entire community. Also listen to the teachers, principals, students, families and the community."

"I want to thank all of those colleagues, teachers, principals and my family who have worked alongside me all of those years to make sure that growth and a growth mindset have always been our focus," Gill added.
"It's been an honor to do this job but it still scares me every day because it's big, and it's something that I don't take lightly." \square

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Food hub hits the spot

Goods from more than 40 local farms and businesses featured at Springfield store FOOD | Peter Glatz

I am a staunch supporter of family farms and sustainable agriculture, and I prefer shopping at small, local businesses over large corporations. This deeply held belief is why the sight of an Amazon package on my porch inevitably triggers a sense of guilt.

The Amazon box symbolizes my struggle to uphold my values in a hyper-efficient, global marketplace. When I need to source specialty ingredients such as Spanish guindilla peppers or Japanese white shoyu, which are not available locally, Amazon's accessibility and efficiency conflict with my commitment to supporting local businesses. Every Amazon purchase feels like a betrayal, supporting a model that erodes the local vitality I support. But rationalizing these purchases is just an excuse for choosing the path of least resistance.

While 100% "Buy Local" is unattainable, I always try to check for local alternatives before shopping online. This is why I was excited when I walked through the doors of the new Salt Fork Food Works food hub in the former Ad Astra space on East Adams Street in Springfield. Its shelves are brimming with goods from more than 40 local farms and businesses. As I explored their vast offerings, I saw numerous opportunities to ease my guilt about filling Jeff Bezos's pockets.

As a necessary disclosure, I work at Caprae Restaurant, which is part of the same parent company as Salt Fork Food Works. Caprae is located at Prairie Fruits Farm and Creamery in

My week is divided between the restaurant, where I work on weekdays, and my home in Springfield, where I return for the weekends. A key part of my job is managing the incoming deliveries of produce and proteins from our local farm suppliers. Because the farmers often deliver the orders in person, I've had the opportunity to build direct, personal relationships with them.

I was pleased to find several of the products we use at Caprae on the shelves at the Salt Fork Food Works Springfield food hub. These included Cahokia rice, a long-grain variety sourced from a fourth-generation biodynamic farm in southern Illinois. This rice is not only delicious but also high in protein, has a low glycemic index, and is free of heavy metal contaminants. Also familiar to me were the meats, poultry and eggs from Abundant Pastures, also located in southern Illinois. And

of course, the store's inventory also includes the award-winning cheeses and gelatos from our own Prairie Fruits Farm and Creamery, as well as an enticing assortment of baked goods from its sister company, Central Illinois Bakehouse, including its popular "croughnut." A croughnut is the Bakehouse's cross between a doughnut and a croissant.

Salk Fork Food Works stocks stone-ground organic flours from local mills: Funk's Grove in McLean and Janie's Mill in Ashkum. My year as a baker and pasta maker in Minneapolis involved working with similar stone-ground, heirloom flours from a nearby mill, so I am excited to once again bake with such highquality local heirloom flours such as Turkey Red and Red Fife.

The food hub sources much of its inventory through a partnership with The Farms of Illinois. This distribution service represents a collective of farmers dedicated to regenerative agriculture, emphasizing collaboration with nature, enhancing soil health and reducing waste. Local farms contributing to this supply include Bland Family Farms (Jacksonville), Buckhorn Dairy (Mount Sterling), Itty

Bitty Micro Farm (Springfield) and Lemay Mushroom Operation (Springfield).

The store offers an exciting variety of artisanal goods. These include goat milk soaps from The Wright Soapery in Urbana, utilizing milk sourced from Prairie Fruits Farm and Creamery. They also feature syrups and pickles from Granite City's Earth Candy, alongside shrubs, syrups and jams from Berries and Flour, a women-owned culinary goods business in Champaign. For coffee lovers, it stocks selections from Sirius Coffee Roasters in Lexington and Elm City Roastery in Jacksonville. Additionally, shoppers can find fresh pasta from Jacksonville's Corner Deli.

According to Salt Fork Food Works owner Lauren Brokish: "Everyone is coming out, and we're selling lots of local food and a ton of croughnuts! We're so happy that people are working us into their schedules. The biggest comment we've gotten is how happy everyone is that there is now a year-round option for groceries downtown. We know that people would like to see us open more days, but our Saturday-only model works really well for us and for our farming partners. We'll try to have new items each week, so be sure to visit weekly to see all the fun seasonal stuff."

Salt Fork Food Works, 308 E. Adams St., is open every Saturday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. year-round.

After my recent visit to Salt Fork Food Works, I stocked up on a few ingredients to make holiday treats. This sweet potato appetizer is a good option for holiday gatherings because it's gluten-free and vegetarian-friendly.

Sweet potato appetizer with fresh chèvre and dried cranberries

Serves 4-6

Ingredients:

2 large sweet potatoes, sliced into 1/4 to 1/2-inch rounds (See note below) 2 tablespoons olive oil Salt and black pepper to taste ½ teaspoon sweet paprika 4 ounces Prairie Fruits Farm and Creamery ½ cup dried cranberries, roughly chopped Honey, for drizzling Fresh rosemary, for garnish Note: I used a round ring mold to make

Preparation:

uniform sweet potato rounds.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a mixing bowl, toss the sweet potato rounds with the olive oil, salt and pepper.

Line a sheet tray with parchment paper. Transfer the sweet potatoes to the sheet tray, spacing them evenly.


Bake the sweet rounds for eight to 10 minutes. Then flip them with a spatula and continue baking for another eight to 10 minutes, or until fully cooked. Be sure to check them periodically as oven performance can vary, which can affect baking times.

When cool enough to handle, roll the edges of the sweet potato rounds with sweet paprika, and top with a spoonful of fresh chèvre.

Drizzle with honey and garnish with the dried cranberries and fresh rosemary. □

December music arrives


